The violation of any of the provisions of the order, makes the offender liable to a fine of from \$100 to \$1,000, or imprisonment for a period of about three months, or both fine and imprisonment.

Where proceedings are instituted by any municipality, the fine will be paid into the municipal treasury, and where instituted by a provincial officer, the fine will be paid to the provincial treasurer.

## THE WAR SITUATION

The loss of Mont Kemmel has evidently falled to disorganize in any way the Allied resistance in the Ypres region. The line, in fact, seems to have stiffened since this isolated height was taken by the Germans, and the enemy, after a day of desperate struggling yesterday, found himself held fast everywhere.

## GERMAN ATTACK REPULSED.

Paris April 27 .- A German attack near Thennes, on the front southeast of Amiens, was broken up last night, the war office announces. Artillery fighting continues on the front between Villers-Bretonneux and Hangard.

The statement follows: "During the night the artillery battle was continued along the front between Villers-Bretonneux and Hangard. There was no change in the situation.

'The Germans attacked our defences on the line of railroad west of Thennes, but were not able to approach our positions. "We carried out successful raids in the region of the Oise Canal near the Loivre and northeast of Carnillet, and took a number of prisoners.

"The artillery fighting was rather severe on the right bank of the Meuse (Verdun front)."

## ALLIES GAIN ON SOMME SECTOR.

London, April 27 .- Continuing their counter-attacks on the front east of Amiens, the Allies have gained further advantages in the Hangard-Villers-Bretonneux sector, it is announced offi-

## QUERIES REGARDING MILITARY SERVICE

Send In Your Problems and They Will Be Answered From Official Information by The Advertiser.

H. C. L., R. E. W. and Others.—
Q.—Does the amendment to the
M. S. A., include men who have
become 20 since the proclamation
of the first call?
A.—Two orders-in-council have been
passed. The first one brings into Class
1 those men who had not attained the
age of 20 on October 13, 1917, but who
have attained the age of 19 years.
These men being now members of
Class 1, could be called upon to report
for service or to claim exemption by
proclamation whenever needed.
The second order-in-council abolishes
all exemptions for men in Class 1, who
are in Category A, or have no category
and who were 20, but had not attained
the age of 23 when their applications
for exemption were made (last fall).
These men are being called immediately. The exemptions of men who
were 23 or over at the date of their
application for exemption, still hold
good.

U. E.—Q.—An exempted man has since the call, got married. Would he be considered a single man in this new draft? Would he not be called until the married men are called?

A.—According to the act, any man married after July 6, 1917, shall be deemed to be unmarried, as far as his being drafted is concerned. If he were drafted, his wife would, however, get separation allowance just the same as any other soldier's wife.

F. W. P.-Q.-Would a man wh gave his age as 22 years when claiming exemption, be called in this new draft, if he could prove with a birth certificate that he was 24?

was 24?

A.—According to the new order-incouncil the age stated in any claim for exemption made by or on behalf of any man, or in any other document signed by the man, shall be conclusive evidence as against him of his age and year of birth. If he is in Category A, or has no category, he will be called immediately. It might be possible for him to prove that he is 24; but he may not be given an opportunity to do so. 



NO DISCRIMINATION

Act Will Be Lived Up To-Many Expected To Appear in Court.

A copy of the order-in-council of April 6, which makes it compulsory for every male person between the ages of 16 and 60 residing in Canada to engage Williams. The document was mailed

Williams. The document was malled from the offices of the department of justice, Ottawa, and gives Chief Williams the authority to enforce the provisions of the new act.

Although action has been taken in several other cities in Ontario. Chief Williams has declined to act to the present, claiming he had no authority until a copy of the act was received from Ottawa.

Instructions will be issued to all the members of the police today to round up men who cannot prove that they are engaged regularly in some useful work. Men suspected of not being engaged in some useful work will have a chance to explain why they are not so engaged. The magistrate will decide whether the occupation in which any individual brought into court is engaged is useful work or not.

The court's interpretation of useful work may be a rude shock to some men who now think their occupation is useful, whereas the magistrate may rule differently. Several loopholes are left in the act, so that these pleas will ful, whereas the magistrate may rule differently. 

HOW TO PROTECT VEGETABLES FROM PESTS.

Each vegetable has its own special enemy, and this must be taken into consideration when trying to exterminate the various enemies or pests. Cabbage, cauliflower, onions, radishes and turnips may be attacked by the flea-beetle, caterpillars, aphis, root maggots and cutwonas. As soon as the plants appear above the ground there is danger of the flea-beetle, and they should be sprayed with paris green or arsenate of lead. For anbage worms the plants are dusted with dry insect powder mixture. Aphis are killed by spraying with kersene emulsion. If cabbage or cauliflower plants are liable to be attacked by root maggots, tar felt paper disce should be put around the stem of the plants case to the ground. This will keep the newlyhatched maggots from eating their way down into the roots of the plant. Insect powder, one ounce to three galons of water, poured about the roots of the plants before

the street. There is a lamentable ignorance among the people as a whole, in regard to the rules of health.

"At the present time nursing is not on a proper basis, and it should be put on such a basis. The member of trained nurses is not adequate to deal with illness as it should be dealt with, and as the state is bound to deal with it in the near future. The care of those not reached by a trained nurse is a very serious problem and such an organization as the Graduate Nurses' Association of Ontarlo should try to do something toward solving it. If they are not ready, the Government will solve it without them. The Victorian Order of Nurses is doing a part of this work already. It is a fine organization, with skilled members, doing a wonderful work. I believe that this organization might be enlarged to help in the problem.

"Provision should be made in good institutions for short courses to help the practical nurse. I wouldn't disparage the practical nurse in any way, but I do disparage the present method of dealing with her.

She should educate her own sex along proper lines, should have first-hand knowledge with regard to venereal diseases, the cancer problem and injurious patent medicines."

Not a few of us have even attempted to sculpture certain trees or, to use the technical word, do "topiary" work. However, this is an art little used in America, but there is no reason why it should not flourish. It seems to have belonged more to the old countries of Especially does it flourish in England, where perhaps the most beautiful topiary garden in the world is at Leven's Hall, near Kendal, in Westmoreland

This form of tree architecture is by no means new. Pliny had the grounds of his Tuscan villa exquisitely decorated by toplary work. In the early days down to the middle of the 18th century Italian gardens were filled with tree sculpture. Evelyn tells us that he saw at Genoa a grove of yews clipped to resemble a flock of sheep.

The Royal Gardens of Holland, designed during the reign of William III., contained a number of tree sculptures in the forms of genmetrical figures. There were junipers shaped in the form of pyramids, marshmallows as sun dials and immense yews shaped like summer houses, besides urns, birds, pools, animals and various forms of ornamental furniture and household objects. The manufacture of steel helmets is described in the Scientific American as being largely a matter of stamping and punching.

"The steel sheets for making the helmets," says this writer, "are furnished to the various plants engaged in helmet manufacture the United States government. All cuttings and other wastage are returned to the government by the plants as a measure of war economy. Each sheet measures about a foot square by one-sixteenth of an inch thick and is tested before it finds its way to the stamping presses. The test consists merely of forming a small hump -in reality a small helmet-at each corner of the sheet; in other words, this is nothing more than subjecting a small section of the material to the same strain which the centre section will have to bear in the huge forming presses. These small humps serve to bring out any flaws that may exist in the sheet, and these are soon detected by inspectors who pass on the sheets.

"Sheets with four perfect humps now make their way to the forming press. Each sheet is placed in turn between the male and female dies of a huge press. The operator manipulates a lever and the dies squeeze the sheet into shape to the accompaniment of an unearthly shrick, Covered with heavy oil the sheet, now formed into the dome of the helmet but still carrying the square sides and humps in the corners, emerges an instant later from between the separated dies Passing to another machine, each embryo helmet is placed between cutting dies which, at a single blow, cleave off the four corners and the square aides and give the helmet its ultimate shape. But the edge is not as smooth as it might be, and another operation remains to finish the helmet proper. So it passes on to another section of the plant, where a steel binding or channel-section strip is placed round the rough edge. This is done by an operator who then presses the helmet into a holder so that the binding is securely held in place with its two ends practically touching. Each helmet is then passed to another operator who welds the steel ends together so as to form a solid ring or binding about the rim. For this work an electrio spot welder is employed; each helmet is placed between the electrodes, and a slight pull on a lever brings the ends between the poles of an electric circuit. The welding operation is over in an instant, and the helmet is then removed from its holder. Provided with a smooth rim and in every other sense complete, it is now ready for the finishing touches.

"The American helmet, like the helmets of other warring nations, is provided with a surface calculated to avoid reflection or glare on the battlefield. The French treat their helmets with a dull blue or brown paint, while the British cover their helmets with paint over which sand is sprinkled so as to break up reflection. In the case of our own helmets we make use of a material which serves to break up reflections, but, at the same time, is a poor conductor of heat. This is a most important consideration; for we are told that British troops suffer not a little from the sun's rays striking on their sand-covered helmets during warm weather. And this is the very thing we have avoided. Of course, canvas covers can be used to shield the helmets; but it is preferable to make the helmet complete in itself.

"Obviously, the finishing of the helmet calls for a head stray and the special lining. Like the British helmet, the American is provided with an inner frame separated from the steel covering by shock-absorbing members, so that bullets and blows are not communicated to the wearer. The completed helmet has excellent bullet-resisting powers; indeed, the tests are most exacting, yet the comfort of the wearer has been carefully considered. # Strange LIZARD That Shoots BLOOD from Its ENES


F the 14 species of horned lizards (popularly called "horned toads") found in the United States, the most remarkable is the blood-squirting lizard. This strange creature is described as having the ability to send at will a fine jet of blood from either eye.

Mr. R. W. Shufeldt describes in Popular Scientific Monthly how he first noticed this habit in a small species of horned lizard that he captured many years ago in New Mexico.

"I have never been able to satisfy myself as to whether the jet of blood was from a vein or

from an artery," says Mr. Shufeldt, "Blood-squirting is generally indulged in when the lizard is laboring under certain states of ex-

citement. The attack comes on suddenly, at a time when you have the lizard in your grasp. It will suddenly stiffen its neck and throw the head upward, as the eyes bulge from their sockets. a another second you can plainly hear a peculiar hissing sound, followed immediately by the finest imaginable jet of pure blood from one or the other of its eyes. With such force is this squirted that the tiny stream, lasting a couple of seconds, may he thrown to a distance of fully five feet. As the

# Why the SUN Sometimes APPEARS to Be OVAL

HY does the setting sun appear to be oval instead of round as it drops close to the horison?

Why, too, does it then appear to be larger? The enlargement is generally an optical filusion due to the disc of the sun appearing close to the horizon, which we know to be very far distant. When the atmosphere is dusty and hot, how-

ever, it acts as a magnifying glass. The oval appearance can be understood by drawing a small circle on a sheet of white paper and placing a reading glass over it. When the circle is under the centre of the lens it appears a circle, but as the glass is moved till the circle is near its edge the circle gradually becomes an oval. The sun as it nears the horizon, and appears entarged, usually becomes an oval longer in

breadth than in height, because it is seen through

the edge of an aerial lens. The air, to a small height, is in a condition to magnify objects and has been so all day, but looking upward its thin layer would have little effect. whereas looking through it toward the horizon the effect would be increased about 16 times by the increased depth of air looked through.

Judge Doherty stated that he had absolutely no knowledge of the matter. He would be surprised, he said, if the civil service commission was considering an appointment before the position had been created.

Dr. Edwards suggested that the Government should advertise for a man to fill the post. If it was the policy of the civil service commission to advertise for men to fill \$50 a year postmasterships, why should it not apply to a position of this kind.

One Man Sufficient.

Dr. Edwards thought also that two inspectors were unnecessary. There were seven penitentiaries in Canada. One inspector could spend a month in each penitentiary and still have five months to spare.
