



TOPICS CURRENT

ESPITE the large number of new books which publishers placed on the market during October, sales have not been particularly heavy. Booksellers in nearly all parts of the Dominion report business dull. However, this state of affairs is by no means extraordinary. Prior to the Christmas rush, a lull is quite a usual occurrence, and just now we are in the midst of it. The arrival of several new and popular novels

on the market is noticeable, and their sales, we believe, have been fairly good. Louis Tracy's "Wings of the Morning," McCutcheon's "The Sherrods," and John Fox, jr's "Little Shepherd of Kingdom Come" have been widely advertised and seem to have caught the popular taste. "Barlasch of the

Guard," "The One Woman," "Gordon Keith," "Mettle of the Pasture." and "The Grey Cloak" have become settled favorites, and "Lady Rose's Daughter" and "The Virginian" still find purchasers. Morley's "Life of Gladstone" has taken well in Canada, considering its character and its cost. Sir Gilbert Parker's "Quebec" is also doing well on the market.

1)OOKSELLERS have not yet lost all influence over the reading public, nor need they fear for some time to come that their office of counsellor and adviser will be taken away from them. A recent experiment by a New York publishing house proves indisputably that of all the influences which guide a purchaser of books, that of the bookseller is paramount. A new novel Rooksellers' Recommendations was selected and in each copy a postal card

was inserted, on which the future purchaser was requested to set down the influence which led him to buy the book. Twenty-six per cent, of the replies showed that the bookseller's recommendation had been the guiding force; sixteen per cent. were due to the author's previous fame; fourteen per cent. to the recommendation of friends; twelve per cent. to reviews; ten per cent. to advertisements; nine per cent, to appearances; five per cent, to the attraction of the title; three per cent. to colored illustrations, and the remaining five per cent. gave no reasons whatever.

THE war which is in progress between Canadian manufacturers and the transportation companies over the Canadian freight classifications, has received a new complexion so far as manufacturing stationers are concerned, by a recent action of the railway companies. Hitherto a single schedule of rates for the whole year has been in force, covering such stationer's pro-Freight Rutes on Stationery. ducts as blank books, envelopes, etc. Th. it seems, was granted on the condition that the shippers refrain from using the steamboats in Summer. Alleging that the condition had been violated the railways have put in a Winter schedule, which differs considerably from the Summer schedule. So far as can be ascertained, however, but little damage will be done to the manufacturing stationers through this action of the railways. Only such houses as are accustomed to pay freight charges will be affected. It may, for instance, slightly affect some Toronto houses which pay freight charges to Montreal on consignments going east to compete with eastern houses.

ME constant introduction of new lines and novelties of sterling character into the bookseller and stationers' store is good for business. It is all well enough for the public to learn to depend on your store for the staples of your trade. This is essential as a ground work. Over and above this, however, a store which can show Novelties variety, novelty and a constant display of new and up-to-date ideas, holds altogether versus Stuples. a different position in the community. The public learn to turn to such a store for the many and varied requisites of daily life. Incidentally the public will purchase their staple requirements from you at the same time. Book-SELLER AND STATIONER endeavors to keep you posted on all the latest products of the manufacturer's skill and art. New directions for developing business are monthly being hinted at, and there should consequently be little difficulty for our readers to keep well abreast of the times.

THE FLEMING H. REVELL CO. have recently brought out two or three novels of undoubted charm. The first, "The Bondage of Ballinger," by Eugene Field's brother, Roswell Field, is the story of a dear old book lover; the second, "On the Road to Accady," by Mabel Nelson Thurston, is a romance of an outdoor girl, with scene laid on the hills near Washington; and a good third is Margaret E. Sangster's "Eleanor Lee," which requires no further recommendation than its author's name.

Two striking figures in the religious life of England today are Hugh Black and W. J. Dawson. Works by both men are being published in this country by The Fleming H.

A clever story entitled "In Music's Thrall," by Lilla Nense, a Canadian lady, is announced for early issue by William Briggs.

Miss Laut has made a further essay into the early history of the West, in a work entitled "Pathfinders of the West." Among the great explorers whose adventures are described are Radisson and Groscillers, the organizers of the Hudson's Bay Company; the Verendryes, father and son, the first traders to push their way clear across the continent to the Rockies; Heavise and Mackenzie, the great fur trade explorers of the north, and Lewis and Clark.

the first white men to make official exploration from the Missouri to the Pacific.

"Our Own and Other Worlds," is the title of a popular work on astronomy from the pen of Rev. Joseph Hamilton, D.D., of Mimico, shortly to be published by William Briggs.

Mrs. Ballington-Booth's book, "After Prison-What?", has a unique interest. It is a plea for the boys of the prison and is the result of seven years' experience among convicts. Revell Company.

Many thousands will be interested in the news that Mr. F. Hopkinson Smith has at last given to the public some further details in the career of the celebrated Colonel Carter of Carterville. The new story, the title of which is "Colonel Carter's Christmas," will be published early in November. (The Copp, Clark Co).

A Puritan edition of "The Pilgrim's Progress," is to be published by The Fleming H. Revell Co. The text is the most accurate obtainable, and the illustrations are striking.

A temperance story, entitled, "The Old Orchard," by a clergyman who uses the pen-name of "Mack Cloie," is announced for issue during the present month, by William Briggs. The scene is laid in the county of Middlesex, Ontario.

"The Bar Sinister," by Richard Harding Davis, is one of the best dog stories which have been written in recent years. The original of the bull-terrier in the story is known to his intimates as "Kid." He made his first appearance in the show world in 1900 at Toronto. The book is beautifully presented with eight full-page drawings in color and numerous marginal illustrations by E. M. Ashe, tThe Copp. Clark Co.)

"A History of the Central Presbyterian Church, of Galt," prepared by the present incumbent, Rev. J. A. R. Dickson, Ph.D., is being issued by William Briggs. The records cover nearly a half-century, and Dr. Dickson's writing has covered the last twenty-four years.

"Dr. Xavier" is the title of Max Pemberton's new book. The increasing sense of mystery and the perpetual charm that pervade all of Mr. Pemberton's stories are here, if anything, in larger measure. Dr. Xavier, the scientist and magician, is skilfully depicted, while the subordinate personages lend an added air of mystery to a cleverly-written tale. (The Copp. Clark Co.)

A work entitled "The White Chief of the Ottawa," by Mrs. Carr-Harris, wife of Prof. Carr-Harris, of Queen's University, is announced for early issue by William Briggs. It is the story of the settlement on the Ottawa river where now the capital city of the Dominion stands.

A beautiful book of entirely new material by William J. Long will be published this season by The Copp. Clark Co. under the title "A Little Brother to the Bear." Together with this author's earlier books, this volume is destined to become a classic. The book opens with a study of the coon and his amusing ways. Mr. Charles Copeland has made 12 full page and 200 smaller drawings to illustrate the volume.

Bentrice Harraden, the author of "Ships that Pass in the Night." has written a new story, entitled "Katherine Frensham." The hero is a man of 35 who has been thwarted in his life work by the incompatibility of his wife, whose influence follows and rearly wrecks his sensitive nature even after her death. Fortunately for him and his son, a boy of 12, Katherine Prensham comes into their lives and not only brings them into harmony with each other, but with her love rounds out and completes a life that was dangerously near to shipwreck. The Copp. Clark Co. will publish this book early this senson.

"Incomparable Bellnirs" is a sprightly romance by Agnes and Egerton Castle, which will be published this month by The Copp, Clark Co., Limited.

"Over the Border" is the title of Robert Barr's new novel. It is nearly two years since this prince of story tellers has appealed to the public with a novel, and his many admirers will welcome a new romance from his pen. "Over the Border" is not an "historical novel," so called; but it is a dashing story of adventure in the time of Crom well, full of love, fighting, integue, told in Mr. Barr's Lreezy and witty way. It is stated that Mr. Cullum is really one of the best known actors on the London stage. "The Foss River Ranch" is his first book, but it is anticipated that there will be another from his pen next year.

Biction readers look forward every year to Mr. F. Marion Crawford's new novels, and they are not disappointed. One may always predict a good story ably told. "The Heart of Rome," the latest story from Mr. Crawford's pen,

centres in the tradition of huried treasure underneath the immense palace of the ruined Conti, who were one of the most ancient families in Rome. (Copp. Chrk Co. 81.50.)

Prof. L. E. Horning, of Victoria College, is engaged on a bibliography of Canadian fiction which he expects to have ready for the press within a couple of months. Such a work is greatly needed and will be a valuable addition to the equipment of the public school libraries.

"A Checked Love Attan" was one of Mr. Paul Leices ter Ford's last stories. It will be beautifully presented this season by The Copp. Clark Co. with full page illustrations in photogravure and border decorations.

"The Ploughshare and the Sword," by Ernest Hentaun, is a Canadian story of the first French occupation of the country which is now called Quebec. The book will be published early this month by The Copp, Clark Co

BRITISH PUBLISHERS AND CANADA.

By E. J. D.

CONSIDERING the rapid progress, the increasing population, the loyalty, and the general prosperity of Canada, it is surprising that British publishers have not made a more serious attempt to secure a stronger foothold here. Those Canadians who imagine it is because of the lack of enterprise on the part of the publishers of the Old Country, must disillusionize themselves of this idea. The English publishers (especially does this apply to magazine and periodical houses) are as full of enterprise as it is possible to be. It is rather owing to the fact that British publishers have been having such a good time at home that they have thought Canada too small for serious consideration.

That Canada can do with more English literature is certain. Take a look overany bookstall or newsstand in any part of the Dominion, and on every hand United States publications predominate. We do not think Canadians read too much United States literature. The point we wish to emphasize is, that they do not read enough English literature; or, rather, that they do not get the opportunity of doing so. Canadians cannot be expected to make any special effort to find out what English magazines and periodicals will suit them. They know every publication the United States sends in. When the average Canadian wants something to read it is usually one of the popular United States publications that is bought.

During the past fifteen years the writer has watched the progress of the various magazine and periodical houses in England; concerns that were comparatively small affairs fifteen years ago are to-day the leading houses of their class in the world. One of the most important and wealthiest publishing firms in the world has hardly existed for fifteen years.

That there are obstacles in the way of Old Country firms who are desirous of getting for their publications more prominence here is obvious. The greatest of these is that of returning unsold copies. No publisher can get a journal handled by the trade in these days unless he can arrange for the return and credit of unsold copies. The English publishers should be assisted out of this difficulty by the enterprise of the wholesale news dealers.

Surely if United States publications can find a market in South Africa (one of the leading news-dealing concerns in Johannesburg is The Anglo-American News Co.), and English houses find it profitable to open branches in that colony, English houses will find Canada a field worthy of exploitation. Whether or not the present condition of affairs is likely to be changed rests, as far as we are able to judge, entirely with the publishers across the Atlantic. Canada is doubtless a field which they can, if they will, add to their present extensive sphere of influence. There is no doubt whatever that literature has a great power in assisting us in framing views on subjects of great importance. A better knowledge of English literature will do more than politicians can do to enable Canadians to take a greater interest in their fellow-subjects in England and in the affairs of the British Empire.

NEWS FROM TRADE CENTRES



MONTREAL TRADE.

BISINESS in the book and stationery lines in Montreal during the month has been quite satisfactory in comparison with the previous month. The Fall trade is in full swing, and in playing caids, invitation stationery, etc., there is a fairly good movement. Some handsome books have been received this month, among them being Morley's "Life of Gladstone," in three volumes. Considering the comparatively limited demand for biographical works of any sort, the demand for this book in Montreal is quite good, due in a great measure to the personality of the author, as well as to his subject.

"The Faith of Robert Louis Stevenson" is a new book about that most interesting character by John Kelman, Jr. The chapters are under such headings as these: "Religion and the Man," "Actor and Preacher," "The Gift of Vision" and "Sympathy and Appreciation." Lovers of Stevenson's writings usually extend their admiration to the man, judging by the ready sale which all hooks about him receive. "Old Quebec," by Gilbert Parker, is selling well. Kiphing's "The Five Nations," has also been one of the selling brooks of the month.

A very handsome book is "Backgrounds of Literature," by Hamilton Wright Mabie. This is an exceedingly interesting volume, illustrated with five photo engravings of landscapes and scenes made famous by the greatest authors. "The Lake Country and Wordsworth," for instance, forms one chapter. "The Washington Irving Country" is another. "Two Country Walks in Canada," by Arnold Haultain, is a small book, artistically bound and printed. As its title indicates, it is descriptive of Canadian life and scenery under our varied climate.

The Land of the Beather," by Chiford Johnson; "The Martyr Graves of Scotland," by Rev. J. H. Thomson, and "A Literary History of England," by J. H. Millar, are three new Scottish books which are receiving considerable attention from the Montreal public.

Howard Pyle's book, "Rejected of Men," has not sold any too well in Montreal. Two other books from Harper's, "The Relentless City," by C. F. Benson, and "Hesper," by Hamlin Garland, have done a little better.

"The Bamsel and the Sage," by Eleanor Glyn, is doing very well. Another children's book by Laura E. Richard has appeared in time for the Christians trade. It is "More Five Minute Stories," illustrated and printed in large type.

Of Joseph Hocking's "A Flame of Fire," much good is spoken. The paper orbition is in fair demand.

 Λ new magazine, the "Independent Review," is out. It is devoted to advanced theological thought.

ENGLISH BOOK NOTES.

THE leading books of the day in popular fiction on the London market are "Barlasch of the Guard," by H. S. Merriman; "Place and Power," by E. T. Fowler; "The Mettle of the Pasture," by James Lane Allen; and "The Call of the Wild," by Jack London.

Morley's "Life of Gladstone" has enjoyed enormous sales. The publishers aumounce that the demand is unprecedented in the history of political biography.

Miss Beatrice Harraden's new novel, "Katharine Frencham," has just made its appearance. The scenes are hid in England and Norway.

The title of Mr. A. T. Quiller-Couch's new novel is "Hetty Wesley." It was brought out by Harper & Brothers, on the 7th inst.

Methuen & Co., are to publish an English edition of Dumas' novels, some 70 in number. The price is od. per volume in paper and 2s. 6d. in cloth.

The English Bookman for October is a splendid double Shakespearean number, replete with choice illustrations and invaluable to students of the great dramatist.

George Newnes, Limited, will shortly publish in their thin paper classics, Boswell's "Life of Johnson" (2 volumes).

"Through Canada in Harvest Time" is the title of a timely work by Mr. James Lumsden, which was published by T. Fisher Unwin, on October 26.

Blackie & Son, of Edinburgh, are bringing out a Library of Great Novelists. The series includes among others, "Jane Eyre," "The Newcombes," "John Halifax, Gentleman," "Westward Ho," "David Copperfield," and several others.

Cassell & Co. announce pocket editions of Robert Louis Stevenson's "Kidnapped" and "Catriona."

NEW YORK NOTES.

STEWART EDWARD WHITE is at present in New York collaborating with the actor. Robert Edeson, in the dramatization of "Conjuror's House," in which the latter is to appear early in January.

The publication of Henry Harland's new Italian novel, "My Friend Prospero," has been postponed until next Spring. It is expected that it will eclipse the author's first favorite, "The Cardinal's Snuff-Box."

Best selling books in New York at the beginning of the month ranked as follows: "Wings of the Morning," "Mettle of the Pasture," "The Long Night," "Pigs in Clover," "Little Shepherd of Kingdom Come," and "Maids of Paradise."

The Macmillan Co., publishers of Morley's "Gladstone," are said to be contemplating an issue of the work in parts, so great has been the demand for the book.



FINANCE AND INSURANCE

HE dispute over fire insurance rates in Ottawa is likely to reach a satisfactory settlement as a result of the decision of the Canadian Fire I aderwriters' Association, in Montreal, October 9 and 10, when it was decided to remove the surcharge of 25c, under certain conditions. The under writers placed this surcharge on account of the extra bazard in Ottawa from lumber yards and the defective water works system. In consideration of certain improvements the surcharge will be reduced 10c, after December 1, the remainder to be taken off when the big conflagration bazard is entirely removed.

THE branch at Ottawa of the Toronto General Trusts
Corporation is now fairly in the field, and with a strong,
and representative advisory board and Mr. H. W.
Chamberlin as manager, a successful career is predicted for
the new venture in that section. The Toronto General
Trusts Corporation has now a capital and reserve of over
one milhon and a quarter, and with upwards of \$25,000,000
under its care, will be an important factor in the money
loaning business in its new field of operations.

NOTTON companies are doing well. Of course they would do better if they had protection. Canadian Colored Cotton at 40, pays 10 per cent, on the investment. Surely there should be a big chance in buying it with hard ly any risk. One buying Dominion Cotton at 32 should double his money in a year or two. This may seem a long time, but it may be sooner." The above is an extract from a recent interview with Mr. Rudolph Forget, of L. J. Forget & Co., Montreal, one of the most influential brokers and best-known financiers in Canada. Mr. Forget also speaks enthusiastically of the opportunities for investment in Canadian industrial and railway stocks. While it is gratifying to hear Mr. Forget speak so encouragingly, the fact nevertheless remains that the present indications on the stock market do not point to a boom, and the squeez ing to which Canadian investors have been subjected in the last few months has bred more or less distrust in "good things.

NE of the most interesting developments of the month was the proposal for the was the proposal for the re-organization of The Canada Cycle & Motor Co. by cancelling \$3,000,000 common stock and reducing 30,000 preference shares from \$100 to \$20 each, par value. The preference shares were then to be come shares without preference or priority and 5,000 of them were to be retained in the treasury. The discussion of this proposal, which was to have taken place at the annual meeting of the company on the afternoon of Octo her 29, was prevented by the issuance of an injunction at the instance of the executors of the estate of Henry Car gill to prevent a vote being taken on the matter of reducing the capital until Thursday, November 5, and until a motion then to be made to continue the injunction be disposed of At the meeting the situation was explained and an ajournment made for six weeks. The annual statement would have shown a net profit for the year of \$29,344,90.

CANADA PERMANENT MORTGAGE CORPORATION.

HE Canada Permanent Mortgage Corporation, one of the leading Canadian financial institutions, has a paid up capital of \$6,000,000, which is equalled only by that of three of the largest Canadian banks. It has a reserve fund of \$1,600,000, and its invested funds amount to 823,600,000. That the management are justified in taking credit for the virtue of stability is evident from the last statement. Less than \$2,000,000 (not quite eight per cent. of its total investments) represents the corporation's entire interest in bonds and stocks, all of which are assured dividend payers. Of this \$1,505,315 represents advances on stocks and bonds. The company does not itself own any stocks or honds, with the exception of municipal debentures to the extent of \$118,120. The remainder of its assets, amounting to more than \$21,000,000, are made up of mortgages on real estate, cash on hand, and the corporation's office premises. It also issues four per cent, debentures which are a legal investment for trust funds, authorned by act of the Legislature, (a favorite investment of both fire and life assurance companies, for deposit with the The depositors and debenture Canadian Government). holders have an equal first claim on the entire assets of the corporation, including \$7,600,000 of actual paid up capital and surplus. By the terms of its act the Canada Permanent's investments in honds and stocks cannot at any time exceed 75 per cent of its paid up capital. It must, there fore, have the entire amount of its horrowed capital (deposits and debentures) as well as 25 per cent, of its shareholders' capital, invested in mortgages upon real In the selection of the latter there is brought to bear the very best experience available in Canada.

SHRINKAGE OF INVESTMENT SECURITIES.

THE shrinkage of securities which has wrought such havor in financial circles these recent months has been the subject of innumerable editorials, articles and explanations. Exeryone is now ready to explain how it happened, although there is not the same unanimity in deciding on what is to be the outcome.

The explanation which is most popularly received and which has a large groundwork of fact, is over capitalization

Confined to some of the new industrials little fault can be found with this explanation. At the height of the boom, enterprises were launched with a recklessness engendered of the gambling spirit. Capital stock was lieuted only by the receptivity of the investing or rather speculating public. Naturally the reaction cannowith the shrinkage which has been so much deploted, but which, under the circumstances, could not but have come.

Some other explanation, however, must be sought for the shrinkage during the Summer months of railroad securities of established credit, which have suffered, if not altogether so severely, yet almost as generally. It has been suggested that large blocks of these "galt edged" securities were held in reserve by bankers and syndicates who were loaded up with industrials. When the slun, came in the market and the investing public withdrew, the embarrassed bankers and syndicates found themselves called upon to discharge the loans contracted to underwrite and hold the industrial shares. They were compelled, therefore, to realize either on their industrials, which were deprecinted and practically unsalable, or on their investment shares, which were at least salable at a price.

That this explanation has more or less force cannot be denied, but it is not all. Quite aside from the necessities of borrowers there was a further reason for a decline in the fact pointed out in these columns a short time ago, that the returns from investments in these stocks were extremely low, I per cent, indeed, while, at the same time, time loans to corporations in the highest credit placed for a year or more commanded 6 per cent, while merchants and manufacturers in perfectly good standing were borrowing on their notes at an even higher rate.

Capital under these conditions was certain to flow to the quarters where the most profitable investments could be secured. To emphasize this tendency there was a further inducement in the knowledge that other large security issues were about to be offered. For instance, when the Pennsylvania Railroad offered its own shareholders a large block of new shares at 120, their old shares, which had been listed at 157, were rapidly thrown on the market, and sold down to 120 to secure the funds to buy in the new. The fate of the Pennsylvania led to the postponement of other issues that had been contemplated, but the knowledge that their issuance was impending was certainly a factor in increasing the shrinkage.

A further factor that has been given much prominence is the bear element. Bear raids, bear manipulation, pressure by the bears, are phrases constantly in use in the papers. But what is the actual position of the bear in the market? He sells stocks he thinks are going to decline that he may buy them in later at the bottom price, just as the bull buys in stocks he thinks are going to rise in hopes of selling out at a higher figure. Both are incidents rather than causes of market fluctuations, and serve more to intensify and prolong fluctuations which are prinarily due to other causes. In times of panic the bear certainly has a disproportionate influence, but as he must subse quently buy in the stock he has sold short the ultimate tendency of his completed campaign is to restore the equilibrium he has helped to disturb.

MODERN BUSINESS METHODS.

In Will Payne

ONCE called on the comptroller of a very important corporation to find out the amounts of certain pay ments, which had been made to the corporation quarterly during several years by one of its licensees. The comptroller summoned a clerk and directed that the information be given me. The clerk and I retired to the outer office and a season of trouble ensued. There was a more or less vague theory that the payments should appent on the cash book, but the cash book, upon examina tion, failed miserably to support this theory. Some payments were there and some were not. My friend scratched his head, and finally brightened up with the idea that a fellow clerk, who knew all about that particular business, would return to the office next day. I called again the next day and was so fortunate as to get the ear of the expert, but the expert himself went to sea over the lapses of the cash book. The payments had surely been made and there was surely somewhere or other something or other which would disclose them. In the general distress I was invited to try my back the next day. I did so. It was temembered that a statement from the licensee accompanied the payment, and that theoretically these statements were A vault, which from my view outside the filed away. railing seemed to be mostly dust and waste paper heaps, was valiantly explored, and, in the course of time, some rumpled sheets were produced which contained the desired data. So at the cost of much time and soiled linen the information was forthcoming. The same corporation, in one of its many departments, acts as the trustee of funds contributed by hundreds of thousands of persons. long after my experience it was discovered that the trust funds were hopelessly confused. Receipts had been credited and payments charged with a haphazard disregard for accurney which perhaps could not have been matched else where outside of comic opera. The corporation was ac turily compelled to suspend all payments, to the vast disadvantage of its clients, and to pay a firm of expert accountants \$65,000 to write a new set of books.

You wish to know the name of this important corporation which did business with so wonderful a lack of system? It is the City of Chicago.

As a matter of course, any private enterprise that attempted to get on with such a lack of system would have found itself in a reserver's hands long ago.

First and last, system is the machinery by which the business moves, and the business simply cannot move beyond its machinery

A CRITERION

No doubt the best test of any particular business undertaking is a test of its system. If you go into an office, as in the melancholy case I have cited, and find that no body knows just where anything is to be found, you are very safe in guessing that the concern is in a poor way. Take the most prosperous concern you know, and you may be quite sure that any item of any importance will be forthcoming at the touch of a button. I have had con

siderable opportunity of applying this test and have never known it to fail. The difference between a successful man agement and an unsuccessful one may be pretty accurately gauged by the ability, through a proper system, to at once command any special information of whatever sort that is of real importance. You are protty safe in forming final conclusions according to whether the furnishing of any particular information is a matter of scratching the head and guessing that somebody else possibly knows something about it and of laboriously searching records and files that fail to "pan out," or whether it is a matter of touching a button and having the item laid on the desk. So in a general way the measure of a manager's capacity lies in his ability to develop the right system.

Many men are able enough within the narrow limits of their own personal, bodily powers—that is, they can do well whatever comes within the touch of their own fingers or directly under their own eyes, and they may be very successful in the small way which this limitation implies. But they lack the higher ability to devise a machine for other hands to operate. In short, they cannot make a system, and so they cannot be successful on a large scale. Broadly speaking, the man who is most successful is he who has the greatest capacity for making a machine or developing a system.

ELIMINATION OF PERSONAL SUPERVISION.

One may venture upon a personal illustration. were several men in the meat-packing trade in the earlier days than whom there was none abler so far as concerns what they could do with their own hands-that is, through their own immediate, personal supervision. Nobody could get more out of a hog or a steer; nobody knew the provision trade any better. But as the ment-packing industry developed possibilities of enormous expansion these men and their concerns were left far to the rear, because they had a few great competitors who, in addition to the purely personal capacity, had the higher capacity to create a system that would employ the energy of scores of subordi-These great competitors could operate a dozen plants as well as one, do a business of \$200,000,000 a year as well as the personally conducted business of a tenth of And the really big business man appreciates this power of creating a system as highly as it deserves.

Not long ago I happened to hear A boasting to B of the ability of his general manager; his tremendous industry—he spent 12 hours a day at the plant and always came down of a Sunday; his indefatigable loyalty—why, three of their special cars were missing and the manager tramped around the freight yards two days until he found them. The cruel B advised his friend to get a new manager. "If he has to spend 12 hours a day and Sundays at the office and tramp around looking-for his cars he isn't up to his job," said B. He recognized that the manager was unable to create a proper system, and if there be no proper system any one man's energy amounts to little. Mere human energy is cheaper than steam horsepower. If it is a matter of energy only you might as well praise a man for running upstairs instead of taking the elevator.

OW that the Department of Inland Revenue has removed the ban which has been in effect for the past two years on spring postal scales, they can be sold in Canada up to and including four lbs. capacity. 
Many professional men are using private greeting cards through which to convey their compliments to their clients, etc. This branch of the business is worth cultivating. Doctors,

dentists, etc. are the class of people who become good customers if the proposition is presented to them tactfully.




GAMES FOR WINTER.







IMPORTANT TO BUYERS.

THE method usually followed in purchasing the stock of wall paper is to simply look at the samples, pick out those that suit, perhaps work out what it will amount to, and give the order. When the stock arrives the merchant will find a line of attractive papers, but when the trade begins he very often finds that his variety is small, and certain styles and uses of rooms have not been provided for. The fault may be recognized, but few have worked out a plan to avoid it.


It is not sufficient to have a good assortment of 5, 7, 10 and 20c. lines and so on; there must also be 5c. lines for bedrooms, 5c. lines for kitchens, 10c lines for diningroom or bedroom or hall, 20c. lines for any room in the house, and the

same variety must prevail throughout. Before buying the merchant should set a limit to the amount to be expended; then, in buying, must see that every room in the house is considered kitchen, hall, dining-room, parlor, bath room, den, bedroom, sitting-room, etc.—and that a selection in each is included. It is not an unusual event for a housekeeper to find no provision made for a hall paper or a den, while a very large stock in bed-room and parlor papers may be shown.

After that, variety of pattern and color must be supplied, and this can be done satisfactorily by noting on a slip of paper the prevailing tint and style of pattern, making reference easy and rapid.






