BOARDS OF TRADE AND AN INSOLVENCY LAW An Important Matter to Merchants Discussed at Ottawa.

Montreal and Ottawa Gentlemen Present the Views of Business Men to the Premier and His Leading Colleagues—Abuses Pointed Out by Able Speakers—Sir Wilfrid Sees Difficulties.

Ottawa, Jan. 16.—(Special).—Representatives of the Boards of Trade of Montreal and Ottawa put in a good hour's work with the Government on Saturday afternoon in reference to the Insolvency question. The deputation, which was introduced by Ald. Penney, M.P., and Mr. Fortin, M.P., consisted of President John McKerron, James Craithorn, E. B. Greenshields, C. M. Smith, W. B. Mathewson and E. D. Watson.

President McKerron of the Montreal board was the first speaker. He explained the situation of affairs in connection with the Toronto Board of Trade, stating that as the Montreal board is thoroughly understood Toronto's wishes in this matter, and was in sympathy with the local laws, preference should be given to the Montreal board.

Everyone expected that Leonard would win under 10 rounds, but Judge went in with plenty of confidence, that never deserted him throughout the evening.

His hard and clean work gained many friends for the Quaker boxer and the applause that was all for the Beau Brummel at the start was evenly divided at the finish.

The bout was the fastest and most even ever witnessed in Toronto.

Leonard was relaxed at times from fatigue, and on re-entering they went at it again with a fury of the cleverest, winding up with a hurricane of hand and clean blows that kept the crowd on its feet.

The Crescent A. C.'s referee, Jack Sheehan of Boston, proved to be the man for the work. He is a typical Irish-American and as a referee he is one of the best in the world.

He kept the crowd on its feet and never allowed either of his three awards given to meet with any possible objection.

The contest showed that the principals were both in perfect physical condition.

They weighed in all right, Leonard 135 lbs. and Judge 136 lbs.

For 10 hours a day the residents of the village have to pay for their return tickets. This is the effect of the railway compromise.

It may be said that the traffic during the limited hours is large, that during any other time in the day it may be so, but it is certain that the railway's offer of 12 1/2 cents for a long hour of the saving of 2 1/2 for 18 hours.
