
self, and Bishop Tuttle took over the episcopacy of Utah and Idaho alone, his territory being diminished to 195, general conventions. He was a man of 1000 square miles. In 1886 he accepted the position of bishop of Missouri, after having refused the election eighteen years previous.

For many years Bishop Tuttle was the dominant figure in the Episcopal imposing appearance, being more than six feet tall, broad-shouldered, and, even at fourscore years, possessed of the vigor of a well-preserved man way years younger. George F. Matthew, LL.D., D.Sc., F.
R.S.C., noted scientist and author, died on Saturday in New York, at the age of eighty-six years. Dr. Matthew was a student of geology in the Maritime Provinces for more than fifty years. His last visit here was on October 7, 1921, when he was the guest of hohor at a banquet in the Union Club at which Lieutenant-Governor Pugsley, Premier Foster, Mayor Schofield and many other prominent citizens were present.

For the last two years, Dr. Matthew has made his home with his son, Dr. William Diller Matthew, at Hastings-con-the-Hudson, N. Y., and funeral services were held there. Interment will take place at Gondola Point, Kings county, N. B.

1887, respectively, white Lavau University in 1894 conferred on him the honorary degree of D. Sc., a rare honor.

He entered the public service in May, 1858, and was appointed chief clerk of the Customs Service, St. John, in May, 1879, and surveyor, July 1, 1893. He retired from the customs service in February, 1915.






# PROTESTS ACTION OF SOVIET RUSSIA

"The first match of our tour was played at Wykagyl, near New York, and both Herd and I declared that we never saw better putting greens," writes Lees to Taylor. "The credit for them belongs entirely to Bob White of St. Andrews, a son of old Robert White, the cleek maker of a former generation. 


