DREADNOUGHT The Bohemian Girl, was presented by the Robinson Opera Company last evening in Dreadnought class, or her eleventh, in-

Robinson Opera Company last evening in the Opera House before a large audience. That the piece was thoroughly enjoyed all through, was evident from the hearty applause that greeted the members of the cast.

Frank D. Nelson portrayed the character of Count Arnheim, whose daughter is stolen by the gypsies, in an admirable manner. THE NICKEL TODAY

Decadought class, or her eleventh, including the three battleship cruisers, represented by the Inflexible, now participating in the Hudson-Fulton celebration at New York, was successfully launched here on Thursday by the Duchess of Albany, in the presence of a great concurse.

The bulkheads of this super-Dreadnought are so heavily armored that experts consider her practically unsinkable by a torpedo.

The Neptune was commenced at Portsmouth January 9, of this year. She has a displacement of 20,250 tons, length 510 feet and beam 86 feet.

She is consequently ten feet longer and two feet wider than any of her predecessors. She exceeds the Dreadnought two feet wider than any of her predecessors.
