

> "Mr. Taylor, my son George and myself, started Monday to spend a few days in the woods after game. We drove out to Green Point road, about twenty miles from this city. We went to Alex. Hood's barn, about from Fredericton to St. Andrews, and put up for the night. We had secured the ser vices of Ephriam Chassie and Peter Myshrall, as guides. Tuesday morning, just before starting for the woods, Mr. Taylor said hat he would give five pounds for a deer. I had my gun with me. George did not have any. Mr. Taylor had a double-barrelled breach loader and Peter had a muzzle loader. We all started out the road and crossed the Yoho stream, I handing my gun over to Chassie. He took and started down towards the lake and was to return at one o'clock. Peter and Taylor went to the right in the direction of some dead water and I remained on the road. Presently Taylor came back, and I asked him where Peter was, and he replied that he had gone to look for deer. We then walked down the road towards a clump of trees. The Important art of Raising Sheep for Profit—How it is Done in England. The best time to buy sheep is in late ummer or fall. It will soon be in order o couple sheep, and as early lambs add argely to the profit the management of sheep in the fall is as important as during any other season. The ram should be pure bred and procured from a flock where the sheep are thrifty. All ewes that are not robust, or which show the least evidence of unsoundness, should be discarded. By careful selection and bringing the ewes into the winter in good condition they will have no difficulty in withstanding the cold and their lambs will be strong and thrifty in the early portion of the year. Dogs can be kept from sheep by a judicious use of barbed wire, the lower strand being on the ground, or buried two of man," he fled precipitately into the inches beneath the surface, and the next strand four inches above the lower one. 
