





CONVICT WANDERER OF DOUBLE MURDER

Peculiar Case Puzzled Chicago Police For Many Weeks.

CHICAGO, March 18 .- Carl Wanlerer today was found guilty by a jury of the murder of the "ragged stranger," shot to death in the alleged mock hold up, and the penalty fixed at death. Wanderer previously was convicted of the murder of his wife, shot to death at the same time as the stranger, and was sentenced to 25 years' imprisonment. The double murder took place last ummer. Wanderer declared that when he came home from a picture show one night with his wife they met a man in the vestibule at the entrance to their home. The man opened fire, Wanderer said, and he fired back. The stranger and Wanderer's wife were killed.

For several days Wanderer was looked on as a hero. The police, however, found that the stranger's gun belonged to Wanderer's cousin, and that Wanderer had borrowed it a few days before the murders. Wanderer was arrested and signed a confession that he had hired the stranger, whom he termed a "poor boob," to stage a fake hold-up, and had killed his wife and the man.

In his first trial, for the murder of his wife, and her unborn babe, Wanderer repudiated this confession. He was found guilty and given a 25-year sentence, the jury announcing that it had compromised on the punishment. he came home from a picture show one

This year is census year—Canada is going to measure its own "height and weight in the world-to find out how much it has grown or lost; to see if it is under-nourished or overnourished or what, in citizens.

A nation is curiously like the hu-man body, for its natural growth consists in the reproduction of its individual units-cells in the case of the body, people in the case of of the body, people in the case of the nation. Just as in the body the new material produced must more than make up for the waste and wear or tear, if growth is to result, so in a nation the number of births must be greater than the number of the deaths to make the population increase by natural means.

But nations can grow another way, by a method not very common in the human body itself—that is by the actual addition of new-ready made material from outside, instead of any internal growth. This does happen in the human body sometimes, as when a surgeon transplants skin from one person to another. In the case of a nation, the immigrant is the transplanted skin, forming a ready-made and often very welcome addition. It must be admitted, however, that sometimes immigration results in the same sort of discrepancy of which Jeff complained to Mutt recently—the skin that was transplanted to Jeff's wounded head turned out to be chicken skin and grew feathers instead of hair! Immigrants sometimes introduce 'hairasing' methods of a like bizarre character.


DEATH RATE LOWER AMONG ABSTAINERS

Superintendent of Insurance Adds To Recent Statement Regarding Statistics.

OTTAWA, March 18.— By Canadian Press.—G. D. Finlayson, superintendent of insurance, in, a statement tonight refers to evidence given before the pensions committee with respect to the relative mortality of abstainers and non-abstainers.

sions committee with respect to the relative mortality of abstainers and non-abstainers.

"The statement with reference to the relative mortality experiencel by abstainers and non-abstainers as insured lives," said Mr. Finlayson, "was made in connection with a private bill promoted by a particular company which has a comparatively small abstainers' section, and the question as to the experience of this section having arisen it was stated that at the present time the mortality in this section was higher than in the general section. It was, however, clearly pointed out that owing to the small number of lives involved this fact had absolutely no significance as indicating the relative mortality of abstainers and non-abstainers generally. "The experience of companies operating abstainers' sections in a large way, and also investigations made from time to time both in the United States and Great Britain into the mortality of the two classes, go to show that the abstainers' class experiences a lower rate of mortality than the general






