EULOGIZE DEAD MEMBER.

Legislature, Regretting Mr. Kidd's Death, Adjourns Out of Respect for the Member For Carleton County.

Toronto, Feb. 12.—A large floral wreath on the desk of the late George N. Kidd, M. P. P., gave silent evidence of the cutting off of one who was one of the most popular men in the Ontario Legislature. The wreath was presented by the members of the House. The Premier deposited a beautiful spray.

The Premier's Speech.

The adjournment of the House was moved by the Premier, out of respect to the late member. Mr. Whitney said he was not anxious to make a precedent in adjourning the House on account of a matter of great seriousness such as the present, but the work before them could very well be postponed. The House was shocked when it received intelligence of the death of George N. Kidd, whose life had been cut off at an early age, 42. He was well known in the constituency, which he represented and throughout Eastern Ontario, and like many other young men of the province he very early made his mark in public life. He became well known as an authority on agriculture and on this question was always listened in public life. Socially and in private life his point of view stood high in the estimation of those who knew him. Of a very sunny temperament, he always brought with him an atmosphere of cheerfulness. His life was put to the test, namely, the appreciation of his neighbors, and judged by the test, he was one of the many instances of good Canadian citizenship, of which he had no reason to be ashamed. Solid foods being digested under one set of conditions and liquid under another, it is not wise to drink too often during the meal, although it is not necessary to be so rigidly abstemious in this matter as some people think. The greatest objection to drinking with meals is that it discourages the flow of saliva, which is necessary to the process of digestion. The temperature of the stomach needs to be normal and soothing in character, and therefore constantly interspersing warm food with cold drinks would give an unpleasant shock. For the same reason there is no better plan than commenc ing the meal with a plate of soup. which stimulates and warms the stom

Anything that brings the tempera ture of the stomach to a lower degree immediately after eating is injurious, and that is why a bath must not be indulged in till the process of digestion is fairly accomplished. Some people have a decided prejudice against sleeping after meals and declare that the are not so well for the practice. "That in the opinion of this House the interests of Canada and the British empire would be best served by a full partnership union among Great Britain and her colonies."

He congratulated the country on the growth of imperialism. We no longer heard any talk about the treaty-making power or about a Canadian navy, and a British general still commanded the armies of Canada. Col. Hughes favored one great Imperial Parliament to be above all the subordinate Parliaments. The Imperial Parliament was not to supplant the present British Parliament. It might be small in numbers and confine its labor to what might be termed international questions. It should also provide for a preferential tariff. Only some such scheme could prevent the various colonies from striking for independence. Neither South Africa, Australia nor Canada could long retain its place as an independent nation if cut off from the protection of Great Britain.

An Age of Combination.

Dr. Chisholm (East Huron) said that this resolution looked too larger confederation. Some opposed it as likely to dwarf them or to destroy their liberties. Many in Quebec had similar fears respecting confederation in 1867, but what had happened? The French-Canadians really dominated the situation, and one of them now rules this country. This was an age of combination, an era of big nations. The idea proposed by Col. Hughes was not new. It had engrossed the attention and the study of the best minds in Great Britain. It had long ago been remounced as premature, if not impracticable. No great change ever came about in English-speaking countries until there was some grievance to be remedied, but in Canada we had no grievance.



MISTAKEN FOR A QUAKE

Woolwich Catastrophe Shocks Towns Far Away

EX LOSION IN ARSENAL

Woolwich, Eng., Feb. 12.—A huge hole in the ground is all that marks the site of the chemical research department of the Woolwich arsenal and the cordite magazine, which exploded early yesterday morning with such terrific force that the concussion was felt in towns forty miles away, and the whole countryside was thrown into a panic, owing to the belief that a violent earthquake had occurred.

There was no loss of life, but build-ings for miles around were wrecked to a greater or less degree by the ex-

Within a few minutes after the ex-Within a few minutes after the explosion, thousands of terror-stricken persons, many of them half clad, thronged towards the arsenal. There were large holes in the walls of neighboring houses, and on all sides shattered doors and windows and wrecked roofs testified to the appalling force of the explosion of cordite and chemicals with which the arsenal and magazine were stocked.

were stocked.

These buildings were practically swept away, the big blocks of stone of which they were constructed being scattered for hundreds of yards on all sides. There was no night shift working, hence the absence of casualties.

The people of Baintree, forty miles away, were thrown into a panie by the shock of the explosion, while nearer towns had windows shattered and chimneys demolished. The cause of the disaster is not known

THEATRICAL TEMPESTS.

The Way a Rainstorm is Produced on the Stage.

on the Stage.

Probably not more than one person m a hundred stops to consider how a rainstorm is produced on the stage. Few perhaps have ever given the subject any serious thought.

During the coming up of the storm there is seen vast clouds of dust, the wind blows a gale, and suddenly the rain comes down in torrents. It is an effect so natural that one almost imagines the elements are genuinely on agines the elements are genuinely on the warpath. Yet, though the rain is real water, not a person is actually drenched, because the water comes fown at the very front of the stage,

from at the very front of the stage, while the players are well back and not at all exposed to its moisture.

It might be thought that to produce a storm many intricate bits of machinery would be necessary, yet such is not the case, for the simplest devices produce the effect desired. These are some gas alpos nunctured by myridds of heles. pipes punctured by myriads of holes, through which the water runs from small barrels, each about half full, at either end. The sound of the wind is made by a revolving barrel which touches a heavy piece of canvas in its rounds. The thunder effect is caused by the artistic manner in which a man beats a bass drum, and the gusts of dust are blown across the stage by an electric fan. The flashes of lightning come from an electric battery connected by wires which when placed in contact throw out the dazzling flashes. A metal plate, which had been specially prepared by first being heated to white heat and then scratched by a knife, is placed in a calcium light machine and gives the effect of lightning in the dis-






