## Portia's Fishery News.

Capt. Fitzpatrick's report as to the fishery west is, that beginning at Bonne Bay 14 schooners belonging to that place had arrived from the Straits fishery, and the best fished of the fleet has 200 qtls, while the generality of the craft are reported clean and do not certainly average 50 qtls. The lobster fishery is all over and the catch is all being shipped away, mostly to St. John's. There is a good deal of fish at Rose Blanche and the fishermen are doing well, but bait is very scarce. Three Gloucester bankers were there when the Portia was coming down, waiting for bait. They were the Romance, Mabel B. Hynes and Smuggler, and they had done well with the fish. There were also three bankers at Burgeo waiting for squid. On that coast from Cape Ray down the fishermen are getting more fish than they usually secure at this season of the year. At Lamaline and St. Lawrence they are doing nothing. About St. Mary's Bay and at Cape St. Mary's, Cape Race and Cape Pine it is fair, but almost a blank along the Southern Shore.


