ATBARA BRIDGE CONTRACT.

British Firms Still Claim That the United States Builders Were Given an Advantage.

THE KHEDIVE IS SUSPECTED

Of Exerting His "Pull" Against the British Engineering Firms and Modifying Specifications.

London, April 5.—The fact that the contract to build the bridge over the Atbara River, a branch of the Nile, has been awarded to a Philadelphia firm, continues to cause a great impression here, and the Evening News this afternoon refers to the matter as an "Egyptian War Office scandal."

The same paper published an interview with Dr. Westwood of the firm of Westwood & Hiley, the English contractors, in reply to a caustic interview with Mr. Roberts of the Penoyd Bridge Works, in which Mr. Westwood declared the Egyptian War Office altered the decision of the Atbara Bridge Commission to suit the Americans, while it did not give the British firms the same chance.

The British tenderers, Mr. Westwood explained, were higher, because special ground was required, which was dropped in the case of the Americans, who were allowed to supply a pile bridge, which good English engineers have debarred, because it makes a weak bridge.

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PROMOTERS OF SHOOTING.

Lord Minto Welcomed at the Dominion Rifle Association Meeting in Ottawa.

LIEUT.-COL. GIBSON IN THE CHAIR

Politics Were Set Aside and Tories and Grigs Worked Harmoniously Together.

Ottawa, April 5.—The 32nd annual meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association was held in the House of Commons this morning.

Amongst those present were Sir Charles Tupper, Sir Louis Davies, Hon. R. E. Dobbell, Major-General Hutton, Lt.-Col. White, C.M.G., Lt.-Col. Delamere, Lt.-Col. H. Smith, Lt.-Col. Hodgson (secretary), Lt.-Col. J. MacPherson, Lt.-Col. Tilson, Col. Hon. M. A. Fisher, Thomas Ross, Major J. J. Mason, Lt.-Col. Hughes, Major Payne, Lt.-Col. Cotton, Lt.-Col. Walker Powell, Capt. Winter, Capt. Dixon and Major Westerbeke.

Hon. Col. Gibson said that all joined in according Lord Minto a very warm reception on the occasion of his first visit to Ottawa. He had taken a special pleasure in his being so, and he was no stranger in Ottawa or in the militia of Canada.

His Excellency voiced the sentiments of every rifleman in the Dominion in extending a welcome to His Excellency Lord Minto. He had a place in the heart of every rifleman. They welcomed him not only as a soldier who had faced danger with "our boys" but who also served against perhaps still more dangerous foes.

His Excellency had great pleasure in being back to old friends. He thanked Col. Hughes and Major McKay for their flattering remarks. It was hardly his duty to speak to the officers of the association, but he had been so associated with military rifle shooting that he wished to make a few remarks. Wimbledon originated immediately after the war.

Would the continuance of these matches tend to make men take up rifle shooting as a sport or as a military study? He had done all he could to promote shooting amongst his rifle corps of which he had recently resigned the command. He deprecated pot shooting. Every regiment had

many good shots, but whilst they took up the practice as a pastime they did not raise the average. They should aim for good average shooting. The day of the individual shot was past.

General Hutton was a first rate officer, thoroughly versed in all the ins and outs of rifle shooting. The General had admitted that whilst corps had good ranges they did not have good averages. That would not do in the field. He would be happy to give any prizes required, but in all he gave he should like to make the teams bear some relation to military efficiency, to marching powers as well as command of the weapon. He sat down amidst hearty applause.

Lieut.-Col. Starke, seconded by Lieut.-Col. Bruce, moved a vote of thanks to the Government for their generous votes.

Sir Louis Davies had a little started at the seductive appeal made by Lieut.-Col. Gibson, but found no demands had been made except one of continued financial support. The vote had always been made year after year, without reference to party. He thought they could congratulate themselves on the practical advice given them by His Excellency.

Sir Charles Spoke Felicitously. Sir Charles Tupper had great pleasure in associating himself with the sturdiest people of this vital importance they know no party. Both sides united in doing their duty to the country. There was no one duty of more vital importance than that of placing the militia of the country in a position to meet the emergency of the present.

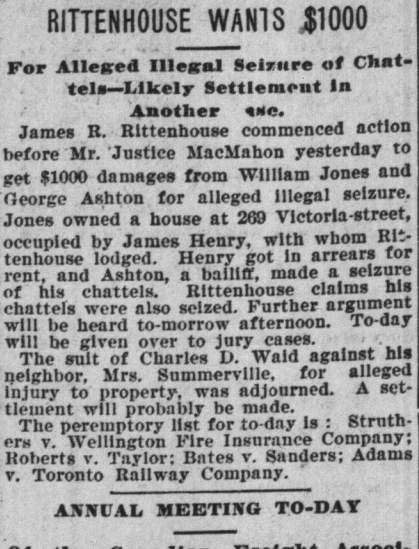

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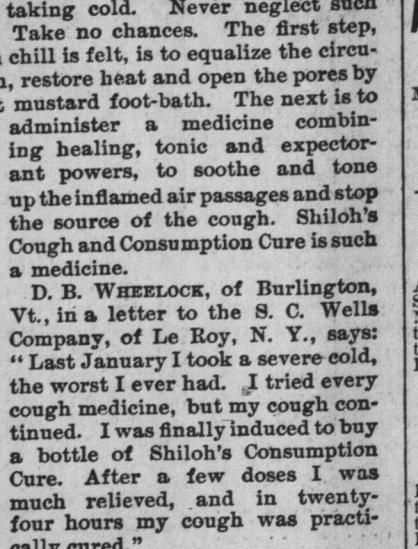
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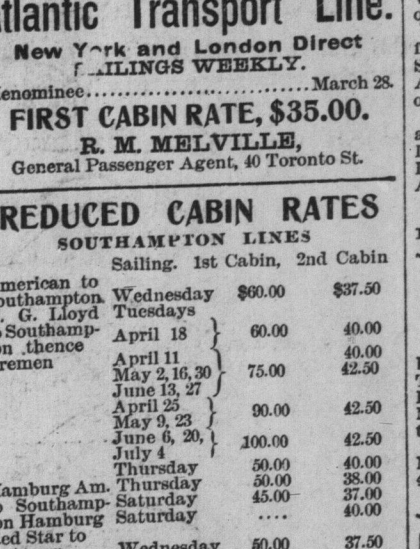

"The shop girl said 'three dollars.'" "That's a big price for such a thing," said the father in an undertone. He bought it.

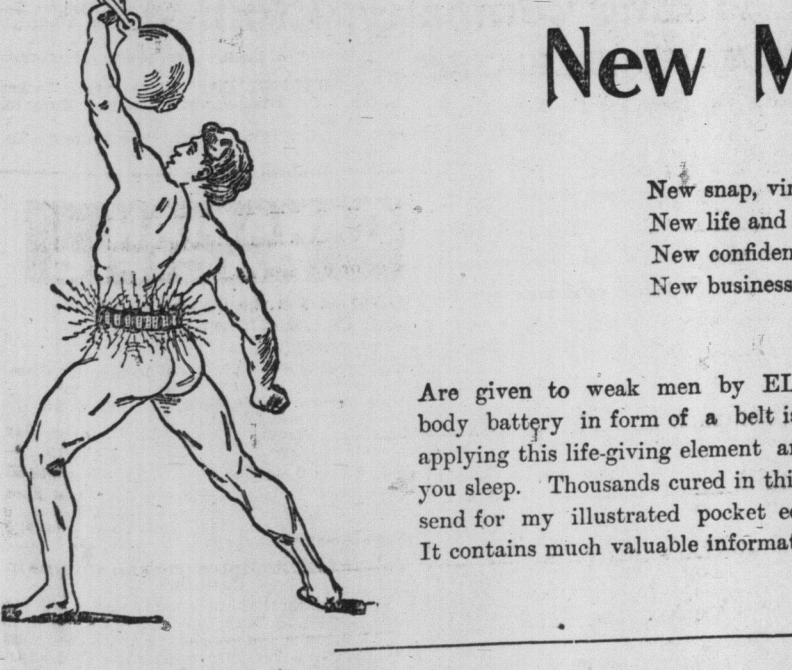
To his friend he said, "I can afford it, for by the way Will Jones is acting Bert; will not be long at my home."

BROAD MARKET IN WHEAT.

Chicago Options Weak Early, But Strong at Close.

Decline Followed by a Sharp Rally—The Market Depends on Crop Reports—Liverpool and Paris Wheat Futures Advanced—Corn and Provisions—Local Grain and Produce—Notes and Gossip.

Wednesday Evening, April 5. Liverpool wheat futures made a net advance of 1/8d to 3/4d per cent to-day. Paris wheat futures were quoted 5 centimes higher for the day.

Chicago's wheat market opened this morning at a slight advance over the holiday, but the price soon gave way, breaking over a cent. The trading was broad most of the day, fluctuations being governed by crop reports. During the last hour there was some heavy buying, and the May option closed at 72c, near the top figure for the day.

Liverpool maize futures advanced 3/4d per cent. At Chicago, May corn opened at 34 3/4c, and closed at 34 1/2c. Receipts at New York to-day, 17,142 sacks and 50 barrels; wheat, 42,991 bushels.

Receipts at Minneapolis and Duluth to-day 500 cars, at Minneapolis 233 cars the corresponding day of last year.
