OTTAWA, March 19,—The dynamite fac-ories owned by John F. Patton, situated bout a mile and half from Hull on the OTTAWA, March 19.—The dynamite incotories owned by John F. Patton, situated about a mile and half from Hull on the Gatineau road, were blown up at 5 c'olock yesterday afternoon. Fortunately no lives were lost. The force of the explosion was terrific, and caused almost a panic in Ottawa and Hull, the impression prevailing in some quarters that an earthquake had occurred. Several houses in Hull were damaged, and the concussion blew out windows in several Ottawa residences. It appears that one of the four hands employed in the mixing house, where the dynamite was prepared, contrary to rules, indulged in smoking and dropped a spark, which caused the disaster. The building contained 4,200 pounds of dualin, 3,361 pounds of nitrate of soda and other combustible materials. The employes fled for their lives. They had scarcely gone 500 yards when the explosion occurred, completely shattering the mixing-house and leveling to the ground the cartridge and nitro-glycerine factories. The men owe their escape to the shelter afforded by a thick grove of trees. Several of the trees were torn up by the roots, and a deep hole about an are in extent was made in the ground. The effects of the explosion were felt at Thurso, 30 miles down the river. The total loss amounts to \$6,000.

PITTSBURG, Pa., March 19.—By an explosion at the Crescent steel works yesterday Frederick Bonnhunt was killed, Hans Wittman and John Gustavison were fatally burned, and six other workers were injured. The explosion was caused by hot slag falling from the furnace into a pool of water.



In accepting Parnell's challenge, Mr. Healy requested Parnell to name a date under which they were both to resign their seats in Parliament, and says he hopes that Parnell will not resort "to a committee from No. 15, or Boulogne tactics," to escape the indgment of the electors.



ELISHA'S DEFENDERS.

BY THE REV. LYMAN AEBOTT, D.D.

"Fear not; for they that be with us are more than they that be with them "—II. Kings vi., 16.

God has semetimes drawn aside the thin but unpierced veil which conceals this world from the other. We are as these on shiphard, approaching an unknewn harbor in a dense fog. Now and then God suffers the fog to lift, and shows us the land close at hand. Then it closes in around us again, and the harbor is utterly con-eaded.

The lesson of to-day is such a disclosure.

The story is a very simple one.

The state of society in that age allowed what modern civilization forbids—swedatory warfare. The King of Syria sent oands of troops to make forays on the Israelitish country and carry off their cattle and goods. It was probably in some such predatory excursion that the little maid was taken captive who became the prophet and herald of good tidings to Naamant. Similar were the excursions of the Highlanders on the Lowlanders of the northern tier of English counties, and the Norman bands of plunderers who, before the Norman invasion, were accustomed to awoop down on the coast of England, to the great terror of the inhabitants. Elisha, who lived at court, and was in favor with the king, informed him of these predatory bands before they made their appearance; forewarned was forearmed, and the Syrians, however secretly their marauding excursion was planned, always found the point guarded by a troop of Israelitish soldiers.

The Syrian king became angry. He suspected without apparent reason, that there was a traitor in his camp; incadical a council of war; laid his suspicions belinis advisers. One of them responded by shrewd and correct surmise: "Klisha, the prophet that is in Israel, telleth the King of Israel the words that thou speakest in thy bed chamber." It is possible that the suggestion came from Naaman, who had prophet?

force to proceed to Dothan for that purpose.

Dothan, where Elisha was residing, first appears in sacred history in the story of Joseph, as the place where his brethren were feeding their flooks when he carried to them his father's message. About twelve miles north of Shechem there is a large plane of very rich pasturage, which still bears the name of Dothan. Though no village is now found there, this is undoubtedly the site of Joseph's calamity and Elisha's deliverance. The probable site of the city is identified by ruins upon an isolated hill in the midst of the plain. On the eastern side it is encircled by a row of hills, where doubtless the Syrian army encamped.
