Cablegrams.

The rejection by the Lords of the bill granting local self-government to Ireland is the talk of the last day or two. Such a gathering of Great Britain's nobility as was witnessed last week has not been seen before within the memory of any living man. The usually tenantless benches and galleries in the splendid chamber of the Lords were prowded afternoon and night. There was row upon row of peers and peeresses. One of the most important matters under discussion was that of the proposed bicycle track at Queen's Park and the offer of the Western Fair Board in connection therewith. Judging from the general interest manifested, it is certain the promoters of the scheme will not allow it to drop, but will push matters vigorously in every direction until the track is an accomplished fact.

Mr. Walter Mann was in favor of letting the offer of the Western Fair pass. He said a joint stock company could readily be found to acquire new grounds, erect stands, etc., and this would give the wheelmen sole control of the undertaking. He moved that no action be taken.

Mr. Carroll thought Mr. Mann's idea impracticable. The cost of grounds, inclosing same, building track and erecting suitable stands would not fall short of \$10,000, and in view of the fact that the only means of revenue would be the rental derived from one or two "meets" and the annual fees of those using the track, he failed to see the inducement to shareholders. The ofter of the Western Fair Board was most liberal; they had acceded absolutely to every demand of the various clubs; and for the wheelmen now to lose heart because the council could not at first sight see the importance of the undertaking was foolish in the extreme. At present they actually had one half of the track, and he was confident that when the council had the matter presented to them in its true significance they would soon have the balauce. United action was necessary, and the re should be no flagging until every obstacle was overcome.

He knows their leaders, their customs, and their strength and vindictiveness, and he surely would not be foolish enough to go into their fastnesses, as he is said to have done, and wreak summary vengeance on men whose thousands of friends he could be certain would more than pay him back in kind. He is a politician, and there is nothing foolish in his make-up. There is not in Africa a more skillful tactician than he.
