Not Live.

New York, Nov. 14.—Thirty feet of the front wall of a one-story brick building at 58 Second Avenue, Brook lyn, was blown out by an explosion of cork dust. One man received injuries believed to be fatal and another was severely burned.

The building houses the boiler room of the David E. Kennedy Company, manufacturers of cork floor tilling. It was in the boiler room that the explosion occurred. Each of the hugg boilers had a dust cap over it through which the cork dust was drawn into a vent pipe.

The dust in one of the caps was ignited and the resulting explosion blew the boiler through the thirty-foot gap in the wall. John Lynch of Brooklyn, watchman in the plant, was blown through the wall with the boiler. He received extensive burns about the body and was badly cut and bruised. It was said at Holy Family Hospital, where he was taken, that he had slight chance of recovery. Four men working in the rear of the boiler room, was felled by the explosion and burned.

HEALTHY LUNGS.

Healthy lungs simply mean lungs that are unimpaired by disease germs and respond to the free elastic movements of the chest, ribs, intercostal muscles and the diaphragm in the process of breathing.

Strictly speaking, there are no healthy lungs. All are more or less impaired through invading dust, inhaling smoke and disease during childhood. Germs and microbes of many kinds gain entrance to the lungs by mouth breathing.

The bronchi and trachea have hair-like processes on the mucus membrane of their walls which do their best to expel minute foreign bodies and microbes from entering the lungs.

But in spite of all efforts, these germs do get in and cause such diseases as influenze, bronchitis, pneumonia and tuberculosis.








YHARVES IN PROVINCE TAKEN OVER BY FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

Action Results From Five Years of Negotiation by the Province — Number Includes Many Along the St. John River.

Fredericton, Nov. 14—Hon. P. J. Veniot, Premier and Minister of Public Works, has made the announcement that the Dominion Government has taken over more than thirty of the wharves in tidal waters of the Province of New Brunswick. It will be remembered that the Minister of Public Works took this matter up as long ago as 1918 with the Federal Public Works Department and that legislation was passed by the Province in April of 1919, confirming the arrangement made between the Provincial and the Federal Minister of Public Works, at that time Hon. F. B. Carvell. The retirement of Mr. Carvell later in the year 1919 from that office to accept the position of chairman of Board of Railway Commissioners seemed to cause a halt in the transfer and. Railway Commissioners seemed to cause a halt in the transfer and, although the Provincial Government has urged upon the Dominion Government on several occasions since then the carrying out of the agreement, nothing was done until quite recently when Premier Veniot succeeded in having 32 of the wharves mentioned in the legislation taken over.
