The first large object found after a ound weight of gold beads, was the adem. This is a band of burnished old over an inch wide, and large nough to surround the full wig. In front is an inlaid cobra, the Royal uraeus ,and around the band are attached fifteen rosettes, each composed of four flowers and four leaves of openwork inlaid. It is thus of an enirely new pattern, most like that painted on the statue of Nefert. Behind the crown stood up high plumes of gold; at the back and sides streamers of gold descended-the, whole mints-that's crown being over a foot and a half Mighty men are never fussing as they

Some Things Found.

A pectoral of gold inlaid with lazuli and amazon-stone (green felspar) must have belonged to the girlhood of the princess; it has the cartouche of Senusert II., upheld by a kneeling man with palm branches, the emblem of millions of years. It is flanked by a hawk on each side, and is altogether 3 1-4 inches wide. The back is exquisitely engraved in the gold. A second pectoral of similar design was gift in the mature years of the wearer, as it has the cartouche of Amenmhat III., minute beads of gold, con nelian and amazon-stone. A pair of bracelets of the same kind are 1 1-2 inch wide, with plain gold sliders. The

Moreover, we have Stravinsky's own assurance that, as regards the art of composition, only one man has mastered its secret-not Wagner or Bra hms, but Stravinsky himself. Although one may deplore this general spirit of braggadocio, it must not be forgotten that nearly all the great composers of the past have been extremely narrow in their sympathies. Stravinsky, after all, has discovered something entirely new which can be said to belong to him exclusively, and his boast is less objectionable than that of another composer who admitted only Beethoven to his own rank.
