CAR FERRY TWO DAYS OVERDUE FEARED BESSEMER

Big Steel Steamer Which Plies Between Port Stanley and Conneaut Is Missing and Wreckage Is Reported Off Long Point Along Her Usual Course -Captain and Many of Crew Well Knownin London.

Conneaut, Ohio, Dec. 10.—The car ferry Conneaut, carrying a large crew and possibly a few passengers, is two days overdue. It is believed the ferry has been lost.

The car ferry ran between here and Port Stanley, Ont. She carried a crew of twenty-five men. Her course is near Long Point, where wreckage was reported by the steamer W. B. Davock, by wireless today.







Then baste each curtain carefully upon an old piece of muslin a little larger in size than the curtains, tacking each scallop firmly in place. book for 1909, compiled by Pitman Pulsifer, clerk of the Senate committee Sticky Sweating on naval affairs, shows the race for second place among the navies of the world to be still very close as between world to be still very close as between the United States and Germany, with Great Britain still far in the lead, having 104 fighting ships to Germany's 46 and America's 45.

of fighting ships (battleships and armored cruisers), built, building, and provided for, the United States has 45 and Germany 46, but the aggregate tonnage for the United States is 659,-241, as against 654,434. Germany, however, has a larger number of smaller ressels than the United States, and her total tonnage is 820,692, as against 785,687 for the United States. Germany's superiority in respect to small vessels is due alreely to her torpedo destroyers, of which she had 97, as against 36 for the United States. Ger-

many also outnumbers in the matter of large guns, 208 against 180. Of the fighting vessels built and in operation, the American tonnage 73,200 tons in exces of that of Germany. Great Britain is shown to possess 104 fighting ships, with a total tonnage of 1,480,680. France has 46 fighting ships, but her tonnage is more than a hundred thousand tons less than that of either the United States or Germany.

The American vessels are the only ones carrying 13-inch guns, and the German vessels the only ones carrying 11-inch guns. All the big guns on board ships are 12-inchers. Thirty-two of the United States guns are of the 13-inch
