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MINUTES

OF THE

Manitoba and North-West Conference,

HELD IN THE CITY OF BRANDON, MANITOBA, JUNE, 1887.

THE FOURTH SESSION of the MANITOBA AND NORTH-WEST CONFERENCE of the Methodist Church was opened in the Methodist Church, Brandon, on Thursday, June 16th, 1887, at 9 o'clock a.m.

Rev. John A. Williams, D.D., General Superintendent, took the chair, and gave out the 753rd hymn.

The Secretary of Conference, Rev. J. F. Betts, read the Scriptures, after which Rev. Thos. Argue and Wm. L. Hutton, Esq., led in prayer.

The following report of the Board was adopted:—

Sixteen candidates presented themselves for examination, only nine of whom wrote upon the entire work prescribed for their respective years.

To these certificates were awarded as follows:

In the fourth year, one first and one second class; in the third year, one second class; in the second year, one second class; in the first year, one first class with honors and one first class; in the preliminary, one first class with honors and two second class.

Candidates who intend writing in preliminary course shall hereafter send intimation of the same to the Chairman of the District in which they

reside, not later than the first day of March.

Examiners shall forward to the Secretary of the Examining Board, not later than the first day of March, manuscript questions on each subject allotted to them, which shall be printed under the Secretary's supervision, and forwarded by him to Chairmen of Districts not later than the fifteenth of March.

The examinations shall be conducted in each District where there are candidates, on the third Wednesday in April, by the Chairman and mem-

bers of the Board resident within the District.

The record of standing of candidates who have passed on part of the course of study must, on the completion of the prescribed course for the year, be furnished by the Secretary of the Examining Board before certificates shall be issued for the year's course of study.

Time shall be considered an element in the examinations, and in all cases where time is set by an Examiner it shall be strictly adhered to.

REPORT OF THE STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee are thankful to be able to report a marked improvement in the filling up of District schedules. Two Districts presented reports which on examination were found correct in every particular. Had the remaining four Districts been equally satisfactory, the work of the Committee would have been fully two-thirds less than it was, and our report would have been ready sooner. To ensure correctness in future, we would respectfully ask the Conference to direct that the Chairman and

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Secretary of each District be a committee on the matter, and that they be held responsible for all the returns on the prepared forms; which returns must be handed to the Conference Secretary in time for the first meeting of the Statistical Committee. Seeing all do not fully understand the schedule on Ministerial Support, we suggest the following explanations:

- 1. The column headed "Salary, Board and Fuel," should show the amount raised by the Circuit or Mission for these items only.
- 2. The column headed "Circuit Deficiency" should contain the amount (if any) which the Circuit falls short of its appropriation for salery, board and fuel, previously made by the Quarterly Official Board, and confirmed by the Financial District Meeting.
- 3 The column headed "Total Received" includes only the amount under the column for salary, board, etc., together with any additional sum received from the Contingent Fund or Missionary Society for salary, board and fuel.
- 4. The "Grand Total" is designed to show everything raised by the Circuit. The District Schedules should contain columns for totals raised for "Connexional Funds," "Circuit Purposes," "Ministerial Support," and "Grand Totals." At present, special columns have to be added, which requires time that should be saved. We recommend drawing the attention of the Book Steward to this matter.

The membership is as follows: On trial, 710; full members, 5,482;—total, 6,192. This shows an increase of 1,034, or twenty per cent. for the year. Number of ministers and probationers, 72. Official members on various Circuits, 968; increase, 160.

We respectfully recommend the Conference to authorize the Treasurer of the General Conference Fund to borrow \$100, in order to meet the deficiency on this Fund for the present year. Also to appoint a small committee who may apportion the sum of \$400 to the various Circuits for next year. This is not to be a tax, but merely for the purpose of suggesting to each Superintendent the amount that would be considered as a fair proportion to be raised by his Circuit for this object.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee on reviewing the work of the year thankfully report advancement in every department. We find there has been a large increase both in Connexional and Circuit Funds, whilst in our membership there has been an increase reported of over one thousand. With gratitude we notice all around us a growing thirst after closer communion with God, and a fuller consecration of powers to the service of Christ. In all this we recognize the agency of the Holy Spirit leading the Church forth to new and more glorious conquests.

Your Committee strongly recommend the use of all legitimate means for the furtherance of the cause of Christ—employing band workers, local preachers, and other helpers in the most systematic way throughout our great land—so coupling knowledge with zeal that no effort may be misspent.

Your Committee deplore the vast amount of dissipation in connection with our civic celebration, as horse-racing, gambling, etc., and recommend the constant diffusion of Gospel truths as the only effectual cure. We are glad to be able to report progress in our Sabbath-school work, and we recommend that special pains be taken on all our fields of labor to carry out the provisions of the Discipline regarding the relations of the children to the Church.

We are also happy to be able to report success in our Indian work. When the past and present privileges of our Indians are compared with those of white people, we find they are not a whit behind them in their moral and religious life.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

For some reason, very few of the schedules sent out to the ministers have been returned to the Committee, so that it is impossible to make any report as to the number of meetings held, or the number of those who signed our pledge. Those returned, however, show a fair increase. We feel sorry that this important matter has apparently been so neglected or ignored, and we respectfully suggest that in our opinion a matter which has claimed the earnest attention of every Methodist Conference aforetime, should not now even seem to be considered as of little moment when we return to our Circuits.

We recommend this Conference to reaffirm its instructions that all our ministers shall preach special sermons on the subject at every appointment, and circulate the pledge-book for signatures, thus signifying our real strength, and laying a strong foundation for the great work before us. We find there is still a lamentable failure regarding the due enforcement of our temperance laws. The North-West permit system, notwithstanding its many excellent features, has failed to accomplish the object for which

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t all our appointour real efore us. reement standing or which it was enacted. This failure occurs largely through the abuse of the permits and the difficulty of carrying out the law while any liquor is allowed in the territory. We still believe the system is better than a license law, and suggest that Conference give its influence in favor of the present system until a better one is obtained. We find also that in our own Province the law is sadly evaded. Whilst acknowledging the general excellence of the law of our Province, we believe it places too much power in the hands of the License Commissioner, and think it should be largely Every citizen should help to enforce the statute. We recommend further that this Conference declares itself to be strongly in favor of municipalities availing themselves of the provisions of the law in the adoption of the Thirty-ninth Clause of the Provincial Act, which empowers them to prohibit the granting of licenses within their bounds as being the readiest method of stopping the traffic in their immediate vicinity. But we desire most distinctly to state that the traffic, especially in the North-West, will not be put down by license laws. We are of the opinion that the question has been temporized with long enough, and it is high time that all true temperance men should speak out plainly in favor of prohibition as the only solution of this the greatest question of the day. This is not the time to lower our standard to suit the taste of avowed enemies or timid friends. Our people have heretofore spoken out bravely on the question of total abstinence for the individual, and we should in the strongest manner reiterate the necessity of this both as a matter of Christian duty and personal safety. Let us preach and emphasize the doctrine that the citizen's franchise is a thing so sacred that it should only be used to uphold the right. Our people must make this question a direct issue at the polls. When politicians of every shade fully understand that our vote and our people's vote cannot be obtained except by those who are in accord with our views, and who will support by voice and vote in the House of Parliament the principles we demand, we will be in a position to control every election. As a Conference we desire to nail our colors to the mast inscribed with the one word Prohibition.

Your Committee therefore recommend that this Conference take some steps to secure some such united action. We suggest that a Committee be appointed to act on behalf of Conference, with any similar Committees appointed by other Christian bodies or Temperance Societies, and to confer with the Executive Committee of such bodies with a view of calling a convention or taking such action as may be deemed necessary in securing the attainment of our object. We suggest the following names: Revs. J. W. Bell and A. Andrews, together with Messrs. C. Sifton and M. H. Fieldhouse. In making all these recommendations we gladly recognize the good work done by the Women's Christian Temperance Union, also the Ministerial Association of Winnipeg, and all Temperance Societies, in pushing on the great work, and we heartily wish them God-speed in all their labor, which also is ours.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

Your Committee having had laid before them a resolution passed by the trustees of the West Selkirk congregation of the Methodist Church, requesting that they be permitted to sell the church property in the town of West Selkirk; and the minute of the last District Meeting of the Winnipeg District requesting this Conference to grant them such permission; and having by enquiry ascertained that such property is liable for debts which the trustees have no means of paying, and that a suitable offer has been made for the property, recommend that such trustees be given authority to sell and dispose of the said property, either by public or private sale.

Your Committee having also considered a resolution of the trustees of the Emerson congregation of the Methodist Church, and a resolution passed by the Winnipeg District Meeting, requesting the sanction of Conference to the sale and disposal of the brick church property on First Street, in the town of Emerson, held by such trustees in trust for the Methodist Church; and being satisfied that the encumbrances against such property are of greater amount than the value of it, and it being made to appear that by an arrangement proposed such trustees can obtain a small amount in excess of the liabilities thereon, therefore they beg to recommend that this Conference do consent to the sale and disposition of this property by the said trustees.

Your Committee also recommend that the consent of this Conference be given to the sale of the Bethel Church property, Winnipeg, either by public sale or by private contract, and together or in parcels, and either at one and the same time or at different times and places, by the proper owners or authorities, as they may deem best.

Your Committee cannot feel justified in making any recommendation in the matter of the Jemima Street property.

A memorial having been presented from the Saskatchewan District in reference to Sabbath-breaking and other immoralities by white people among the Indians, and your Committee having heard from our mission-aries that such a state of things actually exists, and feeling that such conduct is a very serious impediment to civilization and Christianization of the Indians, recommend that this Conference express to the Indian authorities its strong disapproval of such conduct, and furthermore request them to take steps for the removal of this evil, assuring them of the hearty co-operation of our Church and its missionaries in any effort they may make in this direction.

3. With reference to the memorial from Port Arthur re formation of

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new District, your Committee recommend the change proposed as soon as the work shall develop sufficiently in this vicinity to justify such a step.

4. With regard to that part of the memorial from Port Arthur bearing on the time of District Meeting, and the relations of that Circuit to the Manitoba Conference, we recommend that a suitable letter be sent to the Circuit officials, fully explaining the matter as well as the action of the late General Conference.

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GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND.

TREASURER'S INTERIM REPORT.

Requested to be laid before the several Annual Conferences, and published for information in their Minutes.

Although this Fund has been in existence since the time of the formation of a General Conference in 1874, it has never had a written constitution.

The object of the Fund, as gathered from its history, and found in the Journals of the General Conferences and in the Discipline of the Church, is to pay the travelling expenses of delegates to and from the General Conference, and of representatives to other churches and bodies who are appointed by the General Conference; to meet the salaries and expenses of our General Superintendents, and of all General Conference committees that have no funds of their own; as also to pay the expenses of transfers in certain specified cases.

The different departments of the Church, up till the meeting of the last General Conference, paid one-half of the salaries and expenses of the General Superintendents, leaving only the other half to be paid by the Fund.

The income for this moiety was derived from collections taken up from year to year in the several Circuits and Missions in the entire Church, and yet that income has always been insufficient to meet the demands, and hence the Fund has always been in debt.

The present Treasurer was appointed at the last General Conference, and the whole amount necessary to meet all the above claims in full was thrown on the Fund, without aid from any department of the Church.

Nearly all the collections for the year 1886 and 1887 had been paid to the former Treasurer, and yet at the close of the General Conference the Fund was in debt about \$5,000. The present indebtedness of the Fund is between \$6,000 and \$7,000, with large quarterly payments and other heavy special claims to be met as they arise.

The Finance Committee of the General Conference, seeing the very great responsibility involved and the large amounts to be raised, took the following action, viz. (Journal, p. 251): The estimated amount required during the quadrennium, less cash on hand, was \$30,000, or an average of \$7,500 per year. This amount was divided by them as follows: Toronto Conference, \$1,430; London, \$1,000; Niagara, \$1,000; Guelph, \$875; Bay of Quinte, \$875; Montreal, \$1,125; Nova Scotia, \$400; New Brunswick, etc., \$400; Newfoundland, \$125; and Manitoba, etc., \$310. These amounts will therefore be required annually, in the estimation of the Finance Committee, to meet the claims on the Fund. The amount paid by the several Annual Conferences last year, up to the 1st of September, was about \$5,200. Now the Discipline (see p. 50) directs the officers of the General Conference "to disburse only the amount on hand for General Conference expenses," etc. I understand from this clause that the Fund is not to go into debt beyond the quadrennium. As the matter is now carried on, the largest expenditure is incurred in the payment of General

Conference expenses at the beginning of the quadrennium, thus involving heavy payments for interest. What is to be done? I suggest—

1st. That every Circuit and Mission should take up a large all-day Sabbath collection, and forward it immediately, through its proper officer, to the Treesurer. This will reduce the distributions of the treesurer.

to the Treasurer. This will reduce the interest account.

2nd. Should there be any deficiency at the close of any year in the amount expected from any Conference, let prompt and energetic measures be adopted to meet such deficiency. It will be found easier to do this annually than to raise the whole amount at the end of the quadrennial term.

Our brethren throughout the entire Church will see that it will require united, vigorous and prompt action to save the Fund from financial embarrassment, and to enable it to pay in full the amounts needed successfully to carry on our work.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Report of the Treasurer for the year ending July 31st, 1886, for publication in the Minutes of the Annual Conferences.

The full Balance Sheet, having been properly audited and accepted by

the Board, is published in the Journal of the General Conference.

The Fund is divided into two accounts, the Capital and the Annual. The Capital Account is made up of legacies, donations, and other amounts given for the purpose of investment, the interest only being used. This account amounted at the above date to \$167,956.23, less certain unproductive assets valued at \$8,355.14, and leaving as productive capital the sum of \$159,601.09, being nearly \$5,000 over the Capital Account of the previous year. This amount is invested in mortgages, debentures, and other reliable securities, and yields nearly 6 per cent. per annum.

The Annual Account amounts to \$70,918.44. The following are the principal sources of income and expenditure at the date above specified:—

A combination of circumstances which the Board could not control left the Fund in debt at the end of the year, as may be seen from the above statement, over \$2,700.

As the financial year does not close till the 31st July, no definite report can be made for the current year. This report will be presented at the next Annual Conferences. The Book Room grant has been increased this

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year to \$6,000, a result that must be very gratifying to all concerned, and which furnishes an additional reason why our Book Room should be liberally patronized and loyally sustained by both ministers and members. With the assessments from Circuits all paid in full in accordance with our present law, as passed by the late General Conference, we expect to be able to meet all legitimate claims in full, and to reduce, if not extinguish, the deficiency of the previous year. True, genuine loyalty to Methodism and its institutions, and united and persevering effort on the part of our ministers and people, will place the Fund in a position in which it will be a lasting boon and blessing to the Church, and to the aged, the widow, and

REPORT OF COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO INVESTIGATE THE CHARGES PREFERRED BY REV. J. ROBERTSON, SUPERINTENDENT OF PRESBYTERIAN MISSIONS.

Your Committee find that Rev. J. Robertson, Superintendent of Presbyterian Missions in Manitoba and the North-West, is reported in the Toronto Mail of Feb. 2nd last as having said at a meeting of the Toronto Presbytery, in regard to co-operation with the Methodists of this Conference, that "The Methodists allowed the Presbyterians to find out the places and then sent in their men. He found that the ecclesiastical sense of honor was lower in the Methodist Church than in the Presbyterian, and until they came to a level it would be difficult to co-operate. There had been co-operation in the building of union churches, but in these cases the Methodists had got the building and the Presbyterians had to go without."

Your Committee recommend the Conference to place on record its most emphatic and indignant denial of the correctness of the charges, deeply regretting at the same time that occasion has been given by these charges to threaten the very cordial relations which so generally exist between the Methodist and Presbyterian Churches of this country.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO DRAFT DETAILS OF A SCHEME FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A THEO-LOGICAL COLLEGE AT THE CITY OF WINNIPEG.

To the Manitoba and North-West Conference:

DEAR BRETHREN, -Your Committee have the honor to report the following as a basis for the establishment and maintenance of a Theological College at the city of Winnipeg, in the interests of the Methodist people of Manitoba and the North-West Territories.

No Endowment Fund shall be attempted at the present time.

2. The estimate for annual expenses for the next three years shall be \$4,000.

3. Necessary funds shall be raised within the Conference and among the constituents from year to year by voluntary offerings, in such a way as not to interfere with the regular educational collections.

4. Subscriptions shall be inaugurated by this Conference, and as much

guaranteed annually for the next three years as possible.

5. Said funds so guaranteed shall be supplemented by funds raised by collections and subscriptions obtained at meetings held in every Circuit and Mission within the bounds of the Conference, between the first day of November in each year and the first day of March following, and all guaranteed subscriptions shall be payable on the first day of December in each year.

6. The raising of all funds shall be under the direction and control of

the Board of Management.

7. The seat of the said Institute shall be in the city of Winnipeg.

8. The said College shall be established and carried on by the Board of Management, under the authority of Wesley College if practicable, and if not it shall be established and carried on by the Board of Management, under the direction of the Manitoba and North-West Conference.

9. It shall be incumbent on the Board of Management to commence

operations this fall if practicable.

10. If the said College be not under the authority of Wesley College, the said Board of Management shall be Trustees for this Conference in the control and management of the same. All monies received by them shall be held and disbursed as trust monies; and all property acquired by them for the purposes of the said College shall be held by them as trust property.

11. The Conference may, by a vote or votes thereof, at its annual meeting, if necessary, remove any one or more or all of the members of the Board of Management, and substitute another or others in lieu thereof. The Board of Management shall have the power to fill all vacancies therein occurring between any two sessions of the Annual

Conference.

12. The Board of Management shall consist of the Revs. J. Woodsworth, A. Stewart, B.D., J. M. Harrison, J. Dyke, and W. L. Rutledge, and Messrs. W. Hutton, Jas. Chisholm, M. H. Fieldhouse, C. Sifton, B.A.

13. The Board of Management shall annually present a report to the Conference.

STANDING RESOLUTION.

Resolved,—That whereas the Conference may be appointed to meet in some place where there may not be sufficient accommodation easily secured, we hereby direct that the members of the Conference resident in the place where the Conference may be held be the Billeting Committee, and that this Committee be empowered to make the best possible arrangements with the hotels and boarding-houses to accommodate all who cannot otherwise be provided for; and, to meet the necessary expense, each member of the Conference shall pay an equal share. CONSTITUTION OF THEOLOGICAL INSTITUTE.

1. This Association shall be known as "The Theological Institute of Manitoba Conference."

2. The object of the Institute shall be the study of theology and the cultivation of piety by means of lectures, sermons, essays, addresses, and devotional exercises; and also the collection and preservation of historic records of Methodism in this country.

3. The Institute shall consist of all members of Conference, probationers for the ministry, and members of the Methodist Church in good standing, whose names have been enrolled and their membership fees paid, upon nomination and election by a majority of members present at the time of such nomination and election.

4. Any person desiring to become a life member, on election by the Institute and the payment of \$25, shall be enrolled as such; but in all cases such membership shall be cancelled by the Institute upon sufficient cause shown with regard to moral character.

5. The officers shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer, Preacher and Lecturer, elected annually by ballot without nomination.

There shall also be a Historian, who shall hold office for five years, and an Executive Board, consisting of eight members, elected in same manner. In the case of the Executive Board, the two having the highest number of votes shall remain in office four years; the two having the next highest number of votes shall remain in office three years; the two next highest two years, and the next one year. Each year there shall be two members elected to take the place of the members retiring, provided, nevertheless, that any member may be re-elected. In all elections every officer must have a majority of votes cast.

6. A course of reading shall be devised from year to year by the Executive Board. The reports of this Board shall be submitted for confirmation to the Institute, who shall have power to add to or vary the same if deemed advisable.

7. Prizes may be offered annually for essays on subjects chosen by the Board, who shall also award the prizes, such essays to be based on course of reading.

8. An annual meeting of the Institute shall be held in connection with Conference, to open the day previous to opening of Annual Conference, and at the same place, at which meeting election of officers shall take place.

9. There shall be a membership fee of fifty cents per annum, payable in advance.

10. At least ten members must be present at any annual meeting of the Institute to constitute a quorum.

11. No change shall be made in the constitution of the Institute except at an annual meeting and by a two-thirds vote of the members present, and after due notice in writing of such amendment has been given at the previous annual meeting.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

The following shall be the order of business:—

- 1. Opening exercises.
- 2. Reading minutes of last session.
- 3. Calling roll of members and enrolling new members.
- 4. The President's opening address.
- 5. Reading and discussion of essays, etc.
- 6. Reports of Executive Board, Historian, Committees, and Secretary-Treasurer.
 - 7. Consideration of constitutional changes and miscellaneous business.
 - 8. Election of officers.
 - 9. Closing exercises.
- (a) The retiring President shall give an opening address at the annual meeting on current theology or some kindred subject.
- (b) All rules of order not specially provided for shall be governed by the rules of order adopted by General Conference.
- (c) The Historian shall be chief editor, and on his nomination the Institute shall appoint sub-editors, whose duty it shall be to collect and forward documents and information to the Historian. The Historian shall report at each annual meeting.

Course of Reading for 1887-88.

- 1. Natural Law in Spiritual World.
- 2. The Unseen Universe.
- 3. Unity of Nature.
- 4. Sheldon's History of Doctrine.

Three of these must be read; the fourth is necessary, and the others are optional.

A Thesis will be required on some part of the fourth.

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THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

MANITOBA CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

TO THE

CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

DEAR BRETHREN,

Assembled in our Annual Conference, we rejoice to have another opportunity of addressing you, and of greeting you in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. We are profoundly thankful for the many manifestations of the Divine favor granted to us during the year. Showers of blessings have descended on the right hand and on the left. The pleasure of the Lord has prospered in our hands. There have been many evidences of increasing spiritual life in our midst, and many from among the ranks of the worldly have "come up to the help of the Lord, to the help of the Lord against the mighty." We are gratified and encouraged to notice an increase of 1,034 during the past year in our membership. But much yet remains to be done. There is much land yet to be possessed. The success of the past, far from satisfying our spiritual ambition, should reanimate our zeal, stimulate us for further exertion, and inspire us with unswerving faith in the Gospel, and in the power of Him who is "mighty to save," and who must reign "from shore to shore, and from the rivers unto the ends of the earth.

Notwithstanding increasing spiritual prosperity, there is still much that calls for humiliation and earnest prayer. Much indifference still lingers in our midst, and we entreat you, brethren, to arouse yourselves to greater faithfulness and zeal; to seek more earnestly that grace which helps our infirmities and strengthens us for the battle. "Gird on the whole armor of God." "Fight the good fight of faith."

Never before was Methodism so well equipped for work in the Master's vineyard. Never before was she so well organized for warfare with the powers of evil. Never before were her prospects so bright as now. And our responsibilities increase with our opportunities. Brethren, be true to your trust. Let not your hands be slack. Greater efforts will secure greater blessings. Greater faith will be crowned with greater power.

There is a spirit of liberalism abroad in the Churches, at which, for some reasons, we rejoice; but which is by no means unattended with danger. We rejoice at the spirit of unity which is drawing the various branches of the Church of Christ into closer fellowship and brotherly love, and we pray that the Churches may be drawn into still closer fellowship; that all sectarian bitterness may cease, and that Zion may rejoice in peace,

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and that it may truthfully be said concerning us, "Behold, how good and how pleasant a thing it is for brethren to dwell together in unity." But while we say, with all our heart, "Grace be with all them that love our Lord Jesus Christ," while we extend our greeting to our brethren in other branches of the Christian Church, we recognize the danger of encouraging a spurious liberality, which tends to weaken all branches of the Church. You cannot strengthen the chain by weakening its various links. They who are truest to the genius and principles of their own Church can afford to be most generous in the expressions of their brotherly kindness to other denominations. The Church is your spiritual home, in which you and your children may receive that religious nourishment and training without which spiritual destitution and ignorance must prevail. It is the garden of the Lord, in which you may grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Do not countenance that spirit which is so prevalent, and which professes to consider Church membership an unimportant tning. There can be no Church without membership. We entreat you, brethren, in nowise to undervalue this great privilege. By ignoring its importance you will paralyze and destroy the Church's power. Loyalty to our own Church will best lead to loyalty to the uni-

We earnestly entreat you to see to it that your religious life brightens and beautifies your homes. We are profoundly impressed with the fact that if our home life were of a higher type our Church would be greatly strengthened and blessed. Train up your children in the nurture and

"Of such is the kingdom of heaven." admonition of the Lord.

Let not the Church be a bushel under which to hide your light. Within the sacred circle of the home, amid the distractions of business life, and the chilling influences of worldliness, "let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven." Do not countenance that laxity which sanctions demoralizing amusements and sports, such as dancing, card-playing and

theatre-going. "Whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God."

The various interests of our Church claim your hearty sympathy and support. Our missionary work, both at home and abroad, was never more The cry for the light was never louder than it is to-day. Cultivate a missionary spirit. Feebleness of missionary zeal is a sure indication of spiritual decline. The Church that extends the warmest sympathy to those who are afar off is the Church that is most keenly alive to its own interests. Our Missionary Fund has been liberally supported in the past, and it needs your hearty support to-day. We rejoice that our reports show an increase in the contributions to this Fund during the past year of \$1,064.16.

Our educational interests need special mention. We dare not lightly regard this important branch of our work. Other Churches have made strenuous and successful efforts in this direction, and we must not lag We shall be false to our trust if we fail to give practical evidence of our sympathy with this great work at this critical juncture of its his-We have just passed a resolution in our Conference expressing our sympathy with the scheme for the confederation of Victoria College with Toronto University. Deal generously with this Fund now, and we feel sure that the favor will be returned with interest in the near future.

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We also commend the claims of our Theological Institute at Winnipeg as worthy of the hearty support of our people throughout the bounds of our Conference. The fact that the members of the Conference have just subscribed \$1,350 annually for three years towards this Institute augurs well for its future success.

While expressing profound gratitude to God and the people for the financial advancement of the past year, we feel called upon to urge again the necessity of our Missions attaining independence as quickly as possible. The grants to Missions in this Conference are an exceedingly heavy drain on our Missionary Fund, and in view of the calls for more extended work that are coming from every side, we feel that these grants must be made lighter in the case of Missions already formed. We believe that systematic giving, according to ability and with true Christian self-denial, will enable us to do a great deal more than we have ever yet done. Do not make unworthy excuses. Enjoy to the full the measure of privilege conferred upon you. Do not weaken your spiritual life by the adoption of unworthy methods of raising money; methods which appeal to the depraved tastes and impulses of the ungodly. "Freely ye have received, freely give."

We beseech you, brethren, to give that attention and prominence to our Sabbath-school work which its importance demands. We are glad to

report a gratifying increase in this department of our work.

We earnestly entreat you to push the temperance cause. How to secure and enforce the necessary legislation is the crucial point in this great struggle just now. Let your influence be felt as never before in every convention for the nomination of municipal and political candidates. The disappointing utterances, the evasion in some cases, the avowed lack of sympathy with this movement, on the part of political leaders, and the continued refusal of parliaments to assume the responsibility of honest Scott Act enforcement, drive us into this position. Go forward, brethren, with unflinching purpose, the fire of enthusiasm, and that resistless courage which is born of faith, hope, and prayer.

We cannot let this occasion pass without some heartfelt expression of loyalty to our most gracious Sovereign the Queen. This jubilee year appeals not in vain to those patriotic instincts which form part of our holy religion. We rejoice that the King of kings has blessed the great Empire over which Victoria sways her sceptre so wisely and so well. We rejoice that our beloved Sovereign recognizes the truth that "righteousness exalteth a nation," and we earnestly pray that her reign, like the path of the just, may "shine more and more unto the perfect day."

"God save our gracious Queen, Long live our noble Queen, God save the Queen."

In conclusion, dear brethren, we commend you to Him who is able to

perfect you in every good word and work.

"Now unto Him that is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us; unto Him be glory in the church by Christ Jesus, throughout all ages, world without end. Amen."
