



SOCIALIST CREED ALARMS BRITAIN

Unionist "Victory" at the Polls Shows Little Call for Elation.

London, Nov. 10 .- There is great unionist jubilation throughout the country over the so-called rout of the Socialists in the recent municipal elections. There never was a greater misnomer for the result of the national polling, and no broad-minded English politician is deceived by it—least of all the leaders of the unionist farty.

What has happened or is happening is a complete change in the political complexion of the British electorate. Every form of radicalism in Britain until within the last year has been included under the banner of the Liberal party. This loose grouping now has fallen apart, as was inevitable after the overwhelming victory at the last general election.

The secession of the laborites was exected, but the exchange which actually has taken place has a far greater significance. Socialism pure and simple began a widespread propaganda about a year ago, and its effects were first manifested in the result of the election. Its work has pretended to be non-political and its doctrines have been preaches in churches, schoolhouse meetings, open air assemblages, and under every possible ruise and on every possible occasion.

So active have been its disciples that there now average 1,500 meetings weekly throughout the country. So-called nonpolitical organizations have been formed everywhere. There are scores of these in London alone, with a membership of from 700 to 2,000, which did not exist a year ago.

The leaders ignore or repudiate the mistakes of municipal ownership which caused the overwhelming defeat of the progressist party and other cities last spring Those mistakes they account for by saying that they were made by amateur and im practical imitators of real Socialist prin

It by no means follows that Socialism is destined to capture England. On the contrary, the opposite prophecy is a safe one. It does signify, however, that the political situation in this country has entirely changed, and Socialism is to become a great national issue. The leaders of both the old parties realize this fully. Lord Balfour proclaimed it in his appeal a few weeks ago, when he called on citizens of all parties to organize to meet it. The machinery of both the Unionist and Liberal parties is in a condition of demoral!zation and disintegration.

The question of the hour is whether the leaders and the rank and file sufficiently understand the emergency to be willing to abandon old party lines and reorganize to meet the grave issue which the country must face sooner or later. There is less hope of this at the present time in conservative England than there would be in alert America. The average Englishman is not prompt to foresee political dangers, but he is more alive than usual to this emergency. No British political situation ever possessed more worldwide interest than this, and its development will command as much attention in other lands as

A Brilliant Analysis of Spenser's Masterpiece—The Bible as Literature.

The pulpit of the First Methodist hurch was occupied on Sunday by Dr. Moulton, of the University of Chicago. Large congregations were present at both services, and the lectures were much appreciated.

The morning subject was on St. Matthew. He noted the difference between the gospels, a difference noted by every reader. Varied reasons had been given for that difference. He would give his opinion not as a theologian, but as a student of literature. The gospel of St. Matthew differed from the other gospels in that it was not a history, but was wisdom literature after the style of Job, Ecclesiastes, the Proverbs, and the Epistles of St. James. It was a singularly complete philosophy. Philosophy was meditation on things in general, and the philosophy of the Bible dealt with conduct and always had reference to that. An ordinary philosopher might be a good philosopher but a bad man. That was not true of the philosophy

of the Bible.

The Number Seven. The number seven stood for completion and orderly arrangement among the Hebrews, and nowhere in the Bible was it more manifest than in the Gospel of St. Matthew. 

Three years after he assumed the duties of turnkey the famous Reginald Birchall case stirred two continents, and the prisoner was confined in the jail for eight months. Turnkey and prisoner got to be good friends, and about once each year Mr. Forbes received a letter from Mrs. Birchall, who went back to England after the execution, and writes to her at the same intervals.
