THE TOURNAMENT.

THE TOURNAMENT at EGLINTON CASTLE, in
Ayrshire, Scotland, which has been the subject of
long conversation and great preparation, began on
Wednesday, Aug. 28. From Monday morning people
began to flock to the place from all parts of the
United Kingdom, and by Tuesday night not only
the Castle, but all the neighbouring villages and
farm houses, with the towns of Ayr and Kilmarnock,
six and twelve miles distant, were filled. Houses
throughout the neighbourhood were let for £10 to
£30, and single beds from 10 to 20s. a night. It was
computed that on Wednesday, 30,000 people
were assembled within the Eglington grounds. The
castle was built by the grandfather of the present
possessor, and with the grounds presented a fine ap-
pearance. The ground selected for the Lists formed
a beautiful natural amphitheatre. The arena formed
an oblong square of 650 by 250 feet. On the
South side of it was the grand Pavilion for the elite
of the visitors, calculated to contain 8000 persons, and
on the other sides galleries for 1000. At each end
were the marquee and tents for the knights to the
number of 24. Two pavilions were also erected for
a banquet, and a ball-room, the former 137 feet in
length, in which three tables were laid, and the latter
170 feet in length and 45 in breadth.
The weather, which had been variable for some
days, was beautiful on Tuesday. Wednesday opened
auspiciously, but at 12 o'clock the sky became over-
cast, and soon the rain came down in torrents, and
continued to fall during the rest of the day. The
procession nevertheless was formed at two o'clock,
and went round the square, the distance of a mile,
and entered the lists at a quarter before three.
Every one was drenched, and some of the ladies
abandoned their places in the procession. Their pal-

freys however were there beautifully caparisoned.
The tilting soon commenced, with considerable spirit,
and several lances were broken. The rain at length
carried the day, and after the fifth bout, the ground
having been in a great measure cleared, at 5 o'clock
the proceedings were suspended. The banquet also
and the ball were broken up, the costly preparations
for them having been rendered nugatory by the rain.
Male however was held in one of the large rooms in
the castle, which were great numbers attended, and
made amends as far as they were able for the dis-
appointments of the day.

On the morning of the second day the storm con-
tinued. After some hours of doubt it was resolved
to abandon further prosecution of the Tournament.
But at mid-day the clouds dispersed and the sun
shone out in splendor, and it was soon announced
that the tournament should proceed on the next day.
The crowds who were beginning to disperse re-
turned on Friday the weather was clear and beautiful,
and the whole population again turned their steps to-
wards Eglington Castle. The grand stand was oc-
cupied as before, and the procession was formed as
on the first day. In the first encounter, Lord Eglin-
ton, who was in the saddle, was the victor. The
scene from the Glasgow Courier—

The Queen of Beauty, and her guard of lady archers
in green velvet dresses, trimmed with ermine,
now rode their palfreys. The Queen herself wore a
dress of gold and red, richly gilt, over
the neck and breast, a crimson robe trimmed with
ermine, and richly embroidered gauds. Miss
McDonald, lady in waiting on the Queen, wore a
rich ermine and black velvet dress, trimmed with
ermine, which was much praised. Lady Montgomery
was attired in a black velvet dress richly trim-
med with gold. The Countess of Meath wore an
Eastern costume, which attracted much attention,
as did also a very handsome dress worn by Miss Stuart
de Rosby—Among the knights, the Marquis of
Waterford had the best turnout, in his retainers
were Lord Leinster, as a Turkish doctor, in a dress
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
