The Hydro Commission has informed the Town of Essex that the net surplus for the town system was \$9,979.43 in addit-ion to a provision for depreciation of \$785. The actual cost of power was \$1923.42 less than the amount of the interim bills, which is stand-ing to the town's credit on the books. Petrolia Con realizes Meet, with Represente 6 From Through-out the Riding

Petrolia 'nril 17.-Preliminary work toward the organization of the riding of East Lambton for the Liberal-Conservative party in the coming Federal election was undertaken at a well-attended and enthusiastic meet-ing held here this evening at which W. S. Haney, M.L.A., and Joseph Armstrong, ex-M.P., for the riding were the principal speakers. There was every indication that the nomination for the riding would again be tendered to Mr. Armstrong by the party.


E. Preston was returned as president of the association, and the other officers elected were: Honorary president, J.E. Armstrong, ex-M.P.; hon-orary vice-presidents: W. S. Haney, M.L.A., R. V. Lesueur, M.P., West Lambton; vice president, G. G. Moncrieff; second vice president, Mrs. A. Kerr; third vice president, Miss Elizabeth Thompson; secretary, Her third vice president, Miss bert Prior; assistants, James H Gay and Wallace H. Reid; treasurer, J. J. Mathews; chainmen of divisions: No. 1, R. G. R. MacKenzie; No. 2, John Hext; No. 2A, S. Pollard; No. 3, J. Landon; No. 4. Thomas Rose; No. 5, Herbert Prior; No. 6, William Fletcher; No. 7, George Finlayson; No. 8, Thomas McMahon. The list of division secretaries was not completed. MR. HANEY:

Mr. Haney congratulated the asso ciation on its past successes and out lined for the meeting the main issues at the provincial session just closed which he termed a most disagreeable one in view of the disclosures of conditions under the Drury regime. He pointed out that East Lambton farmers in 1921 voted Progressive, but said that now they had realized the mistake.

The downfall of the Progressives was the means of the Conservatives being placed in power by an overwhelming majority, the speaker said. Regarding J. E. Armstrong, the speaker referred to his energy for the riding as a member of the Federal House and declared that men of his type were needed to rescue Canada from the conditions into which it had been cast by the King Government. Mr. Armstrong, he said, was the man who was needed by the Conservative Association as their candidate. The provincial member explained

the O.T.A. amendments, which he declared were the only means of providing temperance and at the same time abolishing bootlegging and moon shine, and saving the youth of the province from strong liquor. No solution, he admitted, could effectively heal at once the trouble caused by the O.T.A. but the Government was certain that the amendments would achieve final success despite the views of W.E. Raney. He did not know when the 4.4 per cent. beer would be placed on sale, but he could say that it was not intoxicating and that it would prove a palatable beverage. Referring to the redistribution, the speaker pointed out that the Town-ship of Enniskillen, including the towns of Petrolia and Oil Springs and Dawn Township, had been transferr-ed to East Lambton. He expressed regret at losing Petrolia and Oil Springs from his riding, but stated that the change would provide more towns in question, he still had Point Edward, he said. In closing, the speaker scored the King Government for its attitude of favoritism to the United Staets. MR. ARMSTRONG. Mr. Armstrong was warmly greet ed by the audience when he arose to speak. He pointed out in his opening remarks that indications pointed to a federal contest shortly, and he pointed out that it behooved the association to prepare for the election. The ex-member mentioned the harm which had been done to Petrolia's industry, the Oil Well Supply Company, which was practically be-ing forced out of business by the most recent action of the Government on tariffs. The oil bounty removal, he stated, spoiled all hope of the oil pro-ducers in the district. Low foodstuffs. tariff had hampered the erection of the Peninsular Sugar Company's re-finery and the operation of the local canning factory. The fruit industry in North Lambton and the tobacco in the Dresden district were barely functioning, while the importation on eggs into the county showed that egg grading was a menace to the farm-ers. Factories in the cities were in-





member Bert Fansher, for his stand on the oil bounty question and then his request asking the Government to remove the duties on refined oil products. This was ruining the large refineries throughout the country.

John Reid, in a brief address, mentioned the boast of Canada of the 450,000 men sent overseas, but failed to take note of the conditions recent-ly which sent 600,000 Canadians to the United States. He declared that the way the present Government was carrying on Canada would soon be nothing but a geographical expres-sion. G. G. Moncrieff and Mrs. J.E. Armstrong also addressed the association briefly.
