The Kirk-Session respectfully report to the congregation that during the past year the Sabbath Services have been conducted with perfect regularity and been well attended.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper has been celebrated five times instead of four, owing to a re-arrangement of dates, made for the purpose of avoiding holiday seasons, and thereby securing larger congregations.

The Prayer-Meeting, owing to service rendered by the Elders during the Minister's three weeks absence in summer, was kept up throughout the whole year. The attendance, however, has not been so large as one would wish or reasonably expect, and it is hoped that this service, evidently appreciated by those that do attend, will be remembered by many more during the ensuing year.

The Sacrament of Baptism was administered to 22 children, and generally in private.

In the Church records 12 marriages have been registered.

During the year 27 communicants have been added to the Roll, 13 on profession of faith, and 14 by certificate. This does not include students.

The Kirk-Session regrets that death and migration have again left many blanks in the communion roll, and on the list of adherents. 10 have died; 12 have removed to the States; 7 have gone elsewhere in Canada, and two have returned to Scotland.

The Session regards with lively interest and joy the persevering activity in congregational, mission and charitable work, by the children and youth of the church, in the Sabbath School, and the more recently established Guilds, and heartily commends them to the generous sympathy and support of the congregation.

The Session desires to record their high appreciation of the services rendered by the Choir, and also of the very efficient manner in which the Precentor and Organist have discharged their important duties.

The Session deeply regrets the failure of efforts put forth by the committee appointed at last congregational meeting for the suppression of a tavern in front of the church.

The Session has examined the report of the Poor Fund administered by the Women's Home Association, and found the same correct and satisfactory.

Report of the Board of Managers.

St. Andrew's Hall, 12th Jan., 1893.

The Managers have much pleasure in submitting the usual Annual Statement to the congregation for the year ending 31st Dec., 1892. They feel that the statement must be gratifying to the congregation, inasmuch as after discharging all obligations for the current year, there is a surplus on hand and no outstanding accounts unpaid.

The Managers would respectfully draw the attention of the congregation to the comparative statement published herewith, which shows a tendency to reduction rather than increase in the revenue available for congregational purposes. It is well to do great things on special occasions but it must not be at the sacrifice of our solemn obligations to our own congregation.

During the year, in consequence of the revenue not coming in as quickly as it should, the managers have been obliged to discount notes, involving an expenditure for interest of \$20.10. This can easily be avoided by the payment of the pew rent in advance and regular payment each Sunday of the Voluntary Revenue by the envelopes.

The managers heartily approve of the scheme of the Treasurer of the Interest Debt Fund to raise the amount required, by 400 contributors at 5 cents each, and commend it to the congregation; but care must be taken that it does not impair the ordinary revenue or plate collection, otherwise nothing is gained. The congregation will be pleased to hear that the ladies of the Home Association have placed the handsome sum of \$300 in the hands of the Treasurer of the Interest Debt Fund towards the interest on the Mortgage Debt due in February.

The interest account being now under such excellent management the amount may be eliminated from the estimate of our requirements for next year. A close estimate would show that with economy, and if no unforseen expenditure arises, not more than \$3750 will be required. But the managers are of opinion that \$4000 should be the minimum revenue raised. The Treasurer's statement, published monthly in the Church Notes, should receive the careful attention of all interested in the welfare of the congregation.

Accompanying you will find full details of receipts under heading of Supplementary Revenue during the year 1892.

I fear that there will be considerable disappointment, among those of the contributors who intended their money to go specially towards liquidating the Interest Debt, when they learn that the amount has been added to the Ordinary Revenue of the church. This procedure could hardly be avoided in the past, but in the current year a new system will be introduced. The Treasurer of this Fund, which will hereafter be known exclusively as the "Interest Debt Fund," will no longer hand the collections over monthly to the Church Treasurer, as has been the custom in the past, but will bank the amounts as they are realized and at the end of the year will hand the whole over to the managers for the specific purpose of meeting the charge for interest on the Church Debt. A total number of 400 contributors must be got who will agree to pay at the rate of 5 cents per week, making a total of \$2.60 a year.

I am very glad to say that, so far, this proposal has been very cordially met by those members of the congregation to whom I have spoken and I fully anticipate that before very long I will have the full number of 400 contributors secured.

The total of the fund raised through my agency in 1892 was \$219.60 against \$183.55 in 1891 and \$202.25 in 1890. This year we must have five times this amount nearly.

It is with much gratitude to the Great Teacher that we, as a Sabbath School, appear before you to render an account of another year's work.

There are 249 scholars on the roll, including the Bible and Infant Classes, with an average attendance of 217. The number of teachers and officers on the roll is 41; average attendance 35. Average number of scholars attending church 53. Two scholars have joined the church during the year. All the classes have studied the International S. S. Lessons for the year with the exception of the Bible Class.

The following scholars obtained Bibles for reciting the whole of the Shorter Catechism:—Agnes Maitland. For reciting the whole of the Mothers' Catechism—Jos. Reid, James Hopkirk, Grafton Herald, Jas. MacDonnell, Ralph Harris. For reciting the whole of the Paraphrases—Gertie Harold.

During the year we enjoyed pleasant visits from Messrs. Strachan and Hermiston former pupils of our school, now engaged in Sabbath School work in the United States, who expressed the warmest regard for St. Andrew's S. S. where they received their early training.

Since our last report was presented Miss Rees and Miss A. Pollie as teachers and Messrs W. Nickle and Gibb as librarians have severed their connection with the school; our best wishes follow them for the future.

No changes have been made in the library with the exception of the issuing of a catalogue which has simplified the work of the librarians very much. Mrs. W. T. Minnes, Miss Knox and Miss E. Minnes have been added to our staff of teachers; we welcome them.

Special quarterly collections have been made during the year, the proceeds to be devoted to Home Missions and the Church Building Fund. By this means \$57.20 have been realized for Missions and \$65.87 for the Building Fund, which is very encouraging.

We desire to express our thanks to Miss Machar for the copy of her latest work entitled "Marjory's Canadian Winter" which has been placed in the Library, No 884. We have no doubt it will be much sought after by teachers and scholars.

The annual Pic-Nic and Xmas Festival were held as usual and were very successful. A pleasant feature of the latter being the presentation to Mrs. Thompson by the mothers of the children under her charge in the Infant Class of a handsome easy chair. We join with the parents in wishing Mrs. Thompson many happy hours in the enjoyment of it.

This Society has held its monthly meetings regularly during the year. It is still a matter of regret that they are attended by comparatively few. Though the number of members is 45, though it ought to be much larger, the average attendance has been 9. At these meetings missionary news is communicated and papers bearing on mission life, its difficulties and trials and marvellous triumphs in our times are read and considered, and those in the habit of attending are interested and value the meetings.

During the greater part of the year sewing-meetings have been held, generally twice in the month, at which the average attendance has been five. At these meetings cast-off clothing has been repaired and new garments made for the indians, heathen and christian, in the North-west. The value put upon the clothes sent this year is \$100. Thanks are due to all those who responded to the appeal made through Mrs. Dobbs and contributed garments, quantities of calico, or small sums of money. Everything has been made the most of.

At the Annual Thanksgiving Meeting the minister presided and Mrs. Byers of Gananoque, the President for this year of the Presbyterial Society gave a short but earnest address. The Thank-offering amounted to \$37.25, though few were present. The total income of the Society is \$95.67, and all liabilities having been met, the sum of \$84.52 has been allocated to Foreign Mission work.

Mission news in the form of leaflets and to the number of 60, has been circulated monthly.

At the Annual Meeting of the Presbyterial Auxiliary, held at Belleville last April, the Society was represented by Mrs. Mowat, Mrs. Fisher, and Miss Ethelwyn Mowat. A most interesting report of the proceedings was brought back by Mrs. Fisher.

The Society has perceived with deep regret that the efforts put forth by the congregation in response to its pleadings and the pleadings of all the Societies in the church, for the suppression of a tavern in the immediate vicinity of St. Andrew's have proved unavailing. It is a new hindrance to Home Mission work, and therefore to Foreign Mission work, and hindrances already abound. Surely there is a call for more workers, sensible, consecrated women, who will give life abundantly to this Society and be able to report to the praise of God far greater things than are now, or ever have been recorded.

For the year that has passed away there are no striking particulars, but a general report of work steadily pursued in a quiet and unostentatious way. The different Sections have each attended to their respective departments and reported their doings at the monthly meetings over which the Minister has always presided and under whose guidance the whole work of the Guild is carried on.

One of the chief ends of the Guild has been the banding together under solemn obligation of the young women of the church for systematic christian work of various kinds in and out of the congregation. It is the sphere wherein all those works in variety can be engaged, which are the true adornment of women professing godliness, and in which all the loyal maidens of the church are expected to be found. Its institution therefore and its busy life in the heart of the congregation are calculated to prevent the ardent youth of the church from straying into alien and ephemeral associations away from the approving eye and guiding hand of those who are over them in the Lord, and of concentrating all the different elements of strength scattered throughout the congregation, that spasmodic working and overlapping and dissipation of energy may be prevented.

The Guild has now 42 members all workers there being no room in it for purely honorary connections. The door stands open to every young woman in the church, and none should be found standing outside idle or busy under names and obligations unknown to the church.

One of the most important Sections of the Guild is the one called the Dorcas, through which warm clothing reaches families suffering in silence, and little children that otherwise could not have the pleasure and advantage of attending church and Sabbath School. Respect for the feelings of such prevents the giving of details, but one can clearly see how extended the usefulness and far-reaching the influence of this Section can be when encouraged and helped by the

congregation. The Section has not been without these aids during the year. Contributions of material and money, little but many, have kept their minds easy, their hands busy and their hearts glad in this sacred work. By selling at lowest prices clothing for the poor after their free distribution was made they acquired a little means for commencing the work of a new year, and if members of the congregation would only send their large subscriptions to their own Dorcas Society the field of operation would be greatly widened and the strength of the church augmented.

The Section has been strongly reinforced for 1893, and is under the excellent convenership of Miss Smith, unanimously chosen for this position on the resignation of Miss McIver, who has rendered excellent service since the founding of the Guild, and who is still a working member of the Section.

The Hospital Section has the holiest and tenderest of christian work under its care, the visiting for purely religious purposes the afflicted inmates of the General Hospital and Rockwood Asylum. Very strengthening and comforting meetings have been held almost weekly at the Asylum during the year, and the ladies in charge have had much real gladness in their work. Through a feeling of timidity the workers in this portion of the field are not so numerous, and two or three very earnest young women, or not young, would be a great gain. The General Hospital has also been regularly visited for the purpose of reading to the sick the Holy Scriptures, holding religious conversation with them, and supplying little wants that are discovered. This last, however, has often had to be left undone, as private means alone could not fulfil all the great desires of the heart. Several times at the monthly meetings have regrets been expressed that they had to visit so often with empty hands. \$25 or \$50 would be riches to this Section, scatter fragrance over many a secret-place, and fill with pure joy the hearts of the visitors. And why should not this sweetness and gladness of heart not be?

It is reasonable to expect not only that some but that the larger part of the charity of the members of the church should flow through channels dug by those in authority in the congregation, and highly approved by it. Miss Hudgeons, who succeeded Miss Dickson last year, and has been unremitting in her exertions, has been unanimously continued at the head of this Section, and the much appreciated services of a lady, not a member of St. Andrew's are, we are glad to say, to be continued throughout 1893.

The Blue Cross Section, in charge of Miss Annie Davidson, has not had much to do during the year. Perhaps this is the best report that

Special work among the young is contemplated for 1893, and for this purpose the section will be strengthened by Mrs. Thompson, whose long continued work in the Sabbath School merits the praise of all.

The Section, and the whole Guild with it, lament the establishment of a drinking saloon right in front of the church, notwithstanding the strong christian influence brought to bear against it. The net however is spread at our door by the authority of man, but it is confidently expected that, by the authority of God, the warning voice will always be lifted up and the preventing hand outstretched.

The Visiting Section under Miss Jones, now succeeded by Miss A. Davidson, has had special charge of all old and frail people unable to attend public ordinances. In their rooms they have held meetings for praise, the reading of the Scriptures, and the rehearing of the Word preached in the Sanctuary, thus being bearers of portions to them that, through the providence of God, have to tarry at home.

The Social Section under the genial and energetic convenership of Miss McIlroy, who has held office since the creation of the Guild, has attended in the most satisfactory manner to the duties entrusted to it. Sometimes by themselves, and at other times in co-operation with the Women's Home Association, social evenings of the most delightful character have been held during the year, the kindly influence of which must linger with many.

Changes through marriage and migration have taken place since last report was laid before the congregation, but it is with thankfulness to God that the Guild has to record no blank in its membership through death since its commencement.

The average attendance has been fifteen and the work done has been of a miscellaneous character, the sewing of useful garments, knitting of mits and stockings, making of scrap books, picture frames, nick-nacks and such like. The greater part of this work was offered for sale in the autumn of the year and was entirely disposed of.

In the summer a Strawberry Festival was held in the hall, and was so well patronized by the friends of the children that a considerable, sum was realized.

The principal source of our revenue, however, for this year, was a balance of 49.54 carried forward from last year, after paying \$260.71 for furnishing St. Andrew's Children's Ward in the General Hospital. This year \$79.50 has been spent on the Ward and a further sum of \$31 is now being used in replacing articles worn out, meeting new wants, and providing clothing for destitute children found in the Ward.

Frequent visits have been paid to the Hospital during the year, and at Christmas time presents of toys, candy and warm clothing
