THE DEFENCE OF THE EMPIRE

PROPOSED INCREASE OF THE BRIT-ISH ARMY AND NAVY,

2,000 Men to Be Added to the Standing Army-A New Income Tax Schedule-Welsh Disestablishment to Be Passed This Session-Herbert Gladstone Re-Elected Without Opposition.

LONDON, March 16. - In the House of Commons Mr. Robert William Hanbury, Conservative member for Preston, quest ed the Government concerning the alleged theft of drawings of the machinery of Yar-

theft of drawings of the machinery of Yarrow's new torpedo destroyer, the Havock.

Mr. John C. Macdons, Conservative member for Southwark, asked the Government if the United States had replied to the communications of the Foreign Office through Sir Julian Pauncefote, British Ambassador at Washington, in regard to mutual action for the removal of derelicts from the Atlantic Ocean.

Sir Edward Grey, Parliamentary Secretary to the Foreign Office, said a reply had been received from Washington on Jan. 25 to the effect that the United States Government had no particular plan for removing derelicts, but that the American warships destroyed them whenever they found them. The communication added that the United States was prepared to confer with the maritime powers at any time with a view of dealing with the subject by concerted action.

The Question of Armament, Sir Edward Grey, in answer to a question by Sir James Carmichael (Liberal), said the Government would gladly consider any practical proposal looking to an international entente limiting armaments. He feared, however, that in the meantime it would be useless to initiate such reform by modification of the army estimates.





When they are not of this work the extra guards compared as a transfer of the state of the st flats. When they are not on this work the extra guards sometimes serve as turnkeys. Ald. Gowanlock thought that part of this staff might be dispensed with, and Ald. Jolliffe and Frankland were appointed a special committee to wait on the sheriff and ask that the number of turnkeys and guards

The report of Park Commissioner Chambers was adopted without discussion. None Too Many Fire Halis.

The Fire Department was hext taken up, and Ald. Thompson wanted to know ifone of the outer fire stations, such as Roseavenue or Bolton-avenue, could not be disavenue or Bolton-avenue, could not be dispensed with. Chief, Ardagh pointed out that there are hardly enough fire stations now to reach the outskirts of the city in good time to save a burning building, and as the rest of the committee was perfectly satisfied with the report it was adopted. A committee consisting of Ald. Gowanlock and Lamb was appointed to wait on the different underwriters in the city and see if something cannot be done to lower the insurance rate, as they considered that too much money is paid into insurance companies every year.

After the Assessors.

After the Assessors Assessment Commissioner Maughan reported that he could not carry on the work of the department with fewer assistants than he now has. There are 14 assessors

than he now has. There are 14 assessors employed from July, 1 to Sept. 36 every year at a salary of \$562.

Aldermen Gowanlock and Sheppard thought that the work could be done with half the number of men if they started at Jan. I instead of July, and moved accordingly. The motion was allowed to drop, and the matter was left over so as to give Mr. Maughan a chance to consider and report at another meeting whether he could not do with less men. Ald. Gowanlock thought that the assessors' clerks should be dispensed with, as he does not see any reason why the assessor cannot do the work of the clerk himself. The reports of Inspector Awde of the License Department and Curran Morrison, the Police Court clerk, were also received and adopted. The largest part of the business of the committee is yet to be transacted.

WILL THE CONTRACTOR LOSE?

Price For Firemen's Clothing the Same As Last Year—The Making Costs More. The Fire and Light Committee met yesterday afternoon for the purpose of opening tenders for firemen's clothing. Five tenders were received, ranging from \$17.85 per

ders were received, ranging from \$17.55 per suit to \$13.40 per suit.

The tender of McCarthy & Co., who gave their price as \$8 for coats, \$1.60 for vests and \$3.80 for pants, making the price of the suits \$13.40, was accepted. This is the same price as was paid last year, but it was pointed out to the committee that since that contract was awarded the schedule of prices for making clothing has been raised and that it costs a tailor \$6.70 to have a suit made. The committee thought that if Mr. Mc-Carthy was willing to run the risk they were, too, and let the tender stand.

Plans of the John-street Bridge. The plans of the bridge to be erected by The plans of the brldge to be erected by the G.T.R. over the prolongation of Johnstreet have been approved by the City Engineer. The bridge will be of iron and will consist of six spans, two of 140 feet and the remainder 100 feet. The roadway will be 30 feet wide, and there will be a six-foot sidewalk on each side. The C.P.R. also submitted the plans for the bridge to be erected by them at York-street, and these will also be approved, subject to the approval of the G.T.R.

FINANCE AND TRADE.

The trading on the local Stock Exchange was not as active as during the previous week. Prices were somewhat erratic, but the tone generally is firm. Money is un-changed, with call loans ruling at 4½ per cent. on choice collateral, and in Montreal this rate has been shaded to some brokers.

"The trade in wholesale dry goods has been fair during the week," said a representative of John Maddonald & Co., "but the volume was hardly up to last week. The trade since the millinery openings began is hardly up to that of the corresponding period of last year. Stocks in the country are probably smaller, and a good feature is that merchants show an increased disposition to take advantage of cash discounts."

There has been a great falling off in the imports of drygoods at this port in February, the total value being only \$589,412, as against \$806,741 in February of last year.

Wheat closed a little stronger at Chicago yesterday, but the following statistical position, as reported by Bradstreet's, is not very encouraging: "If to the Government report of 114,000,000 bushels of wheat in farmers' hands on March 1 be added 117,000,000 bushels out of tarmers' hands the resulting 231,000,000 bushels will supply feed and seed for four months to come, a reserve on July 1 next of 40,000,000 bushels amonth for export, which is more than will be demanded. 
