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The Park-Killer Case.—Some years ago, Mr. Kennedy, formerly of Dundas, but for a few years back of Hamilton, and well known in the patent medicine trade, brought out a medicine which he called "Pain Killer." Lately, Messrs. Perry Davis & Son, of Providence, Rhode Island, applied to the Court of Chancery here for an injunction restraining Kennedy from using a designation which they claimed to be theirs exclusively, and a trade mark. Evidence in the case was taken at the sitting of the court in May last, and early in September, Vice-Chancellor Mowat gave an injunction, which, substantially, seems to be a judgment, in favor of the plaintiffs.
