






C M S MISSION HOUSE. MEMORIAL MISSION ROOM.

#### REPORT.

NCE more the time has come for us to present to our friends a record of our work, together with a statement of our receipts and expenditure. We do so with gratitude to Almighty God for His continued help.

Missionaries are engaged on each of the four Reserves in the Southern part of the Diocese, and seven stations are occupied, viz.: Peigan Reserve, 1; Blood Reserve, 3; Blackfoot Reserve, 2; Sarcee Reserve, 1. Five ordained clergymen are at work, Lay Missionaries supply the other Stations. With the exception of the Missionary on the Peigan Reserve, who is supported chiefly through funds from Eastern Canada, the salaries of the Missionaries are paid by the Church Missionary Society, which makes an annual grant of \$4,970.00 for work in the Diocese.

The Indian Homes, which have grown out of the work of the Missionaries, are helped to a certain extent out of this grant, but the majority of the support necessary to augment the Government's Grants in aid, comes from the Church in Canada, a very large portion of it through the Woman's Auxiliary, whose continued help is most gratefully acknowledged.

The work of St. Peter's Mission, Peigan Reserve, has gone on quietly. The number of children in the Home has continued about the same, but great difficuly has been experienced in getting girls. The reasons given by Mr. Hinchliffe, for this, in his report, are: "(1) Girls are not so numerous on the Reserve as boys. (2) The Roman Catholics, with their usual foresight, have devoted their energies to a girls' school. Being nearer to the more populous part of the reserve, and having a staff of workers exactly equal to ours, and only a third as many children, they can make a better show to the Indians than we can. (3) So many of our girls have died that the Indians are almost afraid to give us others."

The services have been better attended during the past year. One of the Indian boys occasionally reads the lessons, parts of the scripture now being written in syllabics introduced by Mr. Hinchliffe, and different characters being used to those in use amongst the Crees.

The need of a new building for the Home has been felt for some time past, and at the time this report is being written a new Home is in course of erection on freehold land donated by the Government, about ten miles from the present site. It is to be known as the "Victoria Jubilee Home

for Indian Children." It is a frame wooden building, plastered on the inside, and is to be heated with hot air furnaces, the gift of a rancher in the district, who values the work the Indian Homes are trying to accomplish. His kindly help is gratefully acknowledged. The cost of the new building will be about \$3,500.00; towards this amount the Government has promised \$1100.00. Subscriptions are being sought in the neighborhood as thankofferings for our good Queen's long reign, but as it is hardly expected that the whole sum necessary will be raised in the Diocese, help from without is earnestly solicited. Many who are interested in this work and desire to show their gratitude to God for the blessings of the past sixty years, may be glad to assist in the erection of this building. The Ontario and Ottawa W.A. continue to support Miss Brown as matron of the Home.

St. Paul's Mission, Blood Reserve, is the next oldest of our Missions in this Diocese. The Rev. F. Swainson, who when our last report was published, was in England on furlough, has resigned his Lost, but is partially engaged collecting funds for the Mission, in England.

The Rev. E. F. Hockley has been in temporary charge of this station during the year, but a new Principal has just been appointed, the Rev. Arthur de B. Owen. The Home continues to support the same number of children as last year, 64 in all, six of these being destitute half-breed and white children for whom the Government makes no grants-in-aid. There are twenty-five girls and thirty nine boys under training here, ranging in ages from four to seventeen. They speak English, are well instructed in the Holy Scriptures, and many of them attend the prayer meetings held weekly by the staff. The Sunday services are always bright, the children sing and respond, whether in English or Indian.\ A number of adult Indians also attend. Miss Rutherford, a Missionary of the C.C.M.A., has joined the Mission as Matron of the Girls' Home, her salary being met, as are those of other members of the staff, out of the general funds of the Mission. The Huron W.A. continues to pay the salary and board of a teacher for the girls. The Hospital built two years ago is still standing idle, no funds being forthcoming for a nurse's salary. It is a great pity that it cannot be at once put into working order. Two hundred and fifty dollars a year, however, is necessary for this; and we do not at present see where the money is to come from.

Red Crow's—The day-school at this station has been closed, owing to the withdrawal of the Government grant towards the teacher's salary, on account of the small attendance. The Rev. E. F. Hockley is now in charge as itinerating Missionary, his work extending at present some forty miles into the foothills of the Rockies.

Bull Horn's—The day-school at this station has been kept open during the year, but the Government is anxious to close it and make more

use of the boarding-school at St. Pauls, by drafting children into it. When this takes place, it is hoped that means will be forthcoming to place a Lay Missionary there who will spend his time visiting the scattered Indians in that vicinity.

The St. John's Mission, Blackfoot Reserve, including the Station at the South Blackfoot Reserve, is under the supervision of the Rev. H. W. G. Stocken, who finds the work a great strain. He has much encouragement from individual Indians who come to him for sympathy, not only in temporal matters, but also in spiritual concerns. Many attend the services on Sundays, and of some it may be said they are "almost persuaded."

The Homes have contained about the same number of pupils during the year. A new departure has been the separation of the boys and girls by transferring all the boys from St. John's Home to the new Home on the South Reserve, leaving the former institution entirely for girls.

In the early part of the year the Hospital was opened for the reception of patients. This was made possible by the offer of a medical man to devote his services to the Mission, and of the offer of his two daughters, one of them a well qualified nurse, to act as Matron and nurse respectively. The Toronto W.A., whose kindly assistance to the Blackfoot Mission now extends over several years, undertook to provide salaries for the ladies. The Hospital has already received several in-patients, and these, with the number of out-patients that come to have their sicknesses attended to, sorely tax the strength of the ladies. An assistant is being sought, and an enlargement of the Hospital before next winter seems imperative. The manner in which this institution has been used by the Indians from the day it opened, has more than fulfilled our most sanguine hopes, and already this is looked upon as likely to be one of our most important agencies.

Archdeacon Tims has charge of the Sarcee Mission, which was the last to be opened, no Missionary ever having resided amongst this people prior to 1886. The Boarding School was last year enlarged by the addition of a girls' wing, known as the "Katherine Stocken Memorial Wing." Originally it was intended that this memorial should take the form of a Hospital, and subscriptions for this purpose were asked. The sum required not having been realized, and the probability that the means would not be forthcoming for the support of a proper staff, even should the building fund reach the required amount, it was deemed advisable, with the consent of Mr. Stocken and some of the contributors, and with the Bishop's sanction, that a wing should be built to the St. Barnabas Home, for the training of girls. This was much needed, and the maintenance of the staff being already provided for by the Woman's Auxiliaries of Niagara and Quebec, the maintenance of the institution, so far as the

Church was concerned, was assured. The Memorial wing is a two story building, containing, up stairs, a large dormitory, and on the ground floor, a day room and lavatory for the girls, and quarters for the Matron. Six Sarcee girls are being trained here, and it is hoped that during the next year one or two others may be admitted.

The mission work among adult Indians, whilst encouraging in individual cases in all the Missions, cannot be said to be as successful as we should like; but "in due season we shall reap if we faint not."

During the past year eighteen of our elder scholars from the five schools have been drafted into the Central Indian In ustrial School, at Calgary, which has been built by Government and placed in the Bishop's hands. The Principal is a clergyman nominated by the Bishop, so that the religious teaching given in our schools will be continued there whilst the children learn farm work and trades. On the completion of their term they will return to their respective Reserves to be under the pastoral care of our Missionaries.

We must not close our report without acknowledging the very great help afforded our work by the bales of clothing and Christmas presents received from the Branches of the W.A. in Canada, and the Missionary Leaves' Association in England.

All subscriptions and donations in money, should be sent to Archdeacon Tims, Calgary P.O., and they will be credited to the respective Missions for which they are sent.

Bales of clothing, etc., should be addressed to the Missionary in charge of each station. Those for the Blood and Peigan Missions should be addressed to Macleod; for the Blackfoot Mission to Gleichen, and for the Sarcee Mission, to Calgary.

In the Financial Statements, for the first time, receipts in kind, both from the Government and the Missionary Auxiliaries, are shown and entered at cash value.




