Sudden Death of a Doctor.—Dr. J. L. Webster, one of the leading physicians of Yarmouth, N. S., on Sunday morning last was stricken with paralysis and died before daylight.

INSPECTOR MERRITT and Meridith of the Bank of Montreal are in town. T. A. Vaughan, Esq., senior member of the firm of Vaughan & Ross, Iron and Cordage Merchants, St. John, and S. S. DeForest, Esq., of the firm of DeForest Harrison & Co. will visit the Miramichi on business to-morrow.

INSPECTOR.—Dominion Inspectors Smith and Coker are in Chatham, the former inspecting boilers and machinery and the latter the hulls of the steamers. The Midon was inspected yesterday and pronounced a first-class boat. The passenger service between Chatham and Upper Point, the St. Michael taking her place while the officers were performing their work. The Miramichi will probably be inspected to-morrow.

WAGGONS.—Mr. Alex. Robinson whose carriage works on St. John St. Chatham are so well known, has a lot of new wagons on hand and in process of manufacture will worthily inspect by intending purchasers. He has just completed a pair of wagons for Mr. Theo. Keating and a parcel delivery wagon for Mr. E. Strang, both of which are of creditable design and finish.

Mr. Strang's wagon was receiving the finishing touches, yesterday and was much admired by good judges of such vehicles.

ANGELINA.—There has been the usual June crash of trout from the Indian. Some of these were of the finest quality, good, had and indifferent. A few hit the big run, but more missed than when the gathering of the disciples of the rod was in its fullest. Once the opportunity of the favorite resort presented the appearance of a young skimmer facing each other, at no very wide "extension" either. Mr. J. M. Redick and party who went up from Chatham to Mr. R. M. Little's place were among the most successful anglers. Mr. Redick killing a bright salmon besides a number of four pound trout.

Mr. Geo. Cassidy's Factory is thus referred to in London, Eng. "Among the growing industries of Chatham, N. B., the new and old factory of Mr. George Cassidy has attracted much attention. He has added to his machines, this spring, a new combined planer, moulder and miller. This machine will make two sides of a board 24 in. wide at one operation, or it will plane, or plane and moulder up to 18 in. wide, or form mouldings of any pattern, and as large as ever used, being no doubt, as complete a machine as is made.

ANOTHER REDUCTION.—Following the example set by the Miramichi Steam Navigation Company, the rate of fare on the old Andover has been reduced between Chatham and Newcastle. They were always too high when the Andover and Ripple had a monopoly of the run, and the public will thank the people's company for giving them an improved service at a reasonable rate. Of course it is better for the Andover to make a virtue of necessity and follow the good example of the Ripple, but the travelling public will not fail to appreciate the fact that popular rates were adopted by the Nelson company without any outside pressure. We have not heard that the Andover rates are reduced, or whether there is no opposition.

SUDDEN DEATH.—There was a rather sad occurrence happened at Derby on Monday evening, last. A Mr. McKinnon, master mason, who has been employed in connection with the Indian Branch Railway, died very suddenly. He was at his boarding house, having returned from his work, and while the landlady was preparing tea, washed himself and laid down on a lounge. When the landlady called him he made no reply, and when she went over to him, thinking he was asleep, was startled to find that he was dead. Dr. Freeman, coroner, held an inquest on Tuesday morning, when a verdict was found that death had been caused by heart disease. McKinnon was beloved by his wife and his two children and two grand children.—Sun.

WHEN THEY DO.—They get properly started they are superior to the men in some things. For instance a special from St. George, Saker (Empire), West Virginia, says that last Saturday evening Colley Payne and Mary Gregory, girls 18 or 20 years old, daughters of farmers living near that place, quarrelled over the attention that they were being paid then by a young man named Brown and engaged in a fight, which was witnessed by several men, who refused to interfere until Miss Gregory had been badly hurt up. They fought with their fists. Miss Payne picked up a stone, and holding it in her hand, struck Miss Gregory several times in the face. While Miss Gregory was lying on the ground Miss Payne picked her up and threw her into a pile of hot cinders left by burning brush, and Miss Gregory was badly burned about the hands and arms.

A Sensational Rumour.—A Tragic correspondent writes us as follows, under date of 7th inst.—"The monstrous rumour of our rural existence, according to this, that some of our best wheat was being carried off by a woman of the name of which during some portions of the year are pacific; but during a certain

period its waters are convulsed by strong winds, which blow more fiercely around the north pole than on any other part of the globe. The waves raised by this gushing sea against the icy mountains which girdle the pole sea with such fury that enormous quantities of spray are thrown skyward; thus spray when it reaches a very high elevation, is lighted up by the sun whose rays are reflected through the most northern atmosphere. It is argued, therefore, that it is this distribution of light through the atmosphere that produces the northern lights, and the converse, namely changing spray and reflected light produce the flickering movements of the aurora borealis.

BANK CLERK ARRESTED.—A McGowan Main, of the Bank of Nova Scotia at Amherst, N. S., has been arrested for appropriating \$200. The Amherst Guardian in its issue of the 2nd inst. says that the sum named it has been found that two others have been taken, making the whole amount \$377.90. Whichever of the three was the money was uncertain; but it may be that it was to replace other sums previously taken. Main came from Glasgow, a few years ago, where his relative lived, and where he was clerk in a bank, and took a situation in the Bank of Nova Scotia, at Halifax. He was afterwards transferred to Newmarket, and has been with the agency at Amherst about a year and a half. He is about 30 years of age. His being searched only \$2 was found in his pockets. In addition to the sum named it has been found that two others have been taken, making the whole amount \$377.90.

Another Victory for Ross.—A Buffalo dispatch of May 31st says—James H. Riley, of Saratoga, who will row a match race with Wallace Ross at Oak Point, near New York, yesterday, was unable to row, having contracted a severe cold in his practice. Geo. Galtier offers to take his place. If Ross gives him a start of twenty seconds in the three miles. Ross agreed to do this, and the men got ready. In his twenty seconds Galtier managed to get a start of about twelve boat lengths, and when Ross started the race seemed almost hopeless. The long powerful strokes of the man from New Brunswick told, however, and by the time the stake boat, a mile and a half from the start, had been reached the distance between the two men had been reduced to about five boat lengths, and the pace was beginning to tell on Galtier. He is a fine oarsman, and rowed more rapidly, and before the distance was half traversed his boat was lapping that of his opponent. By the time the last half mile of the journey had been begun, the two boats were unable to obtain a "clear." Among the places they visited outside the city were; Eastport, Grand Manan, Calais, Moncton, St. Stephen, Robroy, Sussex, Quaco and Hampton.

Though not successful now, the Pickerton men have confidence that Robinson will yet be captured. "With our staff of officers," said one of the detectives, "I don't think it possible Robinson will get by his liberty much longer. We have about 300 agents in various parts of the world and each man will have a printed description and likeness of Robinson who they will be very likely to find him to escape capture." Robinson's furniture was traced from the house on German street to the auction room where it is alleged to be sold. Mrs. Robinson was "shadowed" for some time and conversations were had with relatives but apparently without obtaining any kind of his whereabouts. The report paper up to the present date is estimated at \$63,000.—Globe.

THE RIPPLE.—The little steamer Ripple arrived on Saturday evening, shortly after the Transient went to press. Her first work was to tow the Clara J. Willard down the river, which job she accomplished satisfactorily. This morning she towed the Star, Capt. Burton, and the Ripple. The Ripple is a screw boat of 19 tons register and partly new. She has a government certificate for 40 passengers and will carry nearly 50 more freight. She will run between Moncton and Hillsboro, Hopewell, Harvey and other points down the river wherever sufficient business exists. She will take an excursion to Harvey on Saturday to see the launch of Mr. Turver's new ship, said to be the largest ever constructed in New Brunswick. The Ripple was purchased for \$2000, by the Petrolina Steamship Company, organized by Capt. H. E. Call, of Newcastle, who has had her in the Miramichi river service. She was brought from Miramichi, around the Nova Scotia shore, by Capt. Redick, who nearly all the time, navigating the long passage. The boat sustained no damage beyond the parting of some of her steam pipes, caused by the heavy weather.—Transient.

Death of David Sadler, Esq.—David Sadler, Esq., Deputy Crown Land Surveyor and J. P., of Dalhousie, and father of John Sadler, Esq., of Chatham, died at his residence in Dalhousie, on the 8th inst. of his age. He came to Miramichi from his native place, Kirkpatrick, Juxta, Dumfriesshire, Scotland, about sixty years ago, remaining here a few years and then removing to Dalhousie, where he has always held a leading position in town and county affairs. He was a man of great integrity, a genuine christian and a devoted reformer, a valued an honest citizen.

Northern and Western Railway Co.—A meeting of the Northern and Western Railway Co. was held at the Miramichi (West) Railway Co., was held at the parlour of the Queen Hotel at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Mr. Alex. Gibson presiding.

Directors were chosen as follows: Alex. Gibson, J. B. Snowball, John Gibson, Alex. Morrison, Alex. Gibson, Jr., Alfred Rowley and John McLaughlin. Mr. Geo. F. Gregory was appointed Secretary and solicitor.

The Directors were authorized to apply for powers to acquire or buy out the Chatham Branch.—Gleaner.
