Under the provisions of "The Prohibition Act, 1917," His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to approve the following Rules and Regulations, submitted by the Board of Liquor Control.

Prohibition Act.

Rules and Regulations.

A.—The strength of Intoxicating Liquors supplied by the Controller to Licensed Druggists and Licensed Practitioners and dispensed by Controller, Licensed Druggist or Licensed Practitioner shall be 20 per cent. under proof for Brandy, Gin, Rum and Whiskey. The strength of Port Wine, Claret, Sherry, Porter, Stout, Benedictine, Vermouth, Champagne, Liqueur, Ale and Beer shall be as imported by Controller.

B.—All prescriptions for private patients for Intoxicating Liquors to be limited to one prescription at any one time or not more than 3 ozs. per patient, for all Districts supplied by Licensed Druggists and Licensed Practitioners; and outside the Electoral District of St. John's where not so supplied the amount to be limited to a 12 oz. prescription per patient, except as provided hereinafter. No person is to receive more than one prescription per week, and the Controller, Licensed Druggist and Licensed Practitioner shall refuse to fill more than one prescription for any one person from any other medical practitioner within the said period of one week.

C.—All prescriptions for Port Wine, Claret, Sherry and Champagne shall be limited to a 24 oz prescription per patient.

D.—All prescriptions for Stout, Porter, Ale and Beer shall be limited to 1 doz. pint bottles per two weeks.

E.—Medical Practitioners may prescribe under Section B. up to the aggregate amount of three gallons only per month each where Licensed Druggists and Licensed Practitioners are established, and 4½ gallons in Electoral Districts where not so supplied.

F.—Medical Practitioners may prescribe under Section C. up to the aggregate amount of five gallons only per month.

G.—The total amount may be exceeded by any Medical Practitioner at the discretion of the Controller up to five prescriptions per month, and any further amount by a special ruling of the Board.

H.—The unused amount which may be to the Doctor's credit any month will not be carried forward.

I.—The Controller shall notify each Medical Practitioner weekly as to the amount of any intoxicating liquor remaining subject to his prescriptions.

J.—When any Medical Practitioner reaches the limited amount at his disposal, the Controller shall notify by post all Licensed Druggists and Licensed Practitioners to refuse further prescriptions signed by that doctor for that month.

K.—Prescriptions shall be written only on printed forms numbered consecutively, supplied by the Controller. The forms to contain spaces for name and address of patient, character of liquor, prescribed dose, doctor's name and date.

L.—The controller, Licensed Druggist and Licensed Practitioner shall cause to be written on prescription the name of the messenger who procures the liquor.

M.—Gummed labels showing the name of the patient, character and strength of liquor, prescribed dose

doctor's name, date, and by whom supplied, shall be placed on each package when prescription is filled.

N.—All manufacturers who obtain intoxicating liquors for manufacturing purposes shall keep a record of the amount supplied by the Controller and report weekly the uses to which same were put, stating the amount of goods manufactured and the percentage of alcohol used. The Controller shall refuse to re-sell to any manufacturer until such returns are received.

O.—The Controller shall have the right to regulate the amount of intoxicating liquor to be supplied to Licensed Druggists and Licensed Practitioner, according to the probable number of prescriptions to be filled by each per month.

P.—The Controller shall keep a separate record for each Medical Practitioner, Licensed Druggist and Licensed Practitioner, and shall prepare and submit a statement to the Board on Monday of each week, showing the number of prescriptions given by each Medical Practitioner, and quantity of intoxicating liquor supplied from each doctor's allotment, and the balance (if any) remaining to his credit, and also showing the amount of intoxicating liquor ordered by Licensed Druggists and Licensed Practitioners located in the Electoral District of St. John's, and the amount supplied by them on prescriptions, also the amount supplied by the Controller on prescriptions.

The report for Licensed Druggists and Licensed Practitioners located outside the Electoral District of St. John's shall be made not more than one week later. The report shall also include an inventory of all stock on hand, stating character and strength. The strength of draught liquor to be certified to by H. M. Government Analyst by distillation.

Recent Events

Charles Cavoy Killed
A great many stirring and important events have taken place since our last issue. The great explosion at Halifax resulted in over a thousand losing their lives and several thousand being injured. Millions of dollars' worth of property was also destroyed.

Maitland Mercer, son of Mr. Nathan Mercer, of Bay Roberts, perished in the mine. Chas. Cavoy, son of Mr. Charles Cavoy, shoemaker, lost four children in the flames, while he and his wife were badly injured. Only one of their children escaped.

In the theatre of war we may note the capture by the British of Jerusalem and German East Africa. The great Russian capture followed by the Bolshevik government. The defeat and retreat of the Italian Army and the British success at Cambrai were two other notable events.

Locally, the political situation has been the main topic, almost eclipsing the war. Premier Morris's resignation was followed by Dr. Lloyd assuming the Premiership. Dr. Lloyd formed a Ministry, although three of the members of the Executive, Messrs. Squires, Bennett and Gibbs, resigned. The Executive was then reduced to nine.

Rumors of important exposures followed the political upheaval and Mr. Coaker has taken liberal actions against the News, Telegram and Star.

A general election is impending, to take place, so rumor says, either in February or May. Testing times are ahead of us, and it behoves every fisherman to be on his guard. The result of the next election will determine, to a large extent, the future status of the fishermen of Newfoundland. The Guardian's advice briefly is, Let no man deceive you.

Killed While Serving His Gun

No. 43768 Driver Harold A. Russell, of the 1st Brigade Canadian Field Artillery, son of Mr. Isaac Russell, Country Road, was killed in action while serving his gun at Loos, France, on August 15th, 1917, by shell explosion in the gun pit. He was buried with military honors on August 16th in the Noeux-Les-Mines Communal Cemetery. This is a recognized military burial ground in France. A wooden cross with particulars of the deceased inscribed thereon has been erected to his memory.

The White Cross.

MADAME MONTESORI is organizing in America a new piece of war work. This is known as the White Cross. The White Cross "is a body designed to treat the children of war; to gather up the new human generation and to save it by a special method of education." A free course of preparation is being established in which volunteers will be trained "in first aid, knowledge of nervous diseases, dietetics for infants and children, isolation, special psychology, domestic science, agriculture, language, and a theoretical and intensive practical course in applied to these children." Groups of trained workers will be sent out to the countries which have been devastated by war, and an attempt will be made to restore to normal activity and joy the minds of children who have been terrified and crushed by the horrors they have suffered. The work is worthy and we wish it success; the need will continue for some years after the way is over.

Sore Throat

The following will be found a useful and refreshing drink in cases of sore throat, and indeed of febrile colds generally. Take a tablespoonful of linseed and boil it for an hour in a pint of water. Strain it and add to it the juice of one lemon and a tablespoonful of sugar. The linseed should be examined before boiling, and any little black grains removed, as they spoil the flavour of the liquid. The mixture may be taken either hot or cold.





Legislative Council, 1917.

Official Synopsis of Debates.

TUESDAY, July 24th.

The House met at 4 p.m., pursuant to adjournment.

The Placentia Water Co. Bill was put through Committee after an explanation of its provisions, but the Bill to amend the Prohibition Act provoked a lot of debate.

THE PRESIDENT complained of the unsatisfactory nature of the machinery devised for enforcing the penal provisions of the Act, which was taken from the Intoxicating Liquors Act, 1906, and which he held was ill-adapted for the purpose, arguing that new sections from the Act and with useless clauses eliminated ought to have been embodied in the Bill.

THE COL SECRETARY explained that the machinery proposed was that submitted to the government by the legal representatives of the Prohibition Committee and had been accepted by them, and that because of the late period in the session when the Bill was taken up, it had been decided to adopt it in the form submitted, but he agreed with the principle of having legislation brought up to date and included in the particular Bill intended.

A bill to extend the term of the present Legislature also passed all stages without amendment.

The Knitting Mills Bill and the Woolen Mills Bill were explained by Hon. Mr. Gibbs and read a second time.

HON. MR. HARVEY advocated an amendment which would relieve ships passing through harbors with liquor in their cargoes, or ships arriving with liquor for the use of passengers, from the technical violation of the Prohibition Act which the presence of such intoxicants on board these vessels involves, rendering them liable to prosecution and fine.

HON. MR. BISHOP agreed that all amendments along these lines are necessary, and was willing to have one drafted and brought in.

HON. MR. HARVEY also suggested that permission might be granted for the bringing into Newfoundland in bond and maturing here of wine from Portugal, in view of the large trade we did with this country.

Both Hon. M. Bishop and Hon. Mr. Squires expressed themselves as unprepared to accept such an amendment because it would provoke conflict. The President argued that it seemed unreasonable and inconsistent to take such a stand in view of the notorious fact that scores of people in the country had their cellars full of liquor at the present time for their own consumption, and it was not intended that the liquor should be consumed here but merely that it should be maturing and then sent away again. The Committee rose at 5.15 p.m. and reported progress.

The second reading of the Bill respecting the control of trading and the necessities of life, was passed after a brief speech by Hon. Mr. Harvey in which he emphasized the fact that the profits made here by business people since the war began, whether legitimate or illegitimate, and he thought them inhumanly high, had been situated in the colony, had been employed in expanding and increasing the business of the country, and had been specially applied to the purchase of ships for the requirements of the country, and held that in this respect Newfoundland had gained an advantage enjoyed by few countries. He explained that he did not mean these remarks as a criticism of the Bill, because he thought that a Bill of this kind if wisely administered, would be productive of great benefit.

HON. MR. BISHOP said that he felt sure that many of the members of the House would like to make some observations on the Bill in Committee, as he intended to do himself, and his idea in moving the second reading, without comment, was that it would be fully discussed at the next step. The remaining orders were deferred and then a motion for Suspension of the Rules was adopted. An adjournment was then taken until Thursday at 3 p.m.

THURSDAY, July 26th

The House met at 3 p.m. pursuant to adjournment. The Committee on the Public Services Electric Company Bill was resumed.

An amendment proposed by Hon. Mr. Gibbs to prevent the expropriation of lands belonging to the United Towns Electrical Co., to July 1, created considerable discussion, as also did a further amendment to protect the exclusive rights of that company to light the towns of St. John's, Carbonear and Heart's Content. The amendments were vigorously opposed by the Hon. Colonial Secretary who contended that they were unnecessary and would destroy the whole effect of the Bill. The Hon. President thought that if the proposed amendments could do no harm and if accepted would allay suspicion that the Bill was designed to operate against the old company.

The amendments were passed as also was one by Mr. Harvey, to the section providing for the free entry of certain articles for the construction and maintenance of the company's plant.

On the motion that the report of the committee be received, the Hon. Colonial Secretary's motion that it be not received was lost in the casting vote of the President.

The third reading was deferred till to-morrow. The Prohibition Amendment Bill passed all its stages after an amendment had been dealing with the importation of liquor in bond in transit to other countries, and for securing purposes.

A bill to extend the term of the present Legislature also passed all stages without amendment.

The Knitting Mills Bill and the Woolen Mills Bill were explained by Hon. Mr. Gibbs and read a second time.

HON. MR. ANDERSON objected to the granting of concessions to the latter company which was an old established company, and asked for further information showing the financial status of the company, before the committee stage was taken.

HON. MR. BISHOP replied that the concessions were not such as the Hon. Gentleman thought. The company had but recently resumed operations and were entitled to the concessions asked.

The War Pensions Bill passed the second reading without discussion.

The following Bill were introduced and read a first and second time.



The House adjourned till to-morrow at 3 p.m.

MONDAY, July 30th.

The House met at 4.30 p.m. A message was received from the House of Assembly that they had passed the Council's amendments to the Prohibition Bill, the control of Trading in Necessaries of life Bill and the Education Bill, all without amendment.

HON. MR. BISHOP in moving the adjournment, announced that he was leaving town to-morrow and this would, therefore, be the last time he would sit as leader of the Government in the Council. He thanked Hon. Members for their unfailing courtesy to him since he occupied the position, and bespoke for his successor the same courtesy as had been extended to him.

HON. COL. SECRETARY in behalf of the Government, spoke in high praise of manner in which the Hon. Gentleman had carried out his work as leader of the Government in the House which had been marked throughout for its courtesy, tact and efficiency.

HON. MR. ANDERSON also voiced the regret of the members at the departure of Mr. Bishop, and paid a high tribute to his work as leader of the Government in the Chamber.

HON. MR. RYAN and the President spoke to the same effect, after which the House adjourned till to-morrow at 3 p.m.

TUESDAY, July 31st.

The House met at 4.30 p.m. The Supply Bill, a Bill to enlarge the jurisdiction of the St. John's and St. George District Courts, and a Bill to amend the Mfd. Products Corporation Act, were put through all the stages, after being briefly explained by the Colonial Secretary.

The Cold Storage Act was sent up and was read a first time on the motion to defer the second reading until to-day, as the Bill was not printed.

HON. MR. HARVEY took occasion to point out many objections which he thought could fairly be taken to the Bill and asked the Colonial Secretary, Hon. Mr. Squires, who has taken over the leadership in the Upper House for the Government, following the withdrawal of Hon. Mr. Bishop, to secure information which would throw light on the matter for the next sitting. His first criticism was that certain clauses of the Bill gave a bonus of one cent per pound on certain fish exported, while other clauses fixed the minimum at half a cent a pound. His second criticism was that under the Act it was possible for Companies, say like the Cold Storage Company in the West End, to recover from the Colony a third of the cost of construction under the ordinary Cold Storage Act already on the Statute Book. His next criticism was that the Company might be able to collect this money year after year without exporting any fish at all. He said he made these observations in the line, not of criticism, but of one asking for information on points that were at present obscure.

HON. MR. SQUIRES said he appreciated the spirit in which the points had been put forward, and promised to have a full explanation regarding them for to-day's sitting. The House then adjourned until to-morrow at three o'clock.

MONDAY, Aug. 6th.

The House went into session at 4 o'clock, and after disposing of the Cold Storage Bill, to which some slight amendments were made,

At Harbor Grace on Monday, the Nineteenth, Tuesday, the Twentieth, Wednesday, the Twenty-first, and Thursday, the Twenty-second days of November next.

At Carbonear on Friday, the Twenty-third, and Saturday, the Twenty-fourth days of November next.

And the said Court shall be kept open for the periods hereinbefore prescribed at each of the respective places, as aforesaid provided the presiding Judge shall have business to do therein; and, if necessary, such Judge may extend the term at any of the said places for a period not exceeding two days and until the determination of the trial of any case then proceeding.

And We do, by these Presents, further order and direct that in the event of a Judge who may preside in the said Court in the Northern District of Our said Island being prevented by unforeseen circumstances from appearing Our said Court on any of the days hereinbefore appointed, or if the said Judge should be indisposed at any of the places hereinbefore named for holding Our said Court before the time stated for the opening thereof, and shall deem it proper to open the same without delay, the said Judge may, and he is hereby authorized to open and hold Our said Court on any other day or days than those hereinbefore appointed; and to keep the same open for the respective periods hereinbefore stated, as aforesaid, if he should find it necessary for the despatch of business to do so.

Public Notice The following Regulations, under the provisions of the Inspection of Foods Act, respecting the sale of condensed or evaporated milk, approved by His Excellency the Governor in Council, are published for general information: 1. No person shall sell or offer for sale any condensed or evaporated milk containing less than eight per cent of milk fat. 2. The Medical Health Officer, Government Analyst, or any Inspector appointed for the purpose of the Inspection of Foods Act may enter any store or any other place where any condensed or evaporated milk is kept or exposed for sale, and may take or purchase any reasonable sample of such condensed milk for the purposes of having the same analysed. 3. Any person who shall sell or offer for sale or expose for sale any condensed or evaporated milk which is found on analysis by the Government Analyst to contain less than eight per cent of milk-fat shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars, or in default of payment, to imprisonment for a period not exceeding thirty days. 4. Legislative Council Continued from 2nd page. without altering the principle though giving better guarantees to the Government. The Profit Bill came up for consideration. HON. SIR E. R. BOWRING assured the House that he was in no way hostile to any legitimate war tax. He was anxious to lighten the burden of the Government in any way that was reasonable and equitable. The Bill before the House, however, bore the imprint of class legislation. The business men of the community, so far as he knew, had been doing their share patriotically. In answer, they were being discriminated against in the Bill under consideration. He did not object to the principles of the Bill, but to the method it suggested. In its present form the proposed measure would not work out well. If it passed, however, he had full confidence that the business men would go on. They would however be obliged to work under restrictions they would conduct their business more carefully. They would not be able to take the same risk as heretofore. They would have to bear in mind that in the good year twenty per cent of their profits was taken, and that in the lean year the Government will not come to their assistance. There would probably have to be a curtailment in supplying. And it may be argued that for the good of the country it would be better if the supply were curtailed. In every country like Newfoundland it was necessary to give supplies. In the year of successful business the profits were large, while the unsuccessful year saw heavy losses. To conserve its interests a firm must pile up a good reserve to meet its losses when they come. The reserve would be taken if the proposed measure became law. The Bill was without precedent, either in the Mother Country or any of the Dominions. In the Old Country the tax was on profits, over pre-war profits. He believed the Government had the same object in view, but went the wrong way about it. In Canada an allowance of 7 per cent was allowed on capital stock. If the Bill before the House became law, nothing was allowed on the capital stock of any company doing business in Newfoundland. Any concern that was working on its own capital, subscribed by the shareholders, was not allowed to pay its shareholders a six per cent dividend, while the business firm that borrowed from the banks and paid six per cent on the money was asked to pay no more to the revenue, though the one had paid the six per cent, already to the bank, and the other had financed its business on the money of its shareholders. Why should the money of the shareholders in a business be not allowed a six per cent interest while the shareholders in the bank, who supplied the money to the other party to conduct business were? He saw nothing in the Bill as it stood to recommend itself, and if it became law it would probably take such an army of accountants to collect the tax that the outlay would exceed the income. The tax was manifestly unfair. Each one should pay his proportion, and no section of the community should be saddled. An import or export duty would be more reasonable. The time of collecting the tax would not be at all suit the trade. Feb. 1st was the time when the business firms had all their stock out in fish, oil, etc., and probably had drafts all ready due at the banks. If the business man at that time went to the bank for money with which to pay the tax, he would be unable to get it, and if the Government required it they could only distraint on the business, and what probably would be a sound concern on realization of its stocks would be driven to ruin. He held that the Government was right in getting after the profiteer. They should also handle the speculator, who is a menace to any country, but legitimate business should be fostered instead of being interfered with. HON. MR. ANDERSON again dealt largely in figures, quoting from Canadian and other authorities, as to the proposed tax on banks. He showed that if the same rate of taxation was applied in Canada as the Bill outlined, the Canadian banks would pay into the Treasury \$7,700,000 while at the present time they pay less than one-sixth of that amount. He argued strongly in favor of an export tax along the same lines as Friday last, and suggested a plan to the Government, as an alternative which would bring a large revenue, and would be easy of collection. He reiterated that the tax was for one class. Why not tax some of the lawyers whose stock in trade was a fountain pen, but yet were making from \$7,000 to \$30,000 a year. It was entirely a matter with the Government to fleece the trade and let the others go free. Getting back to the bank business, he said Canada had been very generous. We were not able to help ourselves and the Canadian banks were helpful institutions. HON. MR. HARVEY introduced similar argument to that of Friday

last. He favored the principle of the Bill, was not opposed to taxation, but wanted something better than class legislation. He advocated a per cent allowance on the capital subscribed, and after that had been deducted, and after that had been deducted, a tax. If twenty per cent, was too little, make it more, but in any case he hoped about it, and even it up, so that all would pay an equal amount. He still contended that the Bill was unworkable, that the Minister of Finance had too much other work to attend to take on new duties: that the privacy of any business should not be made known, and that while he would vote for the second reading of the measure, he would oppose it in toto if amendments that would likely be submitted were not adopted. If a proper and justifiable measure were not brought about, the Government alone would be responsible. HON. MR. MURPHY thought it was only a waste of time debating the question. If the Government would accept an amendment there was only one end to it. There should be no class legislation. Every one should be called upon to pay according to his or her means. As to the banks, they should pay. Unfortunately we had no banks of our own, and all the profits were going outside of the country instead of being spent in business. HON. MR. ELLIS supported the Bill in principle, but was willing to consider any amendments offered in committee. He considered that there was a great deal of misconception as to the intention. The bill was not a permanent undertaking, but only for two years, and there could really be no objection by the business interests. It was not the intention of the Government to deal unfairly with any class. The intention was to make those who made big profits contribute to the present year and next year, towards sustaining the ship of state. The Government was undertaking a big proposition in getting steamers to take our produce abroad, and bring our foodstuffs in, and it was not unreasonable to ask those who made the profits through the Government's efforts to pay something in return. In his opinion, the man who made \$50,000 net, paid \$10,000 to the Government and stowed down \$40,000, had no reason to complain. HON. MR. KNOWLING spoke briefly against the bill, and asked the mover, Hon. Mr. Squires, if it was the intention of the government to accept any amendments. HON. MR. SQUIRES replied that he was unable to answer question, except he knew the nature of the amendments, but in no case could he accept any amendments, that would upset the principle of the bill. HON. PRESIDENT ruled the debate closed to those who had already spoken, and the question being put for a second reading, the vote stood eyes and nays equal as follows: FOR AGAINST HONS. SQUIRES MILLEY GIBBS ANDERSON WINTER SKELTON HARVEY J. D. RYAN BLANDFORD KNOWLING POWER JAS. RYAN ELLIS GOODRIDGE On the casting vote of the President the Bill was read a second time. HON. DR. SKELTON took the Chair of Committee. After some desultory debate it was decided on an after-noon session with the understanding that no vote on the Bill would be taken. The House adjourned at 7 o'clock to meet again at 8. When the session resumed the House went into Committee and sat until 11 o'clock. There was considerable debate, the speakers being Hons. McGrath, Winter, Anderson, Harvey and Ellis. Several recommendations were offered, but none adopted. One by Mr. McGrath was that capital less than \$250,000 be allowed an interest rate, which was supported by Mr. Ellis, and all strongly opposed by Mr. Harvey and Mr. Winter. The Bill however, was then read through. The House adjourned till tomorrow at 4 p.m.

Pastoral of German Bishops WASHINGTON, Nov 22.—An official German statement, radiographed from the Government station at Nauy, says: The Catholic clergy of Germany in rejecting the principle of the sovereignty of the people have aligned themselves in support of the ruling House, and the monarchic constitution. The communication to-day follows: German Bishops will read from Episcopal throne this coming Sunday, a pastoral letter in which it is declared that the Catholics of Germany repel the attacks against the ruling House and Monarchic constitution of the State. The Catholics should protest the throne against outside enemies, and internal revolution. The Bishops reject the sovereignty of the people, which only brings other forms of inequality and servitude and constraints of which the world war offers many examples.



I am instructed by the Government that it is their intention to submit to the Legislature at its next session a Bill to limit the class of vessels entitled to Bounty from the Government under the present Shipbuilding Bounty Law. Hereafter Bounty will be payable on vessels not exceeding 120 tons gross measurement. Vessels exceeding 120 tons gross will not qualify for any Bounty whatever. It is intended that the Regulations shall apply to all vessels of which the keel has been laid at the date of this notice; but all vessels, the keels of which are not now laid, shall come within the scope of the proposed new Regulations, and shall not be entitled to Bounty when the vessels exceed 120 tons gross measurement.

New Rules

The following additional Rules de line with the issuance of liquor to the sick, have been submitted by the Board of Control and approved by the Government. These rules have been designed to meet particular cases which it was felt the allowance under the former regulations were not sufficiently elastic to properly serve:

1. In acute illness such as Pneumonia, Typhoid, Septicemia, etc., in which Alcohol is generally used and a larger prescription is needed than is provided under Section B (Rules and Regulations) the medical practitioner will be at liberty to prescribe any amount necessary for such patient, subject to the discretion of the Controller to the Practitioner's monthly allotment. The prescription must state nature of illness.

2. If in the opinion of the Medical Practitioner an aged person requires an extra amount to the 8 oz. prescribed under Section B (Rules and Regulations) then the Medical Practitioner may prescribe up to 14 oz. per week subject to the discretion of the Controller. The extra amount prescribed to be added to the practitioner's monthly allotment. The prescription must be marked "Aged person."

3. Section 25 of Prohibition Act, Cap IX, June 5, 1915, shall be construed to mean that after the first day of January, 1918, licences shall be issued free of charge to Druggists and Medical Practitioners.
