



A very offensive odor from the feet, which fails to correct itself with the most scrupulous attention to cleanliness of the body, may be mitigated by rubbing with the following compound: Powdered talcum, 5 ozs.: starch, 1 oz.; salicylic acid, 4 scrup-

Sometimes rubbing the feet with alcohol after the bath will destroy the odor of perspiration and tend to prevent its recurrence.

Don't forget that shoes as well as iose, absorb the moisture from the feet, and therefore air them well after resting and dust them inside with a disinfecting powder.

Church Union Carried By the Presbyterian Assembly 406 to 88.-Minority Proposed to Continue as Usual:

Winnipeg, June 14.-As was generally expected, the Presbyterian Gen. eral Assembly voted to-day to enter into organic union with the Methodist and Congregational churches. The official vote showed that 400

voted for the motion and 88 against. Of the ministers present 222 voted for union, and only 45 against. Of the laymen 184 voted for union and 43 against. The east voted four to onfor union, and the west five to one for union. The number absent or not voting was 117. There was no demon stration of any kind when the final

decision was reached. At the evening service, Rev. Dr. Robert Campbell read a statement recording his dissent from the decision of the Assembly on the Church Union matter, and the dissent of those who signed with him. The dissent stated that the small minority, 45 ministers and 43 elders, regarded themselves now as the true Presbyterian General Assembly, and that they did not regard any of the other ministers or elders as having any right in the Asembly.
