

One of the cheapest and at the same time one of the most acceptable modes of beneficence is the supply for a few hours of warmth and shelter to the miserable class of homeless wanderers, says the Pall Mall Gazette of March I. During the prolonged frosts of the present winter great must have been the sufferings of many of those poor wretches, and especially of their women and tender infants. The number of such unfortunates, both in The number of such unfortunates, both in London and Paris, is very considerable, amounting, on the lowest estimate, to many thousands. Any person who cares to explore at night the vicinity of the Thames. Embankment, Covent Garden Markst, the East End docks and other districts of London may soon satisfy himself as to the fact of there being numerous houseless human creatures who exerces the exercise that the exercise the exercise the exercise that the exercise

who, even on the most freezing nights, have no bed but the stones, and no abelter from the piercing wind.

By attendance at certain hours, and by attendance at certain hours, and by attendance at conditions, of course with the stones of these poor wretches might have cained admission into a workhouse or a casual ward, or one of the few night refuges which are supported in London for the relief of this very class. But, from various circumstances and causes, thousands of them do not or cannot avail themselves of the immed amount of shelter afforded by such establish ments. Hence they find themselves with only "the key of the streets" and its consequent discomforts. Nor are these the only people exposed to much suffering in winter nights in great cities. There are many respectable, but very poor, workers and laborers who occasionally have, in the intervals of their work, or while on the lookout for employment, to wait long weary hours in the cold and darkness. To such the boon of any kind of a shelter, with warmth and light, is a most welcome alleviation of their lot. During the past year or two the municipality of Paris, acting under the especial instigation of a benevolent member of that body, Mr. George Berry, has established seven of such night shelters in that city, and more are in course of erection. Mr. Barrow Cadbury of Birming ham has obtained through the Paris agent of his firm (Cadbury Brothers) some official statements courteously furnished by Mr. Berry, which may be suggestive to charitable and philanthropic persons in other large eities.

I. The public warming places, "Chanffoirs publics," of Paris are not erected by private beneficence, but are established and maintained by the municipality.
