MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.

The Annual Meeting of Members was held in the Society's Hall, on Monday Evening, May 5th, the First Vice-President, Mr. W. Edwards, in the Chair.

The Report of the Society's operations during the past year was read by the Secretary.

$R \to P O R T$.

The Committee of the Toronto Mechanics' Institute, in submitting a Report of the Society's operations during the past year, would congratulate the members on its satisfactory condition and encouraging prospects.

It is perhaps, unnecessary at this time, to say anything in commendation, or praise, of Mechanics' Institutes; they are sufficiently established in public favor, and have taken their place among the noble institutions of the present day, having for their object the diffusion of useful and scientific knowledge among a numerous class of persons, who, but for the facilities such institutions afford, would be prevented from obtaining many valuable advantages which they hold out; their claims, therefore, cannot be too strongly urged, especially upon the younger portion of our population.

It is cause of much satisfaction, that hitherto, the history of our Institute has been one of progress and increasing usefulness.

It cannot, indeed be denied that large numbers of that class for whose benefit it was more especially designed, still hold themselves aloof from it, declining to share in its advantages, or to assist in promoting its interests; yet its continued advancement, if not so rapid as might be desired, is highly encouraging to its warmest supporters.

Your Committee would notice the fact of the unusually large number of members who have left the City during the past year; being more than twice the number struck off the roll from the same cause in the previous year. Owing to this the net increase is not so large as would have been gained under ordinary circumstances. Your Committee would further remark, under this head, that if the members generally would use a little exertion to induce their friends to join the Institute, they could materially add to its numbers and influence.

THE LIBRARY

Has, during the past year, received large augmentations. Through the liberality of the members and friends of the Institute, your Committee have been enabled to expend the sum

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of $\pounds 222$ in the purchase of new works. The balance of this special subscription, amounting probably to $\pounds 75$, when the remainder shall have been collected, will be available for the same object next year. From financial causes, the Library, previously to last year, had not received that attention to its requirements which was necessary to its efficiency; but it is to be hoped that, in future, each year will witness an adequate expenditure in this department.

The Library now comprises 3,109 volumes, 1,158 of which have been added since the last annual meeting. The number of members now regularly supplied with books, is very nearly 500. From the fact, that the number of volumes issued, amounted to 9286, during the year just closed, may be inferred the extent to which the advantages of the Library are made use of by subscribers.

In order to accommodate members living at a distance, or who, from other causes, would prefer changing books in the daytime, the Library is now regularly open every afternoon from two to five o'clock.

The above facts are, in the opinion of your Committee, peculiarly gratifying, convinced as they are that the Library is the most important department of the Institute, as it regards the benefits imparted; and that, the more attention there is paid to its condition and improvement, the more numerous will be the accessions to the membership of the society.

Your Committee acknowledge, with pleasure, the following donations; from Mr. James Bain, copies of the Municipal and and Educational Manuals for U. C.; from Mr. B. Huson, U. S. THE READING ROOM.

LECTURES.

Your Committee experienced considerable difficulty in pro curing a course of Lectures for last season; they, however, ultimately succeeded in securing the services of several talented gentlemen, who during the winter, generously supplied useful and interesting information, on various subjects to the members of the Institute. To those gentlemen the thanks of the Institute are specially due, for their disinterested and valuable assistance.

The utility of lectures, in general, your Committee firmly believe, is very great, inasmuch as, independent of the direct instruction they afford, they create a spirit of inquiry, and a thirst for knowledge in the minds of those who attend them which are of the greatest assistance to them in the task of self improvement. At the same time your Committee are of opinion, that in addition to occasional lectures on general subects, it would be very desirable to obtain a course of teaching lectures on one or more subjects during each winter, that is, lectures in which a connected system of instruction would be pursued, enabling the hearers, or rather pupils, to acquaint themselves with the details of a science, as well as its general principles.

Your Committee regret that they cannot report the formation of any classes during the past year; the reason, and it is one of long standing, being the want of proper accommodation in the present building. They recommend, however, that means should be taken, before next winter, to procure the necessary accommodation and teachers, so that this justlyvalued department of instruction may be efficiently organized and conducted.

It will be recollected that, at the last Annual Meeting, the Retiring Committee reported that an effort was at that time being made to procure additional subscriptions from the members, and the citizens generally, to enable the Institute to finish and occupy a part, at least, of the New Hall; and that they had reason to hope the appeal would not be unsuccessful. In a few days afterwards, however, the Provincial Govern-



ment, through the Hon. Mr. Killaly, offered to lease the building for four years, for public offices, on terms favorable to the Institute. Your Committee, after a consideration of the existing and prospective difficulties which opposed the completion of their heavy undertaking, decided to accept the offer of the Government, which decision was subsequently sanctioned by the Members at a Special Meeting called for the purpose. Bv the terms of the arrangement, the Government undertook to discharge the Institute's liabilities to the contractors and other parties, amounting to £1,320,-to finish the Hall at the expiration of the lease, according to the original plans, reserving the right of making certain temporary alterations, in the meantime, to suit their own purposes-to keep the building insured, during the time, for £6,000,-and to give the Institute a yearly rent of £376, to enable it to pay the interest on the Building Loan, and for accommodation in its present premises. Your Committee, while regretting the necessity of the Society being obliged to defer its occupation of the New Hall for so long a period, feel that, under the circumstances, the above arrangement was highly advantageous to the Institute, in relieving it, in a great measure, from responsibilities, the extent of which, would necessarily have cramped its energies for some time to come.

An application to the City Council, to allow the Institute to remain in the present building, during the occupation of the New Hall, by Government, was granted,—the rent being fixed at £60 per annum.

On the arrival of His Excellency the Governor General, Sir E. W. Head, to take up his residence in Toronto, your Committee presented an address to him on behalf of the Institute; to which His Excellency replied "that the address gave him great pleasure, convinced as he was that Mechanics' Institutes were of the highest utility; and that he would always be ready to do his utmost to promote their prosperity."

By the Treasurer's statement, it will be seen that the Finances

of the Institute are in a satisfactory condition. The receipts for the past year amounted to £955 13s. $9\frac{1}{2}d.$,—the Expenditure to £936 4s. 1d.,—leaving a balance in hand of £19 9s. $8\frac{1}{2}d.$ The details will be found appended to the Report. A statement of the Receipts and Expenditure connected with the Building Fund, from last May to the closing of the account in September, is also submitted herewith.

Your Committee have now taken up the different matters which, in their judgment, required notice; and while, in doing so, they have found cause of satisfaction for the past, and encouragement for the future, they do not hesitate to say that much yet remains to be done to render our Institute as powerful for good as it might be. Let every member reflect that he can, by his influence and example, contribute in some degree, to its success and efficiency; and so reflecting, make use of all the means and opportunities afforded him towards the accomplishment of so desirable an object. Then will this Institute be enabled more widely to extend the peculiar benefits it was de signed to confer, and gain, in an increased degree, the confidence and support of all classes of the community.
