



"Thousands of people get up every morning in tip-top condition," Dr. Kimmel declared. "The knockout which rulns the whole day comes right after they have eaten a neavy breakfast. Not only does breakfast upset the business man or woman but it puts too heavy a burden upon the mother who has the children to dress and various other household duties. The average woman is unfit for housework after she has prepared and eaten the average breakfast.

"The most perfect way for family life is to abolish breakfast, or, if you must have it, indulge in one that entails no preparation." Dr. Kimmel added, allowing for those who cannot go to work without food of some kind.

"The cornerstone of health," she added, "is right eating and right drinking—the use of a meatless, unfried food. When we cook food, we destroy the cellulose and change the organic chemistry of the food for which the body was intended to subsist upon.

35c "Danderine" does Wonders Diary Discloses Message of Franz Joseph to German Emperor.

Munich, Oct. 31—"Say to Kaiser Wilhelm that our distress is very great. We may be able to hold out, to carry on the war, for three months or even a couple of months longer; but then we are done; we shall have to conclude peace—to beg for peace. I can no longer assume the responsibility for continuing the war; indeed I will no longer bear it."

These words were spoken by the aged Emperor Franz Josef of Austria on Nov. 11, 1916. ten days before his death. They are quoted now for the first time, by special permission, from the diary of the high personage to whom they were spoken, and with their hitherto unpublished extracts show that on the date mentioned at Schoenbrunn Castle, and on the following days at Pless (which at that time was the seat of the German great general head-quarters), events occurred which were

"Later Franz Josef became more urgent and made use of the words quoted at the beginning of this article, begging his hearer to represent Austria's distressed state to the chiefs at German headquarters. Austria could no longer remain at Germany's side in carrying on the war. What ensued at Pless on the following day may be quoted from the diary.

"His Majesty Kaiser Wilhelm, who had a slight cold, gave me the heartiest welcome. I had to report to him at once about everything. On hearing the message of the Emperor Franz Josef, the Kaiser, without visible agitation, said: 'You must tell that to Hindenburg and Ludendorff, for it is important and—interesting.'

"At 5 o'clock I saw General Field-Marshal von Hindenburg, chief of the great general staff. I told him what the Emperor Franz Josef had said to me. The imperial message met with very little favor:—

"'Austria again! The Austrians want to leave us in the lurch now. I don't underrate the difficulties prevailing in the various countries; they are well known to me; but the Austrians must get over them like other people. Where there's a will there's a way.

"Ludendorff appeared during this conversation. He was very much excited over what he termed the "denunciation" of the alliance by Franz Josef, and these diary extracts may close with his words:—

"There is no relying on the Austrians; they do nothing, they have long been tired of fighting. And now they want to stop. Becter alone than to be tied up to them; there is nothing but vexation in that. Now we see just what these Austrians are. They are forever saying they are done, though they never act up to it. They are just weak and flabby. Truly, there is no trusting them."

Nine days later Franz Josef was de.d. But for that, history might have taken a different course. The situation at the time of these events is worth recalling. The summer had seen the Somme offensive, Brusiloff's great push on the Russian front, the entry of Rumania into the war, and the big Italian drive which led to the capture of Gorizia. Now a position of stalemate was developing, and with it the tide of discontent in Austria-Hungary was rising rapidly.

British Crown.

London, Nov. 1.—Lt.-Commander Rupert T. Gould, of the Admiralty Hydrographic Department, has succeeded in starting an ancient marine chronometer, nearly 200 years old, which had not been working since 1767—157 years. This machine, massive and intricate, is now at the Admiralty, keeping almost perfect time. Its errors, which there are hopes of reducing, amount to only a few seconds a day. Commander Gould worked for a year, chiefly in the small hours of the morning, in cleaning and repairing the clock. It has more than 500 parts and weighs 103 lbs. The brass in the clock is of such fine quality that an ingot of it could be beaten out almost like gold leaf.
