Half a Million Pounds Will Not Cover the Loss of Property Ashore.

Just before the departure of the steamer Miowera from Sydney news was received of terrific gales and floods on the Queensland coast.

Referring to the storm the Townsville Bulletin said: "Once more has the meteorological office given timely warning of the advent of violent disturbances, and the warning was timely; but as no human preparations could insure preservation from the dire effects of so terrible an exhibition of the force of nature, this warning was almost useless."

The wind blew persistently from the south, being accompanied at times with a heavy rain which, under the influence of the gale, found its way into the houses.
