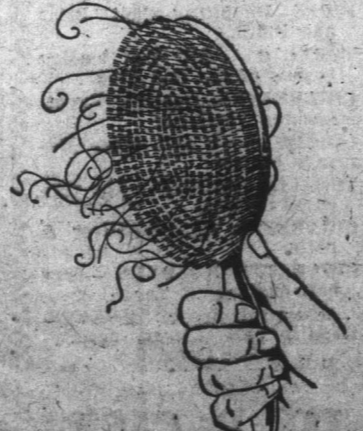

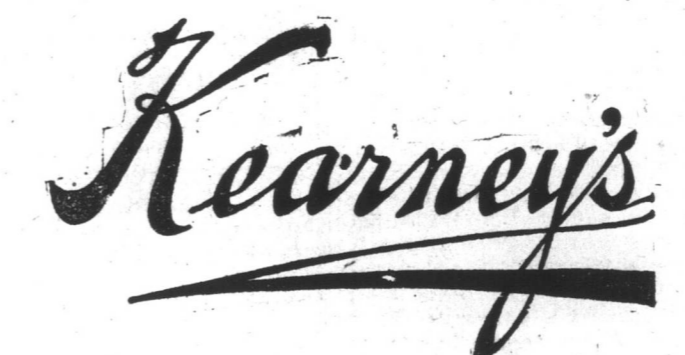

Cause of Northern Lights

From many points in Canada and in the Northern States came reports of brilliant displays of Northern Lights (Aurora Borealis) in August, and again in September. Millions of persons asked the question, what are they? The latest scientific explanation is given by Dr. S. Chapman in a bulletin of the British Institution of Electrical Engineers.

"Magnetic disturbances and aurora," writes Dr. Chapman, "are produced by the injection into the earth's atmosphere of electric corpuscles projected in confined streams from the disturbed regions of the sun. These streams may be emitted in any direction, so far as we know at present; their existence is made known to terrestrial observers only when a stream is projected so that, in the course of the solar rotation, it sweeps over the earth. The streams are often of considerable angular diameter--a. g. 10 degrees or more."

Developed in the streams; and often remains so for hours or even days, notwithstanding that the relative speed of the streams at the distance of the earth enables them to sweep right across the earth in thirty-five seconds. The latter fact explains why magnetic storms, the particularly intense and world-wide disturbances which occur when the earth is enveloped in a dense solar stream, are observed to commence at almost the same instant all over the earth.

Different Forms of Aurora. "There are many different forms of aurora--in particular, arcs, streamers, curtains and corona. But it seems not unlikely that all, or nearly all, these are merely different aspects of aggregations of one elemental unit, the simple streamer or ray. When certain aurora are viewed from a point directly beneath them they are seen to consist of a thin wavy and discontinuous series of vertical streamers. The auroral corona appears to be formed of a rather different arrangement of similar rays.

"This unity of composition" agrees with the evidence of height determination (which show that all types of aurora are situated at approximately the same level) in indicating that there is no essential physical difference between the various forms. The lower limit of height is 100 kilometres above the ground, very nearly, in all cases. "Vegard states that no aurora has been certainly proved to extend downwards below a height of ninety-five kilometres. The great majority lie between 100 and 130 kilometres, and within this range there are two well-

marked levels of maximum frequency of occurrence, corresponding to lower limits of 100 and 106 kilometres.

UNPUBLISHED HISTORY.

Interesting Records of the Royal N.F. Fencible Regiment.

Official Dispatches of Commanding Officers.

The following official letters are taken from photographic copies of the old records of the Newfoundland Regiment of Fencible Infantry which were in the possession of the late B. M. Jackman. They deal mostly with the doings of that regiment whilst on service in Canada in the years 1812-1815, against the United States of America. The photographic copies are now in the custody of Mr. Geo. A. Jackman, H.M.C. The original dispatches are preserved in the military archives of the Canadian Government at Ottawa:

DRUMMER BOYS ENLISTED.
Quebec, 17th March, 1810.
Sir--I have the honor to inform you that during the present month two boys have been enlisted as Drummers in the Royal Newfoundland Regiment, and on a reference to the Military Regulations, I find it inadvisable to enlist boys, without a special permission from the Commander in Chief. I have to solicit the permission of His Excellency to continue them as Drummers, having older drummers whom it would be advisable to transfer to their ranks.

ENQUIRY ABOUT DRUMS.

Where is Mont Blanc?
Mont Blanc, which was reported to have lost its peak by an avalanche some days ago, is generally considered to be Europe's highest mountain, but its claim depends on the exact position of the peak of Mount Elbruz, which dominates the Caucasus, a few miles east of the eastern shore of the Black Sea, and is placed on most maps on the European side of the frontier. Mr. Douglas Freshfield, who ascended Elbruz a few years ago, fixed its height at 18,520 ft. More recently a traveller during a tour of the Caucasus claimed to have seen no fewer than nine other mountains, all in Europe, all higher than Mont Blanc. There can, of course, be no question about Mont Blanc being in Europe, but whether its culminating point is in France or Italy is a matter of dispute between Italian and French geographers. French maps place it wholly in France, but on Italian maps the frontier is carefully drawn so as to divide the top almost equally between the two countries, with the actual summit in Italy. Perhaps the recent avalanche has settled the point beyond dispute.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

AUSTRIA'S DIFFICULTIES.
PARIS, Jan. 14.
Sir William Gordon, a member of the Austrian section of the Reparations Committee, at a luncheon in his honor at the Restaurant Club today, spoke freely on the situation in Austria. Three eventualities must be considered as a consequence of the prospective collapse of Austria, Sir William said. They are, first, an attempt on the part of the Austrian provinces to join Germany; second, the partition of the Austrian provinces among the adjoining States, not excluding Germany; and third, a Communist or Bolshevik reign of terror.

BENEFIT PUGILISTIC BOUT.
NEW YORK, Jan. 14.
In a spectacular bout which was stopped by the referee in the sixth round, at Madison Square Garden tonight, Benny Leonard, world's lightweight champion, scored a technical knockout over Richie Mitchell of Milwaukee, who had previously provided himself a worthy challenger. The bout was the main attraction at the benefit given by the American Commission for Devastated France, and the contest was worthy of the occasion.

NEW SERVICE OPENED.
ST. JOHN, N.B., Jan. 14.
The steamship Manola arrived in port today from Halifax, opening the new service to St. John's, Nfld., which is to be operated by Nagle and Wigmore. Three steamers will be used in this service, but it is uncertain yet just what ships will be employed besides the Manola, as she is the only one definitely assigned to the route as yet. Sailings will be fortnightly, and will be direct from this port to St. John's without any intermediate calls. This is a freight service only and passengers will not be carried.

THE INFERENCE CAN BE DRAWN.
LONDON, Jan. 14.
A dispatch to the Evening Star from Dublin says King's Counsel McGrath, killed by unknown assassins had defended Sinn Fein prisoners at court martial, and as Counsel for the Dublin Corporation at a number of instances on civilians shot by military, he had strongly condemned a section of the Crown Forces.

MILITARY OFFICER KILLS BROKER.
MONTREAL, Jan. 14.
This afternoon, William Holland, aged forty nine, formerly manager of the Montreal Clearing House, and for the last year manager for McDougall Brothers, Stock Brokers of this city, was shot through the heart and died in a few minutes, in the stock broking office of Gordon Strath and Co., into which he had staggered groaning, when shot, by M. Griffith, the attorney, R. M. Griffith, well known in social, military and financial circles here accompanied by his brother, Dr. G. T. Griffith, and his brother-in-law, D. J. J. McGovern, entered headquarters of the police station in this city, gave him a general order for the shooting of Holland. It is conjectured that Griffith, who was known to have sustained heavy losses at the stock exchange in recent months, may have conceived a personal animosity for Holland, and it is stated that the latter had received threatening letters from Griffith.

The Shaft of Death.

Some of the poisons used by Bushmen are so virulent that a scratch from an arrow dipped in one of them means death to man or beast within a few minutes.

The huge "bavian" spider provided one of these. "Caught at a season," writes Lieutenant F. C. Cornell, in "The Glamour of Prospecting," "these venomous insects were pounded between stones, and the resultant paste exposed to the light of the moon for several nights before it was fit for the arrow-tips."

"Another favourite poison was made from the viscid juice of a species of plant. This, too, was prepared with certain rites, and observances in which the moon figured. Both of these poisons were so rapid in effect that the Bushmen, shooting at game with their arrows thus poisoned, made little effort to do more than pierce the animal's skin, or trouble to pursue their quarry, leisurely following the spoor in the certainty that the animal would be found dead at no great distance."

Peculiarly enough, these poisons, though so virulent, had no ill-effect upon the flesh of the animal slain.

For war the favourite poison was obtained from certain portions of a putrefying corpse, and according to Lieutenant Corneille's guide, a man wounded with a war-shaft poisoned with this awful venom died of lock-jaw almost immediately.

A Famous Hoax.

On January 15, 1749, a person advertised that he would on that evening at the Haymarket Theatre, play on a common walking cane the music of every instrument now used, to surprising perfection; that he would, on the stage, get into a tavern quart bottle, and while there sing several songs; that if any spectator should come there marked he would declare who they were. In a private room he would produce the representation of any person dead, with which the person requesting it should converse some minutes as if alive. At the appointed time the house was crowded, among the audience being the Duke of Cumberland, of Colchester fame. The gathering was tolerably patient for a while, but the time arrived and no conjurer, they grew impatient, catcalls and sounding of sticks being heard from the galleries. A person belonging to the theatre appeared and said if there was a failure in the performance, all money would be returned. A wag asked if all present gave double would the conjurer go into a pint bottle? This proved too much for the philosophy of the audience and a general charge was made for the stage. The greater part of the audience made their way out, some leaving a clerk others a hat, others a wig, etc. The mob broke in and tore up the benches, broke to pieces the scenery, pulled down the boxes, in short, dismantled the theatre entirely. An explanation given later was that the conjurer only meant to test the credulity of the public! The theatre management kept the money paid for admission towards defraying the cost of the damage.

Powder Ship Catches Fire.

In 1864, there was moored off the Birkenhead shore the barque "Lotty Bleigh," a vessel of 220 tons, which included in its cargo 840 quarter-kegs of gunpowder, weighing about nine and a half tons. About twenty minutes past seven in the evening of January 15, one of the crew, in filling a paraffin lamp, spilt some of the oil on the floor, which immediately ignited, the flames reaching some hangings in the captain's room, beneath which the powder was stored. Nothing could be done to avert the threatened disaster, and in a few minutes the whole ship was ablaze. The crew had been taken off by a ferry-steamer, when "sudden-

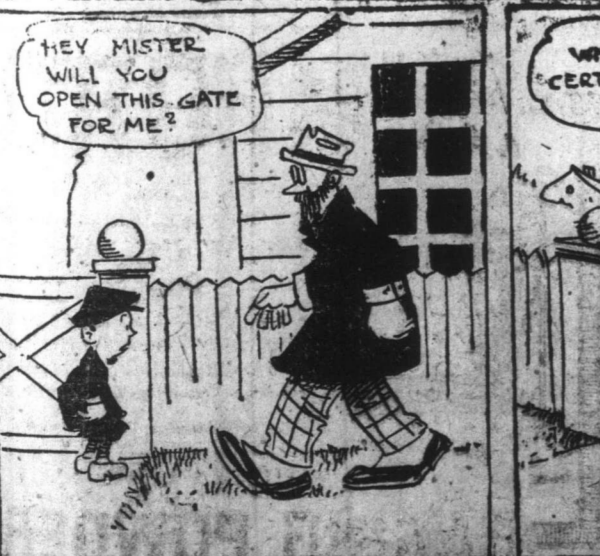
