St. Nicholas, as all the world knows, is the patron of children, with whom he is the most popular saint in the calendar. Bishop of Myra, in Lycia, in the time of Constantine the Great, if we are to credit the Roman breviary, supplied three destitute maidens with dowries by secretly leaving a marriage portion for each at their window. Hence the popular fiction that he is purveyor of presents to children on Christmas Eve. He usually makes his appearance as an old man with a venerable beard, and dressed as a bishop, either riding a white horse or an ass, and carrying a large basket on his arm, and a bundle of rods in his hand. In some parts of Bohemia he appears dressed up in a sheet instead of his head instead of a mitre. On his calling out: "Will thou pray?" all the children fall upon their knees, whereupon he lets fall some fruit upon the floor and disappears. In this manner he goes from house to house, sometimes ringing a bell to announce his arrival, visits the nurseries, inquires into the conduct of the children, praises or admonishes them, as the case may be, distributing sweetmeats or rods accordingly. St. Nicholas is the Santa Claus of Holland, and the Smilkas of Switzerland, and the Somoos Kias of Heligoland. In the Vorarlberg he is known as Zemniklas, who threatens to put naughty children into his hay-sack; in Nether Austria as Niklo, or Niglo, who is followed by a masked servant called Kramaras, while in the Tyrol he goes by the name of the "Holy Man," and shares the patronage of his office with St. Luno, who distributes gifts a long the girls, as he among the boys. Sometimes he is accompanied by the Christ-child. In many parts of Switzerland, Germany and the Netherlands, St. Nicholas still distributes his presents on St. Nicholas eve—the 5th of December—instead of on Christmas Eve. In the Netherlands and adjoining provinces he is especially popular, and is perhaps the only saint who has maintained his full credit, even among the Protestants. For preys previous to his expected advent many housewives have been secretly conspiring with the bakers in gilding nuts, cakes and gingerbread, and torturing pastry, prepared with flour, sugar, money, spices and sweetmeats into the most fantastical forms, from which the good saint may from time to time replenish his supplies. As to the children, St. Nicholas, or Sander Kias is the burden of their prayers, the staple of their dreams and the inspiration of their songs. As they importune him to let fall from the chimney top some pretty gift into their little aprons, they go on hinging with childish fervor. "Sunder Kias du gode Brood! Bleg mi Noet un Zokeroed. Niet te roel un roek to mim. Stiek in mine Schorten in. In Belgium, on the eve of the good bishop's serial voyage to his pastoral visitation of his bishoprics of chimney-tops, the children polish their shoes, and after filling them with hay, oats or carrots for the saint's white horse, they put them on a table or set them in the fire-place. The room is then carefully closed and the door locked. Next morning it is opened in the presence of the assembled household, when, *mirabile dictu!* the furniture is found to be turned topsy-turvy, while the little shoes, instead of the horse's forage, are filled with sweetmeats and toys for the good children, and with rods for the bad ones. In some places, wooden or China shoes, stockings, baskets, cups and saucers, and even bundles of hay are placed in the chimney or by the side of the bed, or in a corner of the room, as the favorite receptacle of St. Nicholas' presents. **Sad Incident of the Eastern War.** The London Telegraph says: An incident has befallen the wicked and cruel war now raging, which may help to bring home to those chiefly responsible for its sufferings a sharper sense of their guilt. Prince Sergius, of Leuchtenberg, says a telegram from Gorney (Goroni), has been killed in one of the recent reconnaissances made by the army of the czar. The prince, as attached, like his brother Eugene, to the banners of the Russian Guard, and being along the Lora, a Turkish bullet struck him in the forehead, instantly killing him. The prince thus slain in the flower of his life—for he was only twenty-eight years of age—was, we believe, the fourth son of the late Duke of Leuchtenberg, and the late Emperor Nicholas, of Russia, being, therefore, a nephew to the present czar, and it is obvious that such a casualty must appeal to the mind of the Russian ruler and his household with a great deal more force than the deaths of innumerable soldiers and ordinary officers. We do not say this uncharitably; for it is not to be doubted that long ago the very soul of Alexander was sickened by the carnage, amid which he is obliged to live, and by the multiplying proofs of the crime a blunder, into which he allowed himself to be drawn by the solicitations of the Russian war party, and the beguiling prospect of a faction among ourselves. We know too how far there may have been a touch of tenderness in the relations between Prince Sergius and the Emperor Alexander, but the two were at all events near kinsmen by blood, and it is not easy to see that the natural feeling of sympathy for this young man's death, may so press the mind of his

majesty with the unspeakable misery caused by his enterprise in many a humble home, and so far away his already melancholy disposition, that he may be and-by open his eyes a little to the true character of this vast crime, which is disguised under the name of a pious and philanthropic undertaking. **A Curious Little Animal.** The "truncated pichigo" is one of the smallest of four-footed animals. It is not more than two inches in length. The shield which covers the entire upper portion of its body is composed of a single piece, and consists of regular, uniform, and smooth scales neatly arranged like mosaic. This coat of mail is truncated vertically at its rear portion. The animal has a curious, cut-off appearance, owing to the apparent absence of a tail, but in reality due to the position of that member, which is short and closely pressed against the body. All the lower portions, the neck, stomach, sides and legs are covered with long and fine hairs. The pichigo is found chiefly in the Cordillera mountains, in Chili, where it feeds on earth worms, snails, and insects. It uses its long, large and sharp nails to make burrows, which are often very deep. In these it remains concealed during the greater part of the day, and rarely ventures to wander to any great distance even by night. It cannot jump or run swiftly; hence when attacked by an enemy it has no means of escape but by its subterranean gallery; hence, when laid pressed, it seeks safety in digging a new hole, and very often succeeds in thus escaping; but when this resource fails, the animal rolls its head and legs under its stomach, forming a ball like a hedgehog, and thus incased in armor defies the teeth or claws of its adversary. It is sometimes called the chlamyphore. As is the case with the mole and other subterranean animals, the eyes are of minute dimensions, and are hidden under the soft and profuse fur of the face.
