

8. S. Fowler, of Nelson, has so far en one of the most successful operors on the leasing system, and his lews on the possibilities and limitaderatle value. Asked his views on e subject by a representative of The anadian, Mr. Fowler said:

"The greatest and also the most oblous advantage of the leasing system is the great saving of expenditure. The ining operations of a big company ecessarily involve an office staff of air salaried men, accountant, clerks, nanager and engineer. Where the aufority of the manager is limited it lso involves frequently costly delays obtaining consent and approval for rojected operations.

The system has been in vogue for me years in Colorado and has been ccessful there. The returns of printcontracts show that the lessees pay much higher royalty in Colorado n has so far been paid in British commbia. There the companies usualdo a certain amount of development k, sink a shaft and equip it, and rt drifts. Then they lease parts the drifts, making it a condition of lease that the lessee shall do a ertain amount of development work fore he begins to stope ore.

"As to the royalties paid, the figures hange since. The royalty is on a ling scale, from 10 per cent on the gross returns in the case of \$25 ore verage of 45 per cent on \$100 ore. In British Columbia the rate is usualy only 25 per cent on \$100 ore and alculated on the smelter returns.

"The first leases in British Columda were generally taken on developed mines by former employes, who knew he location of small ore bodies and t leases merely to take them out. sying a small percentage of the re-Such lessees were usually, ough not always, working miners. "That condition, however, is rapidly assing. It had many defects. Such essees seldom had any capital. They ad to work on credit, with a merhant sharing the risk, and they did o development work. The mine ownrs derived no benefit.

"The new condition is creating lass of lessees with small capital and sually with enough mining and busiless experience to satisfy the owners that the work undertaken will be well

"A recent contribution to the sublect has advocated the formation of mall syndicates, of 25 miners, each ontributing \$10 a month for developent. Well, \$250 a month will not go far to develop a mine.

"Few working miners have enough capital to really accomplish anything worth while. The lessees of the future will be men who can afford a few housand dollars. They may then subease special parts of the properties. "It has been found that employes

INDIANS INDEPENDENT

Government Assistance.

Winnipeg, Man., Oct. 31. - Rev. Thomas Crosby, the oldest home missionary of the Methodist Church, is in the city, after 44 years' work among the Indians of British Columbia. "It was in 1862 that I first entered British Columbia," said Crosby, "Since that time I have traversed the Indian country many times and had personal acquaintance with hundreds of natives for many years. I was for twelve years among the Flatheads of the south, and then removed to the north and began work among the Tsimsians, making my headquarters in Port Simpson, the tribe in the vicinity, there being four

country. "All the Indians of the country are doing well at the present time, those of the north being the most industrious and prosperous. The Indians of the south are chiefly engaged in farming. Those of the Fraser River regions are engaged in fishing, and those of neries. You would be surprised to see the homes which some of the Indians of the province have built for themselves in these recent years. They would be a credit to any white village, being substantially built of sawn lumber and fitted up with all the con-veniences of the modern house. These Indians are wholly self-sustaining, re-ceiving no aid from the Government."

LITERARY NOTES.

MISREPRESENTATIVE WOMEN. A clever little book with noteworthy illustrations comes from the pen of Harry Graham, entitled, "Misrepresentative Women." It is a good-natur-ed satire written in excellent verse on some prominent women and institu-tions. An ode to Miss Marie Corelli is peculiarly apt. He asks:







Appeal Against Mr. Justice Mabee's Order - Ruling of High Court.

In the divisional court, Toronto, betore Chief Justice Meredith and Justices MacMahon and Anglin, a decision was given in the case of the London and Western Trusts Company vs. Luscombe. In this case W. E. Middleton for defendants, Wortman and Durand, appealed from order of Mr. Justice Mabee (8 O. W. R. 406), setting aside order of master in chambers giving directions as to trial of third party issues, and setting aside service of a third party notice upon Moorehouse and Watson, two shareholders in the Birkbeck Loan

At the same time the council showed its appreciation of the retir-ing alderman's services by presenting him with a gold-mounted umbrella, suitably engraved, and an address, expressing regret at his retirement, and voicing the hope that at some future time he might see fit to offer himself

When his resignation had been read by City Clerk Baker, Ald Wyatt told the council that he did not know how iong he would be absent on his trip to the coast, and as he did not intend to offer himself as a candidate for the council in 1907, he considered that his proper course was to tender his resignation. The vacancy, under the new act, could be filled without the trouble of holding another election, and thus the city's business would not be interfered with in any way. He thanked the members of the board for the courtesy shown him at all times. "I do not envy the aldermen," said

Ald. Wyatt. "They have their duties to perform, and they are always face to face with a good deal of selfishness. People want their own way as a rule, and it is pretty difficult to be strictly independent in dealing with all matters. One Thousand Unfortunates Are Shipped to Arctic Desolation in One Day.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 80. — Exiles are leaving Russia by trainloads every day for Siberia. They are all political prisoners whose only crime is discontent with the way Russia is governed and trying to alter it.

Over a thousand prisoners were dispatched from St. Petersburg eastward on one day recently. They were carried in three trains and included a priest, several students, forty-one women and many workmen, soldiers and sailors. The third train carried five hundred sailors who were engaged in the mutinies at Cronstadt and Sveaborg.

All but one hundred of the prisoners were bound for Siberia, the rest going to the cold northern districts of Arch-

angel and Vologda. The bleak settlement of Irkutsk and the salt fields of Ust-Kutsk are still the favorite points of the exile board. which from 1823 to 1898 sent 908,266 unfortunates to Eastern Siberia. Those seventy-five years registered the high water mark of the exile horror and then for a time the fever of deportation diminished.
