"As well go to sleep with a burglar sitting in your front hall," Mr. Elihu Root says, "as to talk about the peace and security of a democracy with Germany still competent to pursue its career of domination."

New York Sun: The German people may be accented with shrewd falsehoods about the purposes of the United States. They may be deceived as to the measure of our participation in the war and its probable effort. But not even the most skilful liar in the Prussian service will be able to prove to them when the embargo looks the door of their cupboards, that they are not hungry. All the pride, all the ambition in the world cannot withstand the message that stares from empty plates.

What is Germany's plan for the "next time?" One of her leading authorities has said. "There will be peace shortly, but the war will be resumed in ten years." "That is their idea," commented Mr. Lloyd George, Britain's Prime Minister; "that is the way they talk. They say, 'There are three things we ought to have foreseen. We ought to have had plenty of food stored in Germany. Next time! Then we shall see to it that there is plenty of copper, plenty of cotton. Then we made a mistake about submarines. Instead of having two or three hundred we ought to have two or three

thousand. Next time!" There must be no next time.

The Ontario Municipal Association at its first meeting in Toronto, emphasized and directed to be placed on the statutes of the province an amendment to the public health act whereby the councils of municipalities big and little be placed in control of the appointment or retirement of the medical officer of health. The officers now live, work and have their being without by your leave of the council. An officer these days may be a veritable nonentity, indifferent as to the conditions of the people for whose interests he is appointed, and may do those things which the board of health might prefer he left alone, but there is no help for it. He is under the protection of the provincial board of health and cannot be discharged from office without its consent. The autocratic and alien bit of legislation is recanted by every council and board of health in the province. The municipal association is demanding that the act be so amended that the councils who hire the officer and pay him may at the same time control his appointment.

Women who will Vote

A misunderstanding has arisen in some quarters regarding the position of the female relatives of returned soldiers under the War Time Election Act, says the Toronto News. Some people seem to think that the mothers, wives and sisters of returned and discharged soldiers are not to have the vote. This is an entire mistake. The female suffrage clauses of the Act apply to the relatives of all the officers and men who have been overseas. Not only this! The mothers, wives and sisters of soldiers who have not yet been overseas, but who embark before election day, will also enjoy the privilege of casting ballots. All the women called upon to make the real sacrifices of the war are to have a part in the selection of the incoming Parliament—a Parliament which will in large measure hold in its hands the fate of the men at the front and of the Dominion for which they fight.

What a Tractor will do

Two careful tests were carried out at Holstein, in order to see exactly what a 9-18 gasoline tractor would do. With three gallons of gasoline, the outfit plowed one and one-half acres of fairly heavy clay sod at an average depth of six inches. In the second test a little over one-half acre was plowed on one gallon of gasoline. In spite of the fact that the field is only thirty-five rods long, the acre and one-half was turned over in seventy minutes, and in the second test the one-half acre was plowed in a few seconds over thirty minutes. The whole nine acre field was plowed on nineteen gallons of gasoline in ten and one-half hours.

A snapshot of Mrs. T. S. Scott, Kingsville, has been returned to her under unusual circumstances. It was lost by a member of the 28th Battalion who was wounded last September. A Canadian officer found it in the trenches, and has returned it to Mrs. Scott.

149th Battalion Much Scattered

The following are extracts from a letter written to The Sarnia Canadian by Lieut. Lloyd Lott, now attached to the Royal Flying Corps. He says in part:

"I don't know whether you have heard what they did with the 149th or not, so will endeavor to tell you what I know. When we arrived at Bramshott they absorbed all our men in the 25th Reserve Battalion, and most of them have since been re-drafted to other units. Of the officers, Col. MacVicar is in France with the Imperial Forces; Major Moncrieff, Durnfield, Capt. Wykes-Smith, and Capt. Edwards are also with the Imperials in France. Capt. Knowles is with the R.F.C., Capt. Trainor is with the officers' battalion at Seaford. Lieut. Woodrowe, Swift, Stokes, MacMillan, Fyle, Williams, Scott, are still with the 25th Reserve Battalion, so you see we are pretty well scattered. I spend from two to three days a week up at the War Office and have had a splendid opportunity of seeing the inside working of things, and I sure can say that the old Englishman that we knew in Canada before the war is dead and a new man is in his shoes, for they are certainly making things hum, particularly in the aeroplane work. It is marvellous to see what they have accomplished, and what they expect to accomplish in the next few months. If the U.S. is going to overtake them here in the production of machines they will have to hurry some."

WATFORD

District Meeting and Missionary Conference

The financial district meeting of the Strathroy District met here in the Methodist Church on Tuesday, Sept. 25th. This meeting is composed of all the ministers of the district and lay delegates from each circuit and the attendance was large. The general business, with reference to the educational and missionary anniversaries for the year was attended to and a strong committee have in hand the arrangement of a series of evangelistic campaigns to cover the whole district.

The afternoon session was given up to a missionary conference and the attendance was increased by several delegates from the various circuits. Rev. A. E. Johns, a returned missionary from China, spoke chiefly on the educational aspects of the missionary work there. He illustrated his address with numerous charts which proved to be very effective. Rev. G. N. Hazen, of Sarnia, who represented the missionary committee of the Conference, followed, with a setting forth of facts and figures concerning the missionary work generally and more particularly the givings of the various circuits in this district. A resolution was passed by unanimous standing vote to strive to increase the givings 20 per cent. over last year and thus enable the London Conference to reach its goal of \$115,000 and the Methodist Church as a whole the sum of \$800,000 for this year, which is a general increase of 20 per cent. over last year. The conference was pronounced by all to be most helpful and inspiring.

Importance of Canada's Effort

Ottawa, Sept. 27.—Figures up to August 31st, 1917, show that 431,455 Canadians had enlisted in the Canadian Expeditionary Force. Canada is represented on many fields. From inland transport workers, of whom one thousand are Canadians and who, amongst other things, help to take supply barges up the rivers of the Far East, to aviators flying over the battle fronts, the North Sea and the Mediterranean, of whom upwards of 1,550 are Canadians, this country has contributed an important part of the Allied war effort.

As to the work woman is doing, it is interesting to note that 1,801 Canadian nurses have gone overseas in the Canadian Army Medical Corps service and 314 in Queen Alexandra's Imperial Military Nursing Service. This, of course, is apart from the enormous accomplishments of women's patriotic and social service societies all over the country.

Canada's strength as a belligerent nation is shown rather strikingly in the realm of finance. Whereas Great Britain has loaned millions to a number of Allied nations, she has received from Canada \$100,000,000 more than she has been asked to give.

Canadians returning from abroad report a widespread recognition in other countries of Canada's importance and value to the Allies as the final stages of the war seem to approach.

Waste Not—Want Not

Food waste in war time is a crime. People in Europe are starving for food. Belgium is devastated and the crusts Canada throws away would be picked out of the dirt and eaten by the starving Belgians, Serbs, Poles and other unfortunates of the war zone.

Canada wastes an enormous amount of good food every year. The Food Controller gives \$50,000,000 as a conservative estimate. Expressed in wheat at \$2 a bushel, this would be 25,000,000 bushels, whereas we are asked to save but 12,000,000 this year out of normal consumption. Expressed in meat at say 40 cents a pound it would be 125,000,000 pounds, or enough to supply a Canadian army of 500,000 men for 200 days.

The bones thrown into the garbage pails every day contain the essence of hundreds of plates of soup. The bread thrown there every day is a waste of thousands of loaves. No bone should leave the kitchen until every scrap of marrow has been boiled out of it; no scrap of bread should ever be thrown away. The woman who wastes a crust, wastes the war effort of the farmer, the miller, the storekeeper and the transportation and delivery men. This is a time when every man's work is valuable to the country to supplement the invaluable work of our soldiers. Watch everything. Watch against waste in the kitchen and in the pantry. Watch against waste in the cellar and in the dining-room. As much food is wasted in the eating as in the cooking.

Since the beginning of the war in 1914, out of more than 12,000 British physicians serving with the colors, 195 have been killed, 82 have died of disease during service, and 964 have been wounded.

Grounds for Exemption

Exemption from service under the
military service act may be claimed on
eight separate grounds. The forms of
application, which will be available at
post offices throughout the Dominion in
the course of a few days make this clear.
The grounds are:

1. The importance of continuing em-
ployment in habitual occupation.
2. Importance of continuing employ-
ment as one for which he is specially
qualified.
3. Importance of continuing education
or training.
4. Serious hardships owing to excep-
tional business obligations.
5. Serious hardships owing to excep-
tional domestic position.
6. Ill-health or infirmity.
7. Adherence to religious denomina-
tion of which the articles of faith forbid
combatant service.

The form is drafted much after the
style of a ballot paper. The applicant
for exemption is required to place a cross
opposite the ground on which the claim
is made. His case will then go to the
local tribunal, to which proof in support
will be submitted.



Medical Board will secure for you
freedom from responsibility under the
Military Service Act from any Exem-

will not preclude an appeal for
exemption on any ground.

Medical Board as soon as possible and
find out if you are liable to be selected.

When it is crisp dry I bottle it for cooking. I also do sage leaves in the same way."

Make window boxes for the back windows and in them sow thyme, parsley, radishes, lettuce, carrots and cucumber seed, also some onions. Four such window boxes, if replanted every three weeks, will furnish enough greens to supply a family of three for the summer.

Beautiful Ugliness.
Everybody is familiar with the extreme ugliness of the bulldog's face that makes the animal positively attractive; and everyone who has studied the moths is familiar with the marvelous hideousness or ugliness of the larva of the Anthonomus. The larva is found from Canada to Florida and westward and southward to Texas and Mexico. In the larval stage it feeds on the leaves of almost any tree or shrub.
For ages the enthusiastic lepidopterist has regarded it as a beautiful creature. The dainty green body with lateral stripes of pink and creamy white covered with clusters of branching spines forms an object to be admired—and respected. It should be handled with care or painful consequences may result. Yet it is a curious fact that in spite of all the pains that Nature has taken to protect this beautiful creature from birds and other large enemies, she has left it open to attack from the tiny ichneumonid wasp which drives its sting between the spines and there places a parasitic egg. In this way multitudes of the larvae are destroyed, says Popular Science.

Steel in New Zealand.
A company has recently been formed in New Zealand, with a capital of \$340,000, with the object of producing iron and steel from magnetic and titaniferous iron sand, of which there is a large deposit on the coast at Taranaki, near New Plymouth, where the works are to be erected. The initial plant will be capable of dealing with 70 tons of iron sand weekly, but plans have been drawn up for the installation at a later date of an additional furnace capable of dealing with 200 tons weekly. The production of steel is also contemplated, and it is intended later to form a new company to carry out this development.

A Few Words to the Ladies From the Food Controller

Office of the Food Controller, Ottawa, September 14th, 1917.

To Lady Hendrie, the Members of the Women's Auxiliary of the Organization of Resources Committee and their co-workers throughout Ontario:—

Great Britain and her European Allies look to Canada for food. The King has notified the Canadian Government that "increased supplies are absolutely essential to the defeat of the enemy's services and to a speedy and successful termination of the war."

Lord Rhonda, the British Food Controller, has told the Dominion that Great Britain looks to "The resources of Canada and to the indomitable energy of Canadians for an answer that will shatter Germany's threat of starvation."

There is a world famine of wheat and a world shortage of beef and bacon. These are the commodities most required for overseas. It is to ensure supplies of these foods and other non-perishable and easily storable commodities that every housewife is being asked to sign the Food Pledge. Canada has abundance of other foodstuffs. By reducing domestic consumption of wheat, beef and bacon and by using substitutes the housewives of the Dominion can give vital war service. They will give it once they realize the necessity. All that is asked at present is that they do not use beef and bacon on two days a week or at more than one meal on any other day, that they reduce their consumption of wheat bread by one-quarter and that they use perishable and non-exportable products to the greatest possible extent as substitutes for the staple foods required for export. The appeal to the housewives is contained in the one word substitute. When they realize the great need of the fighting forces and our Allies they will also save every ounce of food possible in order to release more for export. To do this means the complete conservation of our food supplies and the elimination of waste.

To yourself, to the members of your committee and to your co-workers I wish to express my great appreciation of the services you are giving in circulating the Food Service Pledges by a house canvass and thus bringing home directly to the people the imperative need for substituting other foods for those required for export. Your task is an arduous one, but I am confident that the housewives of Ontario will respond splendidly to your war appeal.

Why Not Our County?

Highway Legislation has been considered by all Municipal Corporations more or less for the past twenty years. The Province of Ontario has endeavored to have its Highway Laws made not only Progressive but with an idea of serving the best interests of the people in the Province. To-day Legislation provides for three types of roads. These are called Provincial, County and Township Roads.

The Provincial Highways are those which may be selected by the Province because they connect centres of population or other important terminal points and serve as Trunk Lines in the System of Highways throughout the Province. These roads will be assumed by the Province and 70 per cent of the cost of Construction and Maintenance will be undertaken by the Province. The balance of 30 per cent to be paid by the Municipalities through which they pass.

The Township roads are those which serve largely a local function. These are controlled by the Township Council and their administration is left largely in the hands of pathmasters who disburse statute labor where and how they may deem best. Where a Township employs a Superintendent appointed by By-law giving him charge of the Township Roads the Government will pay 25 per cent of the salary of such Superintendent up to \$150.00 per year for a period of three years.

But it is the County Roads which we wish to discuss.

These roads are the Main or Market Roads in each County and are intended to serve a large percentage of the population of a County. They connect the Towns, they lead to the shipping points, they serve the producers, they link together producer and consumer.

These roads are selected by the County Council and are by-law adopted as a County System. They usually embrace from 10 per cent to 15 per cent of the entire road mileage in the County and support from 75 per cent to 85 per cent of the traffic.

The laws relating to these roads have been changed and amended from time to time until now they apparently meet the needs of the Counties throughout the Province which are entitled to Government assistance under the Highways Improvement Act.

Of the Thirty-seven Counties in the Province which would be entitled to Government assistance no less than thirty-four have passed the necessary By-law, only three Counties are not participating and Lambton is one of the three.

The Government has distributed over \$2,500,000.00 among the Counties which have adopted County Systems.

Some Counties have received from \$150,000.00 to \$200,000.00 each. Our Auto License money is being spent by the Government to improve roads but not in our County. Why? Why hasn't our County been one of the first to benefit. Surely our Roads are not what they might be. Again we ask Why?

ARMY NEEDS MISUNDERSTOOD

Popular Misconception as to C. E. F. are Being Cleared Up

Ottawa, Sept. 26—Serious misunderstandings with regard to the Military Service Act are being cleared up as a result of the educational campaign now being conducted by the Military Service Council. This non-partisan body is now established here and its activities cover the Dominion from coast to coast.

It has been found out that the majority of people have an idea that men selected for service under the Military Service Act would be paid at the rate of a few cents a day, this being part of the popular conception of "conscription." As a matter of fact, of course, selected men

will receive exactly the same pay as those who have volunteered, with all the incidental benefits from the various funds. Again there was an idea wide-spread that all the men who have gone overseas are fighting troops, ready to enter the trenches at a moment's notice. This idea was at the root of much honest disapproval of the Military Service Act, which was held to be unnecessary. As a matter of fact, again, there are a hundred and one different and essential branches of the service behind the lines for which men are constantly needed. Besides, only men in the highest physical condition are permitted to go to the front line trenches. To understand this actual situation is to appreciate that the existence of the considerable number of men in reserve may not mean—and in this case, does not mean—the existence of adequate reinforcements fit and ready to join particular units when urgently needed to save the military situation.

Death of Mr. Thomas Hillis

The death occurred on Sunday, September 2nd, 1917, of Thomas Hillis, an old and respected resident of this district, after a lingering illness, at the age of 87 years.

Deceased was born in the town of Monaghan, County of Monaghan, Ireland, in the year 1830, and came to Western Ontario in 1844, where he resided, following the occupation of farmer, until 1907, when he came to Holland, Man., where he lived for three years, coming to Macklin in April, 1910. At the age of 80 years he homesteaded the southwest quarter of 17-39-28, now the property of John P. Davy. He was a member of the Anglican Church. His wife pre-deceased him seventeen years ago, also one son, William, of Regina, and one daughter, Martha.

The surviving sons and daughters are: Mrs. R. J. Anderson, of Conquest, Sask.; Mrs. Foster Corestine, Elstow, Sask.; Mrs. Chas. Edwards, Watford, and Miss Sara, at home, Robert of Holland, Man., and John, James and Alex. of Macklin. The funeral service was held at the residence of James Hillis, burial taking place in Macklin cemetery.

Mr. Thomas Hillis was an early pioneer of Brooke township, having spent most of his life since coming to Canada in 1844 on lot 14, con. 14, Brooke. He was married to Jane McClure, daughter of James McClure, also of Brooke, in 1871, who pre-deceased him seventeen years ago. In 1907 Mr. Hillis with a number of his children went West to Manitoba, moving farther

west in 1910 to Macklin, Sask., as there were greater opportunities awaiting the farmer in the newer country. Here Mr. Hillis and his sons, John, James and Alex., homesteaded, while Robert stayed in Manitoba buying grain for The Lake of the Woods, which position he still holds. Mr. Hillis is the last of a very long-lived family, the earliest death occurring at the age of 81 years. All Mr. Hillis' children were present at the funeral except Mrs. Charles Edwards, of Brooke.

Watford Fair Next Wednesday
