Dominion's View of Ruhr Question.

(Saturday Night.) Minister of Great Britain, Hon. Stanley Baldwin, has received messages from the Prime Ministers of all the British Overseas Dominions urging direct settlement of Britain's relations with Germany. While the text of Hon W. L. M. King's assurances has not at the time of writing been made known, it is quite certain that it was representative of the more influential order of sentiment in this country. Canadians, as a whole, are opposed to the British Empire's sitting back as the passive spectator of French aggression and felly, especially since that folly involves the sacrifice of the interests of the nations who fought side by side with France to conquer Germany. Premier Poincare has candidly and cynically admitted that he cares not one iota for the interests of any other nation but France, and that if they do not like French policy they can lump it. It was in an entirely different tone that as President of France, he wrote his famous appeal for British assistance to King George in July, 1914. And it is on record that his tone toward Germany was extremly polite at that period, an evidence of statesmanlike qualities. Poincare is evidently the type of public leader who is most valiant when the opposition is weak; and if the assurances of the Dominion executives have no other value they will at least give him an intimation of the world-view of France's policy.

The world-view is pretty well consolidated, but in the Overseas Dominion it is not based on any love of Germany, but rather on a general hatred of war. To Canada policies which make for war and for the perpetuation of those conditions which for half a century have made Europe an armed camp, seem stupid and intolerable. The soldiers of the Dominion were sent overseas with the inspiration of the belief that they were fighting to end war. That belief consoled countless thousands of bereaved parents. Now the people of the Dominions feel that if they were not hoaxed by France they were certainly hoaxed (innocently no doubt) by the friends of France. They discern in the policies of France every qualfty of Prussianism that in thousands of sermons, speeches and editorial articles they were taught to detest. They have no use for any policy or any statesman whose courses do not run toward peace. Moreover Canadians, Australians, New Zealanders and South Africans are not fools. They know the Germans well-better perhaps than they know the French and they have not the remotest belief that France can ever hope to hold the German people in permanent subfection. Hence the conviction that every step that is taken with that end in view, is merely storing up the vials of wrath,-the seed of future



> GERMANY IS CONFISCATING FOR EIGN CURRENCIES TO BE EX-CHANGED FOR PAPER MARKS.

BERLIN, Aug. 28. Compulsory requisitioning of foreign currencies wherever found is provided for in the Governments program of emergency measures which becomes effective immediately. Chancellor Stressemann frankly informed leaders of finance and big businesses that Government would not countenance the slightest attempt to evade provisions. The forthcoming emergency ordinance would deal with all slackers in the most drastic manner. It is not proposed to be content with formal appeal to patriotism. All foreign monies will be gathered in without formality, the owners being reimbursed with paper marks. The funds thus obtained will be devoted in part in the effort to regulate internal financial chaos which is causing unwarranted advance in prices of food commodities and also to establish steady reserve from which food purchased abroad may be made, Government's money draft ordinace provides excessive money fines and confiscation of private fortunes for wilful concealment or possession of foreign currency and demands a voluntary declaration of such possession. The extent to which holdings will be requistioned depends upon whether or not the holder needs them for legitimate business purposes. The Government expects to realize between two and three hundred million gold marks from the initial raid, and expects the impending action will stimulate the desire to invest foreign currency in new internal loan in preference to having them confiscated and replaced with paper marks.

POINCARE'S REPLY SUPPOSED TO PAVE THE WAY TO ANOTHER CONFERENCE.

LONDON, Aug. 28 aiming at in the latest exp France's policy, but in this connection it is pointed out that Premier Baidwin in his recent statement made the assertion that the British Governfurther delay in settling the issue. John R. Clynes, one of the leading Labour Members of Parliament expressed the opinion to-night that taken as a test of France's desire to get reparations settlement, instead of permanent dominion over a large part of German territory, M. Poincare's note was disappointing. The Belgian Government's reply is expected to reach London to-day, and in view of Belgium's previous efforts to reconctle Anglo-French differences, hope is expressed that Belgium's new views may further modify the situation. The morning newspapers commenting on Premier Poincare's note, readily acknowledge and express their appreciation of his courteous and friendly tone. The majority of them however, are disappointed over the substance of the note, and declare that in effect it leaves things just where they

FRENCH PUBLIC APPROVE POIN-CARE'S REPLY TO LORD CUR-

PARIS, Aug. 23. Premier Poincare's reply to Marquis Curzon's Reparation's note seems to suit the French press and strike a popular chord in public opinion. The few members of Parliament in town united in approving the Premie's stand. The part of the note that appealed to political leaders was that in which M. Poincare asked Lord Curzon whether France would be treated by her Allies more severely than Great Britain wanted to treat Germany, their former common enemy. Great stress was laid on the assertion that if British theory prevailed, Germany would emerge from calamity of their own making with no interior debt and foreign debt of only fifty billion marks, with an annual interest charge much less than that France is made to bear. At the same time, it was declared, Germany has profited from the stopage work in the Ruhr, by putting her industries in such shape that when settlement was finally reached she would be able to compete more sharply than ever with those countries which suffered at her hands. Comment in official circles indicated plainly that Premier Poincare anticipates a continuation of the discussion with British Cabinet.
