





But, sad to say, this beautiful city of Nineveh was very wicked. The people there did not love nor mind God. Indeed, they loved only their own wicked ways.


God saw all this and it grieved him. He spoke to his prophet Jonah and said: "Arise and go to the city of Nineveh. Bid the people repent."

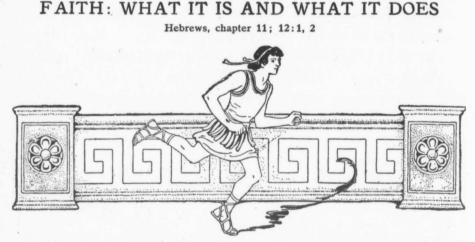


