

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, March 19.

Judgment was given to-day by the King's Bench division for Attorney General Isaacs and Postmaster General Samuel, against the French newstion with the recent contract made be-tween the British Government and the Marconi Wireless Company. The enewspaper was ordered to pay all costs. The Matin had imputed gross corruption to the two members of the British Cabinet in connection with alleged deals in wireless shares, but the newspaper had already with-drawn all its allegations and apolo-gized before the suit came on. Both Cabinet ministers went on the witness stand and repudiated any connection with the market side of the Marconi contract, swearing they had never bought or sold a share in the Company concerned in the contract with the British Post Office. Isaacs, however, admitted he had made transactions in the American Marconi Company shares, six weeks after the tender for the Post Office contract had been made public. He explained that the American Company had nothing to do with the profits of the British Company, and said he had bought ten thousand American Company's shares at a premium, and had sold one thous-and of them to Lloyd George and another one thousand to the Master of Elibank, who were great personal friends of his. He had sold another fifteen hundred shares, but the result of the transaction had been a financial loss to himself, to Lloyd George, and to the Master of Elibank.

LONDON, March 19. The Conscript question is ought out to-day at the Kendal Pariamentary division, whose Conservaive candidate, Colonel Weston, naking the chief plank of his platcompulsory military service. Col. Weston's supporters call his proposals an unlimited form of National service. His opponent's cry is "No conscription." "Strengthen our home defenses, the territorials are fifty thousand short," and "Britain expects every man to do his duty," are two of Col. Weston's placards. His Liberal opponent, Mr. Somerville, responds with "Keep our lads home; vote for Somerville." Somerville's daughter has been singing at campaign meetings topical songs, the refrain of one of which runs, "We soon will take your boys for soldiers." Britain is supposed to be watching the Kendal contest with the keenest attention, particularly according to those papers which advocate some form of compulsory military service.

COPENHAGEN, March 19. The late King George of Greece had intended to abdicate the throne and live the quiet life of a retired gentlenan after the conclusion of peace, accerding to a letter from him received ere to-day. The recipient is a high naval officer who was an intimate riend of the murdered ruler. In the letter King George expressed his joy at the success of the Greek armies during the war, and the rapid and efficient re-organization of the Greek defensive forces. He told of his satisfaction at the Nation's display of confidence in the Crown Prince Constantine after his recent achievements. He said that he often had been in-clined to abdicate, but would not do so during the country's unprosperous period; adding that after peace had been restored, and the jubilee of his reign celebrated, he would leave the live in Denmark, but would spend two months every year in Paris. Before settling down, His Majesty wished to make a tour of the world, and particularly desired to see America and visit the Panama Canal.

LONDON, March 19. The announcement that President Wilson and his administration had declined to request American bankers as part of the six Powers group o continue negotiations in the \$125,-00,000 loan to China, has come as a reat surprise to the British Governnent. Secretary Grey, in a reply to question in the Commons, as to the rosition of affairs, said the terms of the loan had the unanimous approval of the six powers interested. This eply had scarcely been in print when he news came of the decision of the American government. It is held that because of the American bankrs dropping out, the loan will fall through. America holds that neither Japan nor Russia has any money to lend, and that Germany at present as nothing to spare for China.

LONDON, March 19. Speaking at a non-political meeting at Sheffield, Sir Robert Radfield said hat he had just returned from a Continental trip, during which he had talked with many people in France and Germany, who were qualified to now, and had found none of them relished the idea of increasing the ength of military service, or of the cription in England would seriously nterfere with industrial progress.

Dear Sir.—Seeing that the Morris party makes such a shout of what they are doing to encourage the development of our mineral wealth, I determined to put the idle boast to the test and needless to say the test just confirmed my impression, that Morris and company are but braggarts, that it is all shout with them and no work. A more empty boast than theirs of promoting mining activity it is hard to imagine. They have done absolutely nothing, and they know it, still they have the effrontery to tell us that Merris has a Progressive Mining Policy. See article 14 of that pamphlet, "How Morris is Making Good." A more flaccid attempt to boost up an argument is hard to conceive.

Even the champion braggadocio McGrath could make nothing but the faintest puff, and that puff is so palpably insipid that common decency might have dictated silence on his part. We can never go back to the condition of the poor of Europe, and he has but little regard or respect for us who could even suggest it.






