TO PREVENT DUMPING.

Iron Manufacturers of the World Combine to Protect Home Markets and Regulate Exports.

NEW YORK, April 21.—A special despatch to the Sun, dated London, April

of the world began its session here to-day. Its object is to arrange for the reservation of home markets, the pre-vention of dumping and the fixing of vention of dumping and the fixing of uniform export prices. The countries represented are Great Britain, Germany, the United States, Austria and Belgium. The project originated with the German syndicate, the Deutcher Stahlwerksverband, of which Herr Thyssen is the chief representative.

Pourpariers began three months ago, with the result that dumping was greatly restricted during the last two months. The original proposal was to regulate prices only in the neutral markets. The German manufacturers objected that the proposal was not feaspected that the proposal was not feas-able unless it included Great Britain, where Germany dumps a million tons a year. THE COST OF THE WAR. ST. PETERSBURG, April 21.-Rus sia has made a new issue \$15,000,000 in paper ourrency against free gold in the state bank. At the ministry of finance it was explained that it was warm spring weather. forced. Under the law paper is issuable to double the amount of gold, up to \$150,000,000 gold in excess of which paper issued must be covered rouble for rouble. In the state bank there are \$400,000,000 in gold which would permit of an issue of \$550,000,000 in paper, but the paper issue at present only amounts to \$65,000,000. All sorts of figures of the cost of the war are printed abroad. The correspondent of the Associated Press is authoritatively informed that the daily expenses are averaging \$750,000 and it is estimated that a year's amonditure for the war. that a year's expenditure for the war will total \$250,000,000. To meet these there exists a free balance of \$50,000,-000 which was increased \$115,000 by reductions of the ordinary budgets, leaving ostensibly \$135,000,000 to be found. 




