# Russians and Roumanians BRITISH HAVE Continue To Retreat

Still Offer Stubborn Resistance to Mackensen as They Fall Back; Enemy **Checked on Transylvanian Front** 

Petrograd, Oct. 23—The Russian and Roumanian troops in Dobrudja are continuing to retreat, so the war office announced today. They are offering stubborn resistance to Field Marshal Von Mackensen's army.

On the Trancylvanian front the Roumanians made attacks yesterday compelling the Austro-German forces to retire slightly in the Toros-Oituz and Slanic Valleys. On the western frontier of the Moldavia the Roumanians are fighting stubbornly and with success.



### MANITOULIN FARMERS PLAN "DRIVE" ON WILD ANIMALS

Gore Bay, Oct. 23—For some time the bears and wolves have been killing sheep on the western end of Manitoulin Island. Some farmers have lost sheep valued as high as \$75 in one season, and cattle have been worried to death in some cases. The animals are increasing in number and they are now so numerous that many of the farmers say that they cannot afford to take the chance of losing their best lambs and young cattle and may go out of business. C. J. Campbell, of Burpee, has been talking the matter over with his neighbors, and they have devised a scheme to exterminate the bears, wolves and foxes. They propose to assemble about 300 men armed with horns, whistles and rifles. Leaving Mills Township, with the men scattered across the island from the north to the south/shore, they are to march westward tooting their horns and whistles, and making all the noise they can, until they reach the peninsula at Mississaga, where the beasts will all be shot. The farmers plan to cover the ground in about three days, camping at night and building fires all along the line to prevent the animals from getting back past them.

If the plan works out as expected the hunters will make money out of it, as the hides obtained would be worth considerable money.





## SIR WILFRID'S GOOD REASONS FOR DECLINING

The Correspondence Between the Two Leaders on the Belated Question of a Parliamentary Branch of the National Service Commission—The Premier's Attempt to Play Politics.

Ottawa, Oct. 22-Following is the correspondence which passed between Sir Robert Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier regarding the proposed formation of a parliamentary branch of the National Service Commission. Sir Wilfrid refused to accept the belated invitation of the premier, pointing out that Sir Thomas Tait had resigned owing to political interference. Sir Wilfrid felt that he could do much better work by continuing as he has done. He has been one of Canad'as most active recruiting agents sincethe war began:

Sir Robert's Invitation.

"Ottawa, Oct. 14, 1916.

"My Dear Sir Wilfrid Laurier.— I beg to enclose herewith copy of a letter which I have received from Sir Thomas Tait, as director-general of National Service. With the letter he transmits a recommendation unanimously made by the directors of National Service in conference at Ottawa as to the formation of a Parliamentary National Service committee, and the issue of calls to the manhood of Canada as set forth in his letter and in the resolution.

"You may remember that during the last session of parliament I suggested to you the formation of a parliamentary committee along somewhat similar lines.
"I'am quite prepared to accept the proposal of the conference and to undertake the formation of such a committee, and I trust that you will be good enough to co-operate. Of course, parliament itself is the final authority for the appointment of a parliamentary committee in the ordinary sense, but it seems to me that a committee composed of members of parliament for the purposes set forth in the resolution might be formed in the meantime. I would suggest a committee of twelve, and I would ask you to name five members, of whom I hope you will be one. If you shauld think a larger number desirable I shall willingly acquiesce."

London, Oct. 22, 12.42 p. m.—Advancing on a line of 5,000 yards between the Schwaben redoubt and Le Sars, on the Somme, during the night, in France, British troops have pushed their line forward from 300 to 500 yards, says the offiical statement issued last night from general headquarters in France. The British captured Stuff and Regina trenches and took several hundred prisoners. Previous to the attack an attempted offensive on the part of the Germans was re-

pulsed by the British.

SYRUP OF FIGS FOR CROSS, SICK
