It is with pleasure we publish the appended financial statement of the "Newfoundland Patriotic Association of Boston and vicinity," and note that the handsome sum of \$451.50 has been forwarded to and acknowledged by John S. Munn, Esq., Hon. Treas. of the Newfoundland Patriotic Fund.

Having been present at several of the meetings and taken an active, though unpretentious part in organizing the association, we are thoroughly conversant with the difficulties it had to contend with, being hampered by inability and disinterestedness on the part of some prominent members whose ambition seemed to be to gain fame and a name for themselves at the expense of humane efforts of others.

We are pleased to learn that the association has rectified these mistakes and feel confident that their work in the future will meet with abundant success.

The object of the Association is "to raise funds to provide hospital supplies and other Red Cross necessities, for our wounded soldiers and sailors at the front," the money raised to be forwarded to the Newfoundland Patriotic Fund.

## At Harbor Grace

On Sunday afternoon last it was our privilege to accompany Rev. Mr. Higgett, of St. Paul's Church, on a visit to Harbor Grace Island where he went for the purpose of visiting his parishioners who reside there during the fishing season. A short service was held on the green, and the very gentlemen delivered a brief but very impressive address on the subject of "Intercession," in which he urged upon his hearers to help our soldiers and sailors who are fighting the Boer's battles, by praying for them daily. Mr. Higgett is becoming very popular with his congregation, and, we believe, he will be very successful in bringing the members of the parish to closer touch with the services of the church. We hope to see him at Bay Roberts occasionally.

St. Paul's Church is now undergoing extensive repairs. The south west end is being removed, and the north end, clear round to the north east corner, is to be pointed. The east end of the chancel is to have a cement casing of considerable thickness put over it, and probably some concrete pillars underneath the foundation. The work is being done under the direction of Mr. John Davey, of the firm of Davey Bros., builders St. John's, which fact is itself a guarantee that the work will be thoroughly done.

I cannot say any more about my travels at present, as it would take me all day to write about them all. I am just longing for the day when we shall be sailing home.

### WAR NEWS

#### Russians Hold Back Teutons

Petrograd, July 15.—The offensive near Stobychwa, northeast of Kovel, in an attempt to drive the Russians from the left bank of the Stokod River, has failed, according to a statement given out last night by the War Office. The intensity of the fighting on the Stripa River lessened.

#### Still Fighting At Verdun

Paris, July 15.—A violent artillery duel continues in the Fleury sector, the War Office announced to-day. A German attack on a trench northeast of Avocourt redoubt was repulsed, and German attempts to undertake attacks in the Apremont forest were checked by curtain fire.

#### London Exultant

London, July 15.—The new British advance on the Western front provides the theme for exultant comment in the morning papers. The situation of the German army is very critical, declares the Telegraph. The Daily News says: "The comparative ease with which the second lines have been forced into countenance to the belief that they were not as strong as the first lines undoubtedly were. It may be achieved with the carrying of the first lines, which the Germans are said to have held to be impregnable."

#### British Attack Was Surprise

London, July 15.—On the British front in France, at the end of a long day's unbroken struggle, the indications are that the British were holding their gains of the morning when along a front of about four miles they attacked the Germans second line and captured several important positions. An unexpectedly large number of wounded came into the clearing stations during the morning hours; many were borne by German prisoners, who acted as litter bearers. These prisoners said that no attack had been expected, and that the assault before daylight came as a complete surprise.

#### Russian Success In Volhynia

Petrograd, July 17.—In Volhynia the Russians in the region of Ostroff and Goubine have put down heavy Teutonic attacks launched in mass formation and have forced the Teutons to retire to avoid the danger of being outflanked. According to a Russian official communication issued this evening upwards of three thousand men were captured in the fighting.

#### Germans Repulsed French Make Gains

Paris, July 17.—The Germans made two attacks in Lorraine last night. The War office report of to-day says both assaults were repulsed. Attacks were delivered at a point southeast of Momeny. West of Fleury, the French made some progress, taking three machine guns. A raid on trenches in Champagne, occupied by Russian troops, was successfully met by a counter attack, causing heavy losses to the Germans. On the Verduin front the night was comparatively calm, except in the vicinity of Hill 304, where rifle firing was brisk.

#### British Drive Continues

London, July 15.—The British offensive was resumed to-day. The War Office announced that at one point the Germans were forced back to their third line positions; more than 2,000 prisoners were taken.

#### A Mile From Cambles

London, July 17.—The Anglo-French advance has brought the Allied troops within a mile in front of Cambles, which, prior to July 1st when the offensive began, was the German headquarters on the sector. Quiet prevailed on the British front. On Sunday a detachment which had been thrust forward to the third German line of Foureauz Wood to protect infantry operations has now been withdrawn to the main position. The casualty list as announced gives a total of 227 officers dead and 487 wounded or missing, 307 men dead and 1,832 wounded. The British are keenly watching for a new move on the front.

#### War-Saving Week

London July 17.—The week beginning to-day is regarded in this country as the war-savings week in which every citizen of the United Kingdom is expected to invest according to his means in the various forms provided by the Government for financing the war. The Chancellor of the Exchequer, Reginald McKenna, in a manifesto issued to-night urging the importance of the nation's efforts in this direction says, referring to the present military operations in France: "This is not a battle of a day or two, but the beginning of a long, patient and arduous offensive, demanding from our soldiers heroic exertions and unimaginable sacrifices. Are we at home content to be mere spectators of this wonderful effort? Pointing to the necessity for the same patient rights of self-denial on the part of the community, McKenna says, extravagances and wastes are treason in war time, indifference is crime."


#### Significant

Paris, July 15.—The bombardment along the Belgian front has reached a point of the greatest intensity.

#### British Official

The Governor, Newfoundland: London, July 17.—The Somme battle continues to develop favourably. D.ville and Bazentin le Petit Wood have been captured, and our troops occupy the outskirts of Prozieres. It is just announced that fifteen hundred yards of enemy positions, northwest of Bazentin le Petit, and the strongly defended Waterloo farm, east of Lagnival, have been captured. The remainder of the brave garrison of Ovillers, numbering 123, surrendered. The Dragon Guards, however, in action, and over two thousand prisoners have been taken. On Friday, five more howitzers and four other guns were captured. Captured documents indicate that the enemy casualties have been very heavy.

South of the Somme the enemy took Bihes and Malsonette by a surprise attack, but were again ejected. At Verdun early in the week the enemy entered Danloup battery and made some progress towards Fort Souville. The French have recently made progress in the same sector. Russia announced to-day that the enemy had been defeated south of the Luts salient, and driven across the Lipa. Thirteen thousand prisoners and thirty guns captured. Heavy fighting continues on the Stokhod and Baronovitchi sectors. In the Caucasus the Russians took Mamakhatna and captured Bahmut. The Italians continue their pressure upon the Austrians. ### Labrador Report

#### Fish Struck in Early. Fishermen Late Getting Down

Capt. Parsons, of the S. S. Sagona, which ship arrived at St. John's from Labrador on Sunday morning last, furnishes the following report of the fishery on that coast to date:— At Paul's Island the first sign of cod was had Saturday week.

Queen's Lakes—Just a sign. From that place up to the Turnaviks the ship reported nothing more, but at these places there was a splendid sign of cod, though the people were as late as two weeks too late in getting down to do anything. Thos. Evans had 150 qts. ashore.

At Hak the winter men said they jigged fish on the 29th May. Which is the earliest time on record on which cod was taken on Labrador. One winter man was with 200 qts. for a small crew. The Dunns and other good fish killers only just got down and were doing something as the ship came south.

At Makovik Island there was plenty of codfish and all doing well. At Strawberry Bay crafts have as high as 500 qts., especially those which arrived early.

At Iron Bound Island, Hierlihy's, of Bay Roberts, were sitting out, with plenty of cod and caplin there, but no one there except those named to catch it.

Ragged Islands.—Plenty of fish, but the ship only just brought the crews there and all were hastily getting ready for the work. The Eskimos had it all to themselves. It was sticking off when the new arrivals came.

Jigger Tickle.—Two or three schooners 450 to 500 each. Cape Harrison—W. Sampson had 500 qts., and Regier the same. About 30 other schooners there had from 100 to 150 qts., but were too late for the first spurt.

King's Bay—They did very well. Schooners 400 to 500. Holton, Emily H., Horse H.—Doing well. Shoremen 50 to 150, but not as much fish when the ship was coming south.

White Bears—Same as Snooky. Wads, of Conception H., at five Islands had 600 qts., as they were down early. At Out Throat one man 450 qts.; others not doing well, being down too late. Some 100, others 150, and still others reporting very little. From Peck's H., to Indian Tackle very little doing. From that up to Battle H., there has been a little spurt but as the ship came south it was poor.



## Let The Good Work Go On

Another appeal is to be made to the public spirited residents of Bay Roberts and vicinity, and, as it is one which should find its way into the innermost recesses of the hearts of those who are nourished by the milk of human kindness, we feel assured the response will be prompt and generous.

The great war is far-reaching in its ravages and demands; but we have put our hand to the plow; we cannot be drawn-hearted and turn back; we must pay the full price, dear though it be, in order to make the final victory a lasting, glorious monument to our zeal and self-sacrifice.

Our regiment at the front has suffered heavy casualties. Many of Newfoundland's best and bravest sons who were serving either with "Ours," or with Canadian regiments, among them loved ones from Bay Roberts, now sleep beneath the blood stained fields of France.

The list of wounded is long, and the need of funds for the upkeep of cots in the hospitals great. Are we going to be behind in this matter? Shall we prove recreant to the duty that is set before us? We dare not! We must not!

A mass meeting of citizens was called in the Public Building on Wednesday night last for the purpose of considering this matter, but, while there was a large gathering of ladies present, we regret to state the gentlemen did not attend in the force that the exigencies of the cause demanded.

We cannot believe that it was because of indifference, or lack of the spirit of patriotism; but, whatever the cause, the fact remains that there should have been a better attendance.

The meeting was called to order at 8 o'clock by Mr. John Jardine, J. P., who read a telegram from Sir W. H. Horwood, stating the need that existed for an additional supply of cots, and asking that Bay Roberts guarantee to supply one or more.

He then called on Mr. C. E. Russell, who, in a brief speech, outlined the object of the meeting, and made a touching reference to the fact that some of our residents had been bereaved of their sons, while others of our boys are now in hospital demanding our care.

Adjutant Elsworth, S. A., was then called to the platform, and made a brief speech. He was followed by Mr. J. D. Ford, who also spoke briefly. Both these gentlemen sought to emphasize the fact that action speaks louder than words. Miss Parsons, Pres. of the W. P. A., also briefly addressed the gathering.

On motion of Constable Wells, seconded by Mr. Geo. Jardine, Mr. C. E. Russell was elected Secretary-Treasurer, when the following business was transacted.— The meeting decided, on behalf of the citizens of Bay Roberts and vicinity, to send a message to Chief Justice Horwood, guaranteeing the upkeep of one or more cots for our wounded soldiers for one year.

The whole section was then divided up into wards and a number of ladies and gentlemen volunteered to call on the citizens for their subscriptions. These collectors form the committee, who will meet in the public building at 8 o'clock Saturday night to finalize arrangements in reference to the collections, which will be made next week.

## Latest War News

### Not Worried

London, July 19.—"We really are not worried by the war," said Sir William Robertson in an interview with an Associated Press correspondent. "As to the new offensive, a glance at the map will tell the story of the progress."

### Germans in Delville Wood

London, July 19.—The Germans have recaptured a portion of Delville Wood and obtained a footing in the northern outskirts of Longueval, the War Office announced today.

### Recapture of Longueval

London, July 19.—British troops have recaptured the village of Longueval, and in Delville Wood, most of the ground taken by the Germans on Tuesday night, according to a British official tonight. Hard fighting is still in progress in this region. South of Delville Wood this afternoon, we dispersed with our fire a large body of Germans massing to attack Waterloo farm from the direction of Gnillemont.

### French Official

Paris, July 19.—The French made some progress last night on the Verdun front in the course of hand grenade fighting in the vicinity of Fleury, says today's official report. Artillery actions continue in this district. A German raid in the region of Paschendaal, Belgium, was checked by the French fire, as was a raid north of the Aisne near Paezzy.

### Russians Cross Carpathians

London, July 19.—The Russians have crossed the Carpathians and have penetrated a day's march into Hungary, according to a despatch from Petrograd. The despatch says that the Russians are threatening the Austrian rear in the mountains. The advance is being made, according to this information, by armies of General Letchitzky, which are again on the move after an interval of quiet.

### From Berlin

Berlin, July 19.—The Russians have been strongly reinforced along the front south and south west of Riga, at the northern end of the Russian line, and have been heavily attacking Von Hindenburg's forces there. War Office announced today that these assaults all failed, and that the Russians suffered unusually severe losses.

### Russians Forging Ahead

Petrograd, July 19.—Russian infantry in Galicia is advancing towards the passes of the Carpathians which lead into Hungary. Further north in the marsh region, an official statement today says, an attempt by the Austro-German forces to take the offensive was broken: In the Caucasus the Russians have made further progress.

Last week in referring to the poor service given to Bay Roberts by the Postal Telegraphs in the matter of supplying the public with war news, we omitted to state that the Anglo American Co. has been pains taking in its endeavor to furnish us with news. Our citizens will appreciate that fact.

James Hunt, George Strickland, John Strickland (brothers), and Philip Hunt, all of Hr. Briton, the men who strayed away from the banker Metamora, landed at Bay Bulls on Wednesday, after battling with the winds and waves for five days and nights.
