Town and County News.

LECTURE.—Mr. E. E. Parrott, Agent of
the Grand Lodge of the I. O. of G. T.,

elicited last night at the Council meeting
that the rate of assessment for the pre-
sent year would be 15 cents in the \$,
which would leave a balance as per esti-
mate of a little over \$900.

watchman, has decided to give up his
duties at the end of this week. Mr.
Mitchell has been a very efficient watch-
man, and no doubt he would have been
well supported had he remained, but he
thinks there is no necessity for his ser-
vices now.

BROGUES FOR MANITOBA.—Messrs. J. B.
Armstrong & Co. received an order to-day
for six of their buggies to be shipped to
Mr. Livingstone, formerly of Elora, and
now living in Manitoba. This is the
second shipment Messrs. Armstrong &
Co. have made to that Province, and
there is every prospect that the business
will be greatly extended, as the excel-
lence of our Guelph buggies become better
known.

A singular escape from death
by lightning is recorded in the North
Wellington Times.—A thunderstorm passed
over the Hereward neighborhood in East
Garafraxa on Tuesday afternoon. The
lightning struck Atkinson's Rossin
house, going down a chimney, along
stove-pipes through two rooms, out
through the bottom of the stove, and
through the floor into the cellar. Some
of the stove-pipes were ripped open and
thrown out of the house by the electric
fluid, which shattered the bottom of the
stove and splintered a sleeper, as also a
large elm post on which it rested. Though
there were people in the two rooms
through which the lightning passed in the
stove-pipe, none of them were in-
jured, and the damage to property is very
slight.

RACES.—On Monday afternoon several
impromptu races were got up, and came
off on the race course in presence of quite
a number of spectators, who enjoyed the
afternoon's sport very much. The first
was a trotting race between two horses
belonging to butchers. After a spirited
trot between Woods' "White Rose" and
Deveron's roan mare, which was won by
"White Rose." Next was a running race
between W. West's "Blackbird," John
Banyan's sorrel Kate, Hearn's mare, W.
Wood's "Grey Tom" and John West's
"Old Bob." This was a capital race, and
was keenly contested, "Old Bob" sur-
prised all by coming in ahead. A foot
race next came off between G. Amos and
—Simmons mile heat. It was won by
the latter. Next a foot race between
Burns and Clarke—mile heat—won by
Burns. The last was a foot race—100
yards—between Watson McPhail and a
stranger just out from Hawick. Watson
came in first, and Hawick second.

Rome, June 16.—The Bill for the sup-
pression of religious corporation having
passed the Chamber of Deputies, is now
before the Senate, which has adopted the
first seven clauses.

Fortress Monroe, June 16.—The Nor-
wegian bark "Asto," from Havana for
Havre, arrived in the Roads to-day with
yellow fever on board. One man died on
the passage. The captain and three men
have the fever, but are convalescing.

New York, June 16.—Supposed in-
cendiarism in Mexico and Missouri
yesterday destroyed \$30,000 worth of
property.

The court-house, Green County, Ark.,
with all the records was burned on the
12th inst.

New York, June 17.—A fire is reported
early this morning raging in Westboro',
Mass., and is threatening the whole
town. The fire department of Worcester
has been called on for aid.

The boiler in Queen's glue factory,
Rahway, N. J., exploded yesterday, de-
molishing the factory, and killing Frank
Weiss and fatally injuring two others.

It is stated that the Navy Department
has purchased the British steamer
"Tigris," which will be re-manned by
American officers, and sent in search of
the "Polaris."

New York, June 16.—The last day of
the spring meeting of the Prospect Fair
Grounds Association. First race, run-
ning race, mile heats best 3 in 5. Two
entries, purse \$300. "Boughram's" "Ger-
ald" 1, 1, 1; Thos. Jones' "Bay Billy"
2, 2, 2. Time 1:47, 1:50, 1:57. Sec-
ond race, purse \$1,000, for horses that
never beat 2 1/4 mile heats, best 3 in 5,
in harness. Nine started. Won by J. R.
Phillips' "Jack Draper," who won the
first, third and fourth heats. "Ida Pic-
ton" winning the second heat and sec-
ond place. Time 2:30, 2:27, 2:30 and
2:32 1/2.

Chicago, June 16.—A desperate fight
occurred here this morning at the corner
of Halsted and Erie Streets between
three police officers and some burglars,
which resulted in the shooting and prob-
ably killing of Jack Allen, one of the
most daring and notorious thieves in the
country, and the capture of Jake Boggio
alias Rogers, or one-armed Dave, a
scarcely less noted villain.

Nashville, Tenn., 16.—In Rutherford
County, about three weeks ago, Joe
Woods (colored) ravished a widow and
knocked her on the head with an axe.
The woman died on Saturday night, and
a party of fifty men took him to the
woods and hung him.

Thirty-two interments from cholera
are reported since Saturday, and a large
percentage of those attacked have re-
covered. The deaths are principally of
colored people.

Cincinnati, June 16.—A few cases re-
sembling cholera has appeared within
the past few days. One fatal; no
excitement on the subject.

Breakage.

er "Granite State," of the Northern
Transportation Company, bound up,
broke four gates of lock No. 2, Welland
Canal, this morning.

Navigation will be interrupted for
three or four days, owing to the break.

Royal Arch Chapter No. 40.

Therefore Mr. Massie must have taken it upon himself to change it, and Mr. Massie firmly maintaining that he had not made any unauthorized change. The item which Mr. Elliott objected to was committed to the Committee in a lump sum, and he (Mr. Massie) had authority to obtain and submit the exact figures. Other members of the Committee sustained Mr. Massie in his explanation. Mr. Elliott refused to be satisfied and words ran high. After adopting the report the Committee rose. On motion the report was adopted in Council.

The Council went into Committee of the whole on the fifth report of the Fire and Water Committee. Mr. Chadwick in the chair. Mr. Heffernan moved, seconded by Mr. McLagan, that the first clause be stricken out of the by-law for a clause be inserted granting the prayer of the petitioners and providing for the erection of a lamp on Macdonnell street, in the vicinity of Thorp's hotel.—Cried.

Mr. McLagan moved, seconded by Mr. Robt. Mitchell, that the second clause be stricken out. The mover thought it was better to increase the number of tanks rather than buy new hose.

Mr. Heffernan moved that the clause be adopted, but found no seconder. The motion was declared carried.

The Committee rose and on motion the report as amended was adopted by the Council.

The report of the Market Committee was adopted.

BY-LAWS.

Moved by Mr. Richard Mitchell, seconded by Mr. Chadwick, that leave be granted to introduce a by-law for the levying of a special rate on the lot for watering certain portions of the Market Square and Wyndham Street, and that the same be now read a first and second time.—Carried.

The Clerk read the by-law accordingly. On motion the Council went into Committee of the whole on the by-law for the appointment of a License Inspector in conformity with the statutes. Mr. Coffee in the chair.

Moved by Mr. Chadwick, seconded by Mr. Heffernan, that the name of Nathaniel Croft be inserted in the blank left for that purpose.

It was moved in amendment that the name of Philip Sprague be inserted.

Mr. Chadwick said that he had no special reason for moving that Mr. Croft be appointed other than that the same person could fill both offices for the remainder of the year.

Mr. Howard thought Mr. Croft was incompetent. He knew him to be so, but no complaint had been made against him, and therefore he would support the motion.

Mr. Kennedy said he was grossly negligent and incompetent and he could prove it.

A vote was taken which resulted in a tie when the chairman gave his vote for the motion, and the name of Nathaniel Croft was accordingly inserted.

The first clause was amended so as to include the inspection of all places where liquor was sold or reputed to be sold. The third section was amended so that no reference was made to the old statute.

On motion the blank for the amount of salary was filled up with the sum of \$100, a motion making it \$50 having been withdrawn. A section was added requiring the officer to give security, himself in \$200 and two sureties of \$100 each, for the proper performance of the duties of his office. It was then dated 16th June, 1873, and takes immediate effect.

The Committee then rose and on motion in Council the by-law was numbered 232, read a third time and finally passed.

Mr. McLagan moved, seconded by Mr. Kennedy, previous to the final passage, that the name of Philip Sprague be inserted instead of Nathaniel Croft. Yeas and nays having been called on the motion it was lost by 6 to 4.—Nays—Messrs. Chadwick, Howard, Coffee, Heffernan, Rich. Mitchell, Robt. Mitchell—6. Yeas—Messrs. Kennedy, Elliott, McLagan, Hogg—4.

On motion of Mr. Hogg the Mayor was authorized to issue a proclamation making the 1st of July a public holiday. The Council then adjourned at 11-10 p.m.

Mr. T. N. Gibbs has been appointed Secretary of State for the Provinces, and not Postmaster General, as was stated in Monday's despatches.

The first load of new crop hay has appeared on the London market.

The Great Eastern has paid out 176 miles of the new cable, extending from Valentia Bay Island, Ireland, to Sydney, Cape Breton.

The Governorship question of Nova Scotia is still unsettled. The Dominion Government are liable to be waiting an answer from Mr. Archibald.

A rumor is afloat that additional evidence has been obtained in support of the Huntington charges, consisting of certain telegrams that passed directly between Sir Hugh Allan and a member of the Cabinet.

SOUTH ONTARIO.—The writ for the new election for South Ontario, consequent upon Mr. Gibbs' Cabinet appointment, was received on Saturday. The nomination is appointed for Monday, 23rd inst., and the polling for the 30th inst. A brilliant and ably considered contribution by T. W. Knox, entitled "Russian Policy in Asia." The "Old Stager" continues his interesting recollections. D. B. Castleton contributes a very interesting character-sketch, entitled, "Was it a failure?" and Mrs. Frank McCarthy gives us a very humorous story, "The Rev. Gabriel M'Murray's Conversion." Chas. Reader's story, "The Stimpson," is continued. The poetry of the number is contributed by Bayard Taylor, Kate Putnam Osgood, Mrs. M. D. Brine, Tracy Robinson, Miss Constance F. Woolson, and Miss Fannie R. Robinson. The editorial departments are excellent as usual, including a contribution from Dr. Samuel Osgood for the "Easy Chair," an exhaustive summary of scientific progress, a very complete Historical Record, and an entertaining Editor's Drawer.

A ROYAL VIOLINIST.—The aristocracy of England have recently been greatly shocked by the appearance of Prince Alfred, otherwise known as the Duke of Edinburgh, in the role of a musical amateur. Fiddle and bow in hand he came upon the stage with the other performers, to the astonishment and indignation of the music circle, who, while they consider such conduct scandalous in the Queen's own son, nevertheless admit that he acquitted himself ably.
