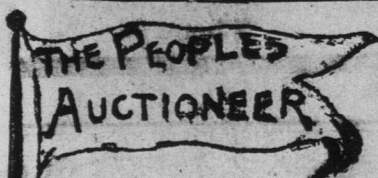

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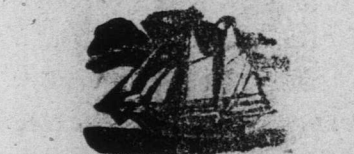

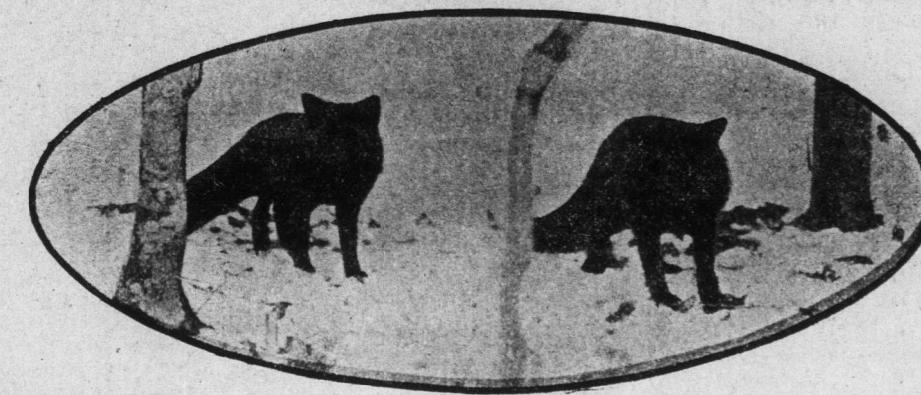

TELLING THE PROCESS FROM ORE TO ORDNANCE

Ironstone, from which is made a greenish silvery limestone in this country comes from Cleveland Hills in Yorkshire.

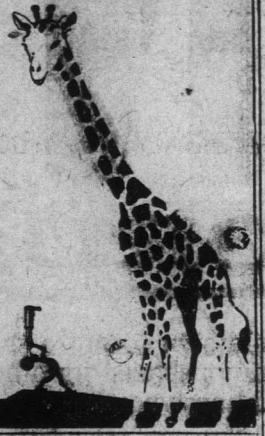

### How Big Guns Are Made.

TELLING THE PROCESS FROM ORE TO ORDNANCE.

Ironstone, from which iron comes, has a greenish silvery lustre. The best in this country comes out of the Cleveland Hills in Yorkshire.

Each truckful, as it is raised from the mine, is weighed and checked; then the truck is pushed into a huge wheel which turns slowly over and empties its contents into a big iron railway wagon waiting below.

Thence to the furnace, and since the furnace depends on fuel, this is usually close to the coal. Also, if possible, near to the sea, for besides ironstone and coal, limestone also is essential to the reduction of the ore.

First, the ironstone is calcined in a kiln, then from the kiln it is swung up in huge lifts to the top of the tall blast furnace which burns unceasingly day and night, year in and year out.

Ironstone, coke and limestone in their appointed proportions are flung into the great "bell" which covers the mouth of the furnace, then the bell is lowered. There is a great gush of super-heated gas, and down go the tons of stuff into the flaming heat below.

Go back to the base of the enormous pile of brickwork, and the first thing you will notice is a steady stream of white-hot liquid pouring from an opening about ten feet above ground level.

But this is not iron, merely "slag"—that is the dross which rises to the top, leaving the heavier iron beneath it. The dross is run away to the slag heap.

#### A CATARACT OF FIRE.

Four times in each twenty-four hours the furnace is "tapped." A hole which has been carefully plugged with fireclay is opened, and the iron glowing with a beautiful rosy light, comes rushing out in a cataract of fire.

Ready to receive it are numbers of little trenches made with river sand. There is a main run in the middle, and smaller ditches called "sows" running off it at right angles. Each "sow" has ten tributaries called "pies," and here the molten iron lies until it cools into "pig iron."

This affront to our national dignity and this contempt for the rights of our citizens demand not only an apology, but satisfaction." The *Tribune* says, "It was a gross violation of neutral

## War News.

### Messages Received Previous to 9 a. m.

#### OFFICIAL.

LONDON, March 12. The Governor, Newfoundland: General French reports the situation between Armentieres and La Bassée materially altered by the success at Neuve Chapelle, where the Fourth and Indian Corps advanced, roughly, three-quarters of a mile on a four thousand yards front, capturing all the hostile positions and trenches and taking over seven hundred prisoners. The enemy's repeated counter-attacks were repulsed with heavy loss. Steady progress and hard fighting continues. This morning further counter-attacks were repulsed and sixty prisoners were taken. The village of Lepinette was captured in a night attack. British aircraft have destroyed the railway junction between Courtrai and Menin.

The French Government reports further appreciable progress in Champagne.

The Russian Government reports extremely obstinate battles between the Niemen and Vistula. In the Carpathians, Austrian units have been annihilated.

#### HARCOURT.

#### GENERAL FRENCH REPORTS.

LONDON, March 12.

General French's semi-weekly report describing the fighting which led to the capture of Neuve Chapelle, is as follows: Since my last communication, the situation on our front between Armentieres and La Bassée has been materially altered by successful initiative on the part of the troops engaged. Shortly after 8 a.m. on March 10th, these troops assaulted and carried German trenches in the neighborhood of Neuve Chapelle. The co-operation between the artillery and all branches of infantry was very good, with the result that the losses incurred were not great in proportion to the result achieved. The mutual support which individual battalions afforded each other during the operations was a marked feature of the attack. Our heavy artillery was very effective. Apart from the foregoing, results, prisoners statements confirm the accuracy of our fire and the damage caused by it. Before noon we captured the whole village of Neuve Chapelle. Our infantry at once proceeded to confirm and extend the local advantage gained. By dusk the whole labyrinth of trenches on the front of 4,000 yards was in our hands. We had established ourselves about 1,200 yards beyond the enemy's advanced trenches. The number of German prisoners captured and brought into headquarters during the day was 750. There are probably more to come in.

During the 11th the enemy made repeated efforts to recover the ground lost. All his counter-attacks were repulsed with heavy losses. We continue to make steady progress, and hard fighting continues. The local initiative displayed by our troops daily is admirable. It says much for the spirit which animates the Army. The success achieved on the 10th and 11th form a striking example.

#### THE BRITISH VOLUNTEERS.

PARIS, March 12.

At least five thousand men were lost by the Germans when they were defeated at Neuve Chapelle by the British on Wednesday, according to a despatch received to-day from St. Omer. This report is corroborated by another despatch to the *Echo de Paris*. Major Civerieux, writing for the *Matin*, declared that the battle was the baptism of fire for Kitchener's army. The British Volunteers, he said, made a historic entry into the firing line, winning the battle.

#### AMERICAN AVIATORS FOR FRANCE.

PARIS, March 12.

The *Journal* announces that Glen H. Curtis and three other American aviators have arrived at Pau to serve with the French Army during the war.

#### HERR VON MULLER RESIGNED.

LONDON, March 12.

A special to the *Daily Express* from the Hague says that Herr Von Muller, the German Minister at the Hague, is leaving his post because of his indiscretion, when talking to a German friend, in saying that Germany made a terrible blunder in attacking Belgium. This statement reached the ears of the Imperial Chancellor, who telegraphed Von Muller to send a denial of the report or his resignation.

That pledge should now be made good. The *Times* says, "unless promptly disavowed, the unwarranted sinking of the *Frye* will add another grave offence to a list already too long." The *World* says, "Germany's own note to the United States of Feb. 18th, leaves Germany without legs to stand on, and makes the act of the Prince Eitel's commander a deed of wanton lawlessness."

#### EXPECTS TO START BOMBARDMENT.

LONDON, March 12.

It is learned through diplomatic sources in London that the Russian Black Sea Fleet is expected to start the bombardment of Bosphorus Port to-day, in co-operation with the allied fleet, which is attempting to force its way to Constantinople through the Dardanelles from the south.

### SAVED BRUSSELS FROM DESTRUCTION.

Monsieur Max, the burgomaster of Brussels, will hold a high place among the heroes when the history of the war is written, for by the exercise of his tact and courage he preserved the peace and beauty of Brussels.

When the Germans entered Brussels as conquerors Monsieur Max insisted upon riding at the head of the ill-ordered procession. Thus he still kept his foremost place, and made it clear, by leading the way, that he was not the captive, but the host, of the intruding guests. Arrived at the Town Hall, he preserved the same unruffled tact.

The general commanding the Germans, served as usual by spies, knew precisely the number of rooms contained in the Town Hall, and announced that, proposing to stay there he should want beds arranged for 300. "See that there are beds in the Town Hall for 301," ordered Monsieur Max, determined at all hazards to stay at his post.

A man of peace, he showed himself more than a match in force and wit for his German colleague. When General von der Goltz put his revolver on the table of the Town Hall the gallant Burgomaster, with a smile, laid by its side his fountain-pen. Yet if the pen became his hand better than the sword, his courage was always resolute.

The German governor, for instance, found it expedient to paste living proclamations on the walls of Brussels. Monsieur Max was not permitted to contradict them in kind. So he made speeches in the public square, and the truth ran swiftly through the streets of the city. Nor did anything that touched the sentiments of the citizens seem of small importance to him.

The people of Brussels had an enthusiastic fancy for pigeons. When the German Governor ordered, the pigeons to be destroyed, Monsieur Max interposed successfully, and gathered them together into one large pen, when their owners might feed and visit them.

Thus by the gentle methods of a peaceful citizen, Monsieur Max saved his fellows from murder and the city from destruction.

Monsieur Max has done something more than protect the city of Brussels against a savage assault. He has set the office of the Burgomaster upon a pedestal of honor.

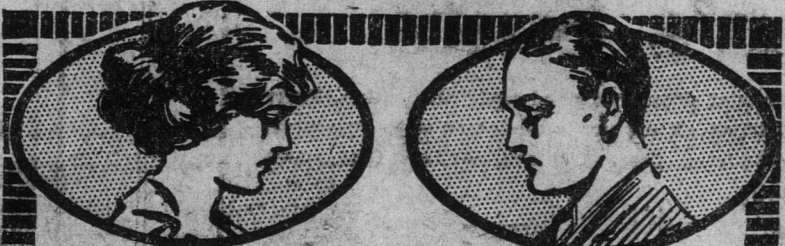

## No War Without Sacks.

THEY ARE GREATLY IN DEMAND AT THE FRONT.

(By a Sack-Maker.)

Besides men, Lord Kitchener wants millions of sacks, and as quickly as he can get them. He will continue to want them, too, for as long as the war lasts.

Since August last, the British Government has ordered nearly 2,000,000 additional sacks for use in the Army and Navy.

No country could go to war without sacks, and the war could not continue for long if the supply of sacks gave out. They are as vital a necessity as powder and shot. Since the war started the Government has forbidden sack-makers to trade with neutral countries through which sacks might be sent to the enemy. Sacks are thus contraband of war.

I cannot say that I have made a fortune out of sacks since the war began, for my profit is on an average about a sixth of a penny on each sack, but my trade is booming, and I have nothing to grumble about. I can sell as many sacks to the Government as I can make; my difficulty is in making them quickly enough.

### Business is Top-Notch.

There are between thirty and forty sack-makers in London, and business is good with all of us. The same is the case in Dundee, the home of the sack and bag trade.

I have said that wars could not be fought without sacks; I think the average person has not the slightest conception of the multitudinous uses of sacks that does not make use of sacks for some purpose or another?

At the front sacks are used for carrying sugar, rice, flour, oats, bran, corn, coal for the field-kitchens—did you know they sent coal to the front?—and for making trenches and defence works.

Proper trenches cannot be made without sand-bags, as they are called, although they are really bags filled with earth, not with sand. Specially-made sacks, about eighteen inches wide by thirty-six inches long, are used for this purpose. Try and imagine the number of "sand-bags" that are now in use at the front.

Provisions and coal for the Navy are sent out to the Grand Fleet in sacks. When the sacks are emptied they are thrown into the sea, so there is a constant demand for sacks in the Navy.

### Kit-Bags, Post-Bags and Bread-Bags.

Then there are kit-bags, post-bags, bread-bags—in each of which 100 loaves are carried from the camp kitchens to the men in the trenches—horses' nose-bags, tarpaulin sack buckets, baths, washing basins, beds. All these are sent to the front, in addition to all manner of sack-coverings, and other things of sacking too numerous to mention.

The sacks that are being supplied now to the Army and Navy are not of such good quality as before, because of lack of the material. They now have to be made of cheaper stuff.

At the time of the Boer War the Government ordered special sacks to be made that would carry 80 lb. of flour, oats, corn and so on. This sized sack is still in use because it has been found that 80 lb. is the most convenient weight for transport and can, if necessary, be carried by Tommy for long distances.

There is one complaint that we British sack-makers have against the Government. That is, that instead of ordering only from British firms (and there are plenty of us), many of the large orders have gone to foreign firms in Britain.

Then, too, they sometimes have a weird way of ordering their sacks, in the Army. Supposing, for instance, that the troops at Salisbury want a certain number of sacks. Instead of ordering them from a sack-maker, the authorities go to a local ironmonger.

The ironmonger has to come to us in the end, and so the Army pays more for its sacks than it need do, and also wastes time.

Apart from the supplies to the Army and Navy, more business is done with the second-hand sacks than with new ones. Hundreds of thousands are bought every year from the Navy Victualling Yard, for instance.

The sack merchant contracts for their left-off good sacks, and then has them shaken and turned inside out. They are then sold again to carry all manner of things—chemicals, manure,

glass-bottles—for I should think that nine trades and professions out of ten buy second-hand sacks.

For instance, the printer of Pearson's Weekly uses them for his yearly tons of waste paper. If you have a spare quarter of an hour try and think of a business that has no use for sacks. I doubt if you will find one.

## Notes on the Patriotic Tour.

### At Harbor Buffett.

**CHAPTER XXII.**  
**L. C. E.**  
Under normal conditions the run from Burin to Placentia is generally accomplished in six or eight hours, but owing to the ice blockade at the time of which we write, our good ship was three days in reaching the latter port. There is usually occupation for travellers on steam ships and so it was on the Glenoce, and the best was done in every way for the comfort of the passengers. Capt. Blandford truly did his best and availed of every opportunity to get his ship along, and displayed great care and judgment and especially so when there was a possibility of her drifting with the ice. To such men as Captains Blandford and English, and our coastal captains generally, there is great praise due, and they deserve all the sympathy of the travelling public. There are so many adverse conditions which arise along our coast during every season of the year, that it requires great watchfulness and keen judgment to make all the sorts of call in safety. Thus for the greater safety of the ship the captain made port at Harbor Buffett, on Sunday, February 7th, and even there the ice was quite thick, and most of the passengers walked ashore. Harbor Buffett is very compact and though not a very large settlement, it has long been prominent in the fisheries of Placentia Bay. In earlier times Messrs. Hann were the leading business people there, and for a long while Mr. Fearn, who is so well known in our Board of Trade, conducted large business interests there; but at present Mr. Wakley is the leading business man. We met Mr. Wakley and partly arranged for a meeting to be held on Monday morning should our steamer not leave port before that time; but the ice conditions having improved our good ship made her departure at midnight.

As many of our readers are aware Rev. Mr. Shorter, of the C. of E., has been stationed at Harbor Buffett for many years, and we were pleased to hear him well spoken of by members of his congregation. We attended his evening service at the church, but did not meet him personally. Before entering the church we visited the cemetery nearby, and among the names of the people who had pioneered the place we noticed those of Dicks, Collett, Hann, Kingwell, and Burton. On one old stone erected to the memory of Christopher Dicks, we saw the following inscription:—  
"An honest man is the noblest work of God."  
And such was he who rests beneath this sod.

We also noticed another stone erected to the memory of the Rev. Mr. Kingwell, who for near half a century ministered to the spiritual wants of the people. There may not be much glory or renown indicated by these plain tombstones, but at the same time they bear the record of good men, who bore the burden and heat of the day, and who, amid many disadvantages did their duty, and did it well. No titles were theirs, but the reckoning time will undoubtedly hear the "well done" of the Master.

During our stay we visited the home of Mr. Ingram, and we very kindly received by his household. Mr. Ingram is of Scotch descent, a nationality not often met with in Placentia Bay. His family formerly came to Burgeo, and afterwards shifted to Harbor Buffett. From Mr. Ingram's premises which is at the eastern side of the Harbour

## War News.

### Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

**ON THE RETIRED LIST.**  
LONDON, March 12.  
A special from The Hague says that the Kaiser has decided to place three Generals—Von Glasenatt, Von Grabow and Von Neohm—on the retired list, because he holds them responsible for the recent German rout on the Niemen. It is said the Generals only obeyed Von Hindenburg's orders, and that he is really responsible for the severe check, but it is impossible now publicly to blame Von Hindenburg, who is the only hope left for the Germans.

### ALLIES NOW READY WITH 3,000,000 MEN.

LONDON, March 12.  
News of advance comes from every part of the Allied lines. The combined Anglo-French-Belgian armies, numbering altogether over 3,000,000 men, are equipped as never before. Even the Belgians, now numbering 1,000,000, have adequate artillery transport. Arrival of enormous stores, ammunition, and large reinforcements, have continued unintermittedly, despite the submarine campaign. Our troops are in the pink of condition, and everything is being done that thought can suggest to perfect preparations. The muddy countryside is still a problem, particularly in Northern Flanders and Upper Alsace. Each day now, however, enables guns to be better moved forward. The Allied advance will have two important results, preventing the Germans from further weakening their western front in order to support Von Hindenburg in the east, making the Germans carefully-prepared counter stroke more difficult. Everyone recognizes that the next few weeks must be enormously costly in lives. Plans have been made to remove all wounded, except very serious or trivial cases, to England at the earliest possible moment. London alone has made provision for tens of thousands of casualties. Our troops are absolutely confident of the result. The Times says that our army was never in better fettle. It is in exceedingly good spirits, despite the long, dreary winter trenches. The Daily News says that the British blow at Neuve Chapelle is a warning to Germany that it is dangerous to transfer forces to the East. The Morning Post says there is no chance of Germany starving. Moreover, Germany considers herself victorious until cleared out of Flanders, France and Poland.

Three prisoners named Skard, Gilham and Francis were brought along by the last night's express to serve six months imprisonment each in H. M. Penitentiary. The first two were convicted by Magistrate Squairey at Channel, for larceny of money and goods. Francis pleaded guilty to receiving the goods knowing them to be stolen.
