

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

My Dear I

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PASTORAL LETTER.

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I invite your attention to the following reports of the congregation. You will find in them much reason for gratitude to God in view of the peace and prosperity with which He has blessed us; and at the same time I hope an incentive to more earnest Christian life in the future.

I am much encouraged by your regular attendance upon the public services of the Church. Your offerings both in the ordinary and special collections show a substantial increase upon any previous year of our history. There is a slight falling off in the amount contributed through the schedules to the schemes of the church, owing, as I think, to the financial depression which seems to exist in son quarters. But, fortunately, a smaller amount was required this year from the Session as interest on the church loan, and therefore we have been enabled to increase our contributions to missionary and benevolent work.

Though the Presbytery did not see its way clear to permit St. Andrew's Church to inaugurate a mission in Stewarton, for which you had generously agreed to be responsible, it is gratifying to be able to state that our object in the extension of Presbyterianism in that part of the city is likely to be achieved in another way. Our school-house has been handed over to the Presbytery, and the services in it have been well attended. There is every prospect of building up a good congregation in that growing suburb without depleting in any serious degree the membership of the city churches. We shall miss some faithful workers who, while severing their connection with St. Andrew's Church with extreme reluctance, have felt it their duty to aid the new enterprise. I cannot adequately express my appreciation of the kind words which have been addressed to me by some who have joined the Stewarton congregation. Most earnestly do I wish the mission abundant success, and those who have gone from us continued comfort and joy in their Christian work.

I desire to express my sincere thanks to the Elders, the Trustees and to the various organizations of the Church for the substantial as-

sistance they have rendered me in the different departments of our activity. I do not recall any previous time in my pastorate when so large a number of faithful and willing allies were to be found in the congregation.

I desire especially to commend to you the newest society in the Church—the Home Missionary Society. Its growth has been most encouraging, and this year it assumes the entire support of a missionary in the North-West. I am sure you will do what you can to aid its laudable enterprise.

I have visited a large number of the sick and aged members of the congregation during the year, and in this pastoral duty I have received fresh impulse for my pulpit labors. We all feel keenly the loss of some of our friends who have been removed by death, and their departure ought to stir us up to more diligent toil in the vineyard of the Master.

While we rejoice in every sign of outward prosperity, let us covet earnestly the best gifts. Let us seek in our homes and in society, as well as in the Church, to be worthy of the name of Christian, day by day growing in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

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REPORT OF THE KIRK SESSION.

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In submitting the following statement concerning our congregational affairs, the Kirk Session gratefully recognize the goodness of God in continuing to bless us with those Christian privileges which, when diligently and prayerfully used, become the means of spiritual edification to the members of the Christian Church.

The Session having reviewed the life and work of the Congregation during the past year, have pleasure in reporting that, on the whole, the prosperous condition of the previous year has been maintained. Some changes, however, have occurred in the Sunday School department of our Church work, which, while diminishing the sphere of our labors, has increased the efficiency of the Church school. These changes have been made in consequence of the Presbytery's action respecting mission work in Stewarton, and the expressed wish of the Lower Town scholars to attend the School which meets in the Church.

Our congregation has been noted in the past for its liberality in responding to the annual calls made upon it for financial assistance to the missionary and benevolent schemes of the Church, yet its highest record might be far surpassed were all its members contributing to the extent of their ability. Under this impression the Session recently ssued an address to the members and adherents of the congregation, with a view of awakening a deeper interest in the general work of the Church, and inducing a spirit of greater liberality in contributing funds necessary to carry on its work successfully. This address will be embodied in the Annual Report, and the Session trusts that it may be deemed worthy of a second perusal, and receive the calm and careful consideration of every member and adherent of the Church.

The Reports and Audited Statements of the financial affairs of the congregation enable the Session to form a fairly accurate estimate of its material prosperity. It is, however, a more difficult matter to gauge the spiritual condition of its membership. It is only the apparent fruits of Christian faith that they can discern, and they may not presume to speak in confident terms of the actual progress made in the Christian life; for "Man looketh on the outward appearance, but the Lord looketh

on the heart," and "He only knoweth the hearts of the children of men;" neither is it their place to speak despondently of any apparent lack of vigour in the spiritual life of its members, for, we are assured that "the Kingdom of God cometh not with observation," and there may therefore exist within the secret recesses of the human heart, spiritual vitality and growth in Christian character, so silent in its movements and unobtrusive in its nature, that it may elude the ordinary discernment of man. In our congregation this type of Christian character may possibly be more numerous than that which manifests the indwelling power of spiritual life by works of faith and labours of love. If so, may the invigorating influences of the Divine Spirit visit us in the coming year, so that the feeble spark of life may kindle into flame, and the weakest among us develope in strength and fruitfulness, so that all our members may become "iiving epistles known and read of all men."

While the Session are unable to report any unusual activity in the Christian life and work of the congregation, they may refer to the following indications of its continued prosperity.

The approximate number of families connected with the congregation is, 330, three hundred and thirty, being a slight increase over the number reported in the previous year.

On the first of March last year, the Communion Roll numbered 509, five hundred and nine, since that date there have been added 56, fifty-six members; 26, twenty-six on profession of faith, and 30, thirty by certificate from other congregations. During the same time there have been removed from the Roll, thirty members, 20, twenty by certificate, 7, seven by death, and 3, three because of long continued absence from communion, leaving a net increase of twenty-six members since last report.

Of those removed by certificate, 10, ten withdrew from the congregation to assist in forming the nucleus of the Presbyterian Church now being organized in Stewarton.

The attendance at the quarterly communions of the congregation has been much the same as last year, the average number present at the services during the year having been, 275, two hundred and seventy-five; this can scarcely be considered as large a number as might reasonably be expected from our Roll of over 500, five hundred members. The Session regret that many are irregular to their observance of this ordinance,

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The pres Station in Ste hitherto been been transferr forms part of the other bran and that so large a proportion of the adult members of the congregation have not yet availed themselves of the privileges pertaining to full membership in our church.

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The attendance on the Sabbath services of the Church has been generally quite equal to that of any previous year. The families of the congregation have been well represented at all the public services, with the exception of those held in Midsummer, and the Session have noticed, with pleasure, that the evening services have been usually attended by many visitors, and especially by a large number of young people who have availed themselves of the cordial invitation which has been given them to unite with the congregation in their Sunday evening hour of public worship.

The prayer-meeting which is regarded by some of our members as the most profitable of all our congregational meetings, has been successfully maintained during the past year. The increased attendance on this means of grace indicates the growing appreciation of its helpful hour of worship and instruction. The Session hope that in the coming year the attendance may be still further increased by the presence of a larger number of the male members of the congregation than heretofore.

The Young Women's Prayer-Meeting has been efficiently maintained throughout the year, and has been a source of much profit to those attending it. It is held at a quarter past seven on Wednesday evening, and closes in time to give the members opportunity of taking part in the usual Church service.

The Reports of the Sunday Schools and Bible classes show that this important branch of our Church work has been continued with commendable vigour and efficiency. The labours of the teachers have lately been entirely concentrated in the work of the Church School, in consequence of the following changes which have occurred in the Mission branches of our school work.

The presbytery of Ottawa having recently commenced a Mission Station in Stewarton, the Sunday School on McLeod Street, which has hitherto been conducted under the care of St. Andrew's Session, has been transferred to the care of the Presbytery's interim Session, and now forms part of the work intrusted to the Stewarton Mission Church, and the other branch of our Church Sunday School, which has been held for

many years, in Central School East, has been discontinued this winter, as the families connected with the congregation, who reside in that locality, prefer sending their children to the School which meets in the Church, and as the wants of others in that district are now fully met by the Sunday Schools of adjoining Churches, and other Mission-Schools recently opened in that neighborhood.

The Ladies' Aid Society, and District Visitors, have, as usual rendered valuable services in their departments of congregational work. Dispensing relief to those in need, visiting the families of the congregation, assisting in the collection of the promised contributions to the schemes of the Church; and in many ways promoting the comfort and welfare of the congregation.

The Session rejoice in the earnest spirit which has animated the Women's Home Missionary Society, as evidenced by their resolve to maintain a Missionary at Lake Dauphin, in the N.W. Territories. They desire to congratulate the Society on its growth, and wish it still larger prosperity in the future.

The Report of the Institute affords gratifying intelligence of the continued prosperity of this organization. It has ministered largely throughout the year to the social and intellectual instincts of the young people of the congregation, as well as helped to engage them in religious work.

A successful Young Men's Bible Class was begun with the New Year by Mr. Frank P. Bronson, who to the deep regret of the members has been compelled to resign the leadership, on account of occasional absence from the city. Mr. F. H. Chrysler has taken up the work, and has entered upon a series of valuable and interesting studies in Old Testament Scripture. The Session cordially commend this class to all young men. It meets at 3.15 p. m. on Sunday, in the Vestry of the Church.

The Session have much pleasure in reporting the continued liberality of our members in contributing to the schemes of the Church, and that so many have sent in their contributions to the Treasurer of the Schedule Fund, with commendable promptness and cheerfulness. The amount at the credit of the Fund has been allocated as follows, viz:—

During the past year, the homes of some of our members have been visited with sore bereavement, and now mourn the loss of loved ones, who have passed away. The Session desire to express their sincere sympathy with those bereaved, and would now commend them to the infinite compassion of Him who is the only unfailing source of comfort and consolation.

Since last annual meeting the Session have lost one of their number by the death of the late George P. Drummond, and in recognition of the loss which they and the congregation have sustained by his death the Session recorded the following minute:

"The Session desire to place on record their deep sense of loss in the death of George P. Drummond who for seventeen years has been one of its most valued members. His unvarying zeal in everything pertaining to the interests of the Church, leaves behind him a lasting memorial, while his faithful discharge of duty, his consistent Christian character, his unmurmuring patience under trial and sickness, endear his name to the hearts of all who knew him.

"The Session would convey to his wife, and to every one of his bereaved relatives their most unfeigned sympathy, commending them to the infinite comfort of Him who while removing from our sight a brother beloved, has taken him to be with Jesus which is far better."

In concluding their report, the Session congratulate the congregation on its present efficient equipment for active service in Christian work, and they pray that God may visit us in the coming year with an abundant outpouring of spiritual blessing, so that the labours of Minister and people may be crowned with a large measure of true success.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

The Annual General Meeting of the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, was held in the lecture room of the Church, this day, Monday, the 2nd day of March, A.D., 1891, at the hour of half-past seven o'clock in the evening.

Meeting was opened with devotional exercises.

Minutes of first Annual Meeting, under the new Act of Incorporation, held on the 2nd day of June, 1890, and special meeting held on the 15th day of September, 1890, were read and sustained.

Reports and accounts of Kirk Session, Temporal Committee, Glebe Trustees, Sabbath Schools, Ladies' Aid Society, and Schedule Fund, were read to the meeting.

It was moved by F. P. Bronson, seconded by J. W. McRae, that the various reports and accounts just read be received and adopted.

It was moved by P. Larmonth, seconded by E. H. Bronson, that James Gibson, Rev. W. T. Herridge, F. P. Bronson, Wm. Hamilton and James Cunningham be a committee to attend to the printing of the Annual Reports, and distribution of same to the congregation.—Carried.

It was moved by J. W. McRae, seconded by F. P. Bronson, that the thanks of the Congregation be, and are hereby tendered to the Ladies' Aid Society, Church Choir, and District Visitors, for their efficient services during the past year.—Carried.

It was moved by J. W. McRae, seconded by F. H. Chrysler, that the thanks of the Congregation be, and are hereby tendered, to James Cunningham, President of the Temporal Committee, for his faithful and efficient services for the past year.—Carried.

The meeting then proceeded to the election of two members of the Temporal Committee, and one member of the Glebe Trustees, whose term of office had expired, and F. P. Bronson and J. W. McRae were appointed scrutineers.

Messrs. C. C. Ray and L. Crannell were duly elected as members of the Temporal Committee for three years, and Geo. Stockand elected as member of the Glebe Trustees for three years.

The meeting was closed with prayer.

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REPORT OF THE TEMPORAL COMMITTEE.

OTTAWA, 2nd March, 1891.

To the Members and Adherents of St. Andrew's Church:

The Temporal Committee in giving an account of their stewardship for the past year, would refer to the following:—

The Secretary-Treasurer's report herewith submitted and duly audited, while showing a small balance of cash on hand, shows that at this date there is under discount notes to the extent of \$3.500 for which provision ought to be made in the near future.

During the past summer extensive repairs were made to the church, both externally and internally, chiefly under the superintendence of Mr. Thos. Scott, architect, and who deserves every credit for the satisfactory manner in which the same were completed—the cost of said repairs including entire new roof, thorough internal renovation of both church and basement, pointing outside mason work, new steps from outside, introduction of electric light apparatus, new carpets, etc., was nearly \$6,000, and this large outlay, which was unavoidable, accounts in part for the note indebtedness of your committee. The ladies very kindly undertook the carpeting and repairs of cushions, etc., and are heartily entitled to the thanks of the congregation for their extra labors in this connection. Messrs. Bryson Graham & Co., who supplied the carpet at the lowest price obtainable, gratuitously gave the making of it and putting it down, and for which they are also entitled to our thanks.

As the congregation is aware, your committee, after much trouble and correspondence, succeeded in getting the loan to Mr. Murray, of Aberdeen, paid off and discharged, and the new loan from Mr. Allan Gilmour for \$35,000 completed, the latter is secured by a mortgage on the church property alone, thus releasing the "Glebe" from all incumbrances.

During the early part of the summer it was found necessary to change caretakers. Mr. Devitt, who succeeds Mr. Foster, has so far given every satisfaction, and the change has been very beneficial in every branch of this service.

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REPORT OF GLEBE TRUSTEES.

Owing to the unavoidable delay in obtaining the discharge of the mortgage upon the Glebe property, the Trustees have not had very much time during their first year to effect sales or develop the property.

They have contributed part of the expense of putting in a deep drain upon Bank street to take away the surface water, which they expect will make an improvement in the appearance and value of that portion of the property.

They have also fixed a schedule of prices for the unsold lots in Archville, and obtained the sanction of the congregation to a by-law for that purpose, so that all the property east of the canal is now in the market for sale. A good many of the lots in Spenceville, however, are low and will not be readily saleable unless some method of draining them is devised, and a reasonable sum wisely expended for that purpose will very much enhance their value.

As no provision had been otherwise made for the payment of the mortgage upon that portion of the property held by Mr. Hiram Robinson, the Trustees borrowed money from the bank for that purpose and obtained a discharge, thus removing the last incumbrance.

The mortgage was not discharged until it was too late in the autumn to make further sales, but the Trustees hope to make some sales east of the canal during the coming summer.

The Trustees have employed Mr. C. A. Biggar, D.L.S., to make a block survey of the whole property, which has just been completed, and is now presented to the meeting.

The amounts collected for reat and from sales of lots have been better than for several years past, amounting in the aggregate to:

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In presenting this report we have much pleasure in stating that the season of 1890-91, has been a most successful one as regards the interest shown in the work of the Society and the increased attendance at the regular meetings.

The meetings have been held as formerly in the Bible-class room, on Friday afternoons at three o'clock, the Poor Relief Committee meetings in the vestry at half-past two.

The average attendance has been 20, as against 15 last year; the largest number present at any one meeting having been 27, the smallest

We have to regret the loss of two valued members, who through removal to another province and country have had to sever their connection with the Society, Mrs. Wilson, for years one of our Vice-Presidents, having gone to New Westminster, B. C., and Mrs. Young to Portland, Oregon, U. S. A. Both these ladies have been active members of the Society since its organization, and their willing assistance and kind faces are sorely missed at the weekly meetings. In the death

of Mr. Perley M.P., the husband of our beloved President, the Society has lost an esteemed and honored friend.

Three entertainments were given during the year, The first-a Concert, on the evening of the 28th March, 1890, in aid of the Sunday School Library Fund. The second—the usual Christmas Entertainment and sale of work, on the evening of the 5th of December. The thirdthe Anniversary Social, on the 27th of January, 1891. These entertainments were well attended and the anniversary was one of the most successful held for years.

The following sums and articles have been donated: To the "Home for Aged Men," \$125.00. To the Sunday School Library Fund, \$100.00. To the "Home for Friendless Women," \$50.00, and to the sufferers from the recent terrible disaster at Springhill colliery, N. S., \$50.00. To three young ladies of the congregation, various articles suitable for a Christmas Tree, which they kindly got up for some little folks. Hintonburgh Mission has been twice given articles for a bazaar To the Protestant Hospital, the ladies added one dozen boys' nightshirts to the donation spoken of in the last year's report.

The dingy brown carpet and apology for a table, in the Bible-class room, have been replaced by a bright crimson carpet and walnut table; perhaps, this transformation has had something to do with the increased attendance. The ladies having had their attention drawn to the need of protecting the cushions in the church pews, from the rays of the sun, have made cotton covers to go over the pews during the week.

The whole amount raised from all sources during the year has been \$338.25.

The sincere and hearty thanks of the Society are hereby tendered to Messrs. Bryson & Graham, for their kindness in sewing and laying the carpet in the Bible-class room, free of charge; to the members of other congregations as well as St. Andrew's, who have so kindly aided them in getting up their programmes, and also to the Church Institute for allowing the use of their piano for the entertainments.

REPORT

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The Home Missionary Society,

From the Annual Report published in November last, we take the following extracts: "It is just three years since this Society was formed for the purpose of Home Mission work, and although the means for raising money is very limited, being confined to membership fees, monthly collections, and the thank offering, the work is progressing in a most encouraging manner. In February of last year, through correspondence with Dr. Robertson, who is in charge of the North-West Missions, this society determined that the entire proceeds of the year should be sent towards supporting a missionary at one of the numerous stations throughout the country, in many of which work had been successfully begun and abandoned for want of funds. If the ladies thought it possible to support a permanent missionary at a cost of between \$200 and \$300 a year, or at least supplement the small salary allowed him, some definite station might be chosen, and direct correspondence be held from time to time between the missionary of that place and our society, and increase the interest of the members in the work. If this step still seemed too much to undertake, a student for the summer months might be secured at a cost of \$120, a plan, adopted by similar societies in Perth and Chatham. As the ladies seemed to think that \$200 might confidently be raised, "Lake Dauphin," a small settlement 75 miles from the railway, was chosen, and to that end the society has since directed its efforts." 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It was with great reluctance that Mrs. McLeod Stewart, who had been President of the Society since its formation, was prevailed upon to renew her term of office, but the ladies feel that her withdrawal would be a great loss while the Society was still in its infancy, and she was accordingly re-elected.

From the Treasurer's statement, it was learned that the sum of \$170, the proceeds of the year, had been sent to Dr. Reid, to pay the missionaries who had labored at Lake Dauphin during the summer, and this amount had been very graciously acknowledged.

At the subsequent meetings which are held on the second Friday of every month, interesting letters have been read from the missionary, Mr. Sutherland, now in charge, who reports very satisfactorily on the good work begun at Lake Dauphin. They have erected a small church which has been provided with an organ, thanks to kind friends in Winnipeg. The church membership is steadily increasing.

We close this brief account of the year's work with much satisfaction at the Society's progress both in members and work, there being now on the roll seventy-eight members, ten have been added since the last annual meeting. We hope that the new year upon which we have entered may be richly blessed, and our faith encourages us to believe that as we have "by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, made known our requests unto God," we may confidently expect the answer from the hands of His people.

To the Members of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa:

Since the last report of the Executive Committee the character of the meetings has changed somewhat in that more closed meetings have been held. It was understood at the beginning of the season that the Ladies' Aid Society intended making special efforts to raise funds this winter, and it was feared that the frequent meetings of the Institute might to some extent interfere with the success of the sister society. The Institute decided in consequence to withdraw some of its public meetings, and to replace them by closed meetings. So far but two public meetings have been held, at one of which the Normal School students were entertained. The Institute also provided a programme

for the Annual Congregational Meeting in January. Three of the closed meetings were devoted to the discussion of "Books and Reading," a subject which proved most profitable and enjoyable. Several meetings remain yet to be held, the main feature of one of which will be a debate, and another will be devoted to the study of the life of St. John, the beloved disciple.

A pleasing incident is to be recorded, namely, a presentation by the members of the Institute, to Mr. C. H. Beddoe, on his retirement from the office of President, which he had ably filled for three years, and to Mrs. Beddoe convener of the Ladies' Committee, in recognition of their invaluable services in connection with the Institute since its inception.

The membership remains about the same as last year, and the Treasurer reports that the funds are sufficient to pay all current expenses.

In conclusion the Executive Committee trust that the meetings of this season have, as in former years, compassed all the objects contemplated by the Institute.

The number of scholars on the roll is 289, an increase of twenty over last year, and the largest number reached in the history of the school. The average attendance, 174, may appear small in comparison with the number enrolled, but this is accounted for by the fact that so many of the children are very young (89 in the primary dept.), and have long distances to come. Lower Town school has been discontinued, and Stewarton school is no longer under the charge of St. Andrew's Session, and some of the pupils from these schools have come to us. We are glad to know that the other pupils of these schools are being cared for by the Presbyterian churches in these localities.

There are few changes to note in the staff of teachers and officers. We have been strengthened by the addition of Mr. Geo. S. May, formerly superintendent of Lower Town school, and Mr. Beddoe and Miss Mitchell. Mr. McNicol, for many years one of our most faithful teachers, has removed to the country, and is now superintendent of Billings' Bridge Sabbath school.

The Bible Class for young women taught by Mrs. Gibson meets in the Ladies' Room. All young women who have not yet joined this

class are cordially invited to do so.

The Bible Class for young men recently begun by Mr. F. P. Bronson, is now under the leadership of Mr. F. H. Chrysler, the former having withdrawn on account of frequent absence from the city. This class meets independently of the school in the vestry at 3:15, and Mr. Chrysler will be glad to welcome the young men of the congregation

to join him in Bible study.

The first examination in connection with the General Assembly's scheme of Higher Religious Instruction, took place on the 7th and 8th of March, 1890, and the result, so far as our school was concerned, was very satisfactory. Twelve of our scholars presented themselves for examination, of whom four won the diploma and three the silver medal. The medallists were Misses Emma Armstrong, Ida Dick and Isabel Gibson. The second examination took place on the 31st January, 1891, when nineteen of our scholars were examined. The results of this examination are not yet published.

In the month of July the school enjoyed a pic-nic—the first for many years, at Chelsea, with so great pleasure that its annual repetition

will be eagerly desired.

The annual festival was held on 6th February and was a great suc-

The Library has been replenished by the purchase of several hundred volumes. About an equal number of old, worn out and unsuitable books have been removed, so that it is now in very good order. We desire to thank the Ladies' Aid Society for a donation of \$100, and the friends who sent in contributions amounting to \$147.90 in response to a circular issued last March asking funds to meet this extraordinary expense.

The collections in the school devoted wholly to missions, amounted to \$163.64, which amount was allocated as follows:

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
