

STOP CYLINDER PRINTING MACHINE FOR FINE WORK.

DESCRIPTION.

THIS machine is of a new pattern, and designed for the finest kinds of **BOOK, WOOD-CUT** and **COLOR PRINTING**. HISTORICAL SKETCHES

OF THE

VARIOUS PROVINCES

COMPOSING THE

DOMINION OF CANADA,

ALSO, THE

PROVINCES OF NEWFOUNDLAND AND PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

SKETCH OF THE HISTORY OF CANADA.

ONTARIO AND QUEBEC.

As the division of Canada into two provinces did not take place till 1791, and as the two sections were united again in 1840, and became separate members of the Confederation only in 1867, much unnecessary repetition will be avoided by including in one sketch the principal events in the history of the whole province as it existed previously to Confederation.

I. CANADA UNDER FRENCH RULE.

The history of Canada is naturally divided into two great epochs: the period of French rule and that of British rule. Of the former period, the most prominent events are the incessant wars of the colonists with the native inhabitants, and with the neighbouring colonies of Britain. The second period is remarkable as a century of wonderful expansion and prosperity, especially in Western Canada. The most prominent events are: the introduction of a representative system of Government, the division of the province, the war with the United States, the political struggles arising out of hostility of race, the rebellion, followed by the reunion of the provinces, the institution of "Responsible Government," and the concession to the Legislative Assembly of entire control over revenue and expenditure; and, lastly, confederation with the other provinces.

EARLY VOYAGES AND DISCOVERIES.

It was on the 3rd of August, 1492, that Columbus, with his little fleet of three vessels, sailed on his memorable voyage of discovery from Palos, a port on the coast of Spain. On the 9th of the following month he passed Ferro, the last of the Canary Isles, and launched out into unknown seas. After the lapse of more than another month, during which the spirit of the commander was sorely tried by the murmurs and menaces of his mutinous and superstitious crews, Columbus left his ship on the 11th of October, and planted the flag of Spain on an island to which he gave the name of San Salvador. Several months were spent in exploration, and then the great adventurer set sail on the 4th of January, 1493, and arrived safely at Palos.

The materials for the historical sketches of the provinces have been derived from Carneau's History of Canada (Bell's translation); Hodgkin's School History of Canada and the British Provinces; Coney's History of New Brunswick; Page's History of Newfoundland; Sutherland's History of Prince Edward Island; and other sources.

The discoveries of Columbus excited a spirit of enterprise and adventure throughout Europe, and subsequent explorers had not any longer to encounter the great difficulties that so long baffled his efforts to procure means to prosecute his voyage. Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island were discovered by the Cabots. Other discoveries followed in quick succession; but it was not till 1534 that the discovery of Canada (Ontario and Quebec) was made by Jacques Cartier, a navigator in the service of Francis I, King of France. The kings of Spain and Portugal protested against the proposed expedition under Cartier as an encroachment on their territorial rights. "What!" Francis is reported to have exclaimed, "do they expect to share all America between them. I should like to see the clause in our father Adam's will that makes them sole heirs to so vast a heritage."

Cartier, with two small vessels, sailed from the port of St. Malo, on the coast of Brittany, on the 20th of April, 1534. Arriving off the coast of Newfoundland after a favorable voyage, he passed through the Straits of Belle Isle into the Gulf of the St. Lawrence, and sailed southward to the Baie des Chaleurs. It was early in July when he reached the Bay, and the heat of the weather caused him to give it that name. Finally, on the 24th of July, he landed on the peninsula of Gaspé, and took possession of the country in the name of the French king. A few days later he set sail for France, taking with him two of the natives. The report of his discoveries excited so much interest at home that the following year he was sent out with three vessels, well manned and equipped. This season he sailed up the gulf. Having anchored in a little bay at the mouth of the river St. John on St. Lawrence day, he named the bay after that saint, and the name was afterward extended to the gulf and river. Ascending the St. Lawrence, he arrived at the Island of Orleans, where he was received in a friendly manner by Donnacona, the Algonquin chief. He then proceeded to a native settlement, called Stadacona, near the mouth of the St. Charles. Here he moored his vessels, boldly resolving to winter in the country. Having heard accounts from the natives respecting a large settlement further up, he was induced, in the month of September, to ascend the St. Lawrence as far as Hochelaga (Montreal) where he was welcomed with the most friendly manifestations by the Huron Indians.* The beautiful mountain lying to the west was named by him Mount Royal. The winter was now

* It is hardly necessary to say that the term "Indians" arose from the mistake of the first discoverers, who thought America was part of the "Indies," or Asia.

approaching, and Cartier returned to Stadacona, (close by Quebec,) where he entrenched himself near his ships.

The expedition suffered greatly during the long winter that ensued. The cold was intense. Most of the sailors were attacked by scurvy, and before the snow disappeared one fourth part of the crews had perished by disease. In spring, Cartier made haste to return to France. On his departure he was guilty of a base act of treachery to the friendly natives, in seizing their chief, Donnacona, and four Indians, and carrying them off to France where they all soon died.

The origin of the name Canada, it may be mentioned here, is somewhat obscure. Some would derive it from the Spanish or Portuguese, by putting, together the words *Ca*, here, and *nada*, nothing, supposed to have been uttered by the first explorers when they found no precious metals. Others, with better reason, conjecture that Jacques Cartier, having heard the natives apply the Indian word *Kannatha* (or village) to their settlements, mistook it for the name of the whole country.

Harassed by wars with Spain, and distracted by religious dissensions at home, the French were unable to give that attention to the newly discovered territories which their importance deserved. Five years elapsed after Cartier's return before another expedition was organized. This was placed under the command of a distinguished soldier, the Sieur de Roberval, who received a commission as viceroy of the colony to be founded. Cartier sailed in advance of Roberval, in command of a flotilla of five vessels. After a stormy passage he arrived in the gulf, and again ascended the St. Lawrence to Stadacona or Quebec. Here the French colonists who had been brought out, landed, and began to prepare ground for cultivation. Cartier continued his voyage to Hochelaga, and endeavoured to pass the Lachine rapids, but without success. The summer passed away without any intelligence being received respecting the movements of Roberval, who was to have followed him out: so Cartier resolved to spend the winter in the country. The Indians, mindful of his treachery to their chief, were far from friendly, and he deemed it prudent to erect two small forts at Cape Rouge for the protection of his winter quarters. In the spring, the natives showing signs of increasing hostility, Cartier sailed for France, where he died a few years later. He had, however, before his death, been ennobled by the king for his distinguished services, and his heirs received a license to trade in Canada. We read of his nephews being engaged subsequently in the peltry traffic.

Roberval, whose departure had been delayed for a year, met Cartier near Newfoundland (or, as some say, near Quebec), and vainly endeavoured to prevent his return. Roberval then continued his voyage to Cape Rouge, where he remained for some time. Little is known respecting his movements during the year that he spent in Canada. He is said to have explored the river Saguenay, and other parts. During the winter fifty of his colonists perished. In 1543, he returned to France at the request of the king, who required his services in the war with Spain which was about to recommence. This was the last expedition for six years.

In 1549, Roberval, having been permitted to organize another expedition, set out for Canada, but he was lost in the passage across the Atlantic, with all his followers. This disaster led to the abandonment of French settlements in Canada. For many years there was no opportunity to Austria, France being engaged in wars with Spain and Sweden, and harassed by civil and religious dissensions. During this period England made no attempt to acquire territory in

Canada, contenting herself with a nominal claim on Newfoundland for fishing purposes.

Passing over Ribault's ill-fated Huguenot expedition to Florida, with which we are not concerned in the present sketch, we come to the next attempt to found a colony in Canada. In 1598, the Marquis de la Roche was appointed lieutenant general, or viceroy, of New France, with very extensive powers. De la Roche landed most of his colonists, who were chiefly convicts, on Isle de Sable. His ship being afterward driven off the coast by a storm, he was forced to return to France. There he was arrested and kept prisoner in Brittany by an enemy of the King, and no aid was sent to the unhappy convicts on Sable Island till five years had elapsed, when only twelve were found living.

PERMANENT SETTLEMENTS IN NEW FRANCE.

We come now to the voyages of Champlain, a distinguished naval officer, whose name is honourably connected with Canadian exploration and settlement. His first voyage was made in 1603, under the auspices of a company of French merchants trading in furs. The little fleet consisted of three small vessels of 12 to 15 tons each. Champlain ascended the St. Lawrence to Hochelaga, but was prevented by the Lachine rapids from passing upward. He, however, diligently collected all the information that he could obtain from the natives respecting the country above the rapids, and sketched a map for the king. Henry IV. was well pleased with the account of the expedition, and appointed de Monts, a Huguenot, lieutenant general of Acadie, with extensive trading privileges. In the ensuing years, settlements were formed at Port Royal (Annapolis) and other places in Acadie.

In 1608 Champlain sailed a third time from France on a voyage to the St. Lawrence. On the 3rd of July he reached the point of land, now the Lower Town of Quebec, where he erected a fort, and cabins for the accommodation of his men. Thus were laid the foundations of the famous city of Quebec. The name is Indian, *Kebec*, a strait. This was the first permanent settlement in Canada.

For some years Champlain continued the congenial work of exploration. His enemies, indeed, made it a matter of reproach that he was more fond of exploring the country than of improving the facilities for trade and increasing the profits of the fur company. About this time the wars between the Iroquois and other Indian tribes appear to have been waged with great ferocity. The weaker tribes, the Hurons and Algonquias, sought the powerful aid of their neighbors, the French, and Champlain unfortunately granted the request. Thus commenced the terrible wars with Indians which fill so dark a page in the early annals of the colony. The first blood was shed in 1609, when Champlain took part with the Hurons in an attack on some Iroquois cantons. The terror inspired by the loud report of European fire arms, and the havoc caused by each discharge, routed the Iroquois on this and other occasions. But few years elapsed before they fought on more equal terms, and manifested a courage unsurpassed by that of any other race.

In 1611, Champlain established a trading post at Montreal, and named the adjacent island Ste. Hélène, after his wife. The death of Henry IV. deprived de Monts of his influence at court, and great rivalry in the fur trade ensued. In 1613, Champlain, who had endeavoured to reconcile the conflicting pretensions of the trading companies, having at length secured the patronage of the Prince de Condé, as successor to the privileges enjoyed by de Monts, again sailed for Canada. He spent some time this year in exploring the Ottawa. Two years later he took out four Recollet fathers (a branch of the

Franciscans), and a first effort was made to introduce Christianity among the Indians. Monastic establishments began to appear in the land. They were the most prominent buildings at the various settlements. At this time (1615), Champlain renewed his explorations of the upper Ottawa. Passing up the Mattawin river to Lake Nipissing, thence down the French river, he came to the Georgian Bay and Lake Huron. He spent some time in exploring those western parts, and visited several of the lodges of the Hurons. At length he reached Cahigue, (now Orillia) one of the chief lodges of the Hurons, near Lake Simcoe. Champlain's relations with this tribe were very friendly, and he was induced to join them in a great expedition against their bitter enemies, the warlike Iroquois. The assault on the enemy was made suddenly and unexpectedly, but the Iroquois speedily rallied, and repulsed their assailants with great courage and determination. Champlain himself was wounded, and with his Indian allies was forced to retreat. Thus Champlain, who was the first, or among the first, to assist Indian against Indian, already began to experience the disastrous consequences of his policy. The thirty years during which he was engaged in exploration are marked by incessant Indian conflicts. Treaties of peace were not long regarded. In 1622, for instance, a solemn treaty of peace was entered into between the Hurons and the Iroquois, but a few years later we read of fresh hostilities.

About 1620, the Princes de Condé ceded the vice-royalty of Canada to Admiral Montmorency, who confirmed the appointment and powers of Champlain as deputy head and resident governor of the colony. About this time Champlain laid the foundations of a government house, known as the castle of St. Louis, at Quebec. He also promulgated several ordinances for the maintenance of order in the colony. Very little was done in the way of tilling the soil, the attention of the colonists being engrossed by the more lucrative occupation of trading in furs. The number of permanent residents at Quebec, including the monks, did not exceed fifty. However, the colony was re-inforced in 1625 by a band of Jesuit missionaries, who labored with the Recollet fathers, for the conversion of the Indians.

THE HUNDRED PARTNERS

Disputes respecting trading privileges were constantly occurring. The trading associations were bitter rivals. Finally, in 1627, a new company, called the Company of One Hundred Partners, or Associates, with extensive trading privileges, was organized under the patronage of Cardinal Richelieu. The powers of this new association were very extensive. The Hundred Partners were in fact the rulers of the colony, with power to make laws within their limits, with attributes of sovereignty and justicship, &c. In return for their privileges the Company undertook to send 4,000 persons to Canada during the fifteen years their charter was to be in force, and to aid these colonists in settling on lands to be appropriated to their use.

Shortly after this, war was declared between France and England. Tadoussac, a trading station, was captured (1628) by Sir David Kerk, a French Huguenot refugee, who had entered the English service, and messengers were sent to Champlain to demand the surrender of Quebec. The request was peremptorily refused. To disguise the starving condition of the colonists, Champlain is said to have sumptuously entertained the messengers of Kerk. The English commander withdrew his fleet without making any attack on the place, but while cruising in the gulf, the ships and stores sent out from France by the new company fell

into his hands. The following year (1629) he resumed hostilities. The inhabitants of Quebec had been half starved during the winter from want of the supplies which had been intercepted; no help came from France, and when in July, 1629, Kerk appeared in sight, the garrison capitulated. This was the first capture of Quebec. At the date of its surrender peace had been concluded between England and France at home. Champlain was carried to England, where he was set at liberty and permitted to return to France.

Three years afterward, (1632) Canada, together with Nova Scotia and Cape Breton, was ceded to France by the Treaty of St Germain en Laye. The following year Champlain was re-appointed governor, and carried out with him abundance of stores. He sought to strengthen and build up the shattered colony, but his labors were soon stayed by death. He expired on Christmas day, 1635, after thirty years' service in connection with Canadian exploration and settlement.

The new governor sent out from France was Montmagny, who pursued the policy adopted by Champlain. The Hurons and Iroquois were at this time again engaged in a sanguinary war. Some consternation was caused (1638) by shocks of earthquake which were felt throughout the country. Similar shocks were experienced in 1663, and have frequently occurred in our own time.

In 1640, the island of Montreal was ceded by M. de Lauzon (who had acquired it from the Hundred Partners,) to an association of 35 persons, by whom de Maisonneuve was instructed to found a settlement. The new town or colony was established near the Indian village of Hochelaga, and named Ville Marie, on the 18th of May, 1642. The few buildings erected were surrounded by wooden palisades for the protection of the place against Indian incursions. Such was the small beginning of Montreal city.

INDIAN WARS.

The war between the French and Hurons on one side and the Iroquois on the other, was now waged with great ferocity. The Iroquois formed a design to wipe their enemies from the face of the land. The French posts were to be simultaneously attacked. The plot failed, but for some years the Indian bravos waged a war of extermination. The French were able to afford very slight assistance to their Huron allies. Their own existence was, in fact, in almost daily peril, for it must be remembered that the whole European population of Canada at this time did not exceed three hundred souls. Soldiers had to be sent from France to protect the encumbered settlement. Ville Marie was put in a condition for defence by d'Allibout; Fort Richelieu was erected at the mouth of the Richelieu, and other measures were adopted to check the incursions of the enemy.

In 1645, a truce was entered into with some of the Iroquois bands. The Company of the Hundred Partners had suffered enormous losses during these Indian wars, and were glad to renounce their rights for an annual rent payable in beaver skins. The inhabitants of Montreal, Quebec, and Three Rivers, accordingly obtained from the company, on the above condition, the privilege of trading on their own account. The sanguinary conflict with the Indians soon broke out afresh. The unhappy Hurons were hunted to death without mercy throughout the length and breadth of the land. The French were wholly unable to afford their allies any protection. Several of the Jesuit missionaries, who were laboring amongst the Indians, died under cruel tortures inflicted by the Iroquois. The Huron tribes were almost annihilated. A few survivors sought refuge within

the palisades of Quebec and other French forts, and were finally transferred to Lorette, where some of their descendants may still be found.

So great was the terror inspired by the bitter hostility of the Iroquois, that when the New England colonies (1648-1651) put forward a project of colonial union with Canada, the French governor refused to negotiate, unless the New Englanders consented to aid the French in humbling the power of their Indian foes. Now the Iroquois, while harassing the French to death, had been fast friends of the English, and such a stipulation would have been highly ungrateful on the part of the latter. So the negotiations were broken off. The incident only served to increase the fury of the Iroquois. For some years trade was paralyzed, and the French were in serious danger of being driven from the country. "The war with the Iroquois," says a chronicle of 1653, "has dried up all sources of prosperity. The beavers are allowed to build their dams in peace, none being able or willing to molest them." It must be borne in mind that by this time the Iroquois had obtained fire-arms, and learned to use them with fatal effect. At length, in 1653, reinforcements being received from France, the governor was enabled to act vigorously on the offensive. European discipline prevailed. The Iroquois lost heart when they saw the number of their foes suddenly doubled by arrivals from the unknown land beyond the seas. They were brought to sue for peace, and a treaty was concluded the following year (1654).

During this time several changes had taken place in the government. It had been decided to change the governors of French dependencies every three years. Montmagny was succeeded in 1647, by d'Aillebont, and he, in turn, was superseded by de Lauzon in 1651.

In 1656, another alarm was caused by incursions of the Iroquois, and war again prevailed, with brief intervals of respite, for several years. D'Argenson came out (1658) as governor in the place of de Lauzon, and in 1661, d'Avau-gour, a very able governor, succeeded.

Up to this period, progress had been very slow, especially when contrasted with the rapid strides of modern times. The inhabitants of the settlement at Quebec did not number a thousand, and the whole population of Canada fell short of 2,500. The mode of colonization had been semi-religious. Jesuit and Recollet missionaries penetrated the country in all directions, and endeavoured to win the natives to the Christian faith. There was not a printing press in the colony till long afterward. A very small portion of the soil was brought under cultivation. The residents, occupied for the most part in trade, did not raise sufficient for their subsistence, and depended largely on supplies from the mother country. The principal buildings seem to have been the monastic establishments. Ecclesiastics exercised magisterial authority in the parishes. An incident related by Garneau, which led to discussion between the governor and ecclesiastical authorities, throws some light upon the state of affairs at this time. Selling liquor to Indians was prohibited under the severest penalties. The governor, d'Avau-gour, had caused three men to be shot at one time for this crime. A widow being subsequently taken to prison for the same offence, one Père Lalle-mant, not only interceded for her but justified her act. The governor angrily exclaimed that if the law was to be enforced in this irregular and partial manner, he would cease to enforce it at all. On their side, the priests refused absolution to those who engaged in the liquor traffic with Indians, and the bishop publicly excommunicated the offenders. These dissensions

continued till, unfortunately for the colony, the governor was recalled. On quitting the reins of government, d'Avau-gour drew up a document strongly recommending that France should, without loss of time, strengthen her footing in Canada. He advised that three thousand picked soldiers, accustomed to agricultural pursuits, should be located in the country, and assisted from Imperial sources till they had firmly established themselves.

SOVEREIGN AUTHORITY RESUMED.

In 1663, the Company of One Hundred Partners, which had not fulfilled the obligations imposed on it, was formally dissolved by Louis XIV., and a sovereign council, composed of the principal officers of civil government residing in the colony, M. Laval, the first bishop, who had come out in 1659, and other distinguished persons, was established at Quebec. This council acted also as a court of appeal from the district courts. In each of the three districts, Quebec, Three Rivers and Montreal, there was a judge appointed by the king, who had full power to decide all matters, both civil and criminal, that arose within the district. Besides the regular courts, judicial authority was vested in the intendant. This power was exercised generally in matters of small amount. The owners of seigniories were also authorized under certain restrictions to administer justice within their seigniories.

The new governor, appointed by the influence of Bishop Laval and the Jesuits, after d'Avau-gour's recall, was de Mézy. He was the first royal governor under the new constitution. He landed at Quebec in the summer of 1663, but a year had hardly elapsed before fresh disputes arose between him and Bishop Laval, in consequence of the interference of the latter in temporal affairs. The recall of the governor was therefore at once resolved on by his adversaries, and it was not long before they brought it about. The governor died before the command to return reached him, but he declared with his latest breath that in all he did he had ever in view the prosperity of the colony. Whilst these events were taking place in the colony, the trading interests of Canada were conceded to the West India Company by a royal edict in May, 1664. In legal matters, the "Custom of Paris" was at this time introduced to the exclusion of all other French *coutumes*. The Marquis de Tracy was chosen to fill the office of lieutenant-general. Talon, another man of ability, was sent out as intendant, and de Courcelles, an administrator of great tact and prudence, was appointed to succeed de Mézy as governor. The new rulers were cautioned by Colbert, the French minister, to avoid disputes with the Jesuits, and advised to seek to build up the colony.

These were days of sunshine to the struggling inhabitants. For a space only too brief, things wore an air of prosperity. The men in authority displayed great zeal and energy in advancing the interests of the colonists. Settlers were brought out from France; cattle and agricultural implements were imported. The audacity of the Indians was checked by a decisive expedition commanded by de Tracy. The Iroquois sued for peace, and in 1667 a treaty was concluded with them which lasted eighteen years.

The reports sent home by Talon advised that the colony should be taken out of the hands of the West India Company. This recommendation was acted upon, and freedom of trade with the natives and the mother country was conceded to the inhabitants. Talon strove to encourage agriculture. Horses were first introduced into the colony in 1665. The Carignan regiment, which had come out with de Tracy, was permitted to remain, and the soldiers were

encouraged to settle in the country. Talon, being in ill health, was forced to solicit his recall in 1638, but the following year he was persuaded to resume office, and sailed from France with 700 emigrants.

In 1672, Count de Frontenac, who was destined to occupy a distinguished place in the history of Canada, came out as governor in the place of de Courcelles. Talon now retired from his office of intendant. At this date the population had increased to nearly six thousand souls.

Frontenac was a high spirited soldier of very fair abilities. Shrewd and discerning in his views, he was also quick and impetuous in action. The position of Quebec excited his admiration on landing. "It could not have been better placed," he said "if it had been expressly selected as the capital of a great empire." The new governor was also favorably impressed by the dignity and eloquence of the Indian chiefs. In 1673, having been present at a conference with Iroquois chiefs at Cataragui, he remarked, in a letter to the Minister of State: "You would assuredly have been surprised, my lord, had you listened to the eloquent oratory, and remarked the subtle spirit with which all the deputies harangued and reasoned. Did I not fear to incur your ridicule, I would venture to intimate that the noble presence of these deputies, in conference with me, recalled to my mind somewhat, a meeting of the senate of Venice."

In his efforts to improve the condition of the colony, Frontenac was unfortunate enough to encounter the opposition and enmity of the Jesuits. Grave dissensions soon commenced between the governor and other dignitaries. Frontenac having imprisoned Perrot, the governor of Montreal, for treasonable conduct, the side of the accused was openly espoused by Fénelon, the parish priest of Montreal. The ecclesiastics denied that any jurisdiction could be exercised over them by the sovereign council, and contended that they could be summoned to appear only before their bishop. The intendant, Duchesneau, sided with the ecclesiastics. Fresh trouble was also created by the liquor traffic. We cannot follow here the course of these unfortunate disputes. The king severely censured his servants, and attempted in vain to check their quarrels; but they proceeded to such a height that both Frontenac and Duchesneau were recalled in 1682.

INDIAN WARS RENEVED.

The new governor, de la Barre, came out at a critical time. Another Indian war was imminent. The New England colonists offered the Indians better prices for their skins, and exchanged goods on far easier terms than the French traders, fettered by trade restrictions, could afford. Much ill feeling prevailed on this account among the natives. The conjuncture required a prudent and conciliatory course. De la Barre lacked ability and experience, and proved unequal to the occasion. After some months of indecision, an expedition set out and advanced as far as Lake Ontario. Here envoys from the Iroquois met the governor, and de la Barre concluded a disgraceful treaty, by which he abandoned some of his Indian allies to the mercy of the Iroquois. The treaty was disallowed by the king, who immediately recalled the governor, and sent out the Marquis de Denonville to replace him. The new governor was brave and determined, but entered with slight experience on duties of great difficulty. His instructions were to repel the encroachments of the Iroquois and compel them to keep the peace with their neighbours. The hatred of these powerful tribes to the French had grown with the

lapse of years, and was embittered by a long course of hostility. At this time, moreover, the Iroquois were incensed by a discreditable act of treachery on the part of the governor. Having deceived some Indian braves to Cataragui, under pretence of a conference, he caused them to be seized, and sent home to work in the galleys.

Having obtained reinforcements from France, the governor led an expedition against the Iroquois, which was successful in the field; but as soon as the steps of the marquis were turned homeward, the foe re-appeared with unabated spirit. The fort at Niagara was suddenly attacked by them and completely destroyed. An ineffectual attempt was made to negotiate a treaty through the intervention of Col. Dongan, the governor of New York. The critical state of affairs was vividly depicted as follows by the governor in a despatch to Paris, Aug. 10th, 1688: "The savages are just so many animals of prey, scattered through a vast forest, whence they are ever ready to issue, to plunder and kill in the adjoining country. To go in pursuit of them after their ravages is a constant but almost bootless task. They have no settled habitation to which they can be traced with any certainty. They must be watched for everywhere and long waited for, with fire-arms ready primed; many of their lurking places could be reached only by blood-hounds, or by other savages as trackers. But those in our service are few, and the native allies we have are seldom trustworthy. They fear the enemy more than they love us; and they dread, on their own account, to drive the Iroquois to extremity. It has been resolved, in the present strait, to erect a fortress in every seigniory, as a place of shelter for helpless people and live stock, at times when the open country is overrun with savages. As matters now stand, the arable grounds lie far apart, and are so surrounded by bush, that every thicket serves as a covert for the foe; so that an army would be needed to protect the tillers of our cleared lands."

The following year (1689) war was declared by France against England for the purpose of aiding James II. A bold project, suggested by Chevalier de Callières, of attacking the English posts at New York and Albany, was under consideration by the French authorities, when a terrible disaster fell upon the colony. The Iroquois, who for some months had been unusually tranquil, without the slightest warning, in the month of August, appeared in force near Montreal, and in one night massacred the entire population of Lachine. Two hundred persons were slaughtered or burned alive on the spot, and others, more unfortunate, were carried off to be tortured to death. The invaders also assailed and captured the fort at Montreal, and kept possession of the island till the month of October. The French, stupefied with terror, made no effort to drive off their enemies, and everywhere throughout the land the Indians held the upper hand till the approach of winter, when they retired suddenly to their settlements.

In the meantime, Frontenac, who had been re-appointed governor, was on his way out to assume the direction of affairs. His coming was hailed with joy by the terrified inhabitants, who had endured so much misery through the incapacity of the last two governors. Fresh spirit was infused into the colonists. The incursions of the Iroquois were everywhere repelled with energy. The Canadian villages were enclosed by palisades, and protected by cannon. The project of attacking the New England settlements, which had received the sanction of Louis, was now prosecuted with some success. Unhappily these successes were sullied by terrible atrocities. Helpless inhabitants of the places

that fell into the hands of the invaders were butchered without mercy.

The New Englanders, who seem to have been taken by surprise by the sudden attack of Frontenac, speedily concerted measures of defence and reprisal. In 1690, a squadron of 35 sail, with 2,000 militia men on board, left Boston under command of Sir William Phipps, afterward governor of Massachusetts. The fleet captured Port Royal, (Annapolis) and other places in Nova Scotia, and on the morning of the 16th October, Quebec was summoned to surrender at discretion. Frontenac returned a haughty refusal, and the batteries opened fire upon the English ships. The strength of the defences baffled all the efforts of the besieging force, and the fleet was compelled to retire. A land expedition under Winthrop, which was to have co-operated with Phipps in the attack on Canada, returned without accomplishing anything.

During the succeeding years hostilities were continued between the French and English colonists. Each side sought to enlist as many of the savage tribes as it could, and to render the aid of these allies effective, the Indians were instructed in the use of fire-arms. The Iroquois that fell into the hands of their enemies were often cruelly burned or tortured to death, in revenge for similar atrocities practised by their own tribes. Under Frontenac's energetic direction, the Canadians were enabled to get possession of the English posts in the Hudson Bay territory.

At length, in 1697, the treaty of Ryswick put an end, for a time, to the exhausting conflict between the colonies. By this treaty France agreed to restore all places in America that had been taken during the war. The restoration of peace was welcome intelligence at Quebec. The colonists, who had ceased to till their lands and had taken refuge within the palisades of the towns from the ferocity of the savages, now ventured back to their farms.

The following year, (1698) Count de Frontenac died, at the age of 77, deeply regretted by his countrymen in New France, whom he had rescued from almost total extermination. De Callières, who had long been governor of Montreal, succeeded him.

In 1700, the French concluded a long hoped for treaty of peace with the Iroquois confederation. The treaty was solemnly confirmed at Montreal on the 4th of August, 1701. Thirteen hundred natives, the representatives of many tribes, took part in the ceremonies.

In 1703, France and England being again at war, there was as usual a renewal of hostilities between their colonies. On this occasion the French were fortunate in having the formidable Iroquois neutral by virtue of the solemn treaty of 1701. In the spring of 1711, another expedition against Canada was organized by the New England colonies, aided by British troops. The object was to capture Quebec. But the fleet was dispersed in the gulf by a storm, and many of the vessels were lost. Peace was restored by the treaty of Utrecht in 1713.

FROM THE TREATY OF UTRECHT TO THE CONQUEST—1713-1760.

Vaudreuil, who had succeeded de Callières as governor in 1703, introduced some improvements in the municipal system, and caused a census to be taken. Montreal was walled in, and the fortifications of Quebec were enlarged and strengthened. The governor earnestly called the attention of the home authorities to the weak state of the colony as contrasted with the flourishing condition of the New England provinces. In 1714, he wrote home that Canada contained but 4,484 inhabitants capable of bearing arms for its defence, in addition

to 620 colonial troops. The British colonies were represented as having 60,000 males fit for war; and it was not doubted that as soon as war commenced an attempt would be made by them to achieve the conquest of Canada. Vaudreuil was succeeded in 1723 by the Marquis de Beauharnois, whose long administration of twenty-one years was for the most part peaceful. The population increased from 22,000 in 1719 to nearly 50,000 in 1744. The value of the exports in 1749 exceeded £100,000 *s.g.* There were some petty conflicts with Indians, and there were some disputes between the governor and the intendant, Dupuis; but up to 1745 the colony enjoyed security from external assaults. In 1745 peace was again disturbed. The contest, however, was not so much on Canadian soil as in the maritime colonies. The strong fortress of Louisbourg was taken by the New Englanders, and an expedition projected against Canada. A French fleet, under the Duke d'Anville, sent to retake Louisbourg, was dispersed by terrible storms. The peace of Aix-la-Chapelle, in 1748, put an end to the conflict, and France and England mutually restored the territory acquired by either during the war.

But a warm dispute immediately commenced as to the boundaries of their respective possessions in the New World. The territory in dispute was very extensive, comprising the whole of the seaboard on the north side of the Bay of Fundy, and also the Valley of the Ohio, connecting the French possessions in Louisiana with Canada. A joint commission, French and British, was appointed to settle the dispute. A conference took place at Paris, but the commission lasted over five years without any definite result. Meanwhile the dispute in America was daily growing in violence. Each party sought to make good its pretensions by encroachments on the territory in dispute. In 1750, three English traders were arrested under the authority of the French governor in the disputed territory of the Ohio valley. Redress being withheld, negotiations were made. After some years consumed in futile negotiation, the war, generally known as the Seven Years' War, commenced. The colonial forces on both sides were reinforced from Europe. Gen. Braddock came out from England to command the militia and regulars. A strong British force, under his command, marched against Fort Duquesne, at the junction of the Ohio and Monongahela rivers; but, pressing on too eagerly, in July, 1755, the men fell into an ambuscade near the fort, and were cut to pieces. Gen. Braddock and most of the mounted officers were killed. The celebrated Gen. Washington, who was serving under Braddock at this time, wrote as follows of the disaster: "We have been beaten, shamefully beaten, by a handful of French, who only expected to obstruct our advance. Shortly before the action we thought our forces were equal to all the enemy in Canada; we have been most unexpectedly defeated, and now all is lost." On the other hand, it was not long before the French met with reverses. Baron Dieskau brought from France a large force in 1755. After some slight successes his army was defeated, and he himself wounded and taken prisoner in an attack on Col. Johnson's camp near Fort William, at the head of Lake George.

The struggle for supremacy in the New World now assumed serious proportions. War was formally declared by England and France (1756). At the urgent representation of the Canadian authorities large reinforcements were sent out. Gen. Montcalm and Gen. de Lévis came out to Canada early in the year 1756, with a considerable force, together with supplies of provisions and munitions of war. Sixteen hundred men had been sent out the previous year, and the colony furnished a thousand more. Nor was the British Government lacking in energy. Money was freely voted to arm and equip

the provincial militia. Gen. Abercrombie came out from England with large reinforcements; and Lord Loudon was appointed commander-in-chief. After some minor incidents the campaign terminated unfavourably for the English. The important place called Fort Oswego, erected by the English on the south-eastern shore of Lake Ontario, surrendered to Montcalm, and fourteen hundred prisoners and a large quantity of stores fell into the hands of the French. This expedition had been planned by the Governor, Vaudreuil Cavagnal, Gen. Montcalm undertaking it apparently against his own judgment in obedience to the governor's orders.

The following summer passed without any important engagement. The inhabitants of Canada suffered during this period great privation from the scarcity of food. In France dissatisfaction began to be expressed at the great cost of maintaining and defending the colony. In 1758 Lord Loudon, the English commander-in-chief, who had failed to evince any military capacity, was superseded by General Abercrombie. Great efforts were made, and with complete success, to enable the English colonies to send into the field a large force of militia. The strong post of Louisbourg, in Cape Breton, fell into the hands of the British forces. In other quarters the campaign was a failure. Gen. Abercrombie led an expedition against Fort Ticonderoga (Carillon) where Montcalm was strongly entrenched. The attack on the fort, persevered in during several hours with great gallantry, was repulsed with heavy loss to the English. This misfortune was in some measure retrieved by a successful expedition against Fort Frontenac under Colonel Bradstreet. The fort was taken, together with a great quantity of stores, shipping, and several pieces of cannon. This achievement destroyed the power of the French on the great lakes.

The English were also successful in their operations in the Ohio valley. A force of regulars and militia marched against Fort Duquesne, and the commandant, despairing of being able to make a successful defence, destroyed the fort and retreated.

The following summer (1759) decided the contest. Gen. Amherst came out to replace Gen. Abercrombie. The French being now compelled to act on the defensive, endeavoured to strengthen their fortified posts. The number of mals able to bear arms was estimated at 15,200, and of regular soldiers there were 5,300. Provisions were at famine prices. The farmers, having for the most part been engaged in campaigning, had been unable to cultivate their fields, whilst the scarcity of food was increased by the fraud and cupidity of certain officials intrusted with the purchase of stores, who enriched themselves at the public expense. Montcalm, who was at variance with the governor, earnestly solicited his own recall as the only reward he desired for his services. The king, reluctant to comply with this request in the critical position of Canadian affairs, recommended the general and governor to reconcile their differences, and accorded them promotion and honors.

The campaign of 1759 did not open till June, when the British forces took the field in three divisions. One under Gen. Prideaux was to attack Fort Niagara; the second, under Gen. Amherst, was to make another attempt to take Fort Ticonderoga at the outlet of Lake George; the third, under the celebrated General Wolfe, was to assail Quebec, where the other divisions of the army were to assemble after carrying out their parts of the general plan. The expedition against Fort Niagara was successful, but General Prideaux fell during the siege. The French retreated from Fort Ticonderoga and entrenched themselves at Isle aux Noix,

where the British allowed them to remain unmolested during the winter.

The expedition against Quebec is that which is most memorable in the annals of Canada. The French had made every preparation in their power for the defence of the city. The buoys had been removed from the channel of the river. Fire ships were in readiness to be launched into the midst of the enemy's fleet, and booms were constructed across the river St. Charles. All the difficulties of the navigation having been overcome, the English fleet, carrying generals Wolfe, Monckton, Townshend and Murray, and a considerable army, arrived at the Island of Orleans on the 25th of June. The freshets sent against the fleet proved ineffectual. Gen. Monckton took up his position at Point Lévis, and commenced to bombard the city. Wolfe's encampment was on the left bank of the Montmorency river. The French were entrenched in rear of Beauport. The month of July was spent by the besiegers in preparation. They carefully examined the defences, and endeavoured to find some vulnerable point. On the last day of the month Wolfe attacked Montcalm's camp, but was repulsed. It was now resolved to make the assault from above the city. Montcalm seemed to have looked upon his position on this side as perfectly secure. "We need not suppose," he wrote to the governor, "that our enemies have wings to enable them in one night to cross the river, disembark, and ascend steep and rugged paths." Wolfe, however, quietly prepared for the desperate undertaking, disguising his intention from the enemy as far as possible. The landing was successfully effected during the night of the 12th of September, at the point now called Wolfe's cove. The sentinels were overpowered, and before daybreak six thousand men had silently scaled the steep bank and were drawn up on the Plains of Abraham. Montcalm hastily gathered his forces and advanced to give battle. The English awaited the onset, and when the advancing line was close at hand, fired a deadly volley which threw the French ranks into confusion. Wolfe followed up the temporary success by a charge, himself leading on the grenadiers. Soon, however, he received a mortal wound, and was carried to the rear. The French were giving way in confusion. Montcalm while endeavouring to rally his flying troops, also fell mortally wounded. As Wolfe's last moment was fast approaching, the cry "They run! they run!" fell upon his ear. "Who run?" eagerly inquired the dying hero. "The French," was the reply. "Then I die in peace," he murmured, and immediately expired. The gallant Montcalm also died the following day.

The Citadel held out a few days, but on the 18th of September, the garrison surrendered to Gen. Townshend. The loss of the English is stated at 700, and of the French at 1500.

The announcement that Quebec had fallen was received with great joy in England and in her American colonies. Both sides prepared earnestly for the coming campaign, the result of which was hardly doubtful. The French concentrated their diminished forces with the design of retaking Quebec, which had been garrisoned for the winter with an army of seven or eight thousand men. Gen. de Lévis, who had taken command on the death of Montcalm, pitched his camp, in April, 1760, in the rear of the city, with an army of eight or nine thousand men. Gen. Murray marched out to meet him, but after a sharp encounter was forced to retire within the fortifications. A few days later, having received the reinforcements which he had been anxiously expecting from England, he forthwith compelled de Lévis to raise the siege and retreat.

The French cause in Canada was now in a desperate extremity, and the mother country was unable to send adequate

assistance. The Canadian militia commenced to give in their submission to General Murray, and the regulars deserted in great numbers. Isle aux Noix, where the French had entrenched themselves the previous summer, and Forts Oswegatchie and Lévis, were the next points of attack. These forts successively passed into the hands of the English, and then the victorious armies, from Quebec, Lake Champlain and Oswego, converged on Montreal. The united strength of the beleaguering army under Gen. Amherst was 17,000 men. Resistance was hopeless, and Vaudreuil proposed a capitulation, which was agreed to and signed on the 8th of September, 1760. Thus was brought to a close the era of French dominion in Canada.

II. CANADA UNDER ENGLISH RULE.

FROM THE CONQUEST TO THE QUEBEC ACT, 1763-1774.

The Canadian people were secured by the terms of the capitulation in the free exercise of their religion. Vaudreuil and De Lévis, with the troops and the principal civil and military officers, and many of the colonists, embarked for France, where some of the officials who had been guilty of peculation and abuse of trust, were brought to trial, condemned and punished.

Peace was concluded by the Treaty of Paris signed 10th February, 1763. By this Treaty, France ceded to England the whole of her possessions in North America with some insignificant exceptions.

The Indian allies of the French did not acquiesce under a struggle in the new order of things. A vast conspiracy was hatched in 1763 by Pontiac, a noted chief of the Ottawa tribe, who was not friendly to British power. The object of the plot was nothing less than the simultaneous capture of the chain of forts extending from Lake Michigan to the Niagara. The conspiracy failed of entire success, but nine British posts were assailed, and the garrisons massacred. The Indians sustained a defeat at Bushy Run near Fort Pitt, and the garrison was relieved. Pontiac was soon forced to abandon the siege of Detroit; the Indian forces began to melt away, and the hostile tribes were glad to obtain terms, and accept the proffered friendship and protection of the new lords of the soil.

At the time of the Conquest the population numbered only 75,000 souls, including 8,000 Indians. The pages of this Directory disclose how great has been the advance during the century. It is worthy of note that now, for the first time, was a printing press used in Canada. The first number of the first newspaper—the *Quebec Gazette*—appeared June 21st, 1764.

The country, which now received the name of the Province of Quebec, remained for some years under military rule. Gen. Murray, after the peace, was appointed the first Governor General; Gen. Gage was in command of the Montreal District, and Col. Burton of the Three Rivers District. The Executive Council was composed of the lieutenant governors of Montreal and Three Rivers, the chief justice, the inspector general of customs, and eight of the leading inhabitants of the colony.

In 1766, Gen. Carleton, afterwards Lord Dorchester, was appointed Governor General. Gen. Carleton, who had taken a prominent part in the capture of Quebec, continued to be connected with Canada for six and thirty years.

The French Canadians, who constituted the immense majority of the inhabitants, soon began to express dissatisfaction at the continuance of military rule. The administration

of the civil law was defective. The barristers and judges not understanding French, the people were under the necessity of carrying on their lawsuits in the English language. Memorials were addressed to the Crown by the discontented majority. In 1770, the Governor went to England to give testimony respecting the affairs of the province. The result of the inquiry was the passing of the "Quebec Act" by the English Parliament in 1774, for reconstructing the government of the Province of Quebec. This measure provided for the free exercise of the Roman Catholic religion by the French Canadians, subject to the king's supremacy, and that the clergy of the church of Rome might "hold, receive and enjoy their accustomed dues and rights, with respect to such persons only as shall profess the said religion." It further provided that "in all matters of controversy relative to property and civil rights, resort shall be had to the laws of Canada, as the rule for the decision of the same." The Act confirmed the criminal law of England as the law to be administered in the province. It further provided for the establishment of a Legislative Council, to consist of residents appointed by the king, not exceeding 23, nor less than 17, in number. Thus, by express provisions of the Legislature of the mother country, the inhabitants of the conquered territory were secured in the enjoyment of their civil rights the free exercise of their religion, and the protection of their own civil laws and customs. This liberality to the French Canadians was displeasing to the British residents, and was denounced by the Congress of the other American colonies which met in Philadelphia in September; but it was highly acceptable to the Canadian clergy, as well as to the principal inhabitants of the colony.

FROM THE QUEBEC ACT TO THE DIVISION OF THE PROVINCE. 1774-1791.

The colonies which had so recently exerted themselves for the extension of British rule in North America were now on the point of offering armed resistance to the mother country. The same year in which the Quebec Act became law, Canada received an invitation to send representatives to Philadelphia to concert measures of union and defence. But if the French Canadians disliked the British, who had recently come amongst them, they hated and distrusted their fellow colonists in New England much more; and the Congress had indelicately increased this distrust by its denunciation of the Quebec Act. "Nor can we suppress our astonishment," it had been declared in a document addressed to the people of Great Britain, "that a British Parliament should ever consent to establish in that colony (Canada) a religion that often drenched your island in blood, and has disseminated impiety, bigotry, persecution, murder and rebellion, through every part of the world." Canada, therefore with this document before it, shewed no disposition to take part in the Congress. The following year coercive measures were resorted to by the latter. Gen. Arnold led an army against Quebec, and Generals Montgomery and Schuyler against Montreal. There were few British troops in the province, and the invaders advanced without much difficulty over large tracts of the country. The forts of Ticonderoga and Crown Point, on Lake Champlain; and Isle aux Noix, St. Johns, Chambly and Sorel, fell into the hands of Montgomery. The Americans still hoped that the Canadians would make common cause with them. A conciliatory address to the people was issued and widely circulated. The sympathizers with the revolutionary cause were, in truth, not few, and the ranks of the invading army were daily swelled by deserters. The French Canadians refused to take up arms with the revo-

tionists, but they likewise refused, for the most part, to bear arms against them. The British population was very small. Montreal could make no effectual resistance, and presently Quebec was the only place that held the enemy in check. The strength of its defences saved the city, and probably the colony. Carleton, with only sixteen hundred men, of whom six hundred were militia, was able to repel all attacks. General Montgomery fell in an unsuccessful assault upon Quebec made on the 31st of December.

In the spring of 1776, the English received reinforcements. The American army, weakened by disease, fell back to Three Rivers. Governor Carleton pursued and captured the enemy's stores and artillery. The retreat was continued to Sorel, which was also retaken by the English troops; and the expulsion of the invading forces was speedily completed. The colonies in revolt now made fresh efforts to detach the Canadians from their allegiance. Franklin and others were sent as special commissioners. The offers were now more liberal: the Roman Catholic religion was to be respected, and the people allowed to govern themselves. But, on the other hand, the French Canadians had already got entire freedom of worship, and the protection of their ancient laws. They had almost all they desired, and refused to put in jeopardy the privileges already secured to them. The American colonies, though successful in shaking off their connection with the mother country, were unable to bring Canada into the Union, and on the recognition of American Independence on the 3rd of September, 1783, Canada remained a colony of Great Britain.

A large number of persons throughout the new confederation, who had remained faithful to the royal cause, being now treated with great severity by the American government, emigrated, and settled in Canada and the other British colonies, but chiefly in the western parts of Canada, now the Province of Ontario. The number of the United Empire Loyalists, as they were termed, that settled in Canada, is estimated at ten thousand. Their property had been confiscated, but by the liberality of the British government large sums were applied to their relief, and each of them received as a free gift from 200 to 5,500 acres of land in Canada or some other colony. Many of them endured great hardships in thus leaving their homes to begin life anew, but by their energy and enterprise they gave much valuable aid in developing the resources of the country.

There was now a growing agitation in the Province of Quebec for a representative system of government. The French Canadians, it is true, had been admitted from the first into the Legislative Council, but they were not in a majority there, whereas in an elective chamber they must almost necessarily have a very large majority. One of the most prominent agitators for a representative form of government was Du Calvet, a French Protestant, who was accused of aiding the insurgents during the revolutionary war. He strenuously advocated an elective assembly, and also the representation of Canada by six members in the British Parliament.

In 1785, Lord Dorchester returned to Canada as Governor General, Sir Frederik Haldimand who had held the office since 1778, having solicited his own recall. Notwithstanding the popularity of Lord Dorchester, discontent generally prevailed. At length, after petitions and counter-petitions had been canvassed for years, and transmitted to Britain, in 1789, the draft of a new constitution was sent to Lord Dorchester by Lord Granville, the colonial minister. By this it was proposed to divide the Province of Quebec into

two—the Province of Upper Canada and the Province of Lower Canada. Each section was to have a Legislative Council and Assembly. "This separation I hope," said Mr. Pitt, then Chancellor of the Exchequer, will put an end to the competition between the old French inhabitants and the new settlers from Britain and the British colonies." The Upper Province was to give a great majority to the one nationality, and the Lower Province to the other. All taxes were to be imposed and the money disbursed under the control of the Legislature of each section.

The Division of the Province was contrary to the advice of Lord Dorchester, but the measure finally became law in 1791. The Act provided that the Legislative Council of Lower Canada should be composed of not fewer than fifteen, and that of Upper Canada of not fewer than seven persons. Members were to hold their seats for life. The number of members to be elected to the Legislative Assembly of Upper Canada was not to be less than sixteen, and of Lower Canada not less than fifty. The Council and Assembly were to be called together at least once in every year: the Assembly to be elected for four years.

During the 30 years that the colony had been under British rule, the population had doubled in number. In 1761, it was about 70,000 souls, now it was over 135,000, of whom 120,000 were French Canadians. The inhabitants of the new Province of Upper Canada numbered only 10,000, and were nearly all of British origin. Within 80 years, however, the preponderance of population has been reversed, the inhabitants of the Upper Province now outnumbering by hundreds of thousands those of the other section.

FROM THE DIVISION OF THE PROVINCE TO THE UNION. 1791-1840.

The first elections in Lower Canada under the new form of government took place in June, 1792. Fifty members were returned. Fifteen persons had been nominated legislative councillors. The Legislature was opened on the 17th of December by Gen. Clarke, (in the absence of Lord Dorchester) and sat till May, 1793. A contest took place at the opening of the Legislature as to the election of a speaker, and as to the language in which business should be conducted. Mr. Panet, the French candidate, was elected by 28 to 18, and it was resolved that the minutes, &c., be recorded in both languages. The revenue of the Lower Province was this year only \$25,000.

The Parliament of Upper Canada met at Newark (Niagara) on the 17th of September, 1792, and was opened by Lieut. Gov. Simcoe. The Council numbered 7, and the Assembly 16. The Legislature in its first session passed an act introducing the English law "as the rule of decision in all matters of controversy relative to property and civil rights." The second act introduced trial by jury. The eighth and last act gave the names of "Eastern, Midland, Home and Western" to the four districts into which the province had been divided by Lord Dorchester in 1788. These divisions were afterward abolished in 1849. The following session (1793) the Legislature of Upper Canada abolished slavery. The owners of slaves then in the Province were to keep their rights, but the children born of female slaves were to become free at 25 years of age. In 1803, it was decided by Chief Justice Osgoode that slavery was incompatible with the laws of Lower Canada. In 1796, the seat of government of Upper Canada was removed from Niagara to York (Toronto) by Gov. Simcoe.

Lord Dorchester, who had been a faithful friend of Canada for more than thirty years, was succeeded in 1796

by Gen. Prescott. The country was now enjoying repose and steadily advancing in wealth and importance.

The bitterness which had previously existed between the French Canadians and British inhabitants of Lower Canada was now considerably moderated. This will be evident from the remarks of M. Pléssis, parish priest of Québec, in his funeral oration over Bishop Briand. "Our competitors," he said, "regarded at first with a jealous eye and lowering brow, inspired in us feelings of detestation or aversion. We could not be persuaded that a race of men strangers to our soil, to our language, and to our worship, could ever be willing to render to Canada an equivalent for what it lost by changing its masters. Generous nation, that has made us aware, by so many proofs, how ill founded were our prepossessions. Pardon us then, for that our first (and now past) distrustfulness of a foreign race, whose virtues, not being then experienced by us, we had not the happiness to know." &c.

Sir R. S. Milnes succeeded Prescott as lieutenant-governor of Lower Canada in 1793, and remained in office till 1805. On his retirement, the Hon. Thomas Dunn acted as administrator until 1807. *Le Canadien* newspaper, entirely in French, was first issued in November, 1806.

The relations between England and the United States at this time were beginning to cause no little disquietude and uneasiness. Mr. Dunn called out the militia of Lower Canada, and the response was prompt and satisfactory, and gave an emphatic contradiction to the reports which had been diligently spread, that the Canadians were only waiting for the approach of the invading army to flock to its standard. At this critical time Sir James Craig, a military officer, came out as Governor General, and remained till 1811. Sir James did not become popular with the French Canadians. It was a time of great irritation and disquietude. The Governor issued a general order exhorting the people to be on their guard against treasonable designs, and directing all militia men to watch attentively the actions of aliens amongst them. Col. Panet and other officers were dismissed from the militia on the charge of exciting discord and animosity between the two classes of British subjects. The Assembly, in 1808, adopted a bill by twenty-two to two excluding judges from seats in Parliament. The Legislative Council rejected the measure, and the Governor approved their course. The following session the Assembly engaged in discussions on constitutional questions, and was dissolved by the Governor after a session of five weeks, on the ground that the House was neglecting the matters submitted for its consideration, and wasting the time in fruitless debates. The new Parliament met in 1810, and forthwith proceeded to declare that it was an infringement of parliamentary privileges for the governor to censure the acts of the Assembly. The House also sought to bring the government officials under its control by offering to assume the payment of their salaries. The Assembly further demanded that a budget should be presented to it showing in detail all the estimated expenditure for the succeeding year. The Council and Assembly were at variance on the question of excluding Judge de Bonne. The Assembly passed a resolution that a judge of the Court of King's Bench could not sit or vote in the House. The Governor declared that he felt bound to oppose this assumption, and prorogued the Legislature. Proceedings were instituted against the proprietors and editors of *Le Canadien* for disseminating treasonable publications, and several of the opposition leaders were arrested. The Governor's health began to fail. The distrust and opposition he encountered at every step from a portion of the French Canadians awakened his indignation. "Base and daring

fabricators of falsehood!" he exclaimed in an address to the Canadians, March 21st, "What do you know of me or my intentions? Canadians, ask the heads of your Church, who have opportunities of knowing me. These are men of honor and knowledge, from whom you ought to seek information and advice. The leaders of faction, the demagogues of a party, associate not with me; they cannot know me. For what purpose should I oppress you? Is it to serve the king? Is it for myself, then, that I should oppress you? Is it from ambition? What can you give me? Is it for power? Alas! my good friends, with a life now contracting slowly to its period under the pressure of disease combined in the service of my country, I look only to pass what it may please God to suffer to remain of it, in the comfort of retirement among my friends. I remain among you only in obedience to the commands of my Sovereign."

In his letters to Lord Liverpool he drew a dark picture of the discord and enmity between French and British colonists, and suggested that it would be better, rather than leave matters as they were, to unite the two Provinces. In the session of 1810-11, the bill for excluding judges of the King's Bench from seats in the Assembly was again carried, and this time it received the Royal sanction. Shortly afterward Sir James Craig returned to England in consequence of ill health, and died the same year. Mr. Dunn assumed the administration of the government for a short time. Then Sir George Prevost, who had been lieutenant-governor of Nova Scotia, was transferred to Canada. Under his conciliatory policy, much of the irritation and animosity between the two nationalities was removed.

The war which had long been apprehended between Great Britain and the United States commenced the following year. M. Pléssis, the Roman Catholic Bishop, profited by this occasion to claim the restoration of the rights and status of the Church as they existed in Canada before the conquest. The Legislature of Lower Canada passed an act empowering the Governor General, in case of invasion, to embody the whole militia of the country, and also voted £15,000 per annum for five years toward defraying the expenses of defending the Province. The Legislature of Upper Canada also passed measures for the defence of the Province and for raising and training the militia. The population of Upper Canada had increased at this date to 80,000, and that of the Lower Province to 200,000.

Success attended the first steps taken against the enemy by the British forces in Canada. Fort Michilimackinac, situated on the island of the same name, in the strait between Lakes Huron and Michigan, was captured, and an American force, under Gen. Hull, which had crossed over from Detroit, was forced to retire. Gen. Brock, commander of the forces in Upper Canada, on the 11th of August advanced on Detroit, the American general, capitulated, and 2,500 prisoners and thirty-three pieces of cannon, fell into the hands of the English general.

Another attempt was made to invade the Province in October. A crossing was effected above Queenston on the night of the 12th. The following morning Gen. Brock was engaged in opposing the crossing of the Americans near the village, when the body that had already crossed about took possession of Queenston Heights. The British general immediately led a force to regain possession of the Heights, but while gallantly advancing to the attack he was struck down by a ball. Gen. Sheaffe took command, and the attack was continued with so much determination that the enemy was dislodged with great loss. The English were every where completely victorious. A subsequent attack

in November, was also repelled. In Lower Canada the invading force, under Gen. Dearborn, retired without accomplishing anything. The campaign proved favorable to England, and the Canadian militia gained some renown. Hostilities were resumed early the following year. The British, under the command of their gallant chief, Tecumseh, gave valuable aid to the British forces. One of the most notable events of the campaign was the battle of Chateauguay. An American army of 3500, under Gen. Hampton, was on the way from Lake Champlain to Montreal. A thousand Canadian militia under Colonel de Salaberry opposed their progress at the junction of the St. Lawrence and Chateauguay rivers. A battle ensued in which the Americans were defeated and forced to retreat. Meanwhile the enemy, who had gained some successes in Upper Canada, was concentrating his forces to co-operate with Gen. Hampton in the attack on Montreal. While on the way down the St. Lawrence, Gen. Wilkinson, the American commander, landed part of his troops under Gen. Covington to give battle to a small Canadian force under Col. Morrison, that had been sent to intercept the invaders. A battle was fought at Chrysler's Farm, county of Dundas, where the Americans, though three times as numerous as the force opposed to them, were completely routed, and their general killed. The defeat of Hampton at Chateauguay, and of Wilkinson at Chrysler's Farm, led the Americans to abandon their design on Montreal.

In March of the following year (1814), the Americans were defeated at Lacolle, and their depot at Oswego was destroyed. The English failed in an attack on Sackett's harbour, and were forced to retreat at Chippewa. A hard fought battle took place at Lundy's Lane near Niagara Falls, after which the enemy retreated during the night to Chippewa. The war was subsequently terminated by the Treaty of Ghent, 24th December, 1814.

About the time peace was restored the Legislature of Lower Canada met at Quebec. The political discussions which had ceased during the war now commenced afresh. M. L. J. Papineau was chosen Speaker in the place of M. Panet, who was nominated a member of the Legislative Council. The elder Papineau had long been one of the most prominent champions of French Canadian nationality, and his son, the new Speaker, was destined to become the greatest agitator of his time.

Sir George Prévost, who had been regarded by the French Canadians as their firm friend, went home at the close of the war to defend himself against some charges that had been made against his conduct of military affairs during the last campaign. He died shortly after his arrival in London. Sir Gordon Drummond administered the government for a short time, when he was succeeded in 1816 by Sir John C. Sherbrooke, ex-governor of Nova Scotia, who, like Sir George Prévost, endeavoured to gain the good will, or at least remove the animosity, of the French Canadian majority. M. Pleissis, the Bishop, was invited to take a seat at the Council board, with the reservation that the right should not extend to his successors. A similar honour was conferred on M. Papineau. The principal topic of discussion now was the Estimates. The Legislative Assembly claimed the right of controlling the entire expenditure. In Upper Canada a similar discussion was proceeding. Another subject that engrossed much attention was the Clergy Reserves. A large amount of territory had been reserved by the Imperial Act of 1791 for the support of the Protestant clergy. The lands had been appropriated

exclusively to the support of the Church of England in Canada. At first, they had yielded no revenue, the rents being insufficient to cover the expenses of management. They remained in the hands of government, and the only money paid to the Church of England up to 1821 was a sum of £427 in 1816. Other bodies of Protestants began to lay claim to a share of the fund, and addresses were passed by the Houses of Assembly recommending the distribution of the money among all denominations. The subject was not finally disposed of till 1855, when, after certain provision had been made for the widows and orphans of deceased clergymen, and for securing the incomes then enjoyed, the rest of the fund was applied to municipal purposes. The colony, notwithstanding these political discussions, was in a highly prosperous condition, and the great majority of the people, busy and contented, took little interest in the debates on constitutional questions.

In 1818, Sir J. C. Sherbrooke was permitted to retire from office, and the Duke of Richmond came out as Governor. His administration was brief; being bitten by a fox, he died of hydrophobia, August, 1819. The Earl of Dalhousie succeeded him. The struggle of the Assembly on the question of voting the supplies continued. Between the Legislative Council, of which the majority of members were British, and the Legislative Assembly, composed almost exclusively of French Canadians, there was continual strife and animosity. The Assembly objected, in particular, to vote the salaries of certain obnoxious officials.

A Bill for the union of the two Provinces was introduced into the Imperial Parliament in 1822, but thrown out on the second reading. When the French Canadians learned that this Bill had been introduced by the government, they loudly denounced the project. The people of Upper Canada were not in favour of it, and when the Lower Canadian Assembly met in January, 1823, it forthwith passed resolutions condemning the Bill, and Messrs. Papineau and Nelson were dispatched to London to protest against it. The project was therefore abandoned for a time.

Meanwhile, the dispute on the question of voting the supplies continued more fiercely than ever. In 1827 the Lower Canadian Assembly again stopped the supplies, as they had done for several years previously. Lord Dalhousie prorogued the Chambers the next day. A new parliament was summoned, which elected M. Papineau to be Speaker. The Governor disapproved of the selection, and requested the House to propose some one else. The House, refusing to comply, was immediately prorogued. The House of Commons appointed a committee that reported at length on the state of Canadian affairs, but no definite action was taken. Sir James Kempt, from Nova Scotia, replaced Lord Dalhousie in Lower Canada, and Sir John Colborne came out to Upper Canada.

Matters were becoming more serious. In Upper Canada there was a strong republican element that looked with admiration at the rapid growth of the neighboring states. The fact that the leading positions in the government were held by a small number of officials and their family connections was another cause of much dissatisfaction. In Lower Canada there was the ancient hostility of race. Concessions which, if made in time, would have allayed the discontent, were withheld. In the Lower Canadian House of Assembly 92 resolutions condemning the government for their management of affairs, for the exclusion of the French Canadians from office, and setting forth other matters of complaint, were introduced and passed in the spring of 1834. The Imperial government in 1835 sent out a commission to

inquire into the grievances complained of. The report of the commission was submitted to Parliament in 1837, but the majority of the House of Commons was opposed to most of the demands of the Lower Canadian opposition. The Imperial Act of 1791 had authorized the establishment of Church of England rectories in the parishes of Canada. Under the authority of this act, fifty-seven rectories were established in Upper Canada by Sir John Colborne in 1836. This act caused increased excitement. Steps were taken by the leaders of the malcontents to enrol the disaffected. In this their success was not great, for few of the common people were disposed to take up arms to enforce the demands made by their leaders. The clergy, and all the most prudent and moderate chiefs of the opposition, strongly opposed any resort to violence. Some of the more violent agitators, however, could not be restrained. The first outbreak occurred in Montreal on the 7th of November, 1837, when the "Sons of Liberty," an organization of young men of Montreal, assailed a body of volunteers in the street. In the course of the month, several encounters took place between the insurgents and the military at St. Denis, St. Charles, St. Eustache, and other points. At St. Denis, the British troops, being few in number, were repulsed; but at St. Charles, the rebels were routed with great slaughter by a detachment under Col. Wetherall. At St. Eustache also, the loss of the insurgents was very heavy. In Upper Canada, the insurgents, under the command of W. L. Mackenzie, were defeated near Toronto by a force of volunteers commanded by Sir F. B. Head. The Earl of Durham, the new Governor General, came out with special powers to inquire into the state of Canadian affairs. The constitution of Lower Canada had been suspended and a special council appointed. The Governor reported strongly in favour of the union of the provinces, but some acts of his administration being censured in the House of Lords, he was recalled. Before the rebellion was finally suppressed, several attempts were made to invade Canada from the American frontier by sympathizers on the other side, but these attempts were all speedily defeated. The subsequent risings were punished with greater severity than the first, a number of the leading rebels being executed under sentence of court martial, and many more transported. Some of the chief instigators of revolt, however, escaped. Mackenzie, Papineau, and others were, some years later, permitted to return to Canada, and obtained seats in the Legislative Assembly.

The insurrection being at an end, the project of uniting the two Canadas was urged on by the British ministry. The Right Hon. C. P. Thompson, an eminent merchant, (afterwards Lord Sydenham) came out as Governor General (1839). The assent of the Special Council of Lower Canada, and of the Legislature of Upper Canada, was obtained to the measure. A bill was drafted and sent to England by Lord Sydenham, and passed in 1840. The Union took effect by royal proclamation on the 10th of February, 1841.

FROM THE UNION TO CONFEDERATION—1841-1867.

Canada was now fully under "Responsible Government," the ministry having seats in the Legislature, and holding office so long only as they enjoyed the confidence of a majority of the members of the Lower House. The Local Legislatures were abolished. Upper and Lower Canada were represented by an equal number of members in the Legislative Assembly of Canada. To the House was conceded also entire control over the expenditure. The Legislative Councillors were to be appointed by the Crown for life.

The first United Parliament was opened at Kingston in

June, 1841. In September of that year, Lord Sydenham, who had been a very able and popular Governor, died from the effects of a fall from his horse. Sir Charles Bagot then came out as Governor General, and held office till 1843. In 1844, the seat of government was removed from Kingston to Montreal. Lord Metcalfe administered the government from 1843 to 1845. Being then obliged to retire in consequence of ill health, he was succeeded by Lord Cathcart, who held office till 1847, when the Earl of Elgin was appointed Governor. The administration of this able statesman was prosperous and satisfactory. Some agitation occurred during his term of office respecting the "Rebellion Losses Bill," for indemnifying persons who had sustained loss during the insurrection of 1837-8. Violent opposition was made to this measure, which was considered by many to be too liberal as well as too indiscriminate. Lord Elgin, after assenting to the Bill, was hooted and pelted in the streets of Montreal, and the Parliament buildings were set on fire by the mob, and a large amount of property, including the library and valuable records, was destroyed. The seat of government was afterwards removed to Toronto.

The succeeding years were years of steady progress and prosperity. A few events only will be noted here, but historical details respecting various subjects will be found under other headings. In 1850, a free banking law was passed. In 1851, five cent postage was introduced. In 1853, the Legislative Assembly was increased from eighty-four to one hundred and thirty members, sixty-five from each section of the Province. In 1858, the decimal system of currency was adopted. Sir Edmund Head succeeded Lord Elgin in 1854 and continued in office till 1860. In 1855 the Clergy Reserves question was settled by the Legislature, and Seigneurial Tenure in Lower Canada was abolished. In 1856, the elective principle was applied to the Legislative Council, and it became an elective chamber. It was to be composed of the members appointed by the Crown before the 14th of July, 1856, and of forty-eight members elected for forty-eight electoral divisions, into which the Province was divided. In 1858, Ottawa was selected by the Queen as the permanent seat of government, and Parliament buildings were erected there. In 1859-60, the Statutes of the Province were consolidated into three volumes, one volume containing the Acts relating to all Canada, and the other two volumes embracing the Statutes relating to Upper and Lower Canada respectively. In 1860, the British Province was visited by the Prince of Wales. Whilst in Canada the Prince inaugurated the Victoria Bridge and laid the cornerstone of the Parliamentary buildings at Ottawa. The seizure of Mason and Slidell on board the British steamer *Ten* towards the close of 1861, and the prospect of a war between England and the United States, caused intense excitement throughout Canada and prompted the organization and enlistment of numerous bodies of volunteer militia. These corps in later years have twice done good service (1866, 1870) in repelling incursions of Fenian marauders. In 1865-6, the Civil Code of Lower Canada, the compilation of which had been entrusted to three commissioners several years before, was completed and promulgated. In 1864, great difficulty was experienced in carrying on the government. The majority of Lower Canadian members and the majority of Upper Canadian members were arrayed on opposite sides of the House, and the two parties were very evenly balanced. The number of members in the Legislative Assembly was the same for each section of the Province, and although the population of Upper Canada now greatly exceeded that of Lower Canada, the Lower Canadian members opposed the com-

tion of any increase of representation to Upper Canada, because at the time of the Union, the representation had been thus settled notwithstanding the fact that at that time the population of Lower Canada was by far the largest. The demand for "Representation according to Population" was now every year becoming more urgent on the part of Upper Canada. A project for uniting the British North American Provinces under one Confederation had been before the country from time to time for eighty years, and more especially from the date of Lord Durham's administration. The desire to carry out this scheme induced some of the leaders of the Upper Canada opposition to form a coalition with the Lower Canadian majority. A government was thus formed, pledged to introduce the federal system. After conference with the other Provinces, Confederation was carried, to take effect 1st of July, 1867. The Act of Union will be found in this volume. The construction of an Intercolonial Railway was one of the stipulations of the Confederation Act, and this is now in course of construction.

the province; the St. Maurice, nearly 400 miles in length; the Saguenay noted for its fine scenery; the Richelieu, the Niagara, and others. The Province of Ontario has for its southern and western boundaries five great lakes—Superior, Huron and Georgian Bay, St. Clair, Erie, and Ontario, of which the total length is 1,985 miles, and area 80,000 square miles. In some parts of the Province of Quebec, especially in the Eastern Townships, the scenery is extremely picturesque. In the Province of Ontario the surface is undulating rather than mountainous. A main water shed separates the waters of the St. Lawrence from those of the Ottawa.

The system of inland navigation is the most extensive and perfect in the world. The statistics given under separate heads will convey some idea of the extent of railway communication; of the agricultural and mineral wealth; the volume of trade, and the vast resources and general prosperity of the provinces.

SKETCH OF THE HISTORY OF NOVA SCOTIA.

I. From its discovery to 1784.

Nova Scotia, up to the year 1784, included the Province now called New Brunswick, and it also formerly included part of the present state of Maine, the whole being known under the name of Acadie. This was the term used in the original commission of the king of France, and is found in public documents as far back as 1604. The country was discovered by Sebastian Cabot in 1498, but may have been noticed by John Cabot in his voyage the previous year. A few years after the discovery by Cabot, French fishermen from Basque and Bretagne arrived at a promontory of an island to the southwest, and named it Cape Breton. This name was afterward applied to the whole island, which now forms part of Nova Scotia.

In 1513, Baron de Léry, an adventurous Frenchman, anxious that France should have a share in the newly discovered territories, proposed to found a settlement in Acadie. He accordingly set sail with a company of settlers, but owing to tempestuous weather and other adverse circumstances, the enterprise miscarried, and the expedition was abandoned. In 1599 Cape Breton was resorted to by persons from England. In 1598, the Marquis de la Roche made an attempt to colonize the country by convicts. Fearing to set his settlers free on the mainland, he first landed forty of them on Sable Island, a spot ill suited to support life. But when the Marquis attempted to return to the island from the mainland, his ship was driven by a storm to France. There he was immediately taken prisoner, in a civil war then raging, and it was not till five years had elapsed that the wretched survivors, twelve in number, were rescued from their miserable position.

No further attempt was made till about 1603 when Sieur Dupont Gravé, a merchant of St. Malo, lured by the prospect of gain, sought to obtain a monopoly of the fur traffic in Canada and Acadie. With the assistance of de Chaste, governor of Dieppe, a company of Rouen merchants was organized, and an expedition fitted out and placed under the command of Champlain. In 1603, Champlain sailed up the St. Lawrence as far as the Lachine rapids; and Henry IV of France was so well pleased with the result of the expedition, that he granted to M. de Monts, a Huguenot, who succeeded to de Chaste on the death of the latter, a monopoly of the fur traffic in all parts of North America lying between Cape Race, in Newfoundland, and the 50th degree of north latitude. The second expedition under de

Monts sailed in March, 1604. Part of the expedition went on to Canada, but de Monts remained at Acadie. This was considered the finest country of La Nouvelle France. It possessed fine ports, a fertile soil, and a temperate and salubrious climate. The Miamec Indians, a branch of the Algonquin family, who then inhabited the country, received the French with kindness. De Monts landed first at Passamoudic, now called Liverpool, and afterward coasted the peninsula as far as the Bay of Fundy. The expedition also stopped at Port Royal, now called Annapolis, where Baron de Poutreincourt, a companion of de Monts, formed a settlement. De Monts sailed on round the bay, and discovered the River St. John. He finally wintered on a rocky islet at the mouth of the St. Croix. Thirty-six of the party died of scurvy during the winter. In spring de Monts went farther south. During his absence, Dupont Gravé arrived from France with supplies and forty additional colonists, and on the return of de Monts, the entire body set out for Port Royal, where they began to establish a settlement. In this work, the celebrated Lescarbot, a friend of Poutreincourt, is said to have afforded much valuable assistance. Under his guidance the colonists constructed a variety of apparatus and machines which were very useful to them in their settlement. But unexpected misfortunes led to the abandonment of the colony. A marauding party of Dutchmen from the New Netherlands seized a whole year's stores of pelts, and, some months later, the merchants of St. Malo, jealous of the monopoly of the fur traffic enjoyed by the Rouen company, succeeded in getting de Monts's charter revoked. In 1607, Poutreincourt, Lescarbot and the other colonists abandoned the settlement at Port Royal, and returned to France.

Three years later, Poutreincourt, the governor, who had obtained a grant of Port Royal from de Monts, which had been confirmed by the king, returned with a number of skilled artisans and resumed his labors. But the Jesuits, after the assassination of Henry IV., having succeeded in effecting an entrance into the country, and having founded a settlement of their own at St. Sauveur, dissensions sprang up which eventually led to the abandonment of the colony a second time; and many of the Huguenot settlers withdrew from the country in disgust. The colonists of Virginia subsequently interfered, claiming Acadie for Britain by right of discovery. Captain Argall, from Virginia, following up this pretension, appeared suddenly before St. Sauveur, the Jesuit settlement founded by La Sausage, and carried the place by storm. The government of Virginia subsequently resolved to extend the French from every point south of the 45th parallel of north latitude, including the central region of Acadie; and Sir Samuel Argall, with three armed vessels, was commissioned to carry out the resolution. Port Royal was captured and destroyed in 1613, the colonists were dispersed, and Poutreincourt returned to France. This is stated to have been the first conflict between English and French in the new world.

The Virginians, however, soon left Acadie. In 1621, Sir William Alexander obtained from James I. of England a grant of the territory lying to the east of a line drawn from the St. Croix to the St. Lawrence. The land was called Nova Scotia in the patent. In 1623, Sir William sent a body of colonists to begin a settlement. Arriving late in the season, they were obliged to winter in Newfoundland. In 1624 they reached Cape Sable, but finding the French in possession of the places they intended to occupy, they returned to Britain.

In 1624, Charles I. granted a large extent of land in Nova

scotia to a number of persons who were created "barons of Nova Scotia." The object was to promote the colonization of the country, each baronet receiving 16,000 acres of land, and being bound to send out six settlers. In 1628, Port Royal was taken by Sir David Kerke, a Huguenot officer in the English service. The following year, Sir William Alexander divided part of his territory to Claude de la-Tour, a French prisoner who had married an English lady. At this time the French still held possession of Cape Sable and other places in the south. De la Tour was sent to take possession of Acadie, but his son, who held one of the forts, refused to give it up. A few years later, by the Treaty of St. Germain en Laye, in 1632, Charles I. renounced the pretensions that had been put forward to Acadie by his subjects, and possession of the colony was confirmed to France. It was now divided into three provinces, of which the governors were de Razillai, young de la Tour, and Denys. Razillai was succeeded in 1635, by Charnazay. Disputes now commenced between de la Tour and Charnazay as to the bounds of their respective territories. Louis XIII. interfered, and in 1638, defined the boundaries anew; but de la Tour would not submit, and for several years a fierce struggle was carried on. Finally, in 1645, Charnazay, in the absence of de la Tour, assaulted the residence of his enemy. Madame de la Tour made a gallant defence, and obtained favorable terms of capitulation. But Charnazay, mortified at finding the band of defenders so small, treacherously hanged all but one. Madame de la Tour died soon afterward. Charnazay was then named chief governor of Acadie. On the death of Charnazay in 1650, de la Tour returned. In 1651, he married Charnazay's widow, and claimed Nova Scotia, as his right; but he was soon assailed by a creditor of Charnazay, named La Borgue, who destroyed the settlement of La Héve. Before the contest was decided an enemy from without interfered. Cromwell, who was now Protector of England, sent out an expedition in 1654, under Colonel Sedgwick who defeated both de la Tour and La Borgue, and made himself master of all the strong posts in the colony. De la Tour appealed to Cromwell for redress. His claim was allowed, and Cromwell granted to him and two English gentlemen the greater part of Acadie. The rights of de la Tour were afterwards purchased by the other proprietors; but in 1667, by the Treaty of Breda, Acadie was again transferred to France.

During these vicissitudes, little had been done by either English or French towards the development and improvement of the country. In 1685, the population was reported to be about nine hundred. The French establishments were ill protected that a band of pirates, numbering only one hundred and ten, captured Pentagoet, the headquarters of Gov. Chamblay.

In 1590, when the Canadians and New Englanders were engaged in hostilities, Port Royal surrendered to Admiral Phips from Massachusetts, and other Acadian posts were captured by Col. Church. The British remained masters of the greater part of Acadie till 1696, when it was once more restored to France by the Treaty of Ryswick. M. de Villebois, who was governor at this time, having died July, 1700, Bouillon succeeded.

War being declared against France at the beginning of Queen Anne's reign, the possession of Acadie was again disputed. The New Englanders organized another expedition for its conquest in 1707. On the sixth of June of that year, a squadron of two ships of war, and twenty-three transports carrying 2900 men, appeared before Port Royal. The fortifications being well manned and defended, the attack was repulsed; but in 1710, Port Royal was forced to surrender

to another colonial expedition under Gen. Nicholson, and the loss of Acadie was involved in the surrender. The power of France being weakened by protracted war, she was compelled by the Treaty of Utrecht, in 1713, to cede to Britain not only Acadie, but also all her pretensions to Newfoundland and the Hudson Bay Territory. The Island of Cape Breton, however, was retained by the French, and after the loss of Nova Scotia they began to construct fortifications at Louisbourg, at a cost of more than one million sterling, as a protection to their Canadian possessions. The island became an important fishing station, and Louisbourg continued to be the capital for many years.

France having declared war against England in 1744, Gov. Shirley, of Massachusetts, formed the design of taking Louisbourg, though the fortress was supposed to be almost impregnable. New Hampshire, Connecticut, New York, and other colonies furnished troops, provisions and munitions of war. The expedition, which was placed under the command of General Pepperell, sailed from Boston, and arrived at Canseau on the 5th of April, 1745. Here it was joined by some English ships under Admiral Warren. A landing was effected in rear of the town early in May, and the siege commenced. Preparations had been made for an assault, when the French governor, Duchambau, capitulated on the 10th of June. The garrison marched out with the honors of war. An immense booty, valued at a million sterling, fell into the hands of the victors. The Canadians, in great alarm at the conquest of this stronghold, sent to France for help, and a formidable expedition was sent out the following year under the command of the Duke D'Anville, to retake Louisbourg and Acadie. But the hostile fleet met with terrible disasters. The ships being dispersed and wrecked by violent storms, and the soldiers and crews thinned by disease, nothing could be accomplished. The duke died of vexation, and the vice-admiral, d'Estourenelle, killed himself in despair. Only a remnant of the expedition returned to France. By the Treaty of Aix-la-Chapelle in 1748, Britain agreed to restore Cape Breton to France, but the cost of the New England expedition was refunded to the colonies by the mother country.

After the Treaty, disputes commenced as to the boundaries of the French and British possessions in America. A joint commission was appointed in 1749, but the disputes led to hostilities from time to time between the colonists of the respective countries. To prevent encroachments on the territory in dispute, the governor of Canada induced three thousand Acadian French to settle on the north shore of the Bay of Fundy, and on Isle St. Jean (Prince Edward Island).

The harassing alternation of proprietorship had hitherto prevented any attempts to develop the resources of Nova Scotia. At this time, however, an effort was made to colonize it by emigrants sent out at the expense of the British government. Free grants of land, together with tools, arms and provisions for a year, were offered to all soldiers who were willing to settle in the colony. About four thousand disbanded soldiers and their families, attracted by these liberal offers, arrived at Chelbaeto Harbor on the 21st of June, 1749, and the town of Halifax was founded on its shores. Cornwallis became the first governor of the colony, and appointed a council of six members. In 1753, about 1500 Germans joined the colony, and settled in the county of Lunenburg.

Meantime the boundary disputes continued. The British claimed the whole territory north to the St. Lawrence including the Peninsula of Gaspé. The Seven Years' War (1756—1763) which resulted in the cession of Canada to

Britain, and thus put an end to the boundary question, soon after commenced. In 1755, the French fort Beausjour, on the north shore of the Bay of Fundy, (part of the disputed territory,) was captured by an expedition from Boston under Col. Winslow, assisted by regular troops under Col. Monckton. An incident of much interest now occurred, for the explanation of which we must go back a few years. After the cession of Acadie to Britain by the Treaty of 1713, many of the Acadians remained in the country, but refused to take the oath of allegiance. They were allowed to follow their own mode of worship, and to have magistrates of their own selection. Being exempted from bearing arms against their countrymen, they received the name of neutral French. By intriguing with the Indians who had also resented the cession of the country to Britain and were hostile to the English settlers, these neutral French proved troublesome and dangerous neighbors. In the course of the boundary disputes they assisted and encouraged the hostile Indians, who were a source of great annoyance and uneasiness to the British. It was resolved, therefore, to remove the entire population and disperse them through the other colonies. This resolution was rigorously carried out; the greater part of the Acadians, about 7,000 in number, being hurried on board ship, their property destroyed or confiscated, and themselves scattered over the continent. Some of the exiles returned to Nova Scotia after the peace of 1763.

In 1758, a constitution was granted to Nova Scotia. From the year 1719, the administration of public affairs had been vested in a governor and council. On the 2nd of October, 1758, the first Parliament assembled at Halifax. The House of Assembly comprised 22 members elected by the people, and the combined Executive and Legislative Council, of twelve members, appointed by the Crown.

The capture of the important post of Louisbourg was one of the objects most ardently desired at the commencement of the war. An attempt to take it was made without success in 1756. In 1758, however, the stronghold was forced to surrender to a powerful expedition under Generals Wolfe and Amherst, and Admiral Boscawen. The fortifications were destroyed, and the inhabitants sent to France. Isle St. Jean also passed from French hands, and was annexed to the government of Nova Scotia.

The Treaty of 1763 restored peace, and the colony now made rapid progress. The island of Cape Breton was at this time annexed to Nova Scotia, and in 1765, was formed into a county. In 1770, St. John's Island, (Prince Edward Island) was separated from the government of Nova Scotia, and became a separate colony.

At the close of the American Revolutionary war, the population of Nova Scotia was greatly augmented by the influx of about twenty thousand loyalists from the revolted colonies, who settled in Nova Scotia and Cape Breton.

In 1784, all the part of Nova Scotia north of the Bay of Fundy was separated from the rest of the Province, and constituted a separate colony, called New Brunswick. The same year a separate government was given to Cape Breton, with Sydney as the chief town.

FROM THE SEPARATION FROM NEW BRUNSWICK TO CONFEDERATION.

The events of this period are of a pacific character, and relate to internal development and improvement. The great Pictou road was opened in 1792; the militia organized in 1806. The next important event was the re-union of Cape Breton with Nova Scotia in 1820, when it was allowed to

send two members to the Legislature. In 1823, Roman Catholics were freed from all disabilities, and placed on the same footing as members of other denominations. In 1828, the combined Executive and Legislative Council was dissolved, and separate Councils substituted. In 1843, Responsible Government was fully introduced.

In 1861, the Legislature of Nova Scotia unanimously adopted a resolution favorable to Inter-colonial Union. The resolution reads as follows:

Whereas, The subject of a Union of the North American Provinces, or of the Maritime Provinces, from time to time has been mooted and discussed in all the colonies;

And Whereas, While many advantages may be secured by such an union, either of all these Provinces or a portion of them, many and serious obstacles are presented which can only be overcome by mutual consultation of the leading men of the colonies, and by free communication with the Imperial government.

Therefore Resolved, That His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor be respectfully requested to put himself in communication with His Grace the Colonial Secretary and His Excellency the Governor General of the N. A. colonies, in order to ascertain the policy of Her Majesty's government, and the opinions of the other colonies, with a view to the enlightened consideration of a question involving the highest interest, and upon which the public mind in all the Provinces ought to be set at rest.

This led to a conference at Charlottetown to consider the advantage of an union of the Maritime colonies. But Canada having proposed a more extensive scheme, the conference was adjourned to Quebec. Delegates from Nova Scotia took part. But after the Quebec conference, a strong opposition was made to the scheme proposed. In 1866, however, the House of Assembly, by a vote of 31 to 19 authorized the Lieutenant Governor to appoint delegates to arrange with the Imperial Government a scheme of union. Delegates were appointed, who, together with the delegates from Canada and New Brunswick, met in London in December, 1866. The Bill for the Confederation of the Provinces was introduced into the Imperial Legislature, and received the Royal assent on the 28th of March following. The minority continued to oppose the scheme, but the anti-confederate party is diminishing, and it may be hoped that all discontent will have vanished in the course of a few years.

DESCRIPTION OF NOVA SCOTIA.

The Province, including Cape Breton, is about 350 miles in length, and 100 in breadth. The country is beautifully variegated by ranges of lofty hills and broad valleys, both of which run longitudinally through the Province. Its Atlantic frontier, for twenty miles inland, is composed of a poor soil, though rich in gold and other valuable minerals. The Cobequid range of mountains, as it is called, runs through the interior of the Province. The summits of a few of the conical mounts of this range ascend 1100 feet, and the land may be cultivated nearly to the top. On each side of these mountains is an extensive range of rich arable lands, where agricultural operations are carried on extensively, and with profit.

The Province is 900 miles in circumference; and, with the exception of fifteen miles, where it joins New Brunswick, it faces the Atlantic, Bay of Fundy, Straits of Northumberland, and Gulf of St. Lawrence. Deep and spacious harbors indent its seaboard; and the interior is pierced in all directions by navigable rivers, the country being thus admirably adapted for commercial enterprise.

SKETCH OF THE HISTORY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

The leading events in the history of New Brunswick up to the year 1784 will be found under the head of Nova Scotia, and need not be repeated here.

The first colonists were the settlers brought out by de Mouts in 1604. In 1639 French settlements were made on the Bay of Chaleurs. This bay was so named by Jacques Cartier from the intense heat of the weather on the 9th July, 1534, when he entered the Bay in the course of his memorable voyage to the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

In 1672, the French established settlements on the river Miramichi, and at other places on the eastern coast. After the cession of the country to Britain in 1713, part of what is now New Brunswick, was claimed by the French as belonging to Canada, and the disputes arising from these conflicting pretensions led to collisions between the settlers. The

colonists also suffered much from the Indians, who remained unfriendly to the English for many years. Finally, in 1761, the Indians consented to a peace, and the hatchet was buried.

The northern counties remained uninhabited till the middle of the eighteenth century. In the summer of 1764, the first British settler, Mr. Wm. Davidson, a gentleman from the north of Scotland, arrived in the county of Northumberland. At this time not a single house was erected, nor a single European resident within the limits of the county. The Micmac Indians were still the virtual lords of the soil.

In 1784 the present limits of New Brunswick were divided from Nova Scotia and erected into a separate Province by a special constitutional charter, the administration of the government being confided to Col. Carleton. In the autumn of 1785 the first general election of representatives took place; and in January 1786 the first Legislative Assembly was held at St. John. Two years after the governor's appointment the city of Fredericton was selected by him as the seat of government, and has since remained the metropolis. The place at that time was composed of a few irregularly built huts; and St. John, now an opulent and flourishing city, was not of much greater extent.

At the time of the separation from Nova Scotia the entire population was only 11,457.

In 1790, Davidson, the pioneer, died. A brisk trade was carried on about this time by Fraser & Thom in the exportation of fish, furs, peltries, and sawed lumber. When the United States had gained their independence, a considerable number of the exiled loyalists, about five thousand persons, emigrated to New Brunswick, where they were supplied with land, provisions, tools and clothing, by the British government. These "United Empire" loyalists may be looked upon as the founders of New Brunswick, and their descendants now form a considerable part of the population. It was about this time (1783) that the first newspaper was published in the Province.

The colony has steadily increased in wealth and importance during the present century. The timber trade was greatly stimulated by an act of the British Parliament in 1809 admitting colonial timber into England free of duty, while timber coming from the Baltic was taxed. The trade became a profitable branch of industry, and ship building was commenced. A tide of emigration flowed in, and rapidly augmented the population. St. John, St. Andrews and Miramichi were annually resorted to by a large number of trading vessels.

In 1803, Gov. Carleton was removed to England, after having governed the Province for nearly twenty years, during which period it had grown from a wilderness to an important colony.

After the departure of Carleton, the government was administered up to the year 1817, by presidents. At the close of the war in 1815, a considerable number of disbanded soldiers settled in New Brunswick. In 1824, the population had increased to 74,176.

The state of the Province in 1825 is thus described by Cooney: "Our trade was looking up; and brightening were our prospects. The bosom of our river sustained a large fleet loaded with the productions of many climes; its sloping banks enamelled with the beauties of expanding vegetation, and the edge of each flowery belt was fringed by the luxuriant foliage of the surrounding forest. Our wharfs and warehouses groaned under the weight of the wealth they contained; the market was well stocked with its staple commodity; ships clustered on our seaboard;

commerce flourished in our towns; and plenty filled our hamlets."

But this year a remarkable conflagration occurred, which caused the loss of many lives, and the destruction of much property. The summer had been unusually warm and dry, and extensive fires had raged in different parts of the country. Throughout the northern part of New Brunswick hardly any rain had fallen, and from the 1st to the 5th October, the heat was extraordinary. The fire, which had been creeping through the forests, approached some of the settlements, and the heat became more intense. About 9 o'clock in the night of the 7th October, the fire burst through the forest in the rear of Newcastle, and that town, together with Douglastown, and the northern side of the Miramichi, for a hundred miles, were enveloped in smoke and flame. The wooden houses, the stores containing spirits, powder, and other combustible articles, the stables and barns of the towns and settlements, speedily became a prey to the devouring fire, and presented a terrible scene of confusion and devastation. Newcastle, a flourishing town of 1000 inhabitants, was left a heap of smoking ruins, and hundreds of miles of country were laid waste. The area swept by the flames was about 6,000 square miles. In this conflagration 100 persons were burned, or drowned in the river, 595 buildings and 875 head of cattle were destroyed. The loss of property was estimated at £204,323, of which only £12,050 were covered by insurance. The Legislature of Lower Canada voted £2,500 for the relief of the sufferers, and contributions to the extent of £35,383 were received from Great Britain, the United States, and the neighboring colonies. The burnt towns and villages were soon rebuilt in a style of greater solidity and beauty. In 1837, another extensive fire occurred in the city of St. John, when property to the value of one million dollars, (including 115 houses) was destroyed.

The provincial revenues were this year surrendered to the local government on condition of paying the salaries of certain officials amounting to \$58,000 per annum.

The treaty between Great Britain and the United States, negotiated by Lord Ashburton in 1842, settled the disputed boundary between Maine and New Brunswick.

In 1845 commissioners were appointed by the British Government, to explore and survey a railway route from Halifax to Quebec, across the Province of New Brunswick. The commissioners in their report speak enthusiastically of the climate, soil and capabilities of the country.

In 1848 Responsible Government was introduced.

The colony has since continued to advance rapidly in wealth and importance. Trade was for a time greatly benefited by the Reciprocity Treaty between British America and the United States.

New Brunswick joined in the conference at Quebec on the subject of Confederation, but a ministry opposed to the scheme came into power shortly afterward. In 1866, however, the ministry resigned, and a new government, favorable to Confederation, was formed. A general election followed, and the friends of union were victorious at the polls. New Brunswick consequently became a member of the Federation.

DESCRIPTION OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

This Province is situated between 45° and 48° 7' N. lat.; and between 63° 50' and 69° W. long. Its length, from Nova Scotia, on the southeast, to the Province of Quebec on the northwest, is 190 miles; breadth, from the State of Maine, on the southwest, to the Straits of Northumberland on the northeast, 140 miles. It is situated nearly in the centre of the north temperate zone. The area of the Province is 27,710 square miles or 17,600,000 acres. The surface of the country is generally flat or undulating. There are some hills skirting the Bay of Fundy and the Rivers St. John and Restigouche, but they nowhere assume mountain summits. New Brunswick has an external water-line of 410 miles, exclusive of indentations. This coast line is indented by deep and spacious bays and harbors; and the face of the Province is traversed in all directions by navigable rivers. The Bay of Fundy, with its affluents, Chignecto and Cumberland bays, is 140 miles in length, by 45, its greatest breadth; and the Bay of Chaleurs, in the northwest, is 8 miles long by 20 broad. The principal rivers are the St. Croix, 60 miles in length; St. John, 450; Pettaudiac, 100; Richibucto, 40; Miramichi, 200; Nipisignit, 90; and the Restigouche, 200 miles long. There are numerous lakes, varying in size from mere ponds to lakes containing 80 square miles. Of the area of the Province, about 14,000,000 acres are fit for profitable cultivation. These lands are accessible from all sides of the country. Of the granted lands, about 60,000 acres consist of rich alluvial lands, called marsh; some of which are said to have been producing large crops of excellent hay for upwards of one hundred years.

The tides of the Bay of Fundy rise from 20 feet at the city of St. John, to 60 feet at the head of Chignecto Bay, while the tides of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, separated but twelve miles from those of the Bay of Fundy, rise only from four to seven feet.

Roads and settlements are nearly continuous around the province, and cross it in numerous places. The River St. John in its downward course traverses the counties of Victoria, Carleton, York, Sunbury, Queen's, King's, and St. John. The counties of Westmoreland, Kent, Northumberland, Gloucester, and Restigouche, lie on the Straits of Northumberland, Gulf of St. Lawrence, and Bay of Chaleurs. Charlotte, St. John and Albert lie on the Bay of Fundy.

SKETCH OF THE HISTORY OF NEWFOUNDLAND.

The Island of Newfoundland, the oldest of the B. N. A. colonies, was discovered in 1497, by Sir John Cabot and his son Sebastian, in a voyage made that year under the patronage of Henry VII. of England. Sebastian Cabot also touched at

Newfoundland the following year, when he explored the coast from Hudson Bay to Florida.

Cabot's discovery is well authenticated, and the island was thereafter claimed by Britain. But it is not improbable that long before this date, the coast of the island had been fallen in with by voyagers animated by the love of adventure, or carried out of their usual course by stress of weather. One account has come down to us of a voyage undertaken in the tenth century by Biarne, son of Heriulf Bardson, a follower of Eric the Red. Heriulf is said to have emigrated from Iceland to Greenland, and formed a settlement there. At this time his son Biarne was absent on a voyage to Norway. On his return home, Biarne resolved to join his father in Greenland. The account of his voyage is given in the London Geographical Journal for 1833. It would appear that Biarne, who was imperfectly acquainted with the course, while seeking for Greenland, toward the end of his voyage, fell in with various unknown lands, supposed to be Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, &c. Ten years afterward Biarne, while on a visit to Eric, Earl of Norway, mentioned the fact of his having seen these unknown lands. Curiosity was excited, and Leif, a son of Eric, having equipped a small vessel, sailed on a voyage of exploration in the year 1000. He also observed the lands described by Biarne, and pushed on southward as far, it is supposed, as the coast of Massachusetts, to which he gave the name of Vinland. In 1002 a brother of Leif, named Thorwald, undertook a voyage to the unknown west, arrived safely at Vinland, and remained in the country two whole years. But while coasting along with the intention of returning home, Thorwald lost his life in an encounter with some Esquimaux.

These early discoveries are apparently entitled to credit, but not being followed up by the establishment of settlements were soon forgotten, and are now of little interest except to the antiquary.

When Cabot visited the island, the natives called the codfish which abounds there, bacalléos, which is also the name of the cod in the Basque or Breton idiom. Hence it has been conjectured that Breton fishermen may have resorted to the banks of Newfoundland previous to Cabot's discovery.

Three years after Cabot's voyage, the coast of Newfoundland was visited by a Portuguese explorer named Cortereal, whose report respecting the abundance of fish to be found there induced his countrymen to establish fisheries. The French, English, and Spaniards followed the example of the Portuguese, and in 1517 there were fifty vessels engaged in the fishery.

In 1524 Verazzani, a Florentine navigator in the service of the French king, touched at Newfoundland, and surveyed a large part of the coast of the United States. Verazzani and his entire expedition perished during a subsequent voyage undertaken soon afterward, and his sad fate for some years damped the ardor of the French for exploration in the new world.

In 1534 Jacques Cartier passed the coast of Newfoundland on his memorable voyage to the Gulf of the St. Lawrence. At this time the fisheries were growing in importance. In 1549, the ports of London, Barnstaple, Bideford and Bristol were prosecuting an extensive trade. In 1578 there were nearly 400 vessels engaged in the enterprise, of which 150 were French.

In the reign of Queen Elizabeth Sir Humphrey Gilbert is said to have equipped a small squadron with which he sailed from England in 1573, but the loss of one of his ships

and other disasters obliged him to return home. With the assistance of his step-brother, Sir Walter Raleigh, he soon fitted out another expedition with which he sailed for Newfoundland in 1583. On arriving at the harbour of St. John's in the month of August, Gilbert took formal possession of the country in the Queen's name, and issued some laws for regulating the fisheries. On the return voyage, Sir Humphrey's ship, a vessel of only ten tons, foundered in a storm near the Azores, and the gallant commander perished.

Among the subsequent attempts to colonize the island may be noticed that of a company of English gentlemen, including Lord Bacon and others, to whom James I, in 1610, by letters patent, gave all that part of the coast between Capes Donavista and St. Mary. This association appointed as their agent a Bristol merchant, named Guy, who established a colony at Musquito Cove in Conception Bay.

In 1615 Captain Whitbourne was sent out by the Admiralty to take steps for the removal of the great abuses which prevailed at the fisheries. Whitbourne introduced some of the English forms of administration of justice, and endeavoured to establish order in the settlements.

In 1622 James I, by letters patent, granted to Sir George Calvert, secretary of state, the peninsula formed by the Bays of Placentia and Trinity. Sir George (afterward Lord Baltimore) called this peninsula Avalon, and sent out as governor Capt. Wynn, who erected a large dwelling house and granary. Sir George himself subsequently visited the island, and resided there a short time.

In 1623 the fisheries had increased to such an extent that 150 vessels resorted to them from Devonshire alone. In 1633 another settlement was formed by Lord Falkland. About this time a code of regulations was promulgated by Charles I with a view to preserve order and punish crime. The following year, the French, rather than relinquish the privilege of fishing on the coast, agreed to pay the British government a tribute of five per cent. on all fish caught by their fishermen.

Another settlement was established in 1654 by Sir David Kertk. "At this time," says Page, in his history of Newfoundland, "fifteen different settlements existed, containing about four hundred families." The jealousy of the merchants engaged in the fishery trade impeded the extension of permanent settlements. About 1670, an attempt was even made to break up the existing settlements.

In 1692 commenced a struggle between England and France for exclusive possession of the fisheries. Placentia, the principal French post on the island, was attacked and partially destroyed by a squadron of five ships under Admiral Williams. The French now resolved to become sole masters of the island. In 1696, a French fleet from Placentia, under Brouillon, aided by a military force under D'Iberville, attacked and destroyed the town of St. John's, and captured all the British settlements, with the exception of Bonavista and Carbonear, which were successfully defended. The Treaty of Ryswick in 1697, restored the rights of the respective powers as they existed at the commencement of the war.

In 1702 hostilities were again resumed. Sir John Leake, who was sent out with a squadron by Queen Anne, captured a number of French vessels; but the French obtaining reinforcements from Canada, succeeded in destroying most of the British establishments on the island. Carbonear was almost the only post that could be defended with success. The English retaliated by taking Port Royal, and making themselves masters of Acadia. For eight years the conflict

was continued with fluctuating fortune. At length, by the Treaty of Utrecht, in 1713, it was provided that Newfoundland should be ceded to Britain, the French having the right reserved to them of catching and drying fish on that part of the coast lying to the north of Cape Bonavista, and stretching along the western shore as far as Point Riche, but having no right to erect fortifications, or to remain longer on the island than the process of curing the fish required.

In 1728 Newfoundland was erected into a distinct Province, and Capt. Henry Osborne appointed the first Governor. The office of Governor has since been filled almost invariably by British naval officers. The island was divided into districts; Sarrogate courts were established, and various improvements in the administration of justice introduced. In 1737, a Court of Oyer and Terminer was established, consequent upon the increase of crime, and the expense of sending offenders to England for trial. In 1741, a Vice-admiralty Court was established. In 1761, the island again suffered from the attacks of the French. The following year, St. John's was surprised and captured by a French fleet. Aid was solicited from Lord Colville, then at Halifax. Admiral Colville promptly sailed for St. John's and having effected a landing at Torbay, speedily compelled the French to surrender the town. The French fleet escaped from the harbour under cover of a fog.

The Treaty of Paris, in 1763, restored peace, and confirmed the title of England to the island. The French simply retained the privilege granted them by the Treaty of Utrecht, of fishing along part of the seaboard.

About this time, Capt. James Cook, the celebrated navigator, was employed by the English government in making surveys of the coast. In 1763, the coast of Labrador was annexed to Newfoundland. The population of the Province at this time is stated to have been about thirteen thousand, of whom not more than half were permanent residents.

During the American Revolutionary war, Newfoundland suffered greatly from the non-intercourse Act passed by the first Congress, prohibiting the exportation of food to the island because the inhabitants remained faithful to the mother country. The people of Newfoundland had been dependent on New England for supplies to the extent of nearly £350,000 annually. These supplies were suddenly cut off, and French and American privateers at the same time preyed on the coast and harbours. When peace was restored in 1783, the Americans retained the right of fishing, but the processes of curing and drying the fish were to be carried on in the unsettled creeks and harbors of Nova Scotia, the Magdalen Islands, and Labrador.

The year 1775 is noted for a terrible storm. The sea suddenly rose twenty feet; hundreds of vessels were driven ashore and totally wrecked; and at least three hundred persons perished.

A Court of Common Pleas was established in 1789, and also the "Supreme Court of Newfoundland," Mr. Reeves, Chief Justice.

In 1796 England and France being at war, Newfoundland was once more harassed by attacks of French vessels. The town of Bay of Bulls was captured and destroyed; but the enemy declined to attack St. John's, which had been made ready for vigorous resistance by the governor, Sir James Wallace.

In 1803 schools were introduced in several localities, and benevolent societies organized for the relief of the poor. In 1807 was established the first newspaper, called *The Royal*

Gazette and Newfoundland Advertiser, John Ryan, proprietor. This journal has retained its original name and changed hands but once. In 1808, the first volunteer militia were enrolled at St. John's. The coast of Labrador was again included in the government of Newfoundland.

The island suffered during the war of 1812-1814 from high prices and scarcity of provisions. Flour sold at £6 to £7 per barrel; pork £8 to £10 per barrel, and other provisions at proportionate rates. The severity of these prices was, however, compensated by the increase in the value of articles exported. As soon, however, as peace was proclaimed, there commenced a season of great commercial depression. The value of fish fell suddenly from forty shillings to ten shillings per quintal, and the same with other exports.

Two years afterward, a destructive fire occurred at St. John's, causing a loss of \$500,000. In the month of November, 1817, two other extensive fires occurred at St. John's, destroying two hundred houses, together with a large quantity of provisions imported for the winter supply. The destitution caused by these conflagrations was relieved by contributions from England and other quarters. One munificent donation came from the citizens of Boston, who despatched a ship laden with provisions for the relief of the sufferers.

At this time (1817) the population was 80,000. The produce of the country was estimated at £2,000,000 stg., and eight hundred vessels were employed in trade and the fisheries. More than three centuries had thus elapsed without any rapid progress, and without any attempt to open up the island for settlement. In fact, England discouraged colonization during the early period of its history. "That the inhabitants of Newfoundland colonized the country in defiance of the policy of the British Government is in some degree true," says Earl Granville, in a despatch dated 16th May, 1870. In 1826, however, an effort to improve the condition of the Province was made by the new Governor, Sir Thomas Cochrane, and with very marked success. Improvements were made in the judicial system; public roads were constructed; grants of land taken up, and cultivation extended. The population increased to 98,000 before 1845.

In 1832 a representative Assembly was granted to the colony, comprising fifteen members. The Legislative Council consisted of nine members.

The first geological survey of the island was undertaken in 1838 under the direction of J. B. Jukes. Since then copper, lead, and other ores have been found on different parts of the coast. The restrictions on grants of land which were imposed for the prevention of encroachment on French rights in the fisheries, have recently been so relaxed as to encourage, as far as practicable, the development of the mineral and other resources of the island.

In 1843, the House of Assembly was incorporated with the Council, and called the "Amalgamated Assembly of Newfoundland." It numbered twenty-five members.

The year 1846 was marked by two great disasters. In June the town of St. John's was almost wholly destroyed by fire. In September following, a furious hurricane swept over the island; many lives were lost, and a vast amount of property destroyed. Great distress prevailed for a time, and contributions, urgently needed, were again obtained from the mother country and the colonies.

In 1847 the amalgamated form of government was set aside, and the two Houses met separately. In 1854 the electoral districts were re-arranged, and the number of the Assembly increased; the Executive and Legislative Councils

were separated, and Responsible Government fully established. The House of Assembly consisted of thirty members.

In 1852 and following years, steam and telegraphic communication between Conception Bay and St. John's was established, mechanics' institutes were founded, the town of St. John's was supplied with water, and other improvements were carried out.

In 1858 an ocean telegraph from Europe, having its terminals in Newfoundland, was laid and opened, but it ceased to operate after a few messages had been transmitted. Since that time, however, another cable has been successfully laid, and continues in operation.

When the scheme for confederating the Provinces was brought forward in 1864, Newfoundland sent two deputies, Hon. Messrs Carter and Shea, to the Conference which met at Quebec in October; but the Legislature subsequently deferred action in the matter. It is, expected, however, that the island will soon take steps to enter the Confederation.

THE INDIANS OF NEWFOUNDLAND.

The aboriginal inhabitants seem to have fared worse in Newfoundland than their countrymen elsewhere. When Europeans first visited the island, they found on the coast a considerable number of natives belonging to a tribe known as Red Indians, from the fact of their bodies being smeared with a species of red ochre. The intercourse with these Indians was friendly at first, but quarrels soon arose, and led to the almost utter extermination of the natives. "The settlers," writes Page, "generally men of fierce tempers and armed with powerful weapons, carried on the contest in a manner peculiarly ruthless, hunting and shooting the natives like deer. The latter have gradually disappeared from the island, and for many years not one has been seen." Several attempts were subsequently made to open up friendly intercourse with the Red Indians, but without success. In 1810, one of the first acts of governor Duckworth was to issue a proclamation for the protection of the Red Indians, and to offer a reward of £100 stg. to any person who should bring about a friendly understanding with them. In 1827, a search for them was prosecuted under the auspices of the Bœothic Society. Abundant traces of their settlements were found, but all the huts and wigwams were deserted. Another tribe, the Micmacs, have continued to occupy different parts of the interior, and have become partially civilized.

DESCRIPTION OF NEWFOUNDLAND.

The island of Newfoundland is situated on the north east side of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, between 43° 37' and 51° 09' N. latitude, and 52° 41', and 59° 31', W. long. It is bounded on the north by the strait of Belle Isle, which is from ten to twenty miles wide. On the east and south it is surrounded by the Atlantic. The island is exceedingly irregular in form, being indented with deep bays, the principal of which are Trinity and White Bays on the eastern, and Placentia and Fortune Bays on the southern coast. The peninsula of Avalon, on which the greater part of the population is resident, is almost severed from the rest of the island by Trinity and Placentia Bays, there being an isthmus only some four miles in width between the heads of these bays. The greatest length of the island from north to south is 350 miles, and the average breadth about 130 miles. Estimated area about 40,200 square miles, equal to 25,728,000 acres.

The coast is for the most part steep and rugged; the sea cliffs are bold and lofty, with deep water at the base. The harbors on the east coast are easy of access.

The geological survey shows the aqueous or stratified rocks to consist of the following formations, which are arranged in descending order: Upper and lower coal formation, magnesium limestone, upper and lower slate formation gneiss and mica slate. There are also chlorite, quartz rock, primary limestone, granite, syenite, porphyry, trap, basalt, serpentine, hypersthene, and greenstone. An extensive lead mine exists at La Manche, Placentia Bay, and has been worked for several years with profit; veins of copper of great value have also been discovered and are being successfully worked.

In the interior the surface of the island is uneven and hilly. Some of the peaks rise to a height of 1000 feet and upwards. The lakes are numerous. The trees consist of fir, spruce, birch, pine, juniper, wych-hazel, mountain ash, alder, and aspen.

SKETCH OF THE HISTORY OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

This small but flourishing colony received its present name in 1798, in honor of Prince Edward, Duke of Kent, father of Queen Victoria. Its ancient name was Isle St. Jean, or St.

John's Island. It was discovered by John and Sebastian Cabot in 1497. The Indians that resorted to the island at that date were of the Abenaki and Micmac tribes. For two centuries after its discovery the island was covered with dense forests to the water's edge, and remained unoccupied save by Indians, being considered of too little importance to justify the establishment of a permanent settlement. It was included with Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Cape Breton, under the general name Acadie. Fortunately it escaped many of the disasters and conflicts that harassed other parts of Acadie and Canada, and there are few stirring or momentous events in its history to chronicle.

In 1663 a French naval captain named Doublet, received from the government of Canada a grant of this island, together with the Magdalen Islands, for the purpose of establishing a fishery. At this time stages and huts were erected near the best fishing grounds, but no permanent settlement was formed. The persons employed by Doublet came in the spring and left in the fall, abandoning the island during the winter to its original inhabitants.

In the beginning of the eighteenth century a few solitary families, attracted by reports of the beautiful scenery and fertile soil of the island, began to settle on some of the most accessible parts of the southern coast. After Acadie had been ceded to Britain by the Treaty of Utrecht in 1713, many of the younger Acadians left their fathers' homes in Nova Scotia, and commenced to form the first permanent settlements in Isle St. Jean, which was still retained by France. The number of settlers slowly increased from year to year as the fertility of the island became better known. In 1728, about thirteen years after the settlements began, there were only sixty families on the island. In 1745, there were about 150 families, numbering 800 souls.

It has been supposed that Isle St. Jean fell into the hands of the New Englanders in 1754, after they had captured Louisbourg. Whether this was the case does not clearly appear; but if so, the island was restored to the French by the Treaty of Aix-La-Chapelle in 1748. "At this time," says Sutherland, (Civil History of Prince Edward Island) "the island was intrusted to the control of two leading officers, the one civil and the other military. The military officer was subordinate to the Governor of Louisbourg; his colleague was a sub-delegate of the intendant of Canada. They had a garrison of about sixty men, with some few pieces of cannon. A small battery was constructed by them at the mouth of the harbor of Charlottetown, on the west side, where they resided, and a small redoubt at a narrow part of the East River, still called the French fort, intended to guard the access by water towards St. Peter's and Tracadie."

In 1752, the population was estimated by a French officer who visited the settlement that year, at 1354, but this number was doubled in the course of a few years by the influx of expatriated Acadians.

In 1758, when Louisbourg was compelled to surrender to British forces, one of the articles of capitulation provided for the surrender of Isle St. Jean. Gen. Amherst immediately despatched Lieut. Col. Rollo to take possession, and thus the island passed out of the hands of the French. By the Treaty of 1763, Isle St. Jean, together with Canada and Cape Breton, was formally ceded to Great Britain. It was then placed under the government of Nova Scotia. At this time the inhabitants numbered 4,100, but many of the French inhabitants left the island when it came under English rule.

In 1764 and the following years, the island was sur-

veyed by Captain Holland by order of the British Government. Having been divided into townships of about 20,000 acres each, these townships were, in August, 1767, distributed by lot amongst about one hundred army and navy officers and others who had claims on government, upon certain conditions of settlement, and the payment of certain quit rents. Lot 68, about 6,000 acres, was reserved as demesne lands for the king.

A town lot and royalty, says Sutherland, were reserved in each county. Each township was to furnish a glebe lot of 100 acres for a minister, and a lot of 30 acres for a school master. For the prosecution of a free fishery, 500 feet from the shore were reserved on all the townships which abut on the coast.

There were three rates of quit rents, six, four, and two shillings, annually, per hundred acres. No quit rents were to be demanded for the first five years after the grant; after that, for the next five years, half the amount of the quit rents would be demanded; after ten years, the whole amount.

The grantees were to settle on each lot one person for every 200 acres, within ten years from the date of the grant. If one-third of the land, in that proportion, was not settled in four years from the date of the grant, the land was to be forfeited to the king. The settlers were to be Protestants, from the parts of Europe not belonging to Great Britain, or such persons as had resided in the American colonies at least two years before the grant was given.

It was found difficult, however, to obtain foreign Protestant settlers, and very few of the grantees attempted to fulfil the conditions on which the lands had been allotted to them.

In 1768, the inhabitants of Prince Edward Island petitioned for a separate government, and offered to pay half their quit rents the next year to meet the expenses. The request was complied with, and in 1770 Walter Patterson, to whom part of lot 19 had fallen, came out as the first Governor. At this time only five proprietors, and not more than 150 families, were resident on the island. Many of the grantees, finding the quit rents too burdensome, sold their lands, and the original conditions of the grants were almost totally disregarded. Instead of having one person for every 200 acres within ten years from the date of the grant, no attempt had been made to settle 48 out of the 67 townships when the ten years had elapsed.

The first House of Assembly, consisting of eighteen members elected for seven years, met in July, 1773. The House took up the land question which has agitated the colony for nearly a century, and passed a measure for the effectual recovery of quit rents, but the act was not carried out. The next year a new Assembly was convened, which sat till 1779.

During the American revolutionary war, Charlottetown was plundered by two American vessels, but the prisoners and plunder were given up by order of Gen. Washington.

In 1780, Gov. Patterson, who had been in England for several years, returned to the island, and instituted proceedings in the Supreme Court for the recovery of arrears of quit rents. Nine whole and five half townships were brought to sale in 1781. The proprietors, who were all, or

nearly all, non-residents, complained to the English Government, and a Bill was sent out, making these sales voidable. Gov. Patterson availed himself of some errors in the preamble as a pretext for not laying the Bill before the Legislature, and he exerted himself to prevent the validity of the sales from being disturbed. The House was dissolved in 1784, and the new Assembly, which met the same year, not supporting the views of the Governor, was also dissolved. Another House, called together in 1785, approved of the Governor's proceedings, and next year a bill was introduced to ratify the sales of 1781. This was disallowed by the Crown. Gov. Patterson was recalled by the Home authorities in 1787; but eventually, after a protracted contest, the sales of 1781 were allowed to stand.

In 1794, two provincial companies of militia, three companies of horse, and one of light infantry, were raised for the protection of the island.

An investigation made in 1797, by the House of Assembly, to ascertain the proportion of settled and unsettled lands in the colony, showed that twenty-three lots, embracing 458,580 acres, had not one settler; that twelve lots, containing 120,000 acres, had only forty-eight families; and that the whole population of the island was only 4,500. The inhabitants represented the state of affairs to the Home Government, and prayed that those proprietors who had failed to carry out the terms of the grants should be compelled to fulfil their obligations. No action was taken on the petition at the time, but the British Parliament made an annual grant to defray the expenses of the Local Government.

In the last years of the century, Prince Edward, the father of the Queen, being Commander-in-Chief of the Forces in B.N.A., caused fortifications to be erected for the protection of Charlottetown. In 1798, the House of Assembly, as a mark of respect to the Prince, gave the Province the name of Prince Edward Island, the change to take effect in 1800.

At the beginning of the 19th century, the House of Assembly again pressed upon the attention of the Home Government the matters contained in their petition of 1797. The arrears of quit rents now amounted to the enormous sum of nearly £60,000 stg. The amount due by many of the grantees was greater than the lands would realize if brought to sale. The matter was attentively considered, and in 1802 liberal terms of settlement were offered to proprietors in arrear. The lots were divided into five classes. The first class, or those which had the full number of settlers, were to pay only four years' quit rent for all arrears to 1801. The second class, or those which had only half the stipulated number, were to pay five years' arrears. Third, those which had less than one-half and more than one-fourth, were to pay nine years' arrears. Fourth, those which had less than one-fourth were to pay twelve years' arrears; and, lastly, the proprietors of townships wholly unoccupied were required to pay fifteen years' arrears. This settlement greatly facilitated the sale of land in the colony. Many of the proprietors were now able to dispose of their property, and in the course of a few years nearly one-third of the lots changed hands. Active steps were taken by the new land owners to encourage immigration. In 1803, the Earl of Selkirk brought out nearly eight hundred persons from the Highlands of Scotland.

In 1805, Gov. Fanning, who had been in office for nineteen years, was succeeded by Col. Desbarres, a military officer of fair abilities, who had been present at the taking of Quebec in 1759. Up to this time the progress of the colony had been very slow, and the war which a few years later broke out between Britain and the United States again retarded for

a time the influx of settlers. In 1813, a brother of Sir Sidney Smith came out as Governor. Mr. Smith called the Assembly together on the 15th of November, but about two months afterward, thinking the session had lasted long enough for all they had to do, he arbitrarily dismissed the House, and for nearly four years did not summon another Assembly. The differences between the Governor and the new houses successively elected continued, till finally, in 1820, the Assembly framed an address expressing dissatisfaction with the Governor's conduct. This address was forwarded to England through the Earl of Dalhousie, then Governor General. The agitation in the colony increased. In 1823, John Stewart, one of the most influential men in the island, was deputed to take home a petition. The Governor endeavoured to arrest him, but Stewart made good his escape, and reached England in December. The Governor was recalled the following spring (1824).

The new Governor, Colonel Ready, was fortunate enough to secure the confidence of the inhabitants. A new House of Assembly was summoned in 1825, and a large amount of general business transacted.

In 1827, a regular census was taken, and this showed that the population of the colony had increased to 23,266. The population of Charlottetown was 1642. Public improvements were pushed forward, roads widened, bridges constructed, and agriculture encouraged.

In 1830, an act was passed freeing Roman Catholics from all civil and political disabilities.

The quit rents now began to cause fresh agitation. By a proclamation issued in August, 1828, the governor announced that he had received orders to enforce the arrears of quit rents from 1st January, 1823. The arrears now amounted to £10,000 stg. The House of Assembly, and the inhabitants generally, petitioned the King to relinquish the arrears, and grant the accruing quit rents to be applied to internal improvements. The answer to these representations was that His Majesty would accept the annual sum of £1000 stg. in lieu of the accruing rents, and that this sum would be appropriated to meet the expenses of the civil establishment of the colony. The House did not accept this liberal proposal, and the matter rested there for the time.

A considerable number of emigrants now came out every year from various parts of England, Scotland and Ireland, and when the census was again taken, in 1833, the population numbered 32,292, an increase of nearly 40 per cent. in six years.

In 1834, an agitation commenced in favor of Responsible Government. The House of Assembly voted an address for an Executive Council distinct from the Legislative. An effort was also made to have an elective Legislative Council. The separation of the Executive and Legislative Councils was effected in 1839. The Executive Council was not to exceed nine in number. The Legislative Council was to be composed of twelve members. The revenue of this year exceeded that of the previous year by £5,000. The years that followed were marked by satisfactory progress. A geological exploration of the island was made by Dr. Abraham Gessner in 1840. Public opinion in favor of Responsible Government was now gaining strength. In 1847, the House passed an address to the Queen praying for the introduction of Responsible Government, and the Governor expressed himself strongly in favour of it.

In 1848, an act received the Royal assent, which provided for a further assessment of land, if the Queen relinquished the quit rents during its continuance. The census was again taken this year, and the population was found to

have increased to 62,634. The following spring the House again petitioned the Queen in favor of admitting Responsible Government, to the extent of giving the country four seats in the Executive Council. The Home authorities did not consider the colony in a proper condition for Responsible Government; but offered to surrender the quit rents, the revenue from Crown lands and general revenue, on condition that the colony paid for the civil establishment. A general election took place in February, 1850; the Legislature met on the 5th of March, and a large majority was in favor of Responsible Government. Governor Campbell offered the majority three seats in the Executive Council. They declined to accept them; refused to co-operate with the Executive Council as then constituted, and refused also to grant the supplies. An address to the Queen was prepared and the House was prorogued on the 26th of March. In October following, the governor, Sir Donald Campbell, whose administration had been highly popular, died, and Sir Alexander Bannerman was sent out to assume the government.

The Legislature having been convened on the 25th of March, 1851, the governor informed the Assembly that he had been empowered to introduce Responsible Government on condition that some compensation be allowed to certain retiring officers. This condition was complied with, and the Executive resigned on the 23rd of April. On the 25th of April, the new administration, having the support and confidence of the majority of the House of Assembly, was gazetted. During this session was passed a measure establishing a uniform letter postage rate of two-pence, to any part of the island, and three-pence to any part of British North America. The following session an important act, known as the Free Education Act, became law; and next year (1853) was passed an act which conferred universal suffrage under certain restrictions.

By the census taken in 1855, the population was ascertained to be 71,496. There were 252 school-houses and 127 places of public worship.

An agitation commenced in 1857 with the object of introducing the Bible into schools as a book for daily use. The proposal met with much opposition; but finally in the year 1860, an act was passed by the Legislature declaring the introduction of the Bible into all public schools to be legally authorized. During the session of 1860, the extensive estates of the Earl of Selkirk, embracing 62,059 acres, were acquired by government for the sum of £6,586 stg. In the same year a land commission was appointed to enquire into the subjects of dispute relating to the tenure of lands, with the object of converting on equitable terms the leaseholds of the whole island into freeholds. Three commissioners were appointed, the Hon. J. H. Gray as the representative of the Crown, the Hon. Joseph Howe as the representative of the tenants, and Mr. Matthew Ritchie on behalf of the proprietors. The commission collected a great deal of evidence, and in August, 1861, made a report of which the principal points are as follows:—1. Lennox island, a valuable island in Richmond Bay, was to be ceded to the Indians, about a hundred of whom reside around the northern shores of the bay. 2nd. The claims of the Acadians, or French, were to be totally over-ruled. 3rd. The claims of descendants of U. E. loyalists to certain lands were recommended to the special consideration of the government. 4th. Escheat of the lands of proprietors was declared by the commissioners to be wholly impracticable. 5th. As to quit rents, no arrears to be recoverable, and no accruing quit rent to be claimed as long as the land tax

was imposed. 6th. The fishery reservations were abolished, and the lands merged into the adjoining properties.

As to the mode of changing the leaseholds to freeholds, the commissioners recommended a loan of £100,000 stg., for the purpose of enabling the government to purchase the estates, and then sell to the tenants. Or, if this loan could not be obtained, it was suggested that the proprietors should be compelled to sell direct to the tenants at rates either based on the rental or assessed by arbitrators.

The government are now acquiring many of the proprietary estates in the island. In 1863, a Bill was passed empowering the government to expend the further sum of £30,000 in the purchase of lands. The local Executive Council last year again suggested the introduction of a measure to compel proprietors of lands to sell to the Government; but Lord Granville deferred the consideration of the subject in view of the probability that the colony might soon unite itself to the Dominion.

In September, 1864, a conference was held at Charlottetown to consider the practicability of a legislative union of the Provinces. At first delegates were to be sent only from Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island; but the coalition government of Canada, pledged to the introduction of a federal system, having come into office, the Canadian government asked permission to send delegates, which was granted, and Canada joined in the conference. It was resolved that a further conference be held at Quebec, to consider the expediency of a federal union. Prince Edward Island sent delegates to the conference; but the Legislature subsequently repudiated the action of its delegates, and was opposed to the plan of Confederation agreed upon at the conference. The cause of Confederation has since made slight progress in the island, but it is expected that at no distant day satisfactory terms of union will be agreed upon.

Act for the Union of Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick, and for the Government thereof; and for Purposes connected therewith.

WHEREAS the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick, have expressed their Desire to be federally united into One Dominion under the Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, with a Constitution similar in Principle to that of the United Kingdom:

And whereas such a Union would conduce to the Welfare of the Provinces and promote the interest of the British Empire;

And whereas on the Establishment of the Union by Authority of Parliament it is expedient, not only that the Constitution of the Legislative Authority in the Dominion be provided for, but also that the Nature of the Executive Government therein be declared:

And whereas it is expedient that Provision be made for the eventual Admission into the Union of other Parts of British North America:

Be it therefore enacted and declared by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords, Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, as follows:

I. PRELIMINARY.

1. This Act may be cited as the British North America Act, 1867.

2. The Provisions of this Act referring to Her Majesty the Queen extend also to the Heirs and Successors of Her Majesty, Kings and Queens of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

II. UNION.

3. It shall be lawful for the Queen, by and with the Advice of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, to declare by Proclamation that, on and after a day there-

in appointed, not being more than Six Months after the passing of this Act, the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick shall form and be One Dominion under the Name of a Canada; and on and after that Day those Three Provinces shall form and be One Dominion under that Name accordingly.

4. The subsequent Provisions of this Act shall, unless it is otherwise expressed or implied, commence and have effect on and after the day appointed for the Union taking effect in the Queen's Proclamation; and in the same Provisions, unless it is otherwise expressed or implied, the name Canada shall be taken to mean Canada as constituted under this Act.

5. Canada shall be divided into Four Provinces, named Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick.

6. The Parts of the Province of Canada (as it exists at the passing of this Act) which formerly constituted respectively the Province of Upper Canada and Lower Canada, shall be deemed to be severed, and shall form Two separate Provinces. The Part which formerly constituted the Province of Upper Canada shall constitute the Province of Ontario; and the Part which formerly constituted the Province of Lower Canada shall constitute the Province of Quebec.

7. The Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick shall have the same Limits as at the passing of this Act.

8. In the general Census of the Population of Canada which is hereby required to be taken in the Year One thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and in every Tenth Year thereafter, the respective Population of the Four Provinces shall be distinguished.

DESCRIPTION OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

In form, the island resembles a crescent, the concave side being towards the gulf. Length, 130 miles, breadth about 34 miles, area 2,131 square miles, or 1,365,400 acres. The surface is slightly undulating, the chain of hills that extends across the country nowhere rising to a considerable height. The indentations along the coast are numerous. The principal harbors are Charlottetown, Georgetown, Bedeque, Cascumpec, Malpeque, New London, and Murray harbors. There are also numerous ponds or lagoons. The climate is mild and healthful, and the soil remarkably fertile. The whole island was formerly covered with a magnificent growth of forest trees; birch, beech, maple, elm, ash, pine, spruce, hemlock, fir, juniper, cedar, willow and poplar were the chief varieties. Ship-building is still carried on to a considerable extent.

III. EXECUTIVE POWER.

9. The Executive Government and Authority of and over Canada is hereby declared to continue and be vested in the Queen.

10. The Provisions of this Act referring to the Governor General extend and apply to the Governor General for the Time being of Canada, or other the Chief Executive Officer or Administrator for the Time being carrying on the Government of Canada on behalf and in the Name of the Queen, by whatever Title he is designated.

11. There shall be a Council to aid and advise in the Government of Canada, to be styled the Queen's Privy Council for Canada; and the Persons who are to be Members of that Council shall be from time to time chosen and summoned by the Governor General and sworn in as Privy Counsellors, and members thereof may be from Time to Time removed by the Governor General.

12. All Powers, Authorities, and Functions which under any Act of the Parliament of Great Britain, or of the Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or of the Legislatures of Upper Canada, Lower Canada, Canada, Nova Scotia, or New Brunswick, are at the Union vested in or exercisable by the respective Governors or Lieutenant Governors of those Provinces, with the Advice, or with the Advice and Consent, of the respective Executive Councils thereof, or in conjunction with those Councils, or with any Number of Members thereof, or by those Governors or Lieutenant Governors individually, shall, as far as the same continue in existence and capable of being exercised after the Union in relation to the Government of Canada,

be vested in and exercisable by the Governor General, with the Advice or with the Advice and Consent of, or in conjunction with the Queen's Privy Council for Canada, or any Members thereof, or by the Governor General individually, as the Case requires, subject nevertheless (except with respect to such as exist under Acts of the Parliament of Great Britain or of the Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland) to be abolished or altered by the Parliament of Canada.

12. The Provisions of this Act referring to the Governor General in Council, shall be construed as referring to the Governor General acting by and with the advice of the Queen's Privy Council for Canada.

13. It shall be lawful for the Queen, if Her Majesty thinks fit, to authorize the Governor General from Time to Time to appoint any Person or any Persons jointly or severally to be his Deputy or Deputies within any Part or Parts of Canada, and in that Capacity to exercise during the Pleasure of the Governor General such of the Powers, Authorities, and Functions of the Governor General as the Governor General deems it necessary or expedient to assign to him or to them, subject to any Limitations or Directions expressed or given by the Queen; but the Appointment of such a Deputy or Deputies shall not affect the Exercise by the Governor General himself of any Power, Authority, or Function.

14. The Command-in-Chief of the Land and Naval Militia, and of all Naval and Military Forces, of and in Canada, is hereby declared to continue and be vested in the Queen.

15. Until the Queen otherwise directs the seat of Government of Canada shall be Ottawa.

IV. LEGISLATIVE POWER.

17. There shall be One Parliament for Canada, consisting of the Queen, an Upper House styled the Senate, and the House of Commons.

18. The Privileges, Immunities, and Powers to be held, enjoyed, and exercised by the Senate and by the House of Commons and by the Members thereof respectively shall be such as are from Time to Time defined by Act of Parliament of Canada, but so that the same shall never exceed those at the passing of this Act held, enjoyed, and exercised by the Commons House of Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and by the Members thereof.

19. The Parliament of Canada shall be called together not later than Six Months after the Union.

20. There shall be a Session of the Parliament of Canada once at least in every Year, so that Twelve Months shall not intervene between the last Sitting of the Parliament in one Session and its first sitting in the next Session.

The Senate.

21. The Senate shall, subject to the Provisions of this Act, consist of Seventy-two Members, who shall be Senators.

22. In relation to the Constitution of the Senate, Canada shall be deemed to consist of Three Divisions—

1. Ontario;
2. Quebec;
3. The Maritime Provinces, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick; which Three Divisions shall (subject to the Provisions of this Act) be equally represented in the Senate as follows: Ontario by Twenty-four Senators; Quebec by Twenty-four Senators; and the Maritime Provinces by Twenty-four Senators, Twelve thereof representing Nova Scotia, and Twelve thereof representing New Brunswick.

In the case of Quebec each of the Twenty-four Senators representing that Province shall be appointed for One of the Twenty-four Electoral Divisions of Lower Canada specified in Schedule A, to Chapter One of the Consolidated Statutes of Canada.

The Qualifications of a Senator shall be as follows:—

- (1) He shall be of the full Age of Thirty Years;
- (2) He shall be either a Natural-born Subject of the Queen, or a Subject of the Queen naturalized by an Act of the Parliament of Great Britain, or of the Parliament of the United

Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or of the Legislature of One of the Provinces of Upper Canada, Lower Canada, Canada Nova Scotia, or New Brunswick, before the Union, or of the Parliament of Canada after the Union;

- (3) He shall be legally or equitably seized as of Freehold for his own Use and Benefit of Lands or Tenements held in free and common Socage, or seized or possessed for his own Use and Benefit of Lands or Tenements held in Franc-Alieu or in Roture, within the Province for which he is appointed, of the Value of Four Thousand Dollars, over and above his Real Estate, Dues, Debts, Charges, Mortgages, and Incumbrances due or payable out of, or charged on, or affecting the same;

- (4) His Real and Personal Property shall be together worth Four Thousand Dollars over and above his Debts and Liabilities;

- (5) He shall be resident in the Province for which he is appointed;

- (6) In the case of Quebec he shall have his Real Property Qualification in the Electoral Division for which he is appointed, or shall be resident in that Division.

23. The Governor General shall from time to time, in the Queen's Name, by instrument under the Great Seal of Canada, summon qualified Persons to the Senate; and subject to the Provisions of this Act, every Person so summoned shall become and be a Member of the Senate and a Senator.

24. Such Persons shall be first summoned to the Senate as the Queen by Warrant under Her Majesty's Royal Sign Manual thinks fit to approve, and their Names shall be inserted in the Queen's Proclamation of Union.

25. If at any time on the Recommendation of the Governor General the Queen thinks fit to direct that Three or Six Members be added to the Senate, the Governor General may by Summons Three or Six qualified Persons (as the case may be), representing equally the Three Divisions of Canada, add to the Senate accordingly.

26. In case of such Addition being at any Time made the Governor General shall not summon any Person to the Senate, except on a further like Direction by the Queen on the like Recommendation, until each of the Three Divisions of Canada is represented by Twenty-four Senators and no more.

27. The number of Senators shall not at any Time exceed Seventy-eight.

28. A Senator shall, subject to the Provisions of this Act, hold his Place in the Senate for Life.

29. A Senator may by Writing under his Hand addressed to the Governor General resign his Place in the Senate, and thereupon the same shall be vacant.

30. The Place of a Senator shall become vacant in any of the following cases:—

- (1) If for Two consecutive Sessions of the Parliament he fails to give his Attendance in the Senate;
- (2) If he takes an Oath or makes a Declaration or Acknowledgment of Allegiance, Obedience, or Adherence to a Foreign Power, or does an Act whereby he becomes a Subject or Citizen, or entitled to the Rights or Privileges of a Subject or Citizen, of a Foreign Power;
- (3) If he is adjudged Bankrupt or Insolvent, or applies for the Benefit of any Law relating to Insolvent Debtors, or becomes a public Defaulter;
- (4) If he is attainted of Treason, or convicted of Felony or of any infamous Crime;
- (5) If he ceases to be qualified in respect of Property or of Residence; provided that a Senator shall not be deemed to have ceased to be qualified in respect of Residence by reason only of his residing at the Seat of the Government of Canada while he being an Officer under that Government requiring his Presence there.

32. When a Vacancy happens in the Senate by Ignorance, Default, or Absence, the Governor General shall, by Summons to a fit and qualified Person, fill the Vacancy.

33. If any Question arises respecting the Qualification of a Senator or a Vacancy in the Senate, the same shall be heard and determined by the Governor General.

34. The Governor General may from Time to Time, by Instrument under the Great Seal of Canada, appoint a Senator to be Speaker of the Senate, who may remove and appoint another in his stead.

35. Until the Parliament of Canada otherwise provides, the Presence of at least Fifteen Senators, including the Speaker, shall be necessary to constitute the Meeting of the Senate for the Exercise of its Powers.

36. Questions arising in the Senate shall be decided by a Majority of Voices, and the Speaker shall in all Cases have a Vote, and when the Voices are equal the Decision shall be deemed to be in the Negative.

The House of Commons.

37. The House of Commons shall, subject to the Provisions of this Act, consist of One hundred and eighty-one Members, of whom Eighty-two shall be elected by Ontario, Sixty-five for Quebec, Nineteen for Nova Scotia, and One for New Brunswick.

38. The Governor General shall from Time to Time, in the Queen's Name, by Instrument under the Great Seal of Canada, summon and call together the House of Commons.

39. A Senator shall not be capable of being elected or of sitting or voting as Member of the House of Commons.

40. Until the Parliament of Canada otherwise provides, Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick shall, for the Purposes of the Election of Members to serve in the House of Commons, be divided into Electoral Districts as follows:—

1. ONTARIO.

Ontario shall be divided into the Counties, Ridings of Counties, Cities, Parts of Cities, and Towns enumerated in the First Schedule to this Act, each whereof shall be an Electoral District, each such District numbered in that Schedule being entitled to return One Member.

2. QUEBEC.

Quebec shall be divided into Sixty-four Electoral Districts, composed of the Sixty-five Electoral Divisions of Lower Canada as at the passing of this Act divided under Chapter Two of the Consolidated Statutes of Canada, Chapter Seventy-four of the Consolidated Statutes for Lower Canada, and the Act of the Province of Canada of the Twenty-third Year of the Queen, Chapter One, or any other Act amending the same in force at the Union; so that each such Electoral Division shall be for the Purposes of this Act an Electoral District entitled to return One Member.

3. NOVA SCOTIA.

Each of the Eighteen Counties of Nova Scotia shall be an Electoral District. The County of Halifax shall be entitled to return Two Members, and each of the other Counties One Member.

4. NEW BRUNSWICK.

Each of the Fourteen Counties into which New Brunswick is divided, including the City and County of St. John, shall be an Electoral District. The City of St. John shall also be a separate Electoral District. Each of those Fifteen Electoral Districts shall be entitled to return One Member.

41. Until the Parliament of Canada otherwise provides, all Laws in force in the several Provinces at the Union relative to the following Matters or any of them, namely:—the Qualifications and Disqualifications of Persons to be elected or to sit or vote as Members of the House of Assembly or Legislative Assembly in the several Provinces, the Voters at Elections of such Members, the Oaths to be taken by Voters, the Returning Officers, their Powers and Duties, the Proceedings at Election, the Periods during which Elections may be continued, the Trial of controverted Elections, and Proceedings incident thereto, the vacating of Seats of Members, and the Execution of new Writs in case of Seats vacated otherwise than by Dissolution, shall respectively apply to Elections of Members of the House of Commons for the same several Provinces.

Provided that, until the Parliament of Canada otherwise provides, at any Election for a Member of the House of Commons for the District of Algona, in addition to Persons qualified by the Law of the Province of Canada to vote, every male British Subject, aged Twenty-one Years or upwards, being a Householder, shall have a Vote.

42. For the first Election, Members to return to the House of Commons, the Governor General shall cause Writs to be issued by such Person, in such Form, and addressed to such Returning Officers as he thinks fit. The Person so named in the said Writs for this Section shall have the like Powers as are possessed at the Union by the Officers charged with the issuing of Writs for the Election of Members to serve in the respective House of Assembly or Legislative Assembly of the Province of Canada, Nova Scotia, or New Brunswick; and the Returning Officers whom Writs are directed under this Section shall have the like Powers as are possessed at the Union by the Officers charged with the returning of Writs for the Election of Members to the respective House of Assembly or Legislative Assembly.

43. In case a Vacancy in the Representation in the House of Commons in any Election District happens before the Meeting of the Parliament, or after the Meeting of the Parliament before Provision is made by the Parliament in this behalf, the Provisions of the last Section of this Act shall extend and apply to the issuing and returning of a Writ in respect of such vacant District.

44. The Presence of a General Election shall proceed with all practicable Speed to elect One of its Members to be Speaker.

45. In case of a Vacancy happening in the Office of Speaker by Death, Resignation, or otherwise, the House of Commons shall with all practicable Speed proceed to elect another of its Members to be Speaker.

46. The Speaker shall preside at all Meetings of the House of Commons.

47. Until the Parliament of Canada otherwise provides, in case of the Absence for any Reason of the Speaker, or of the Member of the House of Commons for a Period of Forty-eight consecutive Hours, the House may elect another of its Members to act as Speaker, and the Writs for such Election during the continuance of such Absence of the Speaker have and execute all the Powers, Privileges, and Duties of Speaker.

48. The Presence of at least twenty Members of the House of Commons shall be necessary to constitute a Meeting of the House for the Exercise of its Powers; and for that Purpose the Speaker shall be reckoned as a Member.

49. Questions arising in the House of Commons shall be decided by a Majority of Votes other than that of the Speaker, and when the Votes are equal, but not otherwise, the Speaker shall have a Vote.

50. Every House of Commons shall continue for Five Years from the Day of the Return of the Writs for choosing the House (subject to be sooner dissolved by the Governor General) and no longer.

51. The Completion of the Census in the Year One thousand six hundred and seventy-one, and of each subsequent decennial Census, the Representation of the four Provinces shall be readjusted by such Authority in such manner, and from such Time, as the Parliament of Canada from Time to Time provides, subject and according to the following Rules—

- (1.) Quebec shall have the fixed number of Sixty-five Members;
- (2.) There shall be assigned to each of the other Provinces such a Number of Members as will bear the same Proportion to the Number of its Population (ascertained at such Census) as the Number Sixty-five bears to the Number of the Population of Quebec (as ascertained);
- (3.) In the Computation of the Number of Members for a Province a fractional Part not exceeding One Half of the whole Number shall be disregarded; but a fractional Part exceeding One Half of that Number shall be equivalent to the whole Number;

(4.) On any such Re-adjustment the Number of Members for a Province shall not be reduced unless the Proportion which the Number of its Population of the Province bore to the Number of the aggregate Population of Canada at the then last preceding Re-adjustment of the Number of Members for the Province is ascertained at the then latest Census to be diminished by One Twentieth Part or upwards;

(5.) Such Re-adjustment shall not take effect until the Termination of the then existing Parliament.

52. The Number of Members of the House of Commons may be from Time to Time increased by the Parliament of Canada, provided the proportionate Representation of the Provinces prescribed by this Act is not thereby disturbed.

Money Votes—Royal Assent.

53. Bills for appropriating any Part of the Public Revenue, or for imposing any Tax or Impost, shall originate in the House of Commons.

54. It shall not be lawful for the House of Commons to adopt or pass any Vote, Resolution, Address, or Bill for the Appropriation of any Part of the Public Revenue, or any Tax or Impost, to any Purpose that has not been first recommended to that House by Message of the Governor General in the Session in which such Vote, Resolution, Address, or Bill is proposed.

55. Where a Bill passed by the Houses of the Parliament is presented to the Governor General for the Queen's Assent, he shall declare, according to his Discretion, but subject to the Provisions of this Act and to Her Majesty's Instructions, either that he assents thereto in the Queen's Name, or that he withholds the Queen's Assent, or that he reserves the Bill for the Signification of the Queen's Pleasure.

56. When the Governor General assents to a Bill in the Queen's Name, he shall by the first convenient Opportunity send an authentic Copy of the Act to One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and if the Queen in Council within Two Years after Receipt thereof by the Secretary of State thinks fit to disallow the Act, such disallowance, with a Certificate of the Secretary of State on which such Disallowance was received by him) being signified by the Governor General, by Speech or Message to each of the Houses of the Parliament or by Proclamation, shall annul the Act from and after the day of such Signification.

57. A Bill reserved for the Signification of the Queen's Pleasure shall not have any effect unless and until within Two Years from the day on which it was presented to the Governor General for the Queen's Assent, the Governor General signifies, by Speech or Message to each of the Houses of the Parliament or by Proclamation, that it has received the Assent of the Queen in Council.

An entry of every such Speech, Message, or Proclamation shall be made in the Journal of each House, and a Duplicate thereof duly attested shall be delivered to the proper Officer to be kept among the Records of Canada.

V. PROVINCIAL CONSTITUTIONS.

Executive Power.

58. For each Province there shall be an Officer, styled the Lieutenant Governor, appointed by the Governor General in Council by Instrument under the Great Seal of Canada.

59. A Lieutenant Governor shall hold Office during the Pleasure of the Governor General; but any Lieutenant Governor appointed after the Commencement of the First Session of the Parliament of Canada shall not be removable within Five Years from his Appointment, except for Cause which shall be communicated to him in Writing within One Month after the Order for his Removal is made, and shall be communicated by Message to the Senate of the House of Commons within One Week thereafter if the Parliament is not sitting, and if not, then within One Week after the commencement of the next Session of the Parliament.

60. The Salaries of the Lieutenant Gov-

ernors shall be fixed and provided by the Parliament of Canada.

61. Every Lieutenant Governor shall, before assuming the Duties of his Office, make and subscribe before the Governor General or some Person authorized by him Oaths of Allegiance and Office similar to those taken by the Governor General.

62. The Provisions of this Act referring to the Lieutenant Governor shall extend and apply to the Lieutenant Governor for the time being of each Province, or other the Chief Executive Officer or Administrator for the time being entrusted with the Government of the Province, by whatever Title he is designated.

63. The Executive Council of Ontario and of Quebec shall be composed of such Persons as the Lieutenant Governor from Time to Time thinks fit, and in the first instance of the following officers, namely—the Attorney General, the Secretary and Registrar of the Province, the Treasurer of the Province, the Commissioner of Crown Lands, and the Commissioner of Agriculture and Public Works, within Quebec, the Speaker of the Legislative Council and the Solicitor General.

64. The Constitution of the Executive Authority in each of the Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and the Provisions of this Act, continue as it exists at the Union until altered under the Authority of this Act.

65. All Executive Authorities, and Functions which under any Act of the Parliament of Great Britain, or of the Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or of the Legislature of the Province of Canada, Lower Canada, or Canada, were or are before or at the Union vested in or exercisable by the respective Governors or Lieutenant Governors of those Provinces, with the Advice, or with the Advice and Consent, of the respective Executive Councils thereof, or in conjunction with those Councils, or with any Number of Members thereof, or by those Governors or Lieutenant Governors individually, shall, as far as the same are capable of being exercised after the Union in relation to the Government of Ontario and Quebec respectively, be vested in and shall or may be exercised by the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario and Quebec respectively, with the Advice or with the Consent of the Councils or other Authority with the respective Executive Councils, or any Members thereof, or by the Lieutenant Governor individually, as the Case requires, subject to the Provisions of this Act, in so far as such exist under Acts of the Parliament of Great Britain, or of the Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland) to be abolished or altered by the respective Legislatures of Ontario and Quebec.

66. The Provisions of this Act referring to the Lieutenant Governor in Council shall be construed as referring to the Lieutenant Governor of the Province acting by and with the Advice of the Executive Council thereof.

67. The Governor General in Council may from Time to Time appoint an Administrator to execute the Office and Functions of Lieutenant Governor during his Absence, Illness, or other inability to act.

68. Unless and until the Executive Government of any Province otherwise directs with respect to that Province, the Seats of Government in the Provinces shall be as follows, namely—of Ontario, the City of Toronto; of Quebec, the City of Quebec; of Nova Scotia, the City of Halifax; and of New Brunswick, the City of Fredericton.

Legislative Power.

1. ONTARIO.

69. There shall be a Legislature for Ontario consisting of the Lieutenant Governor and of One House, styled the Legislative Assembly of Ontario.

70. The Legislative Assembly of Ontario shall be composed of Eighty-two Members, to be elected to represent the Eighty-two Electoral Districts set forth in the First Schedule to this Act.

2. QUEBEC.

71. There shall be a Legislature for Quebec consisting of the Lieutenant Governor and of Two Houses, styled the Legislative Coun-

ell of Quebec and the Legislative Assembly of Quebec.

72. The Legislative Council of Quebec shall be composed of five Members, to be appointed by the Lieutenant Governor in the Queen's Name, by Instrument under the Great Seal of Quebec, one being appointed to represent each of the Twenty-four Electoral Divisions of Lower Canada in this Act referred to, and each holding Office for the Term of his Life, unless the Legislature of Quebec otherwise provides under the Provisions of this Act.

73. The qualifications of the Legislative Councilors of Quebec shall be the same as those of the Senators for Quebec.

74. The Place of a Legislative Councillor of Quebec shall become vacant in the Cases, *mutatis mutandis*, in which the Place of Senator becomes vacant.

75. When a Vacancy happens in the Legislative Council of Quebec by Resignation, Death, or otherwise, the Lieutenant Governor, in the Queen's Name, by Instrument under the Great Seal of Quebec, shall appoint a fit and qualified Person to fill the Vacancy.

76. If any Question arises respecting the Qualification of a Legislative Councillor of Quebec, or a Vacancy in the Legislative Council of Quebec, it is the same shall be heard and determined by the Legislative Council.

77. The Lieutenant Governor may from Time to Time, by Instrument under the Great Seal of Quebec, appoint a Member of the Legislative Council of Quebec to be Speaker thereof, and may remove him and appoint another in his stead.

78. Until the Legislature of Quebec otherwise provides, the presence of at least Ten Members of the Legislative Council, including the Speaker, shall be necessary to constitute a Meeting for the Exercise of its Powers.

79. Questions arising in the Legislative Council of Quebec shall be decided by a Majority of Voices, and the Speaker shall in all Cases have a Vote, and when the Votes are equal the Decision shall be deemed to be in the negative.

80. The Legislative Assembly of Quebec shall be composed of Sixty-five Members, to be elected to represent the Sixty-five Electoral Divisions of Lower Canada in this Act referred to, subject to Alteration thereof by the Legislature of Quebec: Provided that it shall not be lawful to present to the Lieutenant Governor of Quebec for Assent any Bill for altering the Limits of any of the Electoral Divisions or Districts mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Act, unless the Second and Third Readings of such Bill have been passed in the Legislative Assembly with the concurrence of the Majority of the Members representing all those Electoral Divisions or Districts, and the Assent shall not be given to such Bill unless an Address has been presented by the Legislative Assembly to the Lieutenant Governor stating that it has been so passed.

3. ONTARIO AND QUEBEC.

81. The Legislatures of Ontario and Quebec respectively shall be called together not later than Six Months after the Union.

82. The Lieutenant Governor of Ontario and of Quebec from Time to Time, in the Queen's Name, by Instrument under the Great Seal of the Province, summon and call together the Legislative Assembly of the Province.

83. Until the Legislature of Ontario or of Quebec otherwise provides, a Person accepting or holding in Ontario or in Quebec any Office, Commission, or Employment, permanent or temporary, at the Nomination of the Lieutenant Governor, to which an annual Salary, or any Fee, Allowance, Emolument, or Profit of any Kind or Amount whatever from the Province is attached, shall not be eligible as a Member of the Legislative Assembly of the respective Province, nor shall he sit or vote as such; but nothing in this Section shall make ineligible any Person being a Member of the Executive Council of the respective Province, or holding any of the following Offices, that is to say, the Offices of Attorney General, Secretary and Registrar of the Province, Treasurer of the Province, Commissioner of the Crown Lands, and Commissioner of Agriculture and Public Works, and in Quebec Solicitor General, or shall disqualify him to

sit or vote in the House for which he is elected, provided he is elected while holding such Office.

84. Until the Legislatures of Ontario and Quebec respectively otherwise provide, all Laws which at the Union are in force in those Provinces respectively, relative to the following Matters, or any of them, namely,—the Qualifications and Disqualifications of Persons to be elected or to sit or vote as Members of the Assembly of Canada, the Qualifications or Disqualifications of Voters, the Mode to be taken by Voters, the Returning Officers, their Powers, and Duties, the Proceedings at Elections, the Periods during which such Elections may be continued, and the Trial of controverted Elections and the Proceedings incident thereto, the Voting of the Seats of Members and the Issuing and Execution of new Writs in case of seats vacated otherwise than by Dissolution, shall respectively apply to Elections of Members to serve in the respective Legislative Assemblies of Ontario and Quebec.

Provided that until the Legislature of Ontario otherwise provides, any Election for a Member of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario for the District of Algoma, in addition to Persons qualified by the Law of the Province of Canada to vote, every male British subject aged Twenty-one Years or upwards, being a householder, shall have a Vote.

85. Every Legislative Assembly of Ontario and every Legislative Assembly of Quebec shall continue for Four Years from the Date of the Return of the Writs for choosing the same (subject nevertheless to either the Legislative Assembly of Ontario or the Legislative Assembly of Quebec being dissolved by the Lieutenant Governor of the Province), and no longer.

86. There shall be a Session of the Legislature of Ontario and of that of Quebec once at least in every Year, so that Twelve Months shall not intervene between the last Sitting of the Legislature in each Province in one Session and its first Sitting in the next Session.

87. The following Provisions of this Act respecting the House of Commons of Canada shall extend and apply to the Legislative Assembly of Ontario and Quebec, that is to say,—the Provisions relating to the Election of a Speaker originally and on Vacancies, the Duties of the Speaker, the Absence of the Speaker, the Quorum, and the Mode of voting, as aforesaid; Provisions were here re-enacted and made applicable in Terms to each such Legislative Assembly.

88. The Constitution of the Legislature of each of the Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick shall, subject to the Provisions of this Act, continue as it exists at the Union until altered under the Authority of this Act; and the House of Assembly of New Brunswick existing at the passing of this Act shall, unless sooner dissolved, continue for the Period for which it was elected.

5. ONTARIO, QUEBEC, AND NOVA SCOTIA.

89. Each of the Lieutenant Governors of Ontario, Quebec, and Nova Scotia, shall cause Writs to be issued for the First Election of Members of the Legislative Assembly thereof in such Form and by such Person as he thinks fit, at such Time and address to the Returning Officer as the Lieutenant Governor directs, and so that the First Election of a Member of Assembly for any Electoral District or any Subdivision thereof shall be held on the same Time and at the same Place as the Election for a Member to serve in the House of Commons of Canada for that Electoral District.

6. THE FOUR PROVINCES.

90. The following Provisions of this Act respecting the Parliament of Canada, namely,—the Provisions relating to Appropriation and Tax Bills, the Compensation of Money Votes, the Assent to Bills, the Disallowance of Acts, and the Significant or Pleasure on Bills reserved,—shall extend and apply to the Legislatures of the several Provinces as aforesaid; Provisions were here re-enacted and made applicable in Terms to the respective Provinces and the Legislatures thereof, with the Substitution of the

Lieutenant Governor of the Province for the Governor General, of the Governor (General for the Queen and for a Secretary of State, for One Year for Two Years, and of the Province for Canada.

VI. DISTRIBUTION OF LEGISLATIVE POWERS.

Powers of the Parliament.

91. It shall be lawful for the Queen, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate and House of Commons, to make Laws for the Peace, Order, and good Government of Canada, in relation to all Matters not coming within the Classes of Subjects enumerated, that is to say, the Legislatures of the Provinces; and for the greater Certainty, but not so as to restrict the Generality of the foregoing Terms of this Section, it is hereby declared that (notwithstanding anything in this Act) the exclusive Legislative Authority of the Parliament of Canada extends to all Matters coming within the Classes of Subjects next hereinafter enumerated; that is to say,

1. The Public Debt and Property.
2. The Regulation of Trade and Commerce.
3. The raising of Money by any Mode or System of Taxation.
4. The borrowing of Money on the Public Credit.
5. Postal Service.
6. The Census and Statistics.
7. The Currency and Naval Service, and Defence.
8. The fixing of aid providing for the Salaries and Allowances of Civil and other Officers of Government of Canada.
9. Beacons, Buoys, Lighthouses, and Sable Land.
10. Navigation and Shipping.
11. Quarantine and the Establishment and Maintenance of Marine Hospitals.
12. Sea Coast and Inland Fisheries.
13. Ferries between a Province and any British or Foreign Country or between two Provinces.
14. Currency, Coinage.
15. Banking, Incorporation of Banks, and the Issue of Paper Money.
16. Savings Banks.
17. Insurance and Measures.
18. Bills of Exchange and Promissory Notes.
19. Interest.
20. Legal Tender.
21. Bankruptcy and Insolvency.
22. Patents of Invention and Discovery.
23. Copyrights.
24. Indians, and Lands reserved for the Indians.
25. Naturalization and Aliens.
26. Marriage and Divorce.
27. The Criminal Law, except the Constitution of Courts of Criminal Jurisdiction, including the Procedure in Criminal Matters.
28. The Establishment, Maintenance, and Management of Penitentiaries.

29. Such Classes of Subjects as are expressly excepted in the Enumeration of the Classes of Subjects by this Act assigned exclusively to the Legislatures of the Provinces. And any Matter coming within any of the Classes of Subjects enumerated in this Section shall not be deemed to come within the Class of Matters of a local or private Nature comprised in the Enumeration of the Classes of Subjects by this Act assigned exclusively to the Legislatures of the Provinces.

Ecclesiastical Powers of Provincial Legislatures.

92. In each Province the Legislature may exclusively make Laws in relation to Matters coming within the Classes of Subjects next hereinafter enumerated; that is to say,—

1. The Amendment from Time to Time notwithstanding any thing in this Act, of the Constitution of the Province, except as regards the Office of Lieutenant Governor.
2. Direct Taxation within the Province in order to the raising of a Revenue for Provincial Purposes.
3. The borrowing of Money on the Public Credit of the Province.
4. The Salaries and Tenure of Provincial Offices and the Appointment and Payment of Provincial Officers.
5. The Management and Sale of the Pub-

the Lands belonging to the Province and of the Timber and Wood thereon.

6. The Establishment, Maintenance, and Management of Public and Reformatory Prisons in and for the Province.

7. The Establishment, Maintenance, and Management of Hospitals, Asylums, Charities, and Eleemosynary Institutions in and for the Province, other than Marine Hospitals.

8. Municipal Institutions in the Province.

9. Shop, Saloon, Tavern, Auctioneer, and other Licences in or for the Province, and Revenue for Provincial, Local, or Municipal Purposes.

10. Local Works and Undertakings other than such as are of the following Classes:—

a. Lines of Steam or other Ships, Railways, Canals, Telegraphs, and other Works and Undertakings connecting the Province with any other or others of the Provinces, or extending beyond the Limits of the Province;

b. Line of Steam Ships between the Province and any British or Foreign Country;

c. Such Works as, although wholly situate within the Province, are before or after their Execution declared by the Parliament of Canada or for the Advantage of Two or more of the Provinces.

11. The Incorporation of Companies with Provincial Objects.

12. The Solemnization of Marriage in the Province.

13. Property and Civil Rights in the Province.

14. The Administration of Justice in the Province, including the Constitution, Maintenance, and Organization of Provincial Courts, both of Civil and of Criminal Jurisdiction, and including Procedure in Civil Matters in those Courts.

15. The Imposition of Punishment by Fine, Penalty, or Imprisonment for enforcing any Law of the Province, and in relation to any Matter coming within any of the Classes of Subjects enumerated in this Section.

16. Generally all Matters of a merely local or private Nature in the Province.

Education.

69. In and for each Province the Legislature may exclusively make Laws in relation to Education, subject and according to the following Provisions:—

(1) Nothing in any such Law shall prejudicially affect any Right or Privilege with respect to Denominational Schools which any Class of Persons have by Law in the Province at the Union.

(2) All the Powers, Privileges, and Duties at the Union by Law conferred and imposed in Upper Canada on the Separate Schools and School Trustees of the Queen's Roman Catholic Subjects shall be and the same are hereby extended to the Dissident Schools of the Queen's Protestant and Roman Catholic Subjects in Quebec.

(3) Where in any Province a system of Separate or Dissident Schools exists by Law at the Union or is thereafter established by the Legislature of the Province, an Appeal shall lie to the Governor General in Council from any Act or Decision of any Provincial Authority affecting any Right or Privilege of the Protestant or Roman Catholic Minority of the Queen's Subjects in relation to Education:

(4) In case any such Provincial Law as from Time to Time seems to the Governor General in Council requisite for the due Execution of the Provisions of this Section is not made, or in case any Decision of the Governor General in Council on any Appeal under this section is not duly executed by the proper Provincial Authority in that behalf, then and in every such Case, and as far as the Circumstances of each Case require, the Parliament of Canada may make Provisions for the due Execution of the Provisions of this Section and of any Decision of the Governor General in Council under this Section.

Uniformity of Laws in Ontario, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick.

94. Notwithstanding anything in this Act, the Parliament of Canada may from Time to Time make Laws for the Uniformity of all or any of the Laws relative to Property and Civil Rights in Ontario, Nova Scotia, and New Brun-

wick, and of the Procedure of all or any of the Courts in those Three Provinces, and from and after the passing of any Act in that behalf the Power of the Parliament of Canada to make Laws in relation to any Matter comprised in any such Act shall, notwithstanding anything to this Act, be unrestricted; but any Act of the Parliament of Canada making Provision for such Uniformity shall not have effect in any Province unless and until it is adopted and enacted as Law by the Legislature thereof.

Agriculture and Immigration.

95. In each Province the Legislature may make Laws in relation to Agriculture in the Province and to Immigration into the Province; and it is hereby declared that the Parliament of Canada may from Time to Time make Laws in relation to Agriculture in all or any of the Provinces, and to Immigration into all or any of the Provinces; and any Law of the Legislature of a Province relative to Agriculture or to Immigration shall have effect in and for the Province as long and as far only as it is not repugnant to any Act of the Parliament of Canada.

VII. JUDICATURE.

96. The Governor General shall appoint the Judges of the Superior, District, and County Courts, except those of the Courts of Probate in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

97. Until the Laws relative to Property and Civil Rights in the Province of Ontario and New Brunswick, and the Procedure of the Courts in those Provinces, are made uniform, the Judges of the Courts of those Provinces appointed by the Governor General shall be selected from the respective Bars of those Provinces.

98. The Judges of the Courts of Quebec shall be selected from the Bar of that Province.

99. The Judges of the Superior Courts shall hold Office during good Behaviour, but shall be removable by the Governor General on Address of the Senate and House of Commons.

100. The Salaries, Allowances, and Pensions of the Judges of the Superior, District, and County Courts (except the Courts of Probate in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and of the Admiralty Courts in Cases where the Judges thereof are for the Time being paid by Salary, shall be fixed and provided by the Parliament of Canada.

101. The Parliament of Canada may, notwithstanding anything in this Act, from Time to Time provide for the Constitution, Maintenance, and Organization of a General Court of Appeal for Canada, and for the Establishment of any additional Courts for the better Administration of the Laws of Canada.

VIII. REVENUES, DEBTS, ASSETS, TAXATION.

102. All Duties and Revenues over which the respective Legislatures of Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick before and at the Union had and have Power of Appropriation, except such Portions thereof as by this Act reserved to the respective Legislatures of the Provinces, or are raised by them in accordance with the special Powers conferred on them by this Act, shall form One Consolidated Revenue Fund, to be appropriated for the Public Service of Canada in the Manner and subject to the Charges in this Act provided.

103. The Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada shall be permanently charged with the Costs, Charges, and Expenses incident to the Collection, Management, and Disbursement of the same, shall form the First Charge thereon, subject to be reviewed and audited in such Manner as shall be ordered by the Governor General in Council until the Parliament otherwise provides.

104. The annual Interest of the Public Debts of the several Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick, at the Union shall form the Second Charge on the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada.

105. Unless altered by the Parliament of Canada, the Salary of the Governor General shall be £ Ten thousand Pounds Sterling Money of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, payable out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada, and

the same shall form the Third Charge thereon.

106. Subject to the several Payments by this Act charged on the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada, the same shall be appropriated by the Parliament of Canada for the Public Service.

107. All Stocks, Cash, Banker's Balances, and Securities for Money Belonging to each Province at the Time of the Union, except as in this Act mentioned, shall be the Property of Canada, and shall be taken in Reduction of the Amount of the respective Debts of the Provinces at the Union.

108. The Public Works and Property of each Province, enumerated in the Third Schedule to this Act, shall be the Property of Canada.

109. All Lands, Mines, Minerals, and Royalties belonging to the several Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick at the Union, and all Sums then due or payable for such Lands, Mines, Minerals or Royalties, shall belong to the several Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick in which the same are situate or arise, subject to any Trusts existing in respect thereof, and to any Interest other than that of the Province in the same.

110. All Assets connected with such Portions of the Public Debt of each Province as assumed by that Province shall belong to that Province.

111. Canada shall be liable for the Debts and Liabilities of each Province existing at the Union.

112. Ontario and Quebec conjointly shall be liable to Canada for the Amount (if any) by which the Debt of the Province of Canada exceeds at the Union Sixty-two million five hundred thousand Dollars, and shall be charged with Interest at the Rate of Five per Centum per Annum thereon.

113. The Assets enumerated in the Fourth Schedule to this Act (belonging at the Union to the Province of Canada) shall be the Property of Ontario and Quebec conjointly.

114. Nova Scotia shall be liable to Canada for the Amount (if any) by which its Public Debt exceeds at the Union Eight Million Dollars, and shall be charged with Interest at the Rate of Five per Centum per Annum thereon.

115. New Brunswick shall be liable to Canada for the Amount (if any) by which its Public Debt exceeds at the Union Seven Million Dollars, and shall be charged with Interest at the Rate of Five per Centum per Annum thereon.

116. In case the Public Debt of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick do not at the Union amount to Eight Million and Seven Million Dollars respectively, they shall respectively receive by half, early Payments in advance from the Government of Canada Interest at Five per Centum per Annum on the Difference between the actual Amounts of their respective Debts and such stipulated Amounts.

117. The several Provinces shall retain all their respective Public Property not otherwise disposed of in this Act, subject to the Right of Canada to assume the same, or Public Property required for Fortifications or for the Defence of the Country.

118. The following Sums shall be paid yearly by Canada to the several Provinces for the Support of their Governments and Legislature:

Ontario.....Eighty thousand
Quebec.....Seventy thousand
Nova Scotia.....Sixty thousand
New Brunswick.....Fifty thousand.

Two hundred and sixty thousand;

and an annual Grant in aid of each Province shall be made, equal to Eighty cents per Head of the Population as ascertained by the Census of One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and in the Case of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, by each subsequent Decennial Census until the Population of each of those two Provinces amount to Four hundred thousand Souls, at which Rate such Grant shall thereafter remain. Such Grants shall be in full Settlement of all other Demands on Canada to be paid half-yearly in advance to each Province; but the Government of Canada shall deduct from such Grants, as against any Province, all Sums chargeable as Interest

on the Public Debt of that Province in excess of the several Amounts stipulated in this Act.

119. New Brunswick shall receive by half-yearly Payments in advance from Canada for the Period of Ten Years from the Union an additional Sum of Sixty-three Thousand Dollars per Annum; but as long as the Public Debt of that Province remains under Seven Million Dollars, a Deduction equal to the Interest at Five per Centum per Annum on such sum shall be made from that Allowance of Sixty-three Thousand Dollars.

120. All Payments to be made under this Act, or in discharge of Liabilities created under any Act of the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick respectively, and assumed by Canada, shall, until the Parliament of Canada otherwise directs, be made in such sum and Manner as may from Time to Time be ordered by the Governor General in Council.

121. All Articles of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of any one of the Provinces shall, from and after the Union, be admitted free into each of the other Provinces.

122. The Customs and Excise Laws of each Province shall, subject to the Provisions of this Act, continue in force until altered by the Parliament of Canada.

123. Where Customs Duties are, at the Union, leviable on any Goods, Wares, or Merchandises in two Provinces, such Goods, Wares, and Merchandises may, from and after the Union, be imported from one of those Provinces into the other of them, on Proof of Payment of the Customs Duty leviable thereon in the Province of Exportation, and on Payment of such further Amount (if any) of Customs Duty as is leviable thereon in the Province of Importation.

124. Nothing in this Act shall affect the Right of New Brunswick to levy the Lumber Dues provided in Chapter Fifteen of Title Three of the Revised Statutes of New Brunswick, or any Act amending that Act before or after the Union, and not increasing the Amount of such Dues; but the Lumber of any of the Provinces other than New Brunswick shall not be subject to such Dues.

125. No Lands or Property belonging to Canada or any Province shall be liable to Taxation.

126. Such Portions of the Duties and Revenues over which the respective Legislatures of Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick had before the Union Power of Appropriation as by this Act are reserved to the respective Governments or Legislatures of the Provinces, and all Duties and Revenues raised by them in accordance with the Special Powers conferred upon them by this Act, shall in each Province form One Consolidated Revenue Fund to be appropriated for the Public Service of the Province.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

General.

127. If any Person being at the passing of this Act a Member of the Legislative Council of Canada, Nova Scotia, or New Brunswick, to whom a Place in the Senate is offered, does not within Thirty Days thereafter, by Writing under Hand and Seal, present to the Governor General of the Province of Canada or to the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia or New Brunswick (as the Case may be), accept the same, he shall be deemed to have declined the same; any Person who, being at the passing of this Act a Member of the Legislative Council of Nova Scotia or New Brunswick, accepts a Place in the Senate, and thereafter vacates his Seat in such Legislative Council.

128. Every Member of the Senate or House of Commons of Canada shall before taking his Seat therein take and subscribe before the Governor General or some Person authorized by him, and every Member of a Legislative Council or Legislative Assembly of any Province shall before taking his Seat therein take and subscribe before the Lieutenant Governor of the Province or some Person authorized by him, the Oath of Allegiance contained in the Fifth Schedule to this Act; and every Member of the Senate of Canada or every Member of the Legislative Council of Quebec shall also,

before taking his Seat therein, take and subscribe before the Governor General, or some Person authorized by him, the Declaration of Qualification contained in the same Schedule.

129. Except as otherwise provided by this Act, all Laws of Canada, Nova Scotia, or of New Brunswick at the Union, and all Courts of Civil and Criminal Jurisdiction, and all legal Commissions, Powers, and Authorities, and all Officers, Judicial, Administrative, or otherwise, existing therein at the Union, shall continue in Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick respectively, as if the Union had never taken place; subject nevertheless except with respect to such as are enacted by or exist under Acts of the Parliament of Great Britain or of the Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, to be repealed, abolished, or altered by the Parliament of Canada, or by the Legislature of the respective Province, according to the Authority of the Parliament or of that Legislature under this Act.

130. Until the Parliament of Canada otherwise provides, all Officers of the several Provinces having Duties to discharge in relation to Matters other than those coming under the Classes of Subjects by this Act assigned exclusively to the Legislatures of the Provinces shall be Officers of Canada, and shall continue to discharge the Duties of their respective Offices under the same Liabilities, Responsibilities, and Penalties as if the Union had not been made.

131. Until the Parliament of Canada otherwise provides, the Governor General in Council may from Time to Time appoint such Officers as the Governor General in Council deems necessary or proper for the effectual Execution of this Act.

132. The Parliament and Government of Canada shall have all Powers necessary or proper for performing the Obligations of Canada or any Province thereof, as Part of the British Empire, towards Foreign Countries, and towards the Colonies of the Empire and the Colonies of other Empires and other Foreign Countries.

133. Either the English or the French Language may be used by any Person in the Debates of the House of the Parliament of Canada and of the Houses of the Legislature of Quebec; and both those Languages shall be used in the respective Records and Journals of those Houses; and either of those Languages may be used by any person in any Pleading or Process in or issuing from any Court of Canada established under this Act, and in or from all or any of the Courts of Quebec.

The Acts of the Parliament of Canada and of the Legislature of Quebec shall be printed and published in both those Languages.

Ontario and Quebec.

134. Until the Legislature of Ontario or of Quebec otherwise provides, the Lieutenant Governors of Ontario and Quebec may each appoint under the Great Seal of the Province the following Officers, to hold Office during Pleasure, that is to say,—the Attorney General, the Secretary and Registrar of the Province, the Treasurer of the Province, the Commissioner of Crown Lands, and the Commissioner of Agriculture and Public Works, and in the Case of Quebec the Solicitor General, the Registrar of the Lieutenant Governor in Council, from Time to Time prescribe the Duties of those Officers and of the several Departments over which they shall preside or to which they shall be attached; and may also appoint other and additional Officers to hold Office during Pleasure, and may from Time to Time prescribe the Duties of those Officers and of the several Departments over which they shall preside or to which they shall belong, and of the Officers and Clerks thereof.

135. Until the Legislature of Ontario or of Quebec otherwise provides, all Rights, Powers, Duties, Functions, Responsibilities, or Authorities at the passing of this Act vested in or imposed on the Attorney General, Solicitor General, Secretary and Registrar of the Province of Canada, Minister of Finance, Commissioner of Crown Lands, Commissioner of Public Works, and Minister of Agriculture and Receiver General, by any Law of the Province of Canada, or Upper Canada, Lower Canada, or Canada,

and not repugnant to this Act shall be vested in or imposed on any Officer to be appointed by the Governor General, or by the Discharge of the same or any of them, and the Commissioner of Agriculture and Public Works shall perform the Duties and Functions of the Office of Minister of Agriculture and Public Works imposed by the Law of the Province of Canada, as well as those of the Commissioner of Public Works.

136. Until altered by the Lieutenant Governor in Council, the Great Seal of Ontario and Quebec respectively shall be the same, or of the same Design, as those now in use in the Province of Upper Canada and Lower Canada respectively, before their Union as the Province of Canada.

137. The Words "and from thence to the end of the then next ensuing Session of the Legislature, or Words to the same effect, used in any temporary Act of the Province of Canada not expired before the Union, shall be construed to extend and apply to the next Session of the Parliament of Canada, if the subject Matter of the Act is within the Powers of the same, as defined by this Act, or to the next Sessions of the Legislatures of Ontario and Quebec respectively, if the subject Matter of the Act is within the Powers of the same as defined by this Act.

138. From and after the Union the use of the words "Upper Canada" instead of "Ontario," or "Lower Canada" instead of "Quebec," in any Deed, Will, Pledge, Pleading, Document, Matter, or Thing, shall not invalidate the same.

139. Any Proclamation under the Great Seal of the Province of Canada issued before the Union to take effect at a Time which is subsequent to the Union, whether relating to that Province or to Upper Canada, or to Lower Canada, and the several Matters and Things therein proclaimed shall be and continue of like Force and Effect as if the Union had not been made.

140. Any Proclamation which is authorized by any Act of the Legislature of the Province of Canada to be issued under the Great Seal of the Province of Canada, whether by the Governor General of Upper Canada, or to Lower Canada, which is not issued before the Union may be issued by the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario or of Quebec, as its Subject Matter requires, under the Great Seal thereof, and from and after the Issue of such Proclamation the same and the several Matters and Things therein proclaimed shall be and continue of like Force and Effect as if the Union had not been made.

141. The Penitentiary of the Province of Canada shall, until the Parliament of Canada otherwise provides, be and continue the Penitentiary of Ontario and of Quebec.

142. The Division and Adjustment of the Debts, Credits, Liabilities, Properties, and Assets of Upper Canada and Lower Canada shall be referred to the Arbitration of Three Arbitrators. One chosen by the Government of Ontario, One by the Government of Quebec, and One by the Government of Canada; and the Selection of the Arbitrators shall be made by the Governor General of Canada, and the Legislatures of Ontario and Quebec have met; and the Arbitrator chosen by the Government of Canada shall not be a Resident in the Province of Ontario or Quebec.

143. The Governor General in Council may from time to time order that such and so many of the Records, Books, and Documents of the Province of Canada as he thinks fit shall be deposited in the Province of Ontario or to Quebec, and the same shall thenceforth be the Property of that Province; and any Copy thereof or Extract therefrom, duly certified by the Officer having charge of the Original thereof, shall be admitted as Evidence.

144. The Lieutenant Governor of Quebec may from Time to Time, by Proclamation under the Great Seal of the Province, cause take effect from a Day to be appointed therein, constitute Townships in those Parts of the Province of Quebec in which Townships are not then already constituted, and fix the Names and Boundaries thereof.

X. INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY.

145. Inasmuch as the Provinces of Canada, Ontario, and Quebec, have agreed to be joined in a Declaration that the Construction

75. The East Riding to consist of the Townships of Asphodel, Belmont and Methuen, Douro, Dummer, Gelway, Harver, Minden, Stanhope and Dyrart, Otouabe, and Snowden, and the Village of Ashburnham, and any other surveyed Townships lying to the north of the said East Riding.

The County of Hastings divided into three Ridings, to be called respectively the West, East, and North Ridings:—

76. The West Riding to consist of the Town of Belleville, the Township of Sydney, and the Village of Trenton.

77. The East Riding to consist of the Townships of Thurlow, Iyendinaga, and Hangerford.

78. The North Riding to consist of the Townships of Rawdon, Huntington, Madoc, Elzevir, Tudor, Marmora, and Lake, and the Village of Stirling and any other surveyed Townships lying to the North of the said North Riding.

79. The County of Lennox to consist of the Townships of Richmond, Adolphustown, North Fredericksburg, South Fredericksburg, Ernest Town, and Amherst Island, and the Village of Napane.

80. The County of Addington to consist of the Townships of Camden, Portland, Sheffield, Hinchinbrooke, Kadalar, Kenneloch, Olden, Oso, Anglesse, Barrie, Clarendon, Palmerston, Edingham, Abinger, Miller, Canouto, Denbigh, Loughborough and Bedford.

81. The County of Frontenac to consist of the Townships of Kingston, Wolfe, Island, Pittsburg and Howe Island, and Storrington.

The County of Huron, divided into two Ridings, to be called respectively the South and North Ridings:—

82. The South Riding to consist of the Townships of McNab, Bagot, Billingsfield, Brougham, Horton, Adamston, Grattan, Matawatchesan, Griffith, Lyndoch, Raglan, Radcliffe, Brudenell, Sabastopol, and the Villages of Arapicor and Renfrew.

83. The North Riding to consist of the Townships of Ross, Bromley, Westmouth, Stafford, Pembroke, Wilberforce, Alice, Potawawa, Buchanan, South Algona, North Algona, Fraser, McKay, Wylie, Rolph, Head, Maria, Clara, Haggerty, Sherwood, Burns, and Richards, and any other surveyed Townships lying North-westerly of the said North Riding.

Every Town and Incorporated Village existing at the Union, not specially mentioned in this Schedule, is to be taken as Part of the County or Riding within which it is locally situated.

B. do declare and testify, That I am by Law duly qualified to be appointed a Member of the Senate of Canada (or as the Case may be), and that I am legally or equitably seized, as of Freehold for my own Use and Benefit, of Lands or Tenements held in Free and Common Socage (or seized or possessed for my own Use and Benefit of Lands or Tenements held in Franc-alleu or in Roture (as the Case may be), in the Province of Nova Scotia (or as the Case may be), of the Value of four thousand Dollars over and above all Debts, Taxes, Mortgages, Charges and Incumbrances due or payable out of or charged on or affecting the same, and that I have not collusively or colourably obtained a Title to, or become possessed of the said Lands and Tenements or any Part thereof for the Purpose of enabling me to become a Member of the Senate of Canada (or as the Case may be), and that my Real and Personal Property are together worth Four thousand Dollars over and above my Debts and Liabilities.

RAILROAD AND STEAMBOAT ROUTES IN THE PROVINCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK

This Province claims the honor of being among the first in the field of Railway enterprise. In 1844, only fourteen years after the opening of the Liverpool and Manchester Railway,—the first grand achievement in this rapid means of travel—and eight years after the building of a road from Laprairie to St. John, in the Province of Quebec, was commenced the construction of the New Brunswick and Canada Railway, from St. Andrews to Woodstock, a distance of 94 miles. The progress of this road, however, was slow, only 25 miles having been completed in 1855, and the whole line opened in 1862. It was the only Railway undertaken in New Brunswick until within the past ten years, but the Province now possesses five different lines, two of which are owned by the Dominion Government. They are of a total length of 375 miles, and run through the most thickly settled counties on the eastern and southern shores. Good means of communication are, however, still needed to many of its villages and settlements. The building of the Intercolonial is destined to supply a great want, in this respect, to the counties on the North shore, and the continuation of the road from Woodstock to River du Loup, to the western sections, but the heart of the Province will still be almost isolated. In the following Table of Routes, it has been endeavored to make the journey of the general traveller as little irksome as possible by pointing out to him the most convenient point to his destination after leaving the City of St. John. On arriving there, he need experience no difficulty in procuring a conveyance. First-class stages run through all the chief districts of the Province, connecting at leading stations along the several lines of railway. Where no stages run, private vehicles are almost at all times easily procurable.

New Brunswick has a number of navigable streams, chief among which is the noble river St. John, which takes its source in the State of Maine, 450 miles from the sea. The City of Fredericton is situated on the banks of this river, 84 miles from its mouth, and between it and St. John large steamers ply daily during season of navigation. Above Fredericton, small steamers can proceed, at high water, to Woodstock, Tobique and Grand Falls, a distance of 220 miles, and even 40 miles further up to the Madawaska. Steamers also run on Grand Lake and Salmon River, 95 miles from the City, and 45 miles from the river St. John; up the Washademoak 29 miles; and up the Kennebecasis is 25 miles. Vessels of large tonnage can proceed a good distance up the Miramichi, the Restigouche, and the Richibucto, and smaller vessels up the Oromocto, Petitcodiac, Memramcook, Cocagne, Buctouche and other rivers. Steamers and large vessels also run up the St. Croix, a distance of thirty miles from Eastport to Calais and St. Stephens, touching at St. Andrews.

It is to be observed that a large majority of the places in the Province of New Brunswick are chiefly known as "Settlements."

Connects with **A** at St. John, **D** at Fredericton Junction, and **E** at McAdam Junction. From St. Croix this road is now being continued to Mattawankeg, connecting there with the Maine Division to Bangor, thence to Portland, Boston and New York, and Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa, &c. Cars are expected to be running through from St. John to these points in the fall of 1871. The distance from St. John to Montreal, via Danville Junction, Me., and the Grand Trunk Railway, will then be 589 miles, but the projected building of a road from Lincoln, Me., to Lake Megantic, and of the St. Francis and Lake Megantic International Railway from thence to Lennoxville, Que., will reduce the distance to 430 miles. It is believed that the construction of the short link (only 170 miles) required to give the Maritime Provinces such easy and direct communication with the commercial metropolis of the Dominion will be commenced early in the spring of 1871.



FREDERICTON — A small but beautiful city in the county of York. It is the capital of the Province, and the shire town of the county, and is pleasantly situated on a level plain, on the left bank of the River St John, 84 miles from the Bay of Fundy. The city is well and regularly laid out; its streets are wide and airy, crossing each other at right angles. Queen is the chief business street, and on it are situated most of the public departments, law offices, banks, hotels, &c. At the east end is the Province building, a large wooden structure, in which the Provincial legislature holds its sittings; the Supreme court also meets there. There is a fine library in the building, and in close proximity are the various public offices. At the west end is the Government house, a fine stone structure, with no pretensions to architectural beauty, yet possessing ample accommodation as the residence of the lieutenant-governor. On the north side of Queen street is the Court house and City hall, two large brick buildings, and the barracks, a stone structure capable of accommodating a regiment of infantry. On York street is situated the depot of the Fredericton railway, and the skating rink, and on Westmoreland street is the Exhibition building, a handsome wooden structure, covering nearly an acre of ground. In rear of the city, on a hill, stands the University, a large substantial stone building. It is well endowed, has a good staff of professors, and as a seat of learning is in high standing in the Province. There are eight churches in the city, Episcopal, Roman catholic, church of Scotland, Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist and Free-will baptist. Christ Church cathedral is a fine stone edifice, and a good specimen of church architecture. It was built after designs by the late Mr. Willis, and is an exact model of his last work, Christ Church cathedral at Montreal. The See house of the Lord Bishop of Fredericton is situated almost opposite. The scenery around Fredericton is very pleasing; a fine view may be obtained from the University building of the river and adjacent country. The St John river is navigable from St John to this city for large steamers and other vessels, and during high water steamers can proceed to Woodstock, Tobique and Grand Falls. Opposite the city is a pretty village called St Mary's, with which there is constant

communication by ferry steamer, and lower down is the river Nashwaak. There is an extensive lumbering establishment a few miles from the mouth of this river; there are also several large saw mills adjacent to the city. Fredericton is an incorporated city, and its affairs are managed by a mayor and council. It is lighted with gas, has four weekly newspapers, one bank, a reading room, an office of the Western Union Telegraph Co., and is the head office of the Fredericton railway. Distant from the Fredericton Junction, the junction of the European and North American and Fredericton railways, 22 miles, fare 70c.; from St John by rail 64 miles, fare \$1.50; by water 84 miles, fare \$1; from Woodstock by rail 113 miles, fare \$2.85, by stage 65 miles, fare \$2.50; from Chatham 104 miles, fare \$5; from St Stephen 97 miles, fare \$3; from Halifax 253 miles fare \$5.50; from Riviere du Loup 245 miles, from Quebec 371 miles, from Montreal 543 miles, from Ottawa 699 miles, from Toronto 845 miles. Stage leaves semi-weekly for the Miramichi, and tri-weekly for Woodstock. Mail daily. Population about 6900.

COURT FOR THE TRIAL AND PUNISHMENT OF PIRACY AND OTHER OFFENCES ON THE HIGH SEAS.

His Excellency the Governor, the hon. the chief justice, and other judges of the Supreme court, the members of the Executive council, judge of the vice-admiralty, the public secretary, public treasurer, commander in chief, flag officers and captains, and commanders of ships of war on this station for the time being.

The court sits at any place within the province to be appointed by any three of the members,—the governor, chief justice, or one of the judges of the Supreme court, or judge of the admiralty, being one.

COUNTY COURTS.

The Courts are established by 30th Victoria, cap. x., passed 17th June, 1867. The Act authorises the appointment of one judge for the counties of Charlotte, Carleton, and Victoria; one judge for the counties of York, Sunbury and Queen's; one judge for the counties of Albert, Westmorland and Kent; one judge for the counties of Northumberland, Gloucester and Restigouche; and one judge for the counties of King's and St. John—provided that said Court for the county of St. John shall not have or exercise any jurisdiction in any cause in which the City Court, in and for the city of St. John, or the Police Court in the parish of Portland in the county of St. John, have jurisdiction.

The Act also authorises the appointment of a clerk for each court, who shall be an attorney. The sittings of the respective courts shall be held at or near the county court house in the shire town.

By 31st Vict. cap. XIII, county courts of this Province have original concurrent jurisdiction within their respective counties, with the several circuit courts of the Province, of all crimes, offences, and misdemeanors which are not capital.

COURTS FOR THE PROBATE OF WILLS AND GRANTING ADMINISTRATIONS.

The Probate court for the city and county of St. John is held every Friday at three o'clock at the Registry office; and the like courts in the other counties of the province, is held at the times specially appointed by the judges.

The county courts have not cognizance of any action when the title to land is brought in question; or in which the validity of any devise, bequest, or limitation is disputed, except as thereinafter provided; or for criminal conversation, or seduction, or for breach of promise of marriage, or of any action against a justice of the peace for anything done by him in the execution of his office.

Subject to the above, the county courts have jurisdiction, and may hold plea in all personal actions of debt, covenant, and assumpsit, when the debt or damages do not exceed the sum of one hundred dollars; and in action on bail bonds given to a sheriff in any case in a county court, whatever may be the penalty or amount sought to be recovered.

MILTOWN—A most enterprising village in the parish of St Stephen, county of Charlotte, beautifully situated on the Schoodiac or St Croix river. On the opposite side of the river, in the state of Maine, is another village of the same name. They are distinguished by being called, one Milltown, St Stephen, the other Milltown, Calais. Both are connected together by bridges, being but a very short distance apart. In both villages an immense lumbering trade is done. The mills are chiefly owned by the same parties, some members of the firm residing on the Canadian and others on the American side. On the Canadian side alone there are eighteen gang mills, employing some 500 or 600 men, almost constantly in operation, and large quantities of lumber are shipped direct to all parts of the world. In 1863 one firm loaded one hundred and fifteen vessels. There is here also an edge tool manufactory, employing 35 men, and various other works. Milltown possesses several schools, Protestant and Catholic, and three churches, one academy, one circulating library. Distant from the town of St Stephen 2 miles, from St John 87 miles, fare \$4.50. Mail daily. Population about 2000. The population of the parish of St Stephen, and of Calais and Milltown, Maine, is estimated at 14,900.

Distant from Nelson 1/2 mile, from Douglastown 3 miles, from Chatham 6 miles, from Shediac 82 miles, fare \$5.50; from Fredericton 102 miles, fare \$5; from St John 150 miles. Mail daily. PORTLAND—A fine town adjoining but not incorporated with the city of St John. It is the second place in importance, as regards population, in the province, having a far greater number of inhabitants than the city of Fredericton. It is under parish government and maintains a separate police force. Its streets, though somewhat irregular, are well built upon. Main street, which has a good many stores, and oftentimes presents as busy an appearance as any of the streets in the city, is the principal thoroughfare. Along the east shore, facing the harbor, and the west shore, facing the river St John, are a number of large steam saw mills, which give employment to a numerous body of men. Ship building is also carried on to some extent. On the road leading to Fairville and on the range of hills in the eastern part of the parish, the wealthy men of St John have erected most handsome residences. From Fort Howe, a high hill on which a battery was at one time erected, a fine view is to be had of the harbor and surrounding country. Sulphate of barytes has been found near this port, and a rich plumbago mine is worked near the falls. Between Indiantown—a thriving district at the extreme end of the parish—and the city, there is constant communication by means of the City Passenger railway. Indiantown, a part of Portland, is the starting point for steamers to Fredericton and all points on the River St John. Portland is lighted with gas, and has good water supply. A handsome suspension bridge connects this parish with Lancaster. The European and North American railway (western extension) when continued from Fairville to the eastern station in St John, will pass directly through the town. Distant from St John post office, one mile, from Fairville 2 miles. Mail daily. Population about 13,000.

ST JOHN—The commercial metropo-
lis of the Province, and fourth largest
city in the Dominion, is situated
at the mouth of the noble River St
John, 500 miles from its source, pa-
rish and county of St John. It oc-
cupies a very commanding position, and
when approached from the Bay of
Fundy presents an imposing appear-
ance. The whole of the elevated por-
tion of the city consists of solid rock,
which for the purpose of forming
tolerable streets has had to be cut
down at an incredible expense. St
John was first discovered by Cham-
plain in 1604, and in 1785, when New
Brunswick was separated from Nova
Scotia, it was established as a town
by Royal Charter. Its progress since
that period has been steady and pros-
perous, and it now stands the leading
city in the Maritime Provinces. The
position of its harbor, and its entire
freedom from obstruction by ice,
owing to the tide falls of the Bay of
Fundy, which vary between 21 and

25 feet, gives it great advantages over all other ports in the Dominion, and tends largely to its commercial importance. Its facilities for ship building are very extensive. A large trade is carried on in this important branch; also in its principal article of export—lumber. The latter includes the shipment of deals to England, pine timber to the United States, and shooks to the West Indies. Numerous mills and manufactories surround the harbor, which is almost at all times covered with shipping. The streets of St John are wide and chiefly laid out at right angles. King and Prince William streets are the principal thoroughfares. On the western side of the harbor is Carleton, a thickly settled district and part of the city, and joined to the city, but not incorporated thereto, is the populous suburb of Portland. The city is lighted with gas, and has an excellent fire brigade, and unsurpassed water supply. The water is brought from Little River, distant four miles, by means of two large iron pipes, having a capacity of five and a half millions of gallons every twenty-four hours. St John boasts of numerous handsome public buildings, stores, and private residences. Among the former may be noticed the churches, especially the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, Banks, Dominion building, Court house, Gaol, City hospital, Marine hospital, Alms house, Lunatic asylum, Skating rink, Wiggin's Orphan institution, &c. The penitentiary, a large granite building, is located about a mile, and the Rural Cemetery, covering 110 acres of ground, one and a half miles from the city. There are three banks in the city, Bank of Montreal, Bank of New Brunswick, and Bank of British North America; also a savings bank. Three daily, one tri-weekly, and eight weekly newspapers are published, besides several monthly magazines. The fire alarm telegraph and street railway systems are in successful operation. Two railway lines branch out of the city, one to Shediac, on the Gulf of St Lawrence, and the other to St Croix, the boundary line of New Brunswick and Maine. Branch railways connect these roads with Amherst, N. S., Fredericton, St Andrews, St Stephens, Woodstock, and Houlton, Maine; and, in the fall of 1871, there will be direct rail communication by the European and North American railway (western extension) to all parts of the Dominion and the United States. At present constant communication is maintained by first-class steamers with Annapolis, connecting with Windsor and Annapolis, and Nova Scotia railways, to Halifax, and with Portland, connecting with the Grand Trunk railway to the chief cities in the Dominion. The head office of the Western Union Telegraph Co. for the Lower Provinces is located in St John. Near the city, spanning the rocky gorge through which the waters of the St John are forced, and uniting the east and west banks of the river, is a magnificent suspension bridge. It is a monument of mechanical skill,

cost \$80,000, and is 640 feet in length, 182 feet shorter than the bridge at Niagara. A fine view of portions of the city and surrounding district is to be had from the bridge, as also of the rushing waters immediately beneath it, which at times present a splendid scene. Another bridge is to be built alongside this one, for the European and North American railway. Looking at the many natural advantages which St John possesses, especially its free open harbor at all seasons of the year, and its unsurpassed facilities for manufacturing purposes, it bids fair to become, on the completion of the great Intercolonial railway, the chief seaport city in the Dominion. Value of imports 1869-70, \$5,406,311; and of exports, \$3,541,107; duties collected, \$764,426.96; value of assessed real estate for 1870-71, east side harbor, \$7,865,400; west side (Carleton), \$617,150 = \$8,482,550; value of assessed personal property 1870-71, east side harbor, \$7,871,200; west side (Carleton), \$32,200 = \$8,003,400; income tax 1870-71; east side harbor, \$1,479,780; west side (Carleton), \$151,190 = \$1,630,970; total value of assessments, \$18,116,920. The city returns one member to the House of Commons, and four to the Provincial Legislature. The county of St John also returns one to the House of Commons, and four to the Provincial Legislature. Distant from Fredericton 64 miles, from Shediac, 104 miles, from Halifax 189 miles, from Montreal, via European, and North American and Grand Trunk railways, 580 miles, via Woodstock and Riviere du Loup 609 miles, from Ottawa 746 miles, from Toronto 913 miles, from Hamilton 952 miles, from London 1033 miles, from Sarvia 1081 miles. WOODSTOCK — An incorporated town in the parish of Woodstock, county of Carleton, pleasantly situated on the banks of the beautiful river St John, in the centre of a fertile and thriving agricultural district. It is the shire town of the county and the northern terminus of the Woodstock branch of the New Brunswick and Canada railway. A movement is on foot to extend this railway to connect with the Grand Trunk at River du Loup. If successful, it will, besides opening up most valuable country, give a shorter and better communication with the principal cities in the Dominion, and tend greatly to enhance the prosperity of this town. The completion of the European and North American railway has given it daily communication with Fredericton and St John. Considerable lumbering operations are yearly carried on in Woodstock, and an iron mine discovered a few years ago has been worked most successfully. The quality of iron produced from this mine is said for hardness and durability to be unsurpassed. It is now used in England in the plating of heavy armored ships. Tri-weekly stages run between here and Fredericton, and stages leave daily for Grand Falls and River du Loup. During season of navigation, when the water is at a moderate height, steamers run to and from St John and up to Grand Falls. Western Union Telegraph Co. has an office here. TITLES IN CANADA.

The following are the Regulations about Titles for the Dominion of Canada, as communicated by the Duke of Buckingham and Chandos to Lord Monck, 24th July, 1868. The 2nd, 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th, apply also to the Provinces not in the Confederation:—

1. The Governor General of Canada to be styled "His Excellency."
2. The Lieutenant Governors of the Provinces to be styled "His Honor."
3. The Privy Councillors of Canada to be styled "Honorable," and for life.
4. Senators of Canada to be "Honorable," but only during office, and the title not to be continued afterwards.
5. Executive Councillors of the Provinces to be styled "Honorable," but only while in office, and title not to be continued afterwards.
6. Legislative Councillors in the Provinces not in future to have that title, but gentlemen who were Legislative Councillors at the time of the Union, to retain their title of "Honorable" for life.
7. The President of the Legislative of the Provinces, to be styled "Honorable," during office.
8. The Speaker of the House of Assembly in the Provinces, to be styled "Honorable," during office.

Extracts from the Statutes of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, dated the 4th December, 1868.

It is Ordained, that this Most Distinguished Order shall contain Three Classes, as in Our said Letters-Patent mentioned, to be Styled and Designated respectively—

Knights Grand Cross,
 Knights Commanders, and
 Companions.

It is Ordained, that the First Class, or Knights Grand Cross, shall not exceed Twenty-five in Number.

It is Ordained, that the Second Class, or Knights Commanders, shall not exceed Sixty in Number.

It is Ordained, that the Third Class, or Companions, shall not exceed One Hundred in Number.

It is Ordained, that the persons to be admitted into this Most Distinguished Order, shall be such natural-born subjects of our Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, as may have held, or shall hereafter hold, high and confidential offices within any of our Colonial possessions, or such other natural-born subjects of our Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, as may have held, or shall hereafter hold, high and confidential offices, or may render extraordinary and important services to us as Sovereign of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in relation to any of our Colonial possessions, or who may become eminently distinguished therein by their talents, merits, virtues, loyalty, or services, or who now are, or hereafter may be, appointed officers of this Most Distinguished Order.

POSTAL REGULATIONS.

Mails are conveyed twice each way every day, except Sunday, over the principal lines of railway in Canada. Over the less important lines of railway they are carried only once each way every day, except Sunday.

Mails are also conveyed once each way every day, except Sunday, over the principal lines of common road; and once, twice, or three times per week over the less important lines of common road.

The postal communication between Ontario and Quebec and the Lower Provinces is six times per week each way *via* Quebec, Rivière du Loup and Edmundston, and once per week each way by Steamers from Quebec to Picton. Also three times per week each way in summer by steamers between Portland and St. John, N. B., and daily by way of Bangor, Maine and Calais to St. John, twice per week by Steamer between Portland and Halifax.

The most speedy and direct postal route from Canada to almost every portion of the globe (with the exception of the Continent of North America, the Isthmus of Panama, and the West India Islands) is by way of England, whence mails for the several British Colonies and Foreign Countries are regularly dispatched.

The most speedy and direct postal route from Canada to all parts of the Continent of North America, the West Indies, Central and South America, is *via* New York.

Mails for England are despatched as follows: By Mail Steam Packets sailing from Quebec in summer and Portland in winter every Saturday; and from Halifax, Nova Scotia, every alternate Friday. By Steamer from New York every Thursday.

The following post offices in the Dominion of Canada make up mails direct for certain post offices in the United Kingdom, *viz* :

Mails are exchanged daily with the United States post offices at all the principal frontier points, and closed mails

are exchanged daily between the principal cities of the Dominion and New York and Boston.

Montreal exchanges Mails direct with the following American Offices:—Boston, Buffalo, Burlington, New York, Plattsburg, Portland, Rouss's Point, Rutland and Whitehall. Mails for Bermuda and Newfoundland are made up at Halifax, Nova Scotia, whence steamers sail once a month to Bermuda and St. Thomas, and once a fortnight to Newfoundland.

Rates of Postage on Letters.—The rate of postage on prepaid Letters between any one place in Canada and any other place in Canada, is regulated by weight, irrespective of distance, and is as follows:

On a letter not more than $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., 3 cents.
 " more than $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. but not ex. 1 oz., 6 cts.
 " " 1 oz. " 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ " 9 cts.
 " " 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. " 2 " 12 cts.
 " " 2 oz. " 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " 15 cts.

And so on, 3 cents being charged for every additional $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., or fraction of half ounce.

If the weight be exceeded to the smallest extent, even though the balance be merely turned, the letter becomes liable to an additional rate.

Letters posted in and addressed to any place within the Dominion of Canada, if sent unpaid, are liable to a charge of 6 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

In applying the 5 cent unpaid rate to letters passing within the Province posted unpaid or not fully pre-paid—it should be observed that a letter passes either as pre-paid at 3 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., on condition that the whole postage due be fully pre-paid—or at 5 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. if posted unpaid, or only partly pre-paid—in the latter case the full rate at 5 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. will be marked, and a deduction made therefrom of the amount which may have been paid—thus on an ounce letter pre-paid 3 cents only—the rate will be 10 cents and crediting the 3 cents paid—7 cents will remain to be charged, and collected on delivery.

The object of the 5 cent unpaid rate is to induce pre-payment, and thereby relieve the Post Office from costs and trouble of account and collection, but this object is equally defeated whether the letter be wholly unpaid, or but partially pre-paid—and therefore the 5 cent rate applies to the whole charge upon the letter in both cases.

The charge on local or drop letters, viz., letters posted at an office in Canada for delivery from that office is one cent for each letter, which must be pre-paid, or the letter will be sent to the dead letter office for return to the writer.

The charge on letters delivered by letter-carriers in Canada, is two cents for each letter in addition to the ordinary postage.

The rate of postage on letters to Prince Edward Island is 3 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. if pre-paid, and 5 cents if not pre-paid.

The rate of postage on letters to Newfoundland is 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., which must be pre-paid.

The rate of postage on letters to British Columbia and Vancouver Island is 10 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., which must be prepaid. This rate covers the letter to San Francisco only; there will be an additional charge on delivery.

The rate of postage on letters to Red River, via the United States, is 6 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., which must be pre-paid by postage stamp.

The rate of postage on letters between any place in Canada and any place in the United States, is 6 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. if pre-paid, and 10 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. if not pre-paid.

Upon a letter or packet, of any weight, addressed to the United States, the whole postage or none at all should be pre-paid. If anything less than the whole is pre-paid no account is taken of it, and it is entirely lost to the sender.

The scale of weight under which the above letters are charged is the same as the scale under which letters, passing between places in Canada, are rated.

The single rate of postage on letters between any place in Canada and any place in the United Kingdom, is as follows:

By Canadian Steamer, sailing every Saturday from Quebec in Summer, and from Portland in Winter, and from Halifax fortnightly, 6 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce.

By Steamer, sailing from New-York every Wednesday, 8 cents.

Letters addressed to the United Kingdom, and forwarded by either of the above routes, will be charged according to the following scale:

Letters not over $\frac{1}{2}$ an oz., 1 rate.

Letters more than $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., and not ex. 1 oz. 2 rates.

" " 1 oz., " 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. 3 rates.

And so on, adding one rate for every additional half ounce or fraction of a half ounce.

The postage on all letters posted in Canada for the United Kingdom, and in the United Kingdom for Canada, should be pre-paid.

If sent unpaid 3d. sterling will be charged on each letter, on delivery, in addition to the ordinary postage rate.

Letters posted in the United Kingdom, for Canada, unless specially addressed "By Canadian Steamer," or "By Cunard Steamer," are despatched in the first mail that is made up—whether for Canadian or Cunard Line—after the letter is posted, so that letters intended for the Canadian Packets must either be posted on the proper days for the Canadian Packet Mails, or bear the words "By Canadian Mail Steamer" on the address. In like manner letters posted in Canada for the United Kingdom should be addressed "By Canadian Packet" or "via New York." If for the latter route the additional postage 2 cents per half oz. should be added to the ordinary rate of 6 cents.

Three cents will be charged on the delivery of letters which have been forwarded as above by Cunard Steamer, but on which 3d. sterling or 6 cents only per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. have been pre-paid.

The charge on dead letters, returned to the writers, is five cents on each letter in addition to the postage.

Soldier's and Seaman's Letters—non-commissioned officers embodied pensioners, seamen and soldiers, and army school-masters of all but first class, while they are employed in Her Majesty's Service, can send and receive letters at the rate of 2 cents each, under the following regulations:

1. The two cents must be paid by postage stamp at the time the letter is posted.

2. The name of the soldier or sailor, his class or description, and the name of his ship, corps, or detachment to which he belongs, must be specified in the direction of the letter; and in the case of letters sent by soldiers or seamen, the officer in command must sign his name and specify his rank, and the name of the ship or regiment, corps or detachment, which he commands. 3. The letter must not exceed half an ounce in weight. 4. The letter must refer solely to the private affairs of the soldier or seaman.

All the foregoing descriptions must be fully written in the address in the following form, the initials of the name of any ships or regiments being insufficient:

Letters for soldiers or seamen may be forwarded at the above rate to or through any country requiring the payment of any foreign or transit rate, but subject to the payment of such foreign or transit rate as may be chargeable thereon.

Soldiers' and seamen's letters are not liable to any additional rate on re-direction.

All soldiers' and seamen's letters are conveyed between Canada and the United Kingdom by the Canadian line of steamers.

Letters sent by commissioned or warrant officers, midshipmen or masters' mates, engineers, gunners, boatswains or carpenters in the navy, captains, clerks, or first class school-masters, or commissioned or warrant officers in the army, are not included in the privilege attached to letters of soldiers and seamen, but are chargeable with the same rates as ordinary letters.

Soldiers' and seamen's letters posted in Canada without a compliance with the above regulations are liable to full post-

age. If posted in accordance with the above regulations, but without pre-payment of 2 cents, they are liable to a charge of 2d. sterling on delivery in the United Kingdom.

Soldiers' letters, and those of non-commissioned officers and privates of the Volunteer Militia of Canada when on active service posted and addressed to places in Canada, pass under the above regulations at the reduced rate of 2 cents.

Rates of Postage on Newspapers.—The law declares that for post office purposes a newspaper shall be held to mean a periodical published not less frequently than once in each week, and containing notices of passing events, that is to say, general news.

Although provision is made for forwarding newspapers through the post, it is not compulsory on any one to employ this mode of transmission; everything except letters may be sent in any other way.

A newspaper for pass at the undermentioned rates is subject to the following restrictions:

1. It must have no cover, or a cover open at both ends.
2. It must not contain any enclosure.
3. It must have no writing or mark thereon but the name and address of the person to whom it is sent, nor anything on the cover except such name and address.

Newspapers which are not posted in accordance with these regulations are not forwarded but are sent to the Dead Letter office and destroyed.

An extra newspaper, or a supplement to a newspaper, is deemed a distinct newspaper, and charged accordingly.

Newspapers published in the Dominion may be sent by post from the office of publication to any place in Canada at the following rates, if paid quarterly in advance, either by the publisher at the post office where the papers are posted, or by the subscriber at the post office where the papers are delivered.

A paper published 6 times per week, 20 cts. per quarter	“	3	“	15	“
“	“	2	“	10	“
“	“	1	“	5	“

When the above rates are not paid in advance by either the publisher or subscriber, the papers are charged 1 cent each on delivery.

It is not necessary that the commuted rate on newspapers should be paid absolutely on the first day of each quarter. The regulation is intended to be carried out with all due consideration for the convenience of the public, and it will be sufficient if the person desiring to pay the commuted rate declares his intention and offers the payment when first calling at the office within a reasonable time after the commencement of the quarter; but after having made his option to pre-pay the commuted charge, or to pay for his papers as received at 1 cent each, as the case may be, postmasters are not expected to alter their newspaper accounts to allow of a change until the commencement of the next quarter.

The commuted rate of payment cannot be accepted from new subscribers during a quarter for any unexpired period of the quarter.

Newspapers published in Canada, which are not posted from the office of publication, must be pre-paid 2 cents each by postage stamps, otherwise they will not be forwarded, but be sent to the Dead Letter office and destroyed. Papers of this class are termed “Transient Newspapers.”

Publishers of newspapers in Canada are allowed to enclose in copies of their papers sent to subscribers, subscription accounts and receipts for the same without rendering them liable to any additional postage.

Packets of unbound newspapers published in Canada may be returned by a subscriber to the office of publication at the rate of 2 cents per 8 oz. or fraction of 8 oz., which must be pre-paid.

Transient newspapers addressed to the United States must be pre-paid 2 cents each newspaper by postage stamp, otherwise they will not be forwarded, but be sent to the Dead Letter office and destroyed.

Transient newspapers posted in the United States and addressed to Canada, are liable to 2 cents each on delivery. The stamp paid on these papers indicates that the United States postage only has been pre-paid, the Canadian rate of 2 cents remaining to be collected.

American newspapers posted or re-posted in Canada except by news agents to regular subscribers must be pre-paid 2 cents each, by stamp, otherwise they will not be forwarded.

The option of paying the commuted rate on newspapers does not apply to papers published in the United States;

papers addressed to regular subscribers must be paid for at the full rate of 1 cent each.

Canadian news agents and booksellers may post American newspapers unpaid, when addressed to regular subscribers in the Province; but such newspapers are chargeable, on delivery, with 1 cent each.

Newspapers posted in Canada and addressed to the United Kingdom must be pre-paid by stamp, 2 cents each newspaper.

It is forbidden by the regulations of the British Post Office to send through the post, at newspaper rate, any newspaper bearing more than one address. Persons sending newspapers to the United Kingdom from Canada should be careful to cut off the ordinary printed address pasted upon newspapers sent to subscribers in Canada from the office of publication, as any paper having thereon such printed address in addition to that of the party for whom it is intended will be sent to the English Dead Letter office.

When two or more newspapers are enclosed under one cover, postage must be pre-paid by stamp at the rate of 2 cents for each newspaper, or the package will be detained and sent to the Dead Letter office.

Newspapers forwarded by Canadian Steamer are delivered in the United Kingdom without additional charge.

Newspapers forwarded by Steamer from New York are liable, on delivery, in the United Kingdom, to one penny each, being the American transit rate.

Newspapers posted in the United Kingdom for Canada should, if forwarded by Canadian Steamer, be pre-paid one penny each, by stamp. They are subject, on delivery, to no additional charge.

If to be forwarded by Canadian Steamer they should be pre-paid two pence each, or they will be kept for the Canadian Packet.

British newspapers re-posted in Canada must be pre-paid 2 cents each by stamp.

British newspapers distributed to regular subscribers by Canadian booksellers or agents, pass free in the same way as if received by the Canadian Steamer.

Canadian newspapers addressed from the office of publication to subscribers in the United States, the United Kingdom, Lower Provinces, &c., may be forwarded on pre-payment of the commuted rate applicable to subscribers within the Province; but they cannot be forwarded if unpaid. Care should be taken to see that such newspapers are properly stamped at the Post Office where posted “Prepaid by Publisher,” as they are in the absence of such stamp liable to be mistaken for unpaid papers, and to be detained accordingly.

Exchange papers passing between publishers in Canada and between publishers in Canada and publishers in the United States, are carried free through the post.

No newspaper, properly so called (except exchanges), whether devoted to education, temperance, agriculture, or to any branch of science, is entitled to exemption from charge.

Newspapers addressed to Newfoundland must be pre-paid 2 cents each, by stamp.

No United States newspapers of any kind or description (with the exception of exchange papers) are on any ground entitled to pass through the Canadian mails free of postage.

In cities and towns where newspapers are published, the printers and publishers should send them to the post office put up in a manner to admit of their being readily counted, and, if necessary, withdrawn from their covers for examination. The newspapers for each office also should be made up in strong paper in a separate parcel, which should be plainly addressed.

When the numbers of a newspaper published in Canada, or in any of the other British North American Provinces, or in the United States, and issued daily, shall have remained in a post office in Canada uncalled for during two weeks; or of a newspaper issued semi-weekly, or tri-weekly, during three weeks; or of a newspaper issued weekly, during one month; and of a monthly periodical during two months, or when such newspapers and periodicals have been refused to be taken by the party to whom addressed, the postmaster is instructed to notify the respective publishers in the proper form, which is to pass free of postage. If the newspaper or periodical continue to arrive after the notice has been sent, the postmaster is instructed to notify the publisher in the same way a second time, specially calling his attention to the first notice.

To enclose a letter, or any writing, or to make any written marks to serve the purposes of a letter, or to enclose any other thing (except publishers' accounts and receipts, as before mentioned) in a newspaper posted to pass as a news-

paper, is a misdemeanor. Postmasters are requested at once to transmit all newspapers containing such writing, marks and enclosures, to the Postmaster General.

Periodical Publications.—Periodical publications are publications issued at regular intervals, but less frequently than once per week. An Almanac or any work of a like character published at stated periods and containing matter of general interest is deemed to be a periodical.

Periodical publications can be transmitted by post to any part of Canada and the United States at the following rates:

Periodicals passing by Mail in Canada.—The rate on all periodicals, other than newspapers, passing by mail in Canada, save such as may be addressed to or received from the United Kingdom, is 1 cent per 4 oz. weight of package containing periodical matter, whether the package contain one or more numbers.

Any fraction of 4 oz. to be charged as a full rate. Transient periodical matter posted in Canada must in all cases be pre-paid by postage stamps.

The above rate is payable on delivery on all periodical matter received from the United States, except that Canadian editors may receive exchange periodicals from the United States free of Canadian postage.

Canadian Periodicals posted for United Kingdom by Canadian Packets.—Periodicals, printed and published in Canada, may be posted, addressed to any place in the United Kingdom by Canadian Packet, on pre-payment by postage stamp of 2 cents each number.

This rate is applicable to all classes of Canadian periodicals posted as above for the United Kingdom.

No periodical of any kind or description can, upon any grounds claim exemption from Canadian postage, except such as are received in the mails from the United Kingdom.

Periodicals to pass at above rates must be put up in covers open at the ends or sides; and if these regulations are not complied with, or if such periodicals are found to contain any writing other than the address, they are liable to full letter rates of postage.

No packet of periodicals can be forwarded through the post if it exceeds the weight of four pounds.

Bound volumes of any periodical published in Canada may be forwarded at the rate of 1 cent for every 4 oz. if pre-paid by postage stamp.

Book Post.—British Provinces and United States.—Books bound or unbound posted in Canada, and addressed to any office in Canada, British North America and the United States, are chargeable with a rate of 1 cent per oz., which must be pre-paid by postage stamps.

Books addressed to places in Canada can be sent through the mails in closed packets at the rate of postage applicable to parcels sent by parcel post.

Bound volumes of any periodical or newspaper published in Canada, if bound in a form to come within mailable dimensions, that is to say, not exceeding two feet in length, breadth or thickness, nor exceeding 4 lbs. in weight, may be sent from the office of publication to any place in Canada at a charge of 1 cent per 4 oz. or fraction of 4 oz. if pre-paid.

Letters, whether sealed or unsealed, or any enclosure found in a book parcel, are liable to be rated as unpaid letters, and the packet in which it is enclosed to an additional rate of 12½ cents as a penalty for a breach of the regulations.

Book Post.—United Kingdom, France, &c.—Book packets are forwarded by post from Canada to the United Kingdom, and vice versa, at the following rates:—By Mail steamers sailing from Quebec or Portland and Halifax: For each packet weighing not more than 10z., 2 cents, exceeding 1 oz. and not exceeding 2 oz. 4 cents; exceeding 2 oz. and not exceeding 4 oz. 6 cents.

Not more than 4 oz.	6 cts.
Exceeding 4 oz. and not exceeding 4 lb.	12 "
" " " " 12 oz.	18 "
" " " " 1 lb.	24 "
" " " " 1 1/2 lb.	30 "

And so on, the scale progressing throughout by a single rate for every four ounces.

By Cunard and other steamers sailing from New York, as above: 4 oz. 6 cts.; 8 oz. 17 cts.; 12 oz. 25 cts.; 1 lb. 33 cts.; 1 1/2 lb. 41 cts.

Book Packets addressed to the United Kingdom may in

future be registered upon payment of a registration fee of 6 cents, in addition to the ordinary rate of postage.

Book packets, printed matter, or single newspapers can be forwarded from Canada to France, or vice versa by Canadian Steamers only, at the following rates:—

If not exceeding 2 oz. in weight	8 cts.
If exceeding 2 oz. and not exceeding 4 oz.	8 "

And so on, adding 8 cents for each additional 4 oz. or fraction thereof.

The following conditions must be carefully observed:

1. every book packet must be either without a cover or in a cover open at both ends or both sides.
2. It must not contain any letter open or sealed, or writing to serve the purpose of a letter, or any sealed enclosure whatever.
3. It must not exceed two feet in length, breadth, or width.
4. The postage must be pre-paid by stamp.

A book packet may contain any number of separate books, publications, works of literature or art, almanacs, maps or prints, photographs, daguerotypes, when not on glass or in frames containing glass, and any quantity of paper, vellum, or parchment (to the exclusion of letters); and the books, maps, paper, &c., may be either written, printed or plain, or any mixture of the three, and may be either British, Colonial, or Foreign.

All legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of the same, or a portion thereof, will be allowed as part of the packet whether such binding, &c., be loose or attached, as also rollers, in the case of prints and maps, and whatever may be necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or whatever generally appertains thereto, and the postage is rated upon the gross weight of the packet.

The name and address of the sender may also be written or printed on the envelope or cover of the packet, in addition to the name and address of the person to whom it may be forwarded.

Book and Newspaper Manuscripts and Printers' Proofs.—In Department Order No. 65, dated 24th Nov., 1863, permission was given for Book-Manuscript, and Printers' Proofs, whether corrected or not, to pass at the printed matter rate of one cent an ounce, and it now appears to be necessary to explain that by Book-Manuscript was meant the written sheets of any book intended for publication, and the intention was to encourage literary productions, by affording facilities for Authors to send and receive such matter to and from their Publishers by Post. Printers' Proofs are the printed impressions taken by a printer, for correction or examination, of any matter passing through his Press. By Newspaper Manuscript is meant written articles (not including advertisements) intended for insertion in a newspaper or periodical, and addressed to the editor or publisher thereof for insertion. Under former regulations the written marks correcting such proofs rendered them liable to letter postage when sent by mail, and the intention of the Department Order referred to was to relax the rule in favor of such proofs, and allow them when corrected, to retain their character as printed matter, and pass at printed matter rates of charge.

PRINTED PAPERS, CIRCULARS, PRICES CURRENT, HAND BILLS, &c.—Printed circulars, prices current, hand bills, and other printed matter of a like character, posted in Canada, and addressed to any place in the Dominion, British North America, or the United States, are chargeable with a rate of 1 cent per oz. (one cent each when sent singly), which must be pre-paid by postage stamp.

The half-yearly School Returns made by School Trustees to the Local Superintendents of Schools, may, though the printed form be partly filled up in writing with the names of the pupils and days of attendance, be transmitted by post in Canada at the rate of 1 cent per oz. to be pre-paid by stamp.

When not filled up the above forms are printed matter, and liable as such to 1 cent per oz. postage.

Military returns, statistics, and rolls, policies of insurance, containing written figures and signatures, may be forwarded as printed matter on pre-payment of 1 cent per oz.

Printed circulars are transmitted by post to the United Kingdom under the regulations and charges of the Book Post. They must be forwarded, however, open at the ends or sides. If sent in envelopes, sealed or unsealed, they are liable to letter rates of postage.

Prices current, posted in Canada and addressed to any

place in the United Kingdom, are liable to a rate of 2 cents each, which must be pre-paid by stamp, when sent singly; when, however, sent in packages to one address, they pass at book rates.

Pieces current enclosed in envelopes sealed or unsealed are by the regulations of the Imperial post office liable to letter postage.

Lithographed letters and circulars are allowed to pass through the Post at the same rate as printed circulars.

Printed notes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament and Colonial Legislatures pass to and from the United Kingdom at the ordinary book post charge.

Parcel Post.—Parcels closed at the ends and sides, and not exceeding 3 lbs. in weight, may be posted at any post office in the Dominion, addressed to any other post office in Canada, at the following rates:

For each parcel weighing not more than 8 oz. 12½ cents.
Exceeding 8 oz. and not exceeding 1 lb. 25 "
Exceeding 1 lb. and not exceeding 1½ lb. 37½ "
and so on up to the limit of 3 lbs.

The following conditions must be carefully observed:

1. No letter or letters shall be enclosed.
2. The parcel shall not contain any explosive substance, glass, liquids or other matter likely to injure the ordinary contents of the mail.
3. The weight of the parcel shall not exceed 3 lbs., nor the size exceed one foot in length or breadth, or six inches in thickness.
4. The postage must be pre-paid by stamps.
5. The parcel should have the words "By Parcel Post" plainly written on the address. It should be well and strongly put up, and be legibly addressed to the post office address of the intended receiver; the name of the County in which the said office is situated being added.

If the name and address of the sender be written on the parcel, it will, if delivery should fail from any cause, be returned from the Dead Letter office unopened to the sender on payment of an additional rate for the return conveyance.

If the number of stamps affixed to a parcel be insufficient to pre-pay the proper rate, the amount deficient will be rated unpaid, with a fine of 12½ cents in addition.

Parcels may be registered, on pre-payment, by stamps, of five cents in addition to the postage. When registered, the postmaster should give a receipt to the party posting the parcel.

Parcels sent by post may contain books, daguerreotypes, photographs, printers' proofs and copy, military returns, statements and rolls, containing written figures and signatures; returns, deeds, legal papers, and all transmissions of a like character not being strictly letters.

To enclose a letter or letters, or any writing, intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a parcel intended for the Parcel Post, is a misdemeanor.

Should it be ascertained that a packet posted for the Parcel Post contains a letter or letters, the stamps it may bear will be cancelled, and the parcel rated as a letter with full unpaid rates.

Parcels cannot be transmitted by post at the above rates to any place beyond the limits of the Dominion of Canada.

The following is an example of the address recommended:

By Parcel Post.

Franking and Free Letters.—The following matter is exempt from Canadian Postage.

All letters and other mailable matter addressed to or sent by the Governor General of Canada.

All letters or other mailable matter addressed to or sent by any department of the Government at the seat of Government at Ottawa, under such regulations as may from time to time be made by the Governor General in Council.

All letters and other mailable matter addressed to or sent by the Speaker or Chief Clerk of the Senate or of the House of Commons, or to or by any member of either House at the seat of Government, during any Session of the Parliament; or addressed to any of the members or officers in this section mentioned, at the seat of Government as aforesaid, during the ten days next before the meeting of Parliament.

All public documents and printed papers sent by the Speaker or Chief Clerk of the Senate or of the House of Commons, to any member of either House, during the recess of Parliament.

All papers printed by order of either House, sent by members of either House, during the recess of Parliament.

Petitions and addresses to either of the Provincial Legislatures of Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, or to any branch thereof, and votes, proceedings and other papers printed by any such Legislature, or any branch thereof, during any session thereof, provided such petitions and addresses, votes, proceedings and other papers, are sent without covers or in covers open at the ends or sides, and contain no letter or written communication to serve the purpose of a letter.

Letters and other mailable matter (except that provided for as above) addressed to or sent by the Provincial Governments or Legislatures of Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia will be liable to the ordinary rates of postage.

Public documents and printed papers sent under the foregoing clauses, should bear, as part of the address, the *bona fide* superscription of the Speaker, Chief Clerk, or officer specially deputed for this purpose, to act for those functionaries, or of the member sending the same.

All letters and other mailable matter to and from the Postmaster General and the Deputy Postmaster General; and all official communications to and from the Post Office Department, and to and from the Post Office Inspectors, are to pass free of Canada postage.

Rating and Refunding Postage.—Postmasters in Canada are allowed to refund postage in the following cases, only:—

Letters originating and for delivery in Canada, charged as weighing more than the actual weight.

Postage incorrectly charged on editors' notices addressed to publishers and editors, and exchange papers, which should legally pass without charge.

All other claims for the return and statement of postage must be specially referred to the Postmaster General for his decision, with the letter or packet on which the return is claimed.

Undelivered and Dead Letters.—All letters remaining undelivered in the post office on the first of each month, excepting drop letters and such letters as are daily called for, are advertised in a list posted at the office door for the information of the public.

If a newspaper is published in the neighborhood, the Postmaster is, at the discretion of the Postmaster General, directed to insert this list therein, provided the proprietor will give it insertion at the author's rate.

Parties applying at an office for advertised letters should always ask for them as such.

Letters and papers after remaining undelivered in an office for two months are sent to the Dead Letter office, as also are all letters refused by the person to whom they are addressed, or letters addressed to persons deceased.

Letters are opened in the Dead Letter office in order that they may, when necessary, be returned to the writers; but no Postmaster is at liberty to return a letter to the writer direct. All undelivered correspondence must be sent to the Dead Letter office.

Registration.—By the pre-payment of the following fee, in addition to the ordinary postage, letters and parcels can be registered at the office at which posted:

On letters addressed to any place in Canada or the other British North American Provinces	2 cents.
On letters addressed to any place in the United States.....	5 "
On letters addressed to any place in the United Kingdom	8 "
On books addressed to any place in the United Kingdom	8 "
On parcels to any part of the Dominion.....	5 "

The registration fees on letters to British colonies and foreign countries will be found in the tables.

Every letter or parcel containing value should be marked for registration and presented to the Postmaster or his clerk, and a receipt obtained therefor. On no account should it be dropped into a letter box.

When letters are registered, both the postage and the registration fee must in all cases be pre-paid.

Books, periodicals, newspapers, circulars, and other printed

matter cannot be registered (except books addressed to the United Kingdom) unless pre-paid the full letter rates, in addition to the ordinary registration fee.

Registered letters and packets can only be delivered to the parties to whom they are addressed or to their order; and a receipt must be given on the delivery of each registered letter in a book kept by every Postmaster for that purpose.

It should be clearly understood that the post office is not responsible for the safe delivery of a registered letter or parcel.

The registration simply makes its transmission more secure, by rendering it practicable to trace it, when passing from one place to another in Canada, from its receipt to its delivery; and when addressed from any place in Canada to any place in the United States, the United Kingdom, or parts abroad, if not to its delivery, at least to the frontier or port of despatch.

Postage Stamps.—Every Postmaster is required to have on hand a sufficient stock of postage stamps, and to sell them to the public at $\frac{1}{2}$ cent, 1 cent, 3 cents, 6 cents, and 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents, each.

The Department has discontinued the supply of stamped envelopes.

Under the authority of the Postmaster General, postage stamps are sold to certain dealers in the principal cities to retail again to the public, but no person other than a Postmaster, can sell postage stamps unless duly licensed to do so by the Postmaster General under a penalty of \$40 for each offence.

Pre-payment of letters should, in all cases where practicable, be made by postage stamps.

A mutilated stamp, or a stamp cut in half, is not recognised in pre-payment of postage.

A medalion stamp cannot be accepted in pre-payment of postage separate from the envelope of which it may have formed a part.

No British stamps, or stamps of a foreign country, can be received in pre-payment of postage in Canada.

In affixing the stamp to the letter, wet slightly the corner of the envelope and the gummed side of the stamp, and gently press the stamp until it is firmly fixed. Stamps should be placed on the front or address side of the letter, and on the right hand upper corner.

Letters cannot be pre-paid partly in stamps and partly in money; the postage must be pre-paid either wholly in stamps or wholly in money.

If the stamps affixed to a letter addressed to any place in British North America be not adequate to the proper postage, the letter is rated with an amount equal to the deficiency; the whole postage being calculated at the *unpaid rate*, e. g. a single letter pre-paid 1 cent would be rated 4 cents additional; a double letter pre-paid 5 cents only would be rated 5 cents additional.

Letters addressed to the United States, on which stamps are affixed representing less than the amount of postage to which the letters are liable, are rated with full unpaid postage.

Postage stamps are received at all post offices in payment of postage on unpaid letters delivered therefrom.

Postage Rates on certain Miscellaneous Matter passing within the Province of Canada, or to and from the United States.

1. Packages of seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, and scions, or grafts, may be posted in Canada for delivery within the Province or to an address within the United States, on pre-payment by postage stamps of a rate of 1 cent per ounce; and when received from the United States to any place in Canada, such packages may be delivered on payment by the person addressed, of a like rate.

2. The limit of weight for such packages will be one pound. No communication, whether written or printed, must be enclosed in them; and they must be so put up as to be easy of examination, for the purpose of verifying the alleged contents. If put up in bags bag must be simply tied at the neck, so as to admit of inspection; and in the case of such package, mailed in Canada, the nature of the contents, such as "seeds," "roots," &c., as the case may be, must be marked on the package by the sender, as a statement of the same to pass at the reduced rate above mentioned.

3. Book manuscript, and printers' proof sheets (whether corrected or not) maps, prints, drawings, engravings, photographs, when not on glass, or in cases containing glass, and sheet music (whether printed or written), may pass in covers open at the end or sides, and provided that no letter

or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter, be enclosed therein, on pre-payment, when posted in Canada, by postage stamp of the ordinary printed matter rate of 1 cent per ounce; or upon payment of that rate on delivery of such matter when received in the mails from the United States.

Transmission of Patterns of Merchandise and Samples between Canada and the United Kingdom, and certain other countries.

4. Patterns of merchandise and samples may be forwarded between Canada and the United Kingdom, and Denmark, France, Italy, Belgium, and the German States by the Canadian packet mails, at book-post rates, and subject to the following conditions:

A. The patterns or samples must not be of any intrinsic value; and this rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and whatever may have a value of its own, apart from its mere use as a pattern; nor must the quantity of any material or articles sent as a pattern or sample be so great that it could have on this ground an intrinsic value.

On this point an explanation in a subsequent Department Order, appears as follows:

B. It has hitherto formed part of the Imperial post office regulations that "samples or patterns must not be of intrinsic value," but in consequence of the difficulty that has been experienced in determining what is, and what is not, a pattern or sample of merchandise of intrinsic value, this prohibition has been removed.

The modification is a verbal one, and will not alter nor enlarge in any way, the character of the transmission permitted to pass by pattern post.

The special prohibition as to intrinsic value has, it is understood, been withdrawn, not because the question of value will not still influence a decision as to whether an article offered for transmission by pattern post is a genuine commercial sample (or pattern) or not, but because as a general proviso it could not well be enforced; inasmuch as every article, whether properly a pattern or sample or not, has necessarily more or less of an intrinsic value, and might be held to be amenable to a strict construction of this prohibitory clause in the regulation.

C. The patterns, &c., must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and such like, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material, simply tied at the neck; or, provided that bags be transparent, they may be entirely closed, if they are for delivery within the United Kingdom. Bags, however, entirely closed, even though they be transparent, must not be used for the transmission of seeds to foreign parts.

D. The rule which prohibited the transmission through the post, as patterns, of articles of cutlery, &c., has been rescinded; and scissors, knives, razors, forks, steel pens, nails, keys, watch machinery, metal tubing, pieces of metal or ore, and such like articles, are now allowed to be forwarded by the post as samples, provided they be packed and guarded in so secure a manner as to afford complete protection to the contents of the mail bags, and to the persons of the officers of the post office. Such articles, however, must be so packed that they may be easily examined; and it is made a rule that any packet containing such articles, which may be found to be insufficiently guarded, shall not be forwarded through the post.

A packet of patterns or samples sent to France or Portugal must not exceed 18 inches in length, 12 inches in width or depth; a packet to any other place abroad must not exceed 24 inches in length or 12 inches in breadth or depth.

None of the articles named in the rule D. may be sent as patterns or samples to any place abroad, except Germany,

N. B.—The Currency amount to be added for any broken sum between the pounds Sterling, viz., from £1 to £3, will of course be taken from the scale above. Thus for an Order of £3 18s. 11. Sterling: £3 is \$14.60; and for 18s. 11d., \$4.60, which will give the full value of the Order, viz., \$19.20.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS.

The Postmaster-General will receive at any of the Post Office Savings Banks, deposits paid to the postmasters by persons wishing to place their money in the Government Savings Banks.

2. The direct security of the Dominion is given by the Statute for all deposits made.

3. At each Post Office Savings Bank, the Savings Bank regulations may be read by the public, giving full information with respect to the mode of depositing and withdrawing money, and these regulations are printed on the cover of the pass-book supplied to each depositor.

4. Any person may have a deposit account, and deposits will be received daily, during the ordinary hours of post office business, of any number of dollars, from \$1 up to \$300, the total amount which can be received from a depositor in any one year, except in cases to be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General.

5. The postmasters of the offices named will act as agents for the receipt of the money deposited for transmission to the Postmaster-General, and for the payment by the Postmaster-General of money withdrawn by depositors.

6. Each depositor will be supplied with a pass-book, and the sums paid in, or withdrawn, will be entered therein by the postmaster receiving or paying the same. In addition, a direct receipt for each amount paid in will be sent to the depositor from the Postmaster-General, and the Postmaster-General will issue a cheque payable at any Post Office Savings Bank desired, for any sum withdrawn.

7. Every depositor's account will thus be kept with the Postmaster-General, and a depositor may pay into his or her account with the Post Office Savings Bank, at any of the Savings Bank Post Offices which at the time may best suit his convenience, and may exercise the same choice in drawing out money, subject only to the obligation of producing the pass-book, in proof of identity—whenever paying in or drawing out money.

8. Interest at the rate of 4 per cent per annum will be allowed on deposits lying in the ordinary deposit accounts, but when a depositor has \$100 deposited he or she may request the Postmaster-General to transfer this sum to a special account, and will then receive certificate of such special \$100 deposit bearing interest at 5 per cent per annum.

9. Postmasters are forbidden by law to disclose the name of any depositor, or the amount of any sum deposited or withdrawn.

10. No charge will be made to depositors on paying in or drawing out money, nor for postage on communication with the Postmaster-General in relation thereto.

11. The Postmaster-General will be always ready to receive and attend to all applications, complaints, or other communications addressed to him by depositors or others, relative to Post Office Savings Bank matters.

12. A List of the Post Office Savings Banks in Canada, may be seen by the public at any Post Office in Canada.

BILL STAMPS.

Bill stamps—Are distributed for sale very generally throughout the Post Offices in the Provinces; these stamps are of various values from 1 cent upwards. Bill Stamps cannot be used in pre-payment of postage.

Law Stamps—Are also for sale at the principal Post Offices in Lower Canada.

General regulations—Postmasters and certain other officers of the department are exempt from serving on juries or inquests. This exemption applies to mail carriers, but not to assistants appointed and paid by postmasters.

Postmasters are not authorized to give credit for postage, if they do so it is entirely at their own risk.

A letter once posted becomes the property of the person to whom it is addressed, and must be forwarded according to its direction. On no application, however urgent, can it be delivered back to the writer, or to any other person.

A letter addressed to a firm may be delivered to any member of the firm. If addressed to several persons, it may be delivered to any one of them.

A letter delivered to the wrong person in consequence of his name being the same as that of the person for whom the letter is really intended, should be at once returned to the postmaster from whom received, the party writing on the cover "opened by me through mistake," and signing his name thereto.

Letters posted without any direction, or addressed so imperfectly that they cannot be forwarded to their intended destinations, and also unpaid or insufficiently paid letters addressed to countries to which letters cannot be sent without the postage is pre-paid, are returned to the writers through the Dead Letter office.

No information can be given respecting letters which pass through a post office except to the person to whom they are addressed.

Parties desiring their letters and papers to be re-directed should send an intimation to that effect, in writing, to the postmaster of the office from which letters and papers are to be re-directed.

Postmasters are allowed to re-direct letters to the known places of residence of the parties to whom they are addressed, after allowing a reasonable time to elapse without their being called for.

Letters and papers are not subject to any additional charge when re-directed from one post office in Canada to another post office in Canada.

Postmasters are instructed not to receive any letter or packet which there is good reason to believe contains glass or anything likely to injure the contents of the mail bag or the person of any officer of the post office.

The transmission of indecent photographs or prints, and immoral books, papers or publications through the Post is strictly prohibited, and all packets containing such articles should be stopped and sent to the Postmaster-General.

A postmaster is not legally bound to furnish change; but may require that the exact amount of postage on any letter or packet be tendered to him in current coin, or in Canada postage stamps.

Postmasters and their assistants, in the above matter, as well as in all their official intercourse with the public, are expected to afford every accommodation, and to treat every person having business at their offices with the utmost courtesy.

Letters cannot be delivered at any intermediate office en route, but must be conveyed to the office to which they are addressed.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN POSTAGE TABLE—VIA ENGLAND.

TABLE showing the amount of Postage to be collected in the Dominion of Canada, upon Letters, Newspapers, and Book Packets, forwarded by Canadian Mail Steamers,—to the United Kingdom, and, through the United Kingdom, to the undermentioned Colonies and Foreign Countries.

Mem. 1.—In all cases the postage must be prepaid. Letters for the United Kingdom, if posted unpaid or insufficiently paid, will be forwarded,—but they will be charged on delivery with the amount of deficient postage, and a fine of threepence stig.

2.—No Book Packet addressed to Portugal, Madeira, the Azores, or Cape de Verds must exceed 1 lb. in weight; the weight of a Book Packet for Russia or Poland is limited to 8 oz.; the weight of any Packet of Patterns for Germany or Belgium is limited to 8 oz.; the weight of a Book Packet for Greece is limited to 3 lbs.—no such Packet for Greece must exceed 2 ft. in length or 1 ft. in width or depth.

3.—Letters may be registered to all places, except those the names of which are followed by the letters *n r*, indicating that no registration can be effected.

4.—The Registration Fee on letters addressed to the United Kingdom is 8 cents each. In all other cases the registration fee is 15 cents, from Canada to the place of destination; except in those cases where an asterisk is prefixed, when a registration fee of 8 cents each letter, and a postage of 4 cents per ½ oz. must be collected, to which must be added double the ordinary rate of postage as given in this table.

5.—Upon Letters, Newspapers, and Book Packets forwarded through the United States the following additional rates must be collected, viz., 1 cent per half ounce for Letters, 2 cents each for Newspapers, and 2 cents per four ounces for Book Packets.

6.—On Book Packets not exceeding one ounce in weight, addressed to the United Kingdom, the postage is 2 cents; on Book Packets weighing more than 1 ounce, the progressive rates of postage will be found in the table below.

Newspapers.—Addressed to the United Kingdom must be pre-paid at the ordinary commuted rate, if from office of publication, and 2 cents each if *transit*,—but will be liable to an additional rate of 2 cents (1d. stg.) each on delivery. Newspapers addressed to British Colonies and Foreign Countries are not forwarded by the above Steamers.

On Book Packets and Packets of Patterns and Samples addressed to the United Kingdom, 9 cents per four ounces, which must be pre-paid. Book Packets and Packets of Patterns and Samples addressed to British Colonies and Foreign Countries are not forwarded by the above Steamers.

The Registration Fees are the same as by Canadian Steamers in Table No. 1.




