



Cobden's Disappointed Hopes The writings and speeches of Richard Cobden are to be brought out in complete form by his son-in-law, Fisher ent discussion, in which the trade policy of Great Britain is seriously challenged for the first time by British publicists. The great controversy of sixty years ago will be studied afresh, and there will be a reading and re-reading of Cobden's speeches, in which both parties will find weapons for the battle. The opponents of free trade point to the non-fulfillment of Cobden's prophecy that England's example would convert the world. In an address at keep an industry going. "Europe altogether has been cor-rupted by the vicious example of England in her commercial legislation. There they are, throughout the continent of Europe, with a population increasing at the rate of four or five millions a year, yet they make it their business, like ourselves, to put bar-riers in the way of a sufficiency of food to meet the demands of an increasing population. I believe that if protectionist views. and adopt free trade in its simplicity there will not be a tariff in Europe that will not be changed in less than five years to follow your example. But I have been accused of looking too much to material interests. Nevertheless, I have taken as large and great a view of the effects of this mighty principle as ever did any man who dreamed over it in his own study.
