NEW ENGINEER IS APPOINTED

R. J. Sandover Sly is Choice of Council—Other Business.

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Firemen's Hall last Thursday evening. His Worship Mayor McKay, who has been prevented through illness from attending for some months occupied the chair and was warmly greeted.

Coun. Gilroy, St. Onge, Graham, Mathews, Duncan, Moore and Marquis were present. A communication was read from A. T. LeBlanc who stated that the town could not assess Joseph Ouellette, though he worked in town, as he lived outside the town limits. He referred to Assessment and Appeals Committee.

The minutes of several previous meetings were read and confirmed. A communication was read from A. T. LeBlanc threatening legal action if Mr. Legere suffered damage by reason of the town permitting sewers to run through Mr. Legere's property. This communication was ordered placed on file.

A communication was read from Dr. Melvin enclosing copy of amendments made to the Provincial Board of Health Act made at the last session of the Provincial Legislature. Laid on table to be taken up at the next meeting of the council.

The auditor for the past year W. F. Comeau, Newcastle, wrote agreeing to make a quarterly audit and oversee work on books for \$200.00 per year. On motion he was appointed town auditor for the ensuing year, as per his offer.

The town solicitor wrote that the deed to that portion of the O'Leary property required for street purposes would be ready within the course of a few days. Mr. O'Leary having already agreed to the town's terms and conditions, he need now only awaiting his signature. Placed on file.

A communication was read from the Deputy Minister of Railways in which he stated he would send a representative here to meet the council regarding the proposed Central street subway, arrangements could be entered into between the town and the railway, of having the railway's proposition of the cost included in next year's estimates. Placed on file.

Several applications for licenses were referred to the Police and License Committee.

The usual departmental accounts were then gone into and ordered paid. On recommendation of Councilor Graham, Chairman Police and License Committee, several licenses were ordered granted on the payment of the customary fees.

Coun. Moore moved that Mr. R. R. Beebe be appointed Town Engineer. Motion lost.

Coun. Duncan moved that R. J. Sandover Sly be appointed Town Engineer. Motion carried.

Mr. Sly was also appointed Plumbing Inspector and Manager Water Sewerage Department.

Mrs. Stewart McLaughlin was appointed a member of the Board of School Trustees in place of Mrs. Wm. Currie whose term had expired.

Donald McIlraith was appointed to measure the stone hauler from the Sugar Loaf last fall by Thom. Ellisworth. Substitute W. R. Millican.

On motion of Coun. Graham seconded by Coun. Gilroy it was ordered that improvements to property within the town, consisting of painting, fencing and planting of trees etc, be exempt from taxation.

The town clerk reported that he had been presented with a county tax bill. He explained that for years the county assessors had not assessed the town's property in the county, nor had the town assessed the county's property in the town. This year however both the county and town had been assessed.

His Worship brought up the matter of the unsightly buildings formerly used as a fire station. These he suggested should be moved and the lot cleaned up. He suggested that three

GEO. SARGENT'S BODY RECOVERED

Picked Up by Lobster Fishermen Near Tignish, P. E. I. Last Week.

Summerside, P. E. I. May 27—James Sargent, of Campbellton, and E. J. Sargent, of St. John's, father and brother respectively, of Geo. Sargent, who was presumed to have been drowned while shooting wild fowl at Escomb on November 21 last, were in Summerside today on their way to Tignish where they intend to get in touch with the authorities regarding the unidentified body of a man which was found floating on the water by lobster fishermen a few days ago at Frog Pond, near Tignish.

E. J. Sargent read an item in the New Brunswick paper regarding the finding of the body but it was then too late for him to be present at the inquest. From the published description he is reasonably certain that the body is that of his missing brother whose disappearance has been considerable of a mystery. Upon the arrival of father and son at Tignish Saturday evening they propose to have the body, which has been buried there, exhumed.

The above dispatch appeared last Saturday.

On Monday Mr. Sargent was able to identify the remains as those of his son George, who was lost off Escomb while shooting geese last fall. The body was prepared for removal to Campbellton and arrived here Tuesday morning.

The Graphic understands that a thorough post mortem examination of the body was made, the evidence of foul play was discovered. The funeral was held Wednesday afternoon and was very largely attended.

The services at the house and grave were conducted by Rev. Mr. Harrington. The body was conveyed on the Escomb to Summerside, as the deceased was a member of the brigade. Many floral offerings attested to the esteem in which the departed was held.

CAMPBELLTON BASE BALL LEAGUE

Four Teams Have Entered Local League—Opening Game Monday Next.

A meeting in connection with the organization of the Campbellton Baseball League was held in the Campbellton Curling Rink, Friday evening 19th inst. Four teams entered, viz—Cubs, Shivers, C. N. R. and Firemen. The officers elected for the season are as follows:—

Honorary President—J. P. Jardine, Chairman; Geo. F. Miles, A. H. Troy, Earl Love, A. H. Troy, D. K. Graham, J. Moore and Dr. Gaudet.

Field Committee—J. P. Jardine, Hector Smith, Harold LaFrank and Wallace Henry.

Official Umpires—George Harding, Earl Love, A. H. Troy, D. K. Graham, J. Moore and Dr. Gaudet.

Local Press Reporters and Advertisers—Reuben Dickie, Gerald L. Wall, Shirley Wetmore, R. M. Raymond and Harry Hachee.

Schedule Committee—A. H. Troy, J. P. Jardine, Geo. F. Miles, Wesley Dobson, P. R. McLean.

Representatives of Teams—Cubs, J. P. Jardine, Shivers, W. Fred, C. N. R. Geo. F. Miles; Firemen, P. R. McLean.

The Executive Committee of the Base Ball League is composed of the President, Vice-President, Sec. Treas., Chairman Field Committee, together with representative of each team.

The league opens on Monday, June 5th, and the schedule committee have been authorized to draft schedule.

The Executive Committee have authorization regarding arrangements for out-of-town games and expenditures involved therein.

The funds of the Base Ball League shall be known as the Campbellton Base Ball League Funds and cheques can only be issued by the Secretary Treasurer certified by the President.

Any players having played on any one team cannot be transferred to another team without the permission of the Executive Board.

The following rules and regulations were adopted:—

The name of the organization shall be the Campbellton Baseball League.

Time limit to submit list of names of eighteen (18) players for each team to the Secretary Treasurer to be June 30th. In the event of a ball player becoming a resident after June 30th, before such person or persons are permitted to participate in games, their applications will have to be accepted by the executive board.

All field rules to be arranged before games between captains and the umpires.

All games to be started at 6.45 p.m. sharp.

Games to consist of seven innings unless called off by the umpires on account of rain or darkness. Nothing less than three innings to constitute a game. If a tie occur one extra inning will be played if the umpires so desire.

All the games and postponed games to be played at the end of the season, in order of postponement.

League games to be played on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Practice nights, Tuesdays and Thursdays.

All matters pertaining to the league shall be dealt with by the executive. Not less than five of said executive, composed of three officers and at least a representative from two of the teams to constitute a quorum.

Players are forbidden to indulge in abusive language and conversation with spectators during league games.

No betting by players will be tolerated. No smoking by players occupying the field or bat. Any team of the league violating the bye-laws or refusing to abide by the decision of the executive shall be expelled or suspended, such suspension or expulsion to carry with it forfeiture of all monies due the said team or club, until such time as may be seen fit by the executive to lift the ban.

The net gate receipts, less expenses shall be divided equally among the competing teams or clubs of the league and the executive. The settlement to be made at the end of the season.

IN DEATH'S SHADOW
FOR NINE HOURS
Thrilling Experience of Crew of Shipwrecked Steamer Arbece.
Near Cape Race.

Montreal, May 27.—With the story of how they were left clinging to a rock two miles from shore for nine hours before getting to safety, nine members of a shipwrecked crew reached Montreal yesterday, where they will sign on the American ship John Magee.

The shipwrecked mariners were on the British steamer Arbece which struck the Renewa Rocks, near Cape Race, last Monday week.

Seaman W. J. Miles, one of the shipwrecked party, stated that there had been the slightest sort of a breeze blowing every man of the crew in the vicinity and only six feet above the water at low tide. There was no room for the men to turn around or ease their cramped muscles. The cold was intense. When daylight came the ship was found to be in a hopeless position and the captain decided to give orders for the lowering away of one of the life boats by cutting the tackle. The lifeboat had a bad list when it crashed down and broke the leg of the mate, who was helping the men out with the launching. At the same time the lifeboat practically wrecked itself.

While the tide was rising to a dangerous height work was rushed forward on the boat, and a canvas tied round the bottom helped to keep the water out. The crew then piled in and soon the tide was high enough to float the boat which was then rowed to the shore. When within two yards
