SUICIDE WITH STRYCHNINE.

THOMAS JOHNSON ENDS HIS LIFE AT THE NEALSON HOUSE.

Took the Poison in Whisky. Then Asked For Lardnauum—The Man Apparently Not a Stranger in Toronto, But His Friends Unknown—An Inquest To-Day.

Thomas Johnson, an Englishman apparently of about 35 years of age, committed suicide at the Neelson House, King-street east, at 1 o'clock this morning, by taking strychnine.

Johnson, who is a stranger in the city, became a guest at the Neelson House on Monday last, but failed to register. He was introduced to Mr. O'Connor, the proprietor, by one of his boarders, Henry G. Callahan, a clothing salesman.

Last evening Mr. O'Connor was called to Johnson's room, when the latter complained of severe pains, and stated that he was in the habit of taking lardnauum when suffering from such attacks.

Johnson, as seen lying on his bed at the hotel, appeared fully six feet in height, was well built, probably weighing about 170 pounds. He had sandy hair, wore a heavy mustache of the same color. He was slightly bald. He was respectfully clothed in a dark suit. Johnson claimed to have been a reporter on the World, but is unknown at this office.

POISONING WAS SUSPECTED.

Rev. Wm. Torrance's Sudden Death at Paisley—An Inquest Held, but No Post-mortem—A Victim of Apoplexy.

Paisley, Ont., May 21.—Coroner Patterson held an inquest here on the body of Rev. Wm. Torrance, whose sudden death Wednesday has aroused suspicion that he was poisoned.

Evidence was given that deceased had formerly taken morphine to ease sciatic pain, but latterly had taken strychnine for the same purpose. Several medical gentlemen officiated at a funeral the afternoon of his death, and on returning called at the drug store of Mr. D. Bain and partook of a draught of effervescent citrate of magnesia, which was ordered with pineapple.

Eight hours later he died in great agony, with symptoms of strychnine poisoning, such as vomiting, purging and paralysis. Dr. Bain and Kalkbrenner attended him. The former swore he first thought Mr. Torrance's illness was due to a mistake in the draught given, and the latter made a return to the coroner to that effect.

The doctor said the symptoms would indicate poisoning, but it was possible that some other cause had been a drink of ice-water when the body was overheated. His impression was that death was due to belladonna or its alkaloids.

The Greek drama is something which is no longer a novelty, but which is in the hands of the dramatist, and the enthusiasm of the playgoers for whom it was written. RACING IN SULTRY WEATHER

SIX EVENTS DECIDED AT THE N.C. TRACK.

Upwards of 4000 were in attendance at the Hamilton races yesterday. The weather was sultry and the officials showed commendable alacrity in getting through the program at a rapid rate.

Some enterprising Hamilton citizens sold a misleading program to many on the outside, but they were only compelled to buy by their earnest card when they reached the grounds.

The attendance was a fashionable one, and included His Honor the Lieut-Governor, Mrs. Kirkpatrick, Sir Frank Smith and many notables.

Through the fields were small, the "stragglers" being numerous, the racing was pretty good, notwithstanding the heat.

The 2-year-old race had four starters, with Pyramis an odd-thing, as usual at the public supported Seagram's filly, while the talent went down on Kilrona.

Trainer Burgess' charge took the lead at the quarter and was easily.

A most peculiar incident happened in the Wellington Handicap, at a mile and a quarter, and which was not discovered until the race had been decided.

Starter McLaughlin, no doubt forgetting that the track was a mile and a sixteenth, took the horses a quarter of a mile up the stretch, thus making the distance they made 1:51.2.

It was a heavy betting affair between Lord Nelson and Coquette, while Totia was fancied by many, and well supported. Lotus being the outsider.

Had Rover not come to grief, he would have been the favorite, but Charlie Phair, fell at the "double," but Charlie Phair escaped without injury.

Pat Oakley evidently did not like the heat, for he was unable to keep him up through the field.

The Prince of Wales Plate for Canadian 3-year-olds resulted in an easy victory for Bonfield, who won all the way, Kiltie defeating Confectioner for the place.

The last race, at seven furlongs, had 19 starters, with the unreliable Lookout the favorite, while Devise and the Kappa colt were also well backed.
