Ottawa, May 30.-In the Senate today, Mr. Boulton moved for a return showing the loss to the revenue occasioned by the payment of rebates of customs duties on articles exported. speaking to his motion, he said that the farmers of the Northwest were forced to pay more than they should for their agricultural implements. The Massey-Harris Company, he said, disposed of agricultural machinery in Prussia. Australia, and the Argentine Republic at a lower price than they, charged Canadian farmers, thus contributing to the cheaper production of wheat in these countries, to the deriment of the Canadian farmers.


