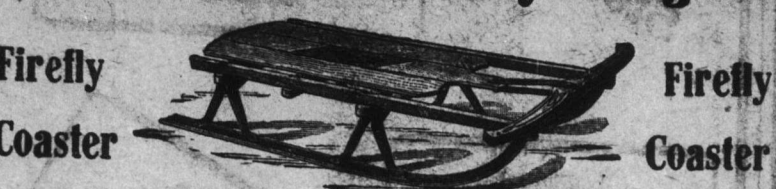

In New Zealand there is now a noxious weed act, which imposes fines up to \$100 on any person who knowingly sow, sell or offer for sale any noxious seeds. All grass seeds must, before sowing, be thoroughly dressed by means of seed cleaning machines or other sufficient processes for the purpose of removing all noxious seeds. All farmers are required under penalty of fines to clean thoroughly any threshing machines, clover dressers or chaff cutters immediately after being used. After these machines have been swept the second dressing ridges must be removed and cleaned, the screen opened, the slide below the grain elevator taken out and all rubbish removed.

THE CABINET.



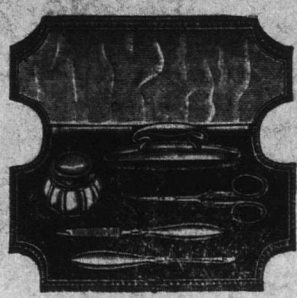
The president's cabinet is an assembly of well-meaning citizens who carry about a load of care and the electoral vote of several states. The cabinet's duty is to read the president's messages in the original, unadorned, unadorned manuscript without crude comments about the spelling and punctuation. Nothing will lose a cabinet officer his job quicker than a delicate intimation that the president's orthography needs a fresh coat of thought. Cabinet officers are always chosen on account of their acquaintance with the best literary style and the leading politicians of the doubtful states, and sometimes they are able to dispense with the former. The cabinet is the mouthpiece of the president, and as such is very useful in great crises, such as quelling an insurgent uprising or assuring Wall Street that nobody intends to confiscate its hard-earned savings. Whenever this happens, the ceremony of introduction to the president has to be gone through with at the next cabinet meeting. Cabinet officers draw \$12,500 a year and so many six-course dinners that they have to lunch or colomel between meals. They work in perfect harmony until some member is requested to resign in order to allay irritation in some close state. A cabinet officer is always consulted about federal appointments in his own state when he is loyal to the administration and the two senators are in Europe. As this seldom happens at the same time, the cabinet is freed from the vulgarizing influences of the spoils system and doesn't have to give the parlor bedroom to any politician on earth.

A Self-Sacrifice.

To give up a life of luxury and pleasure and to become a nurse in one of Dr. Wilfred Grenfell's hospitals in Labrador, is the plan of Miss Amelia Forbes, daughter of Mrs. J. Malcolm Forbes, of Boston. At present Miss Forbes is training for her chosen profession in the Waltham Home for Nurses, and when she completes her course she is to start for the north and begin her duties among the Eskimos, Indians and fishermen. Miss Forbes first became interested in the work being done in Labrador while attending a lecture by Dr. Grenfell, and she volunteered her services.

Store Blown Down.

In the big storm of two weeks ago considerable damage was done about Belleoram and neighbourhood. At Belleoram the big new fish store owned by E. J. Burdock was blown down and will cost a large amount to erect it. Several flakes and stages were also blown away.

Going Home For Christmas.

Men have already started to leave Bell Island to spend the Christmas holidays with their friends and for the next couple of weeks there will be a regular exodus from that place. Most of the men belong to Conception and Trinity Bays. After about the 20th of the month work in the mines of both companies will close down until after the New Year when the miners will return and resume operations.

Big Herring Shipments

Since the herring fishery began this season at Bonne Bay 26 cargoes have been forwarded to the American and Canadian markets both from Bonne Bay and Bay of Islands or in all a total of 286,000 barrels. Quite a number of vessels are loading or will soon load at these places, and the season is likely to be a record one.

LARGELY ATTENDED FUNERAL.—Yesterday afternoon the funeral of the late Mrs. Thos. Keating took place and was attended by a large number of citizens. The remains were enclosed in a handsome casket and the deceased was interred at Bevidere Cemetery.

OBITUARY.

MR. NICHOLAS WADDEN.

The death occurred at his residence, New Gower Street, at 2 o'clock this morning, of one of the most venerable and respected citizens in the person of Mr. Nicholas Wadden, shoemaker. Mr. Wadden was probably the oldest man residing within the city limits having at his death reached the patriarchal age of 95 years. He was also possibly the oldest of his race in Newfoundland. Mr. Wadden was a native of New Ross, County Wexford, Ireland, and after coming to Newfoundland and serving his apprenticeship he opened a book and shoe business on Water Street, opposite Tessier's premises, and though the property was destroyed in the 9th of June fire of 1846, it was re-built, and Mr. Wadden until a few years ago carried on a prosperous business there. Mr. Wadden was a man of fine physique and was well known and liberal; he was noted for his affability and genial disposition and was a man of integrity and honour in all his dealings. In his earlier years Mr. Wadden was a prominent member of the B. I. S. and took a deep interest in its affairs. Being enterprising and industrious Mr. Wadden made a splendid competence for himself and acquired much property in the city. Five sons and a number of grand and great-grandchildren survive him and to them the Telegram extends its sympathy.

Darrow's Arrest Now Hinted At.

Chief Counsel for McNamara Denies All Knowledge of Alleged Jury Bribing.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 30.—Thanksgiving Day brings a day of respite to those engaged in the attempt to bring the Times dynamite conspiracy case to trial. Bert H. Franklin, chief of the special investigators employed by counsel for McNamara, was arraigned yesterday on a charge of bribery of a venireman, with Henry T. Gage, former Minister of Portugal, as counsel. He pronounced the effort to have an immediate preliminary hearing to be a political plot, and threatened to leave the case. "He obtained an extension of two days, instead of ten, for which he asked. Gage is said to have been paid a retainer of \$10,000 to defend Franklin, the money coming from the McNamara defence fund. The lawyers engaged in defending McNamara stoutly deny all connection with the Franklin bribery case. There are rumors, however, that the arrest of Clarence Darrow, chief counsel for the defence, is contemplated by District Attorney Fredericks.

It develops that the arrest of Franklin was brought about through the agency of Priscilla Hitchcock, a stenographer in Frederick's office, and a student of criminology.

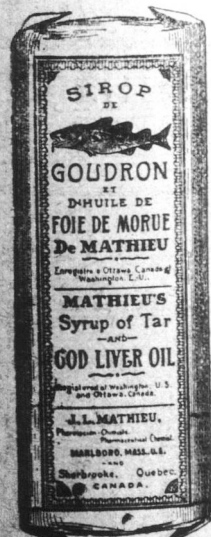

St. Joseph's Mo., Dec. 2.—At a meeting of the Central Labor Council of St. Joseph's, representing nearly all the labor unions of the trade, resolutions were adopted unanimously demanding the death penalty for the McNamara. Indignation is at a high pitch among the union men on account of the affair.

BOYS WARNED.—Boys are warned not to go on the ice of the ponds near the city yet. It is not fit to bear.

Two Boston Women Killed When Speeding Auto Skidded and Overturned.

Boston, Nov. 30.—While chasing another automobile in which a newly married couple were endeavoring to escape the usual post-nuptial greetings, the pursuing automobile skidded at a sharp turn in the Roxbury district to-day, causing the death of two persons and cuts and bruises to two more.

The car was owned and driven by John J. Gormley, of Jamaica Plain, whose brother, James A., had just been married, and the couple had eluded their friendly pursuers momentarily following the wedding breakfast, and had started off in their automobiles before their absence was noticed. The chase was then taken up in another machine. The pursuing automobile was coming around the corner of Crawford Street and Walnut Avenue at a rapid rate when it skidded in the mud and was overturned. Gormley was thrown clear of the automobile and was unhurt.

Miss Galvin and Miss Gaffey were pinned beneath the car. The former was instantly killed, while Miss Gaffey died several hours later at the City Hospital, where she and her brother had been taken. Miss Milley was able to go to her home.

HAD HIS REVENGE.—An old resident of Hunt's Lane, Hoytestown, who was pelted with snow balls by some of the boys working at the Soap Factory yesterday, took revenge in a peculiar manner. He went into the factory and taking three boxes of soap, brought them outside, broke them open and scattered the soap around the street in front of the door.

Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Dec. 8.

Lord Curzon, in the House of Lords, raised the Persian question, inquiring the Government's policy. He asked for the papers referring to Russia's first ultimatum, with regard to which Britain had advised Persia to comply. He thought that advice was unpalatable but wise. With regard to the second ultimatum, there was evidence that the American Treasurer-General, Mr. Shuster, had shown an unfortunate lack of acquaintance with diplomatic usage and language, but Lord Curzon wanted to know if Shuster's action was really an excuse for armed occupation on the part of Russia. The Government, he said, could not wash their hands of all responsibility for the second ultimatum. He foresaw that administrative partition would inevitably proceed to political partition, and therefore to a geographical one.

Lord Morley said that the troubles in Persia arose not out of any Anglo-Russian agreement, but from the very nature of the experiment which is being tried in Persia. With regard to Shuster, he agreed with Curzon, that the Treasurer-General had certainly shown want of tact. He had ignored the position, and the indisputable claims of Russia and Britain. Russia's object, he said, was the establishment of normal and stable relations with Persia, and the removal of all elements of discord. Russia intended to make further proposals to that end, though she did not aim at a violation of Persia's integrity or independence. Russia assured us categorically, said Morley, that such measures as had been taken were purely provisional. Regarding the indemnity, he hoped that Russia, after the crisis had passed, would find her way out of the difficulty. Britain, he said, had informed Russia that it would be impossible, under any circumstances, to recognize the deposed Shah. Concluding, Morley said, that there was good reason to hope that we should soon see a solution of the problem, which was now so full of difficulties, but was not altogether hopeless.

Lord Morley's statement in the House of Lords to-day, concerning Persian affairs, is regarded as easing the crisis in that country. It is assumed that Russia's further proposals, of the nature of which Morley gave no hint, would modify the last ultimatum. This ultimatum was described to-day by Lord Curzon as harsh, peremptory and precipitate. Sir Edward Grey will make a further statement with regard to Persian affairs, in the House of Commons next week.

Special to Evening Telegram. BUFFALO, Dec. 8.

The jury in the States Court to-night returned a verdict of guilty in the case of the Government against the Standard Oil Company for accepting rebates from the New York Central and Pennsylvania Railroads on shipments of oil from Olean, N.Y., and Burlington, Vermont, in 1904 and 1905. The railroads have been convicted and fined for giving rebates. There are 143 counts in the indictment, upon which the Standard Oil Company has been convicted, each of which is punishable by a fine of \$20,000. An appeal will be taken.

Special Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.

The battleship Maine was blown up in Havana harbour by an explosion from the outside. This the first statement, issued by the Navy Department to-day, based on the findings of the Joint Army and Navy Board, which has spent several months investigating the wreck.

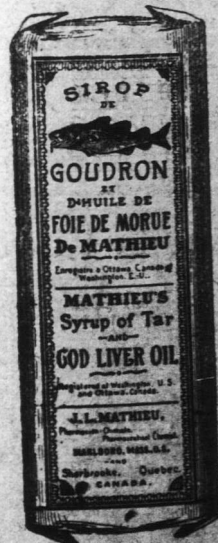

8000 Manchus Slain.

Special to Evening Telegram. PEKIN, To-day. The first direct unexpurgated news from Sian Fu, since the recent outbreak there, was brought here by messenger yesterday. It consists of letters to the British and the American legations and the Director of Posts. The letters say that 8,000 Manchus were slain by the Chinese there, and that there was much looting, several mission houses in the Province being destroyed, and eight foreigners and some children being killed, four of the dead being Americans. The telegram received at Shanghai from Hankang says General Chang Hsu, the commander of the Imperial troops who with his force escaped from that city, when the revolutionists captured it, annihilated a band of revolutionists, who attempted to bar the retreat at a spot 100 miles at the Tien Tsin, Pei Kai railway, further north from the scene of the fight. The revolutionists reported the blowing up of bridges by dynamite.

The destroyer struck a rock near Nobe in a hurricane and foundered. Forty-six of the crew were drowned. Fifteen reached the shore by swimming.

HAGUE, To-day.
The International Opium Conference passed the resolutions proposed by the British delegates that every government frame effective laws and regulations for the control of the production and distribution of raw opium, and that the governments represented at the Conference shall restrict the number of localities in which the importation of raw opium shall be permitted.

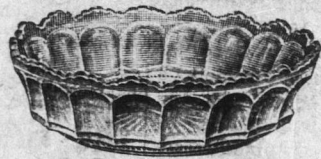

This year will be a record in Bonne Bay as far as the herring fishery is concerned. There is also good fishing at Bay of Islands and the fishermen are doing good work. They have been getting \$1.50 per barrel. From Bonne Bay about 20 salt of vessels have come to Gloucester, with cargoes. A fleet of vessels are also now on their way from Gloucester and Bonport for cargoes.

Council Meeting

Mayor and full Board present at last night's meeting.
A letter received from the Colonial Secretary was to the effect that the Government had taken into consideration the disputed question of the building lot on Duckworth Street, west of Dryer's block.
A letter was received from Government Engineer Hall re the laying of pipes on Quill Vidi Road. He advised that as the City Council refused to adopt his plan that the Government lay the pipes in their own premises.

Albert Salter, for the Nrd. Curring Association, asked for a better water supply at the Rink. The Secretary will write him saying that he can get a half inch pipe, and that if a larger is required he will have to pay higher rates.
R. R. Wood's application for a remittance of taxes on his house which is part of the College and should be covered by the taxes paid on the College. He believed that educational institutions did not pay rates. An enquiry will be made.

The request of the Imperial Tobacco Co. to lay a water pipe from their factory to the main pipe on Bond St. in order to have a good supply of water in the event of a fire breaking out, was granted provided the Company do the work at their own expense.
Steer Brothers wrote to say that they would claim damages of the Council if the old schooner Poppy, moored near their wharf, should do any injury to their premises. The Secretary informed the Council that he had written Mr. English, Harbor Master, who replied that the schooner belonged to Mr. E. W. Roberts, and as the Council had undertaken to attend to the coves they should communicate with Mr. Roberts. Advice of N. Bradbury, one of the sweeping staff, who has been ill for some time will be put on the pension list. Jas. Ready who has applied for the vacancy will have his application considered by the Sanitary Committee.

Mr. Clapp, owner of the shed on vacant land, will be written to about its removal. Mr. Ryan, plumber, who keeps his stock there sent in a note to the Council asking that he be not turned out of it till the spring as he would suffer much inconvenience. Councillor Mullaly said that they should deal with Mr. Clapp and not with his tenant. He will be written to to have the shed taken down by May 1st, 1912.

Mrs. Rose will be allowed to erect house on Flower Hill.
Solicitor reported that Council were not liable to J. Power, Nagle's Hill, for damages caused to his horse by falling into a hole at Cathedral Street, neither should they pay damages to J. Rideout whose horse fell through the ground at Bates' Hill.
The Mayor will bring up the proposal of paving Duckworth and New Gower Streets. He intends to visit Halifax soon and will get all the information that he can on street paving. The street car track from Holloway Street to the East End Fire Hall will, he thinks, have to be taken up and graded anew before the work can be undertaken. Mayor Ellis spoke about the opening of the contemplated road from Carter's Hill to Barter's Hill. The Premier had promised that the Government would assist in the work. Engineer will be asked to report the cost.

Councillor Mullaly deferred his motion on "Bill Posting on city walls" till next meeting. He asked that statement of the amount of taxes collected the past year through lawyers be handed in.
Engineer will be asked to report on the complaint made by Mr. Whitten, South Side, through Councillor Ryan, viz., that a fence erected there lately has so narrowed a lane that in case of fire there would be great damage to the property.
The motion of Councillor Myrick to have the way of Park main increased to \$9 in winter months; the Finance Committee will see to it.
Councillor Mullaly spoke about the throwing of sand and salt in Harvey & Co.'s cove making it hard on horses. An enquiry will be made.
The Engineer's report was read. After passing the pay rolls, etc., the meeting adjourned.
