"Father of Federal Square" Plan Says Injunction To Stop Building On Present Site Is Contemplated—Citizens' Wishes Should Be Carried Out.

Reports that an injunction will be sought to prevent the use of funds voted for federal square purposes to erect city offices on the present site were further strengthened today, when Lieut. Col. W. G. Coles stated that action of this kind was contemplated. It was largely through his efforts that the Federal Square scheme was adopted in 1913, and he is anxious to see the wishes of the people carried out as expressed on that occasion.

Diverting funds voted for that purpose to the erection of a temporary office building is illegal, in his opinion, and can be stopped by the courts. The funds, he pointed out, were accumulated in the following manner: \$100,000 was acquired by the sale of the old city hall: \$75,000 for a new hall was voted by the council of 1912, and in 1913 the Federal Square vote added another \$250. 900 to be used in the erection of buildings on the Federal Square site. Tokio Government Claims That America Furthering Own Interests Only.

Tokio, Jan. 17 .- Proposals emanating from the United States that Japan, Great Britain and the United States "take a naval holiday" is eloquent proof that despite the fabulous riches of the United States, she wishes to curtail national expenditures, and therefore the national expenditures, and therefore the proposals are intended more to help the United States than to contribute to the peace of the world, said Marquis Shigenobu Okuma, former Japanese premier, in an interview today. Daring Young Bandits Hold Up Mail Truck, Escape With Sacks of Bonds and Money

Chicago, Jan. 18.—Five youthful bandits held up a United States mail truck at the Union Station here early today, escaping in an automobile with twelve sacks of mail, ten of which contained registered mail. Police say that the best information obtainable this morning indicates the pouches contained part of a Federal Reserve Bank money shipment, which was to have been placed on a train leaving for St. Paul. Minn., at 2:30 a.m.

The bandits surprised three postal employees guarding the pouches, forcing them at the point of guns to back into the truck, while the bandit car deshed up. adian Press).—Twelve hundred cemeteries scattered across France and Belgium will be constructed by the imperial war graves commission as final resting places for the thousands of soldiers of the British Empire who fell during the war. Some of these cemeteries have been completed under the direction of distinguished architects, but by far the greater number are yet to by far the greater number are yet to be constructed. In many of the cemeteries Canadian soldiers are, or will be, buried, and some of them will be composed largely, if not entirely, of Canadian graves. As the record of each cemetery is completed by the military authorities, it is handed over to the imperial war graves commission. each cemetery is completed by the military authorities, it is handed over to the imperial war graves commission for marking, beautifying and care.

When a cemetery is completed a register is compiled, neatly bound in book form, containing photographs and descriptive matter in regard to the cemetery, and an alphabetical list of the soldiers buried there, with full particulars of rank, regiment, age, date of death, location of grave, and names of next of kin. These registers, when complete, form a complete roll of the cemetery. One copy, bound in leather, is left at the cemetery, other copies being sent to public libraries and institutions of that nature, while others have been sold, on application, at the cost of production.

The Canadian Government, having seen samples of the registers, and realizing what treasured possessions they will be to relatives of soidiers who are buried in the cemeteries, have decided to purchase sufficient copies of the register of each cemetery as it is published to supply the nearest relative of each soldier buried in the cemetery.
